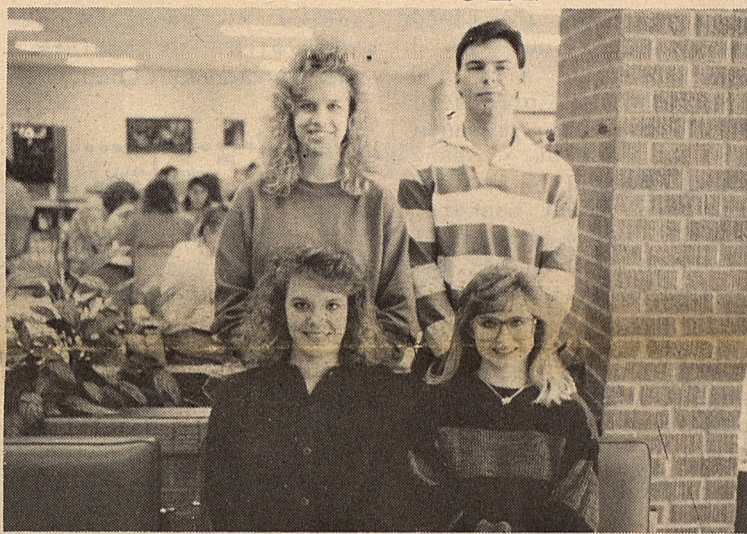

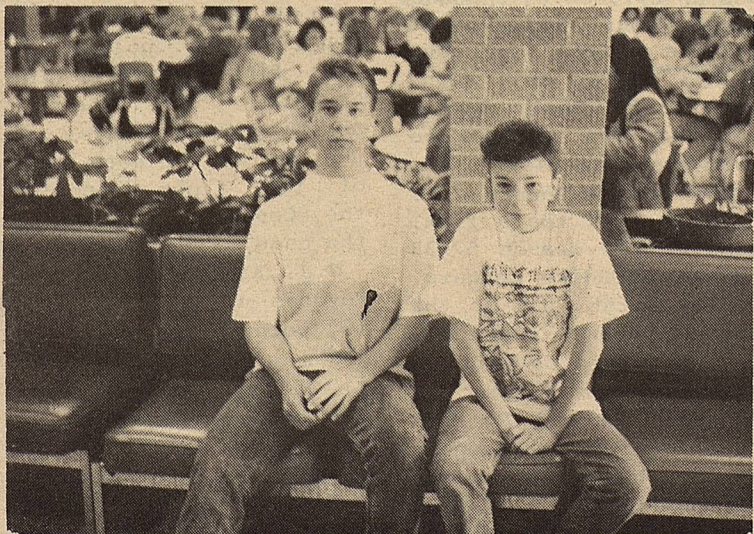
Sam, also known as "Mr. Football" is retiring from coaching and teaching after more than 30 years on the field.

Sam said, "I do not have any definite plans for the future, but would like to look after a few head of cattle, as long as they didn't interfere with cont. to pg. 8

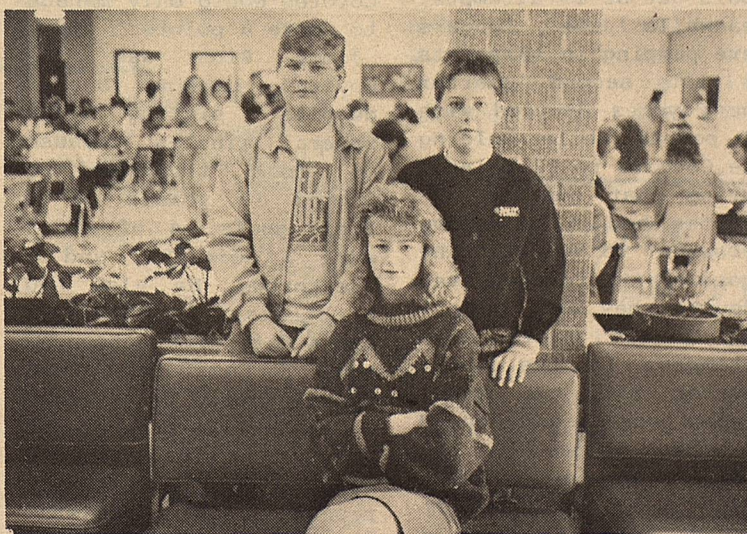

## Coyotes Burned By Dragons 60-56

The Borden County Coyotes battled the Dawson dragons for 32 minutes before the final outcome could be determined. The Coyotes fell behind in the first quarter as a result of poor shooting and 5 turnovers. The Coyotes only made 3 out of 15 field goal attempts and found themselves trailing 15-7. In the second quarter the Coyotes shooting improved greatly (8 out of 17), and they only committed 3 turnovers. The Coyotes outscored the Dragons 20 to 15 to pull within 3 points at halftime. The Coyotes good second quarter shooting carried over into the third quarter with the Coyotes making 7 out of 14 field goals. The Coyotes outscored the Dragons 15 to 13 to close the scoring gap to only 1 point. The fourth quarter proved too much for the coyotes. Their troubles began with Cole Vestal picking up his fifth foul. Then a short time later, Jimmy Rios was whistled for his fifth foul. To make matters worse after the Coyotes had managed to acquire a 4 point lead with about 1 minutes and 30 seconds left in the game, Cody Stone was forced to sit out the

rest of the game with his fifth foul. The shooting percentage also fell with only 5 of 13 field goals falling for the Coyotes. The turnovers proved to be too much for the Coyotes as they gave the Dragons the ball 10 times on turnovers in the final 8 minutes.

Despite the final outcome, the overall performance was the best the Coyotes have had since the district competition. Jimmy Rios led the Coyotes in scoring with 21 points. He was good on 9 out of 15 field goal tries, 1 of which was a 3 point try. He also made 2 free throws, 1 steal, 4 offensive rebounds, and 2 defensive rebounds. Cole Vestal scored 14 points on 6 out of 13 field goals and 2 out of 3 freethrows. He also had 2 steals, 3 offensive and 10 defensive rebounds and an assist. Shane Kemper scored 6 points on 2 three point baskets. He also had 4 steals, 1 defensive rebound, and an assist. Clint Kemper had 5 points on 2 field goals and a free throw. ## Lady Coyotes Extinguist Dragons

A total team effort enabled the Borden County Lady Coyotes to romp past the Dawson Lady Dragons in Tuesday night's action by a score of 77-18. Eleven people got into the scoring column in the lopsided win as Borden came out hot, hitting 65% from the field in the first quarter and led 25-6 at the end of eight minutes of play. Borden extended their lead to 45-8 by halftime and led 57-12 after three quarters of play. For the game, Borden shot 47% from the field, 67% from the line, came up with 21 steals, 21 assists, and 48 rebounds.

Lisha led in scoring with 22 points, 18 coming in the first half. She was followed in double figures by Randi Woodward with 13 points. Kristi Adcock had 8

points, Amy Lewis and Amanda Anderson each hit 7, Rachel Romero and Julie Harris each made 5, Shayne Hess hit 4, Leslie Fryar made a three pointer, Kelly Jo Ogden made 2, and Shara Dee Woodward contributed a free throw to the total. The Borden County Coyotes ended their season at Klondike last Friday. The Cougars set the pace of the game in the first quarter as they held the Coyotes to only 4 points on 2 field goals out of 15 attempts. Meanwhile the Cougars were pumping in 18 points. In the second quarter the Coyotes erupted with 21 points while holding the Cougars to 17 points. During that quarter the Coyotes had 9 offensive rebounds to help in the scoring effort even though they made only 7 out of 24 field goal attempts. In the third quarter the two teams traded baskets and scored 18 points apiece. In the fourth quarter Jimmy Rios fouled out, and it looked like the whole world caved in on the Coyotes. Only 2 out of 15 field goal attempts

## Lady Coyotes End District With 78-32 Win At Klondike

The only way to describe Friday's district game at Klondike was complete domination in every quarter against the Lady Cougars. Borden opened the first quarter of play with a nine point lead, 19-10 and extended the lead to 36-17 by half-time. The 50% shooting from the floor, combined with aggressive defense by the Lady Coyotes was more than Klondike could overcome. If things looked bad for the Lady Cougars in the first half, the second half was not much kinder to them as Borden out shot the home team 19-6 for a 32 point lead entering the last quarter. The last quarter was just a continuation as Borden hit 23 points to Klondike's 9 for the 46 point margin of victory.

A balanced scoring attack enabled the Lady Coyotes to take their biggest win ever over the Lady Cougars, with Lisha Sternadel and Randi Woodward each hitting 14 points. They were followed by Amy Lewis with 13 and Amanda Anderson with 11. Kristi Adcock hit 9 points, Shara Dee Woodward added 7, Rachel Romero made 5, Leslie Fryar hit a three pointer, and Julie Harris contributed 2 to the win. Lisha led in field goal percentage with 71% followed by Amy with 56%. Lisha led in free throw percentage with 100% followed by Kristi and Amanda with 63% each. Kristi and Amanda also tied for honors in steals with 4 each. Amy led in rebounds with 13 followed by Kristi, Randi and Amanda with 8 each. Rachel led in assists with 4.

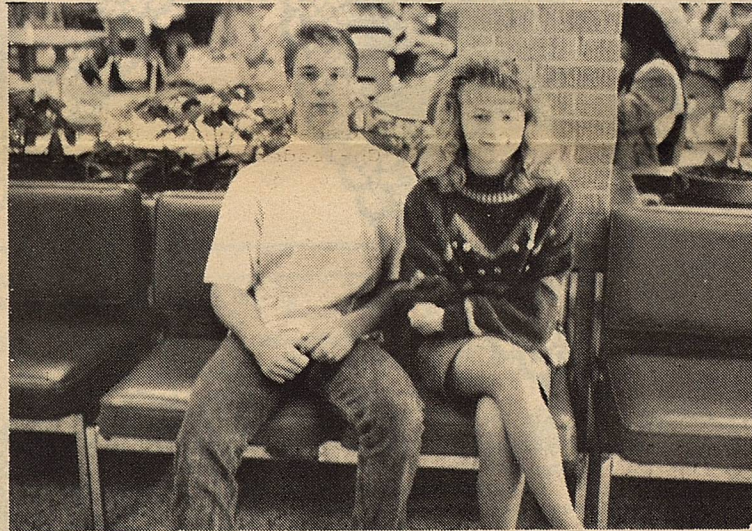

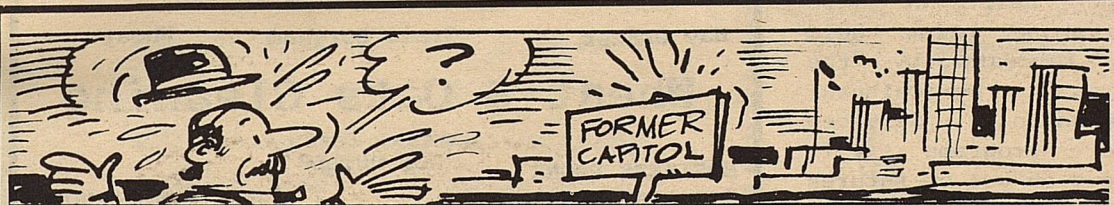
## UIL Practice Meets Begin
