Seargeant is reportedly being questioned by the Del Rio Police Dept. about the incident.

Seargeant is the youngest Justice of the Peace in Texas at 21.

FRONTIER FAIR OPENS TODAY!

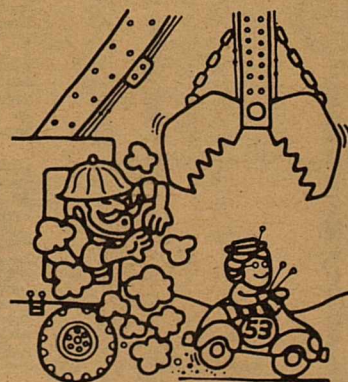
The seventh annual Frontier Fair will officially open today in Brackettville.

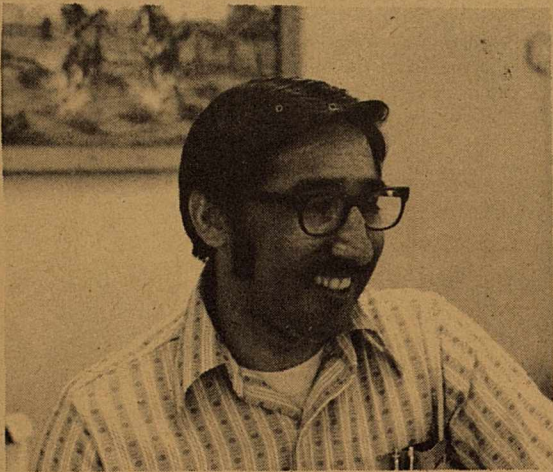

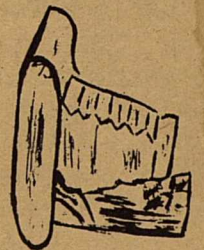
ALAMO VILLAGE

Soil Conservation

Many newcomers to the area are noting that there is a real "facelift-ing" job taking place in Brackettville. The new recreation park and community center are just examples. There are two things that are greatly responsible for this improvement activity to be feasible. The two things are the flood-water retarding structures above town.

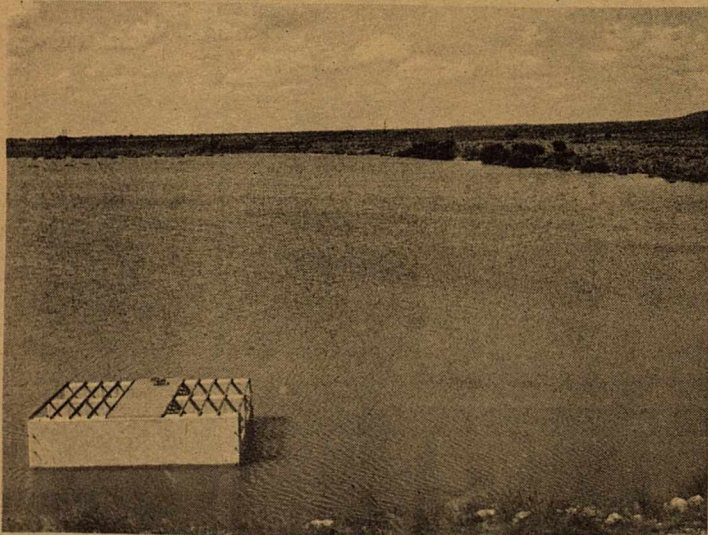
Brackettville has a long history of flooding. Just as an example there were heavy floods in 1948; 1949; 1951; 1954; 1955; 1957; and 1958. The most damaging flood in recent years was on June 17, 1958. There were 35 square blocks in the City which were under water. The estimated flood damage at that time was 75,000 dollars. With threats like this, many improvements were not feasible.

The two structures of the Upper Las Moras Watershed were completed in

1964. Their purpose is to protect the lives and property of the people from flood water damages. Since the completion of these structures they have proven their value many times. On August 11, 1972, approximately 6.4 inch of rain fell on the watershed above the structures. The water was slowly released from the structures by the primary spillways. The release rate is slow enough to prevent Las Moras Creek from leaving its banks in Brackettville. The creek has not been out of its banks in town since the structures were completed.

We can quickly see that the flood water retarding structures are a real asset in Frackettville. The structures were designed and constructed by the Soil Conservation Service. Later they were turned over to the local sponsoring organization for care and maintenance. The local sponsoring group is made up of the West-Nueces-Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District, the City of Brackettville and the Kinney County Commissioner's Court.

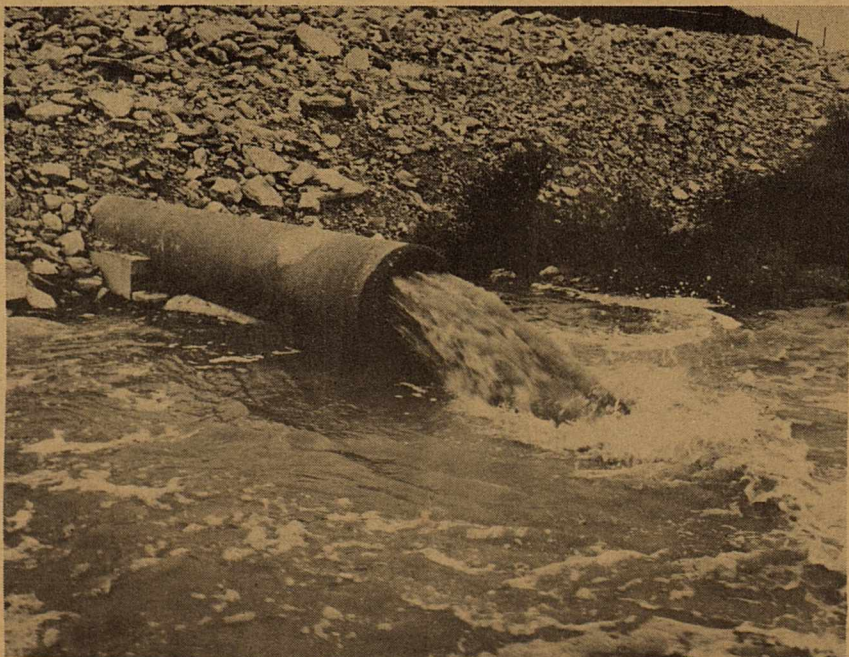

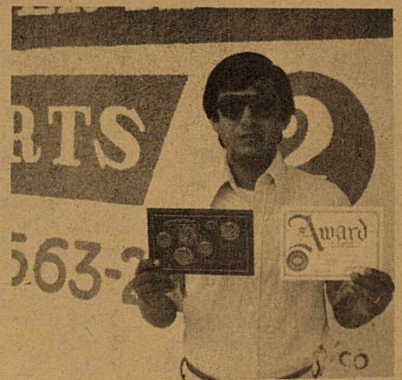

COUNTY AGENT REPORT

Screwworms are continuing to impose a problem to area livestock producers and all producers are encouraged to carefully watch livestock for possible screwworm infestations. Everyone's help and careful attention will be needed to keep the screwworms at a low. Carl Esser, Kinney County Agent, reminds producers that in order for a livestock producer to receive flies, each screwworm case must be sent in and confirmed. Sterile screwworm flies are being delivered to Del Rio each Tuesday and Friday for those area ranchmen who have had a confirmed case.

The pecan phylloxera is causing serious problems on many pecan trees in Kinney County. Phylloxera are small galls formed by a soft-bodied insect related to the aphid which feeds on newly formed stems and leaves. Phylloxera winter in the egg stage in bark crevices. In spring, the egg hatches and the tiny nymph feeds on tender young growth, secreting a substance which stimulates plant tissues to develop into galls. Several generations follow through the year, as long as there is young growth on the tree. The recommended controls for phylloxera is a dormant oil spray (3 1/2 gallons of 97% oil/ 100 gallons of water) applied when the tree is dormant. Late February is the recommended time for application. If a producer has an annual problem with phylloxera, the addition of 3 lbs. of 25% WP Malathion/ 100 gallons of water in the pre-pollination spray should give some relief. There are no recommended controls for trees infested at the present time.

The Las Moras 4-H Club met Monday evening, April 28th, and the West Nueces 4-H Club met Tuesday evening, April 29th at the Kinney County Courthouse. The 4-H Clubs discussed their plans for the annual Tri-County 4-H Camp and Frontier Fair, as well as other upcoming 4-H events and activities that will be happening this summer. 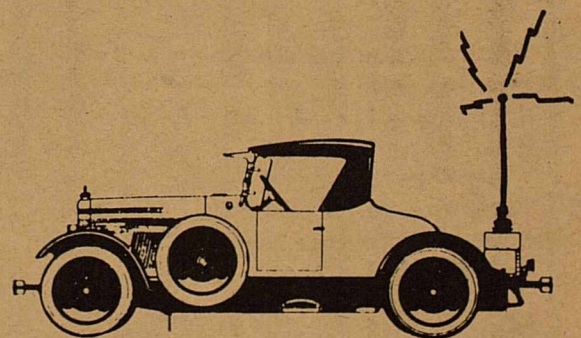

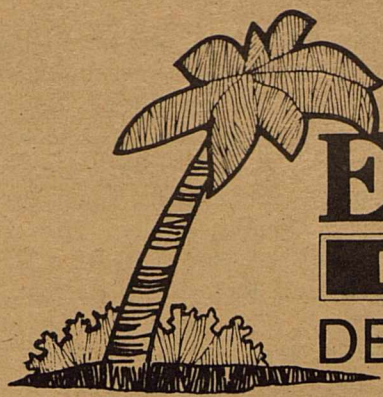
