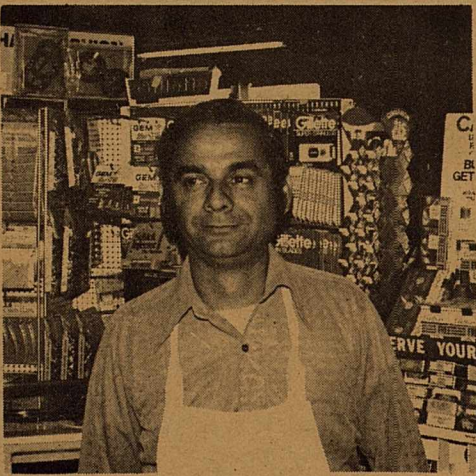

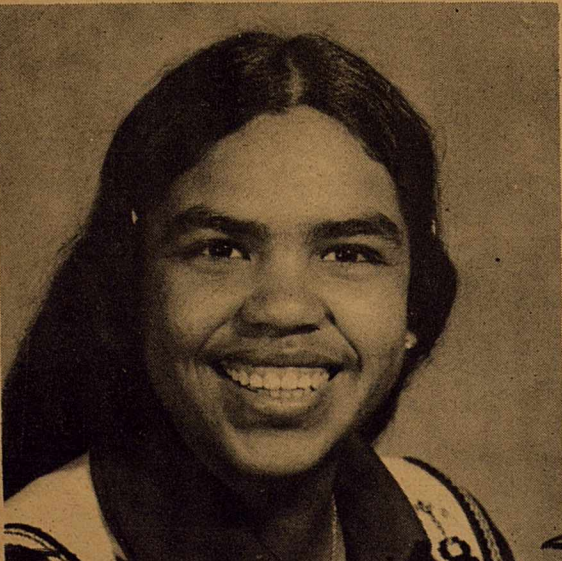

Freddy Newman and Mark Veltmann placed 1st in District and 2nd in REGIONAL which qualified them for State.

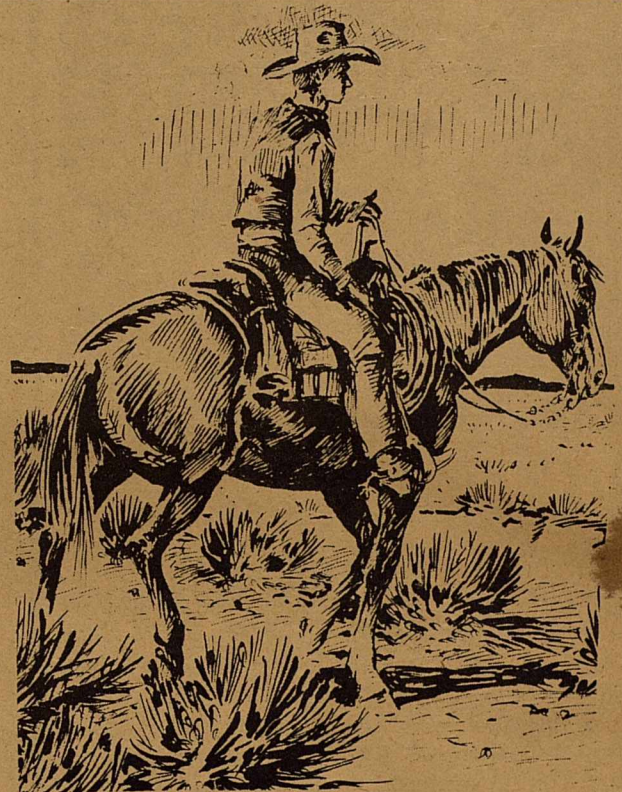
The Coach for the Brackett Team is Kathy (Mrs. Jimmy) Bader. This is Mrs. Bader;s first year to Coach a Tennis Team.

MEMBERSHIPS AVAILABLE

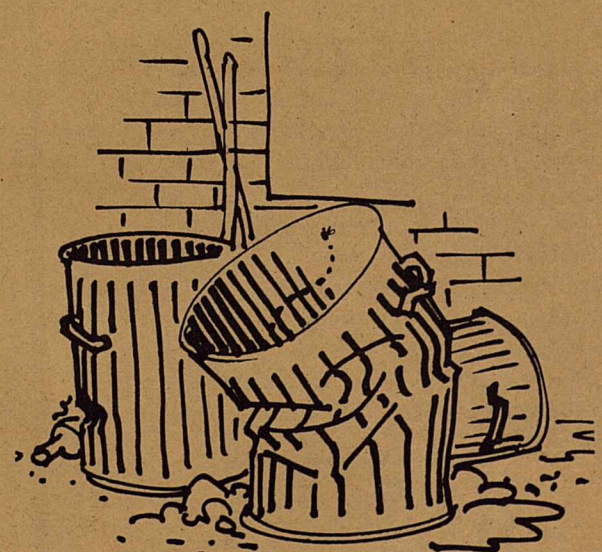

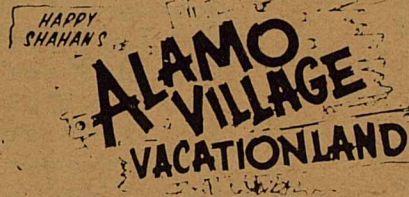

APRIL 28, 1975

Judge Tommy Seargeant called the meeting to order at 9:00 o'clock a.m. with the following members present: Commissioner Manuel Fuentes, Commissioner L.S. Johnson, County Clerk, Dolores Raney. Absent: Commissioner T.H. Glover, Commissioner G.C. Talamantez; Sheriff J.A. Sheedy; and Tully Shahan, County Attorney.

Judge Seargeant reported that the 1974 audit report would be ready for the next meeting.

ELECTION RETURNS CANVASSED

The returns of the April 22, 1975, Constitutional Amendment Election were canvassed and Commissioner L.S. Johnson made a motion to certify the returns as correct. Commissioner manuel Fuentes seconded the motion which passed.

LITTLE LEAGUE FENCE

Ray Robinson informed the court that the Little League has approximately \$300.00 for the new fence. Judge Seargeant said that Mr. Medndelsohn is donating over \$400.00 to the Kinney

to Kinney County to cover the balance of cost on the fence for the Little League Park. Judge Seargeant also stated that the rest room facilities at the Recreational Park would be available for Little Leaguers until such time as the rest rooms at the old concession could be repaired.

RECREATION PARK DISCUSSED

The recreation park has not been accepted by Kinney County, and there is a possibility that the paving around the park will have to be repaired before acceptance from the contractor. The opening date for the park is not definite but it will probably open in another month. Judge Seargeant asked if there were any comments about the park and Mrs. Emil Schafer said that the water standing in the swimming pool was breeding mosquitos in her neighborhood.

Meeting adjourned.

SCREW-WORM WARNING!

Carl Esser, Kinney County Extension Agent, urges all livestock owners to carefully inspect all livestock for signs of screwworm infestation. The moisture and temperature conditions throughout the area are ideal for screwworms. Esser urges all livestock owners to carefully watch navels of new born animals for signs of screwworms infestation. In addition: shearing; docking; earmarking; castration; and other "working" wounds are prime prospects for screwworms at this time of the year. screwworm cases have been reported in Val Verde; Kinney Uvalde; Real; and Edwards County.

When an infected is found the owners are asked to carefully collect a sample from deep in the center of the wound and submit to the screwworm laboratory center in Mission. Sample kits for collecting samples are available from the County Extension Office, notes Esser.

Saturday, April 26th, the District 13 4-H Council and District 13 4-H Adult Leader Association met at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Uvalde. Representatives from Kinney County 4-H included Kaye York and Lisa Porter along with Mrs. Joe York, Jr. and Carl Esser. Plans were discussed for the District 13 4-H Sponsored Career Day scheduled for June 10th in San Antonio, and the District 13 4-H Leaders Conference scheduled in Sept. at the H.E.B. Camp in Leakey.

NOTARY PUBLIC REQUIREMENTS

Texas Secretary of State Mark White today announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1975 and ends June 1, 1977, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1975 and May 15, 1975, inclusive.

Secretary White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1975, should have applied to the County Clerk before April 30, 1975. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk. Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State as the law specifically provides that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

WASHINGTON--- Representative Susan Gurley McBee, Del Rio, Texas, was among the more than onehundred state legislative leaders from throughout the country who today met at the White House with President Ford, Secretary of State, Kissinger, members of the President's Domestic Council and on Capitol Hill with Congressional leaders. The legislators were in Washington for a special leadership meeting sponsored by the National Conference of State Legislatures.

President Ford told the state leaders that he has sent a draft bill to Congress proposing that extension and revision of general revenue sharing. "This legislation," the President said, "takes a good concept--Revenue Sharing--and extends it, at the same time including some very important improvements and refinements."

The President's bill would retain the the present revenue sharing formula, authorize funds for five and three-quarters years, provide for a \$150 million yearly increase in funding, increase some cities' share by easing per capita restraints, permit a more flexible system of reports, and require renewal consideration two years prior to extension.

Following President Ford's remarks members of the President's Domestic Council fielded a series of questions from the legislative leaders. Paul O'Neill, Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget, warned that is federal spending continues at its current rate, by the year 2000 the federal budget deficit will exceed \$720 billion.

Micheal Duvall, Associate Director of the Domestic Council, told the legislators that the energy crisis is getting worse daily, and he chided the Congress for not taking any national action on this issue.

Secretary of State, Kissinger addressed the group and answered questions for nearly 40 minutes, but his remarks were off the record.

Charles W. Bray, III, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Public Affairs, briefed the legislative leaders at the State Department. He warned against a return to isolationism, and explained how foreign policy questions--such as those dealing with energy--have important domestic effects.

At the morning session, held in the New Senate Office Building on Capitol Hill, the state leaders had an opportunity to question the Speaker of the House, Carl Albert, (Oklahoma); Rep. Jim Wright, (Texas); and Senators Edmund Muskie (Maine); and Peter Dominici (New Mexico); and James McClure (Idaho) Senators Henry Jackson (Washington) and Lloys Bentsen (Texas) also spoke.

Senator Muskie, Chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, expressed confidence in its program, but warned that "next week, when our proposed new FY '76 budget strategy is debated on the floor, things could slow down, particularly as Senators urge funding for their own pet projects or programs."

The Senate Budget Committee, in its first formal report, has proposed a FY '76 spending target of \$365 billion. It calls for different spending priorities than the Administration. Key features of the Committee's budget strategy include a \$4 billion shift from defense and foreign aid spending to "Humans needs" programs and a \$4.5 billion increase for relief programs such as unemployment compensation and food stamps.

Rep. Jim Wright (Texas) urged adoption of a Public Works Bill, H.R. 5247, which would authorize \$5 billion to states and localities suffering from high unemployment. The money would be used to finance already existing public works programs that can be begun within 30 days.

Rep/ Wright, a member of the Public Works Committee, reminded the legislators that "for every one per cent of unemployment, the nation loses \$14 billion in tax revenues as well as an additional \$2 billion in federal payout for welfare and unemployment compensation."

Stating the "no one should be able to buy themselves out of this crisis," Senator Jackson said he opposed the Administrations's proposal to increase taxes in order to deter purchasing. He advocated opening up existing energy reserves such as those in Elks Hill, California and Alaska, and the establishment of a National Energy Production Board to mobilize U.S. resources to acheive energy self-sufficiency.

Speaking to what he described as the "movers and shakers of the sate governments," Senator Bentsen called for an expanded monetary supply to prime the pump of the nation's economy. "You can't stimulate housing construction," he said, "with high interest rates."

Senator Bentsen also noted that the U.S. is spending nearly 5 times less for agricultural research and development than it did 20 years ago. "We need to increase food production," he said, "in order to help the consumers and farmers, while improving our balances of trade."

Senator Domenici said that enough federal employment programs already exist. He warned against the "growth of huge W.P.A. projects with millions of people on a never-ending federal payroll."

Senator McClure advised against a federal take-over of the welfare system. He called for welfare reform in order to "get the cheaters off the rolls, and put those who deserve it back on."

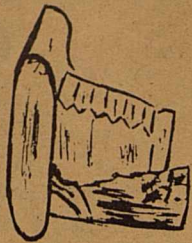

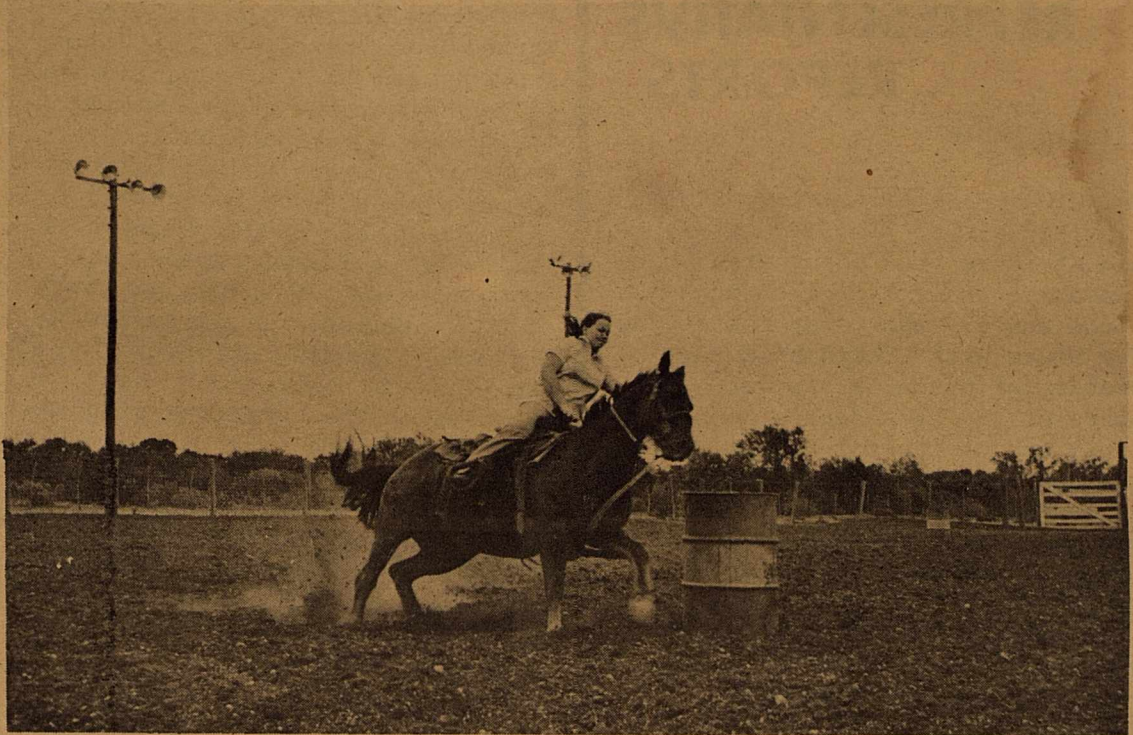

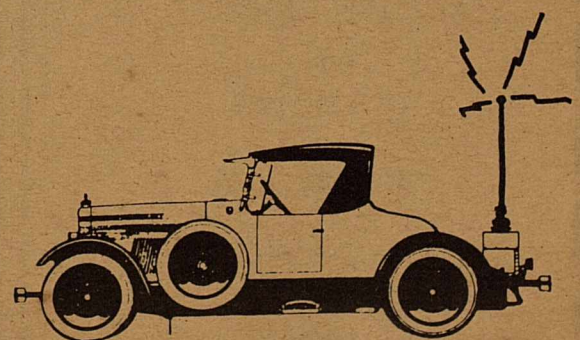
