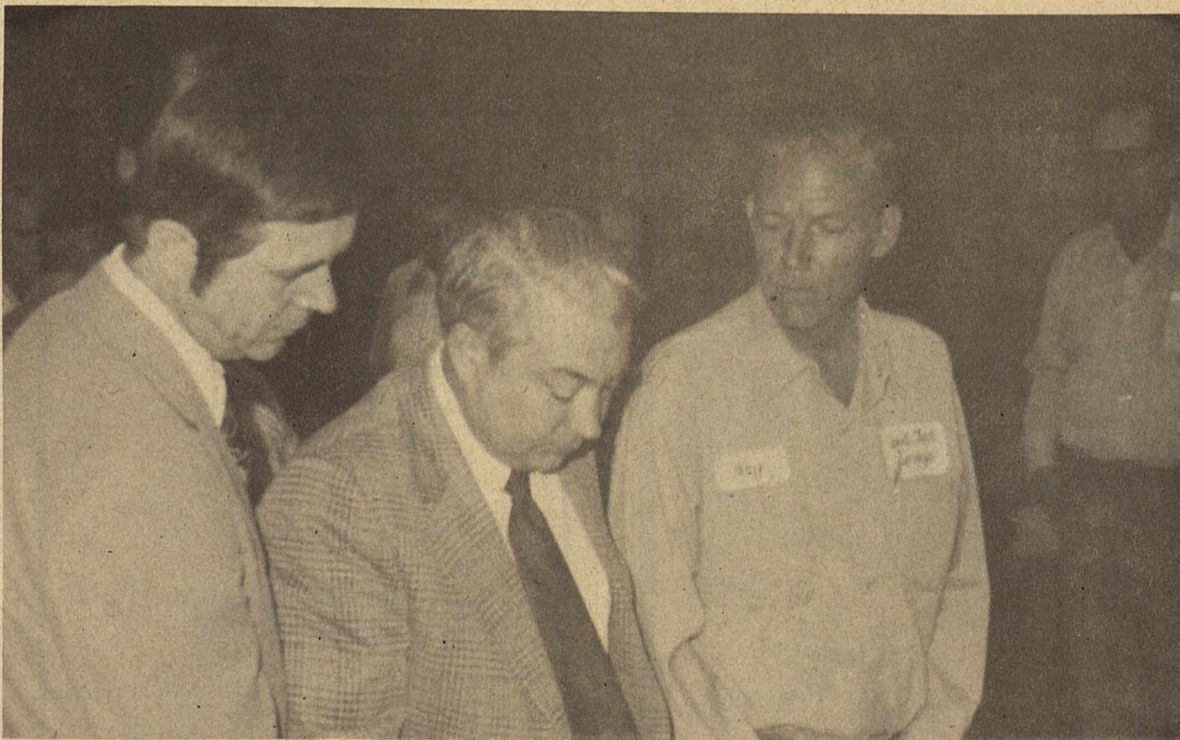

!!! A GREAT MEETING !!!

Wednesday, October 23rd was a historic day for the residence of Kinney County. The County Commissioners held a special call meeting to discuss the activation of an ambulance service for the area, and invited members of the City Council. Also Attending were officials of the Texas State Health Dept. and Dick Reardon of the Middle Rio Grande Dev. Council.

This was an official meeting called by the county commissioners, for the purpose of discussing ambulance service for the area. The City Council was invited and participated in an unofficial capacity, since this was not a duly called Council meeting.

SUMMARY

Derald Dugger and Bill Lawson, of the Texas Dept. of Health pledged their support. Both of these men have been instrumental in initiating similar services in several other communities.

Ray Huntley submitted the names of 36 people who have signed up for the first aid course to qualify as ambulance attendants.

Jake Royal, who is a qualified Red Cross instructor, volunteered to teach the required course.

All City Councilmen and County Commissioners agreed, "that this service is a Must for the community".

Jake Royal, in behalf of the Kinney County Memorial Clinic Committee, offered to donate the present ambulance to Kinney County.

This was an official commissioners meeting and the following resolutions were passed by unanimous vote:

If the old ambulance was found to be in running condition, \$750.00 would be designated to buy new tires, a battery,, misc. repairs and insurance for a year.

Bids would be submitted for a new ambulance, thereby allowing, the older ambulance to serve as a standby unit in the future.

All City Councilmen present agreed, that when the total figures were available, they would be willing to discuss the cost sharing aspects of such an operation.

EDITORS NOTE

After attending the above meeting with both the city council and county commissioners, (which lasted several hours), I feel every member of this community should thank them for their support on this very worthwhile project.

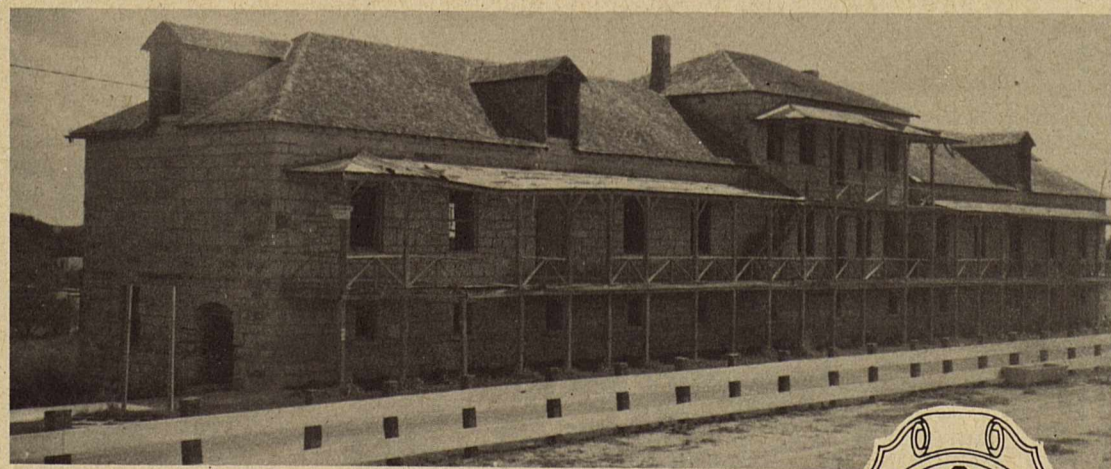

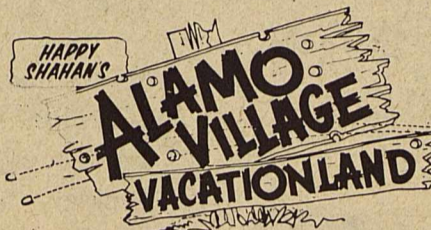

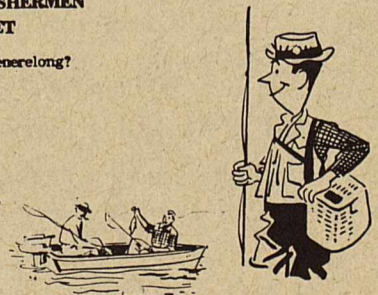
