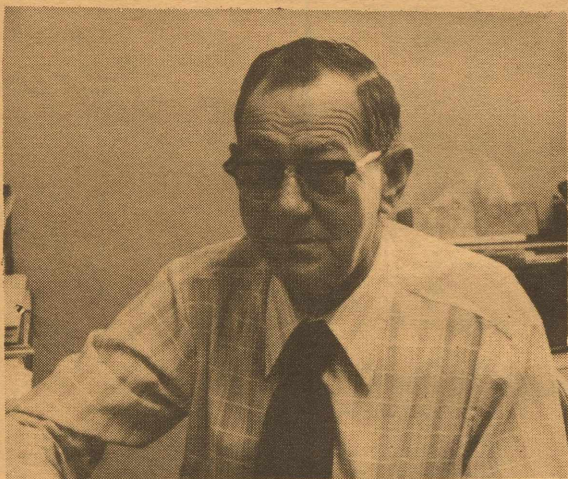

PAYMENT FOR ELECTION

JUDGES & CLERKS

Dolores Raney, County Clerk informed the Court that preparations had been completed for the November 4, 1975, constitutional Amendments Election, with the exception of appointing an alternate presiding judge for Precinct Number Four. The Alternate Presiding Judge for Pct. No. 4 was Betty West who moved out of the County. Commissioner L.S. Johnson appointed Miss Charles Emily Wilson to as Alternate Presiding Judge for Precinct No. 4. The election judges and clerks are to receive \$2.00 per hour for holding the election.

APPLICATIONS FOR COUNTY ATTORNEY

The Court received several applications for the office of County Attorney, but a final decision will not be made until the November 10th Commissioners meeting.

1975-1976 PAYROLL SCHEDULE

Commissioner Manuel Fuentes made a motion to approve the following payroll schedule for the 1975-1976

salaries. The motion was 2nd by Commissioner L.S. Johnson and passed unanimously.

Commissioner T.H. Glover asked the Commissioners if they thought they were justified in accepting a \$107.00 monthly increase in salary and was it fair to the taxpayers. After a discussion, Mr. Glover agreed to accept the raise in salary.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REQUEST

The Brackettville Fire Department requested permission to store the rural fire truck in the County Barn as there is no space available at the City Hall. Judge Seargeant suggested that the fire truck could be stored at the Civic Center arena until such time as the County Barn could be repaired.

CIVIC CENTER FEES

The Court agreed to operate the Civic Center on the following schedule until January 1st, 1976;

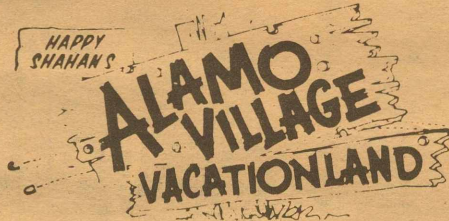

KINNEY COUNTY MANPOWER VOCATIONAL EDUCATIONAL FACILITY

Mr. Hector Jimenez of the Texas Migrant Council met with the Court and asked Kinney County to sponsor the nine county vocational training school to be held in Brackettville for migrants. Mr. Jimenez stated that the Texas Migrant Council had contracted with the Texas Vocational Agency to establish the school. The first courses to be taught will be in mechanics, cabinet making and air conditioning. Eligible students will range in age from eighteen years and older. Students will earn \$2.10 per hour with no deductions, men or women students that qualify under the Migrant Program will attend classes from eighth o'clock A.M. through five o'clock p.m., and each student can make up to \$800.00 during the course.

Commissioner G.C.Talamantez made a motion for Kinney County to sponsor the Migrant Training Program which will be held at the Kinney County Barn, rent free to the school. The motion was seconded by Commissioner L.S.Johnson, and passed unanimously.

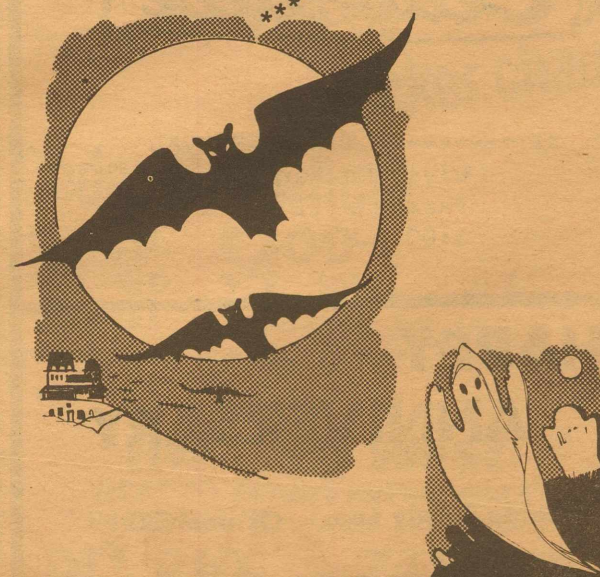

COMMENTS from THE SAGEBRUSH



As winter approaches there will be a scramble to get plants inside to protect them from loss in the cold weather. Some plants will hardly know there was a transition. Some, however, will resent the move and will show it. If plants do well with a lot of light outside they will want all the light they can get inside. The big problem inside is trying to get enough lights for the plants. If you have fluorescent lighting it is simpler because this is a close approach to natural light. If you have incandescent lighting it is about like having no light for the plants. Another thing to remember is that plants do not use as much water in cool weather and inside--so don't overwater. More plants are killed by too much water than any other thing. If plants turn yellow and sickly--usually they do not have enough light and too much water. It's a difficult task to carry all your plants safely through the winter but to have them alive and growing in the spring will be a fine reward.

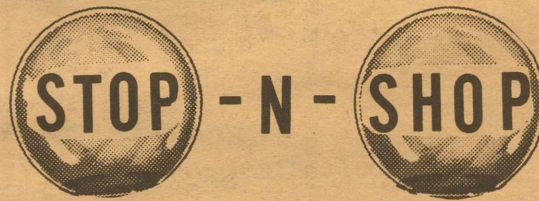

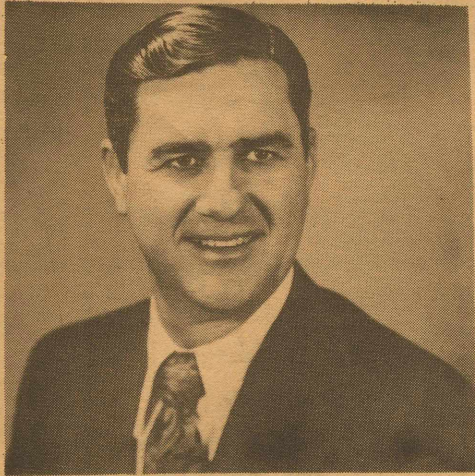

George C. Marks, will succeed Edward E. Thomas as state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service effective November 2nd.

Marks, a native of Heidenheimer, Tx., is currently state conservationist for Arizona. He began his career with SCS at Rusk in 1950 as a soil scientist and later worked as a soil conservationist and district conservationist at Sulphur Springs, Winnsboro, Jefferson, New Boston, and Corsicana.

From 1964 to 1968, Marks was area conservationist at Temple. He then moved to Arizona as an assistant state conservationist for Arizona. He received awards for outstanding work in 1967 and 1975.

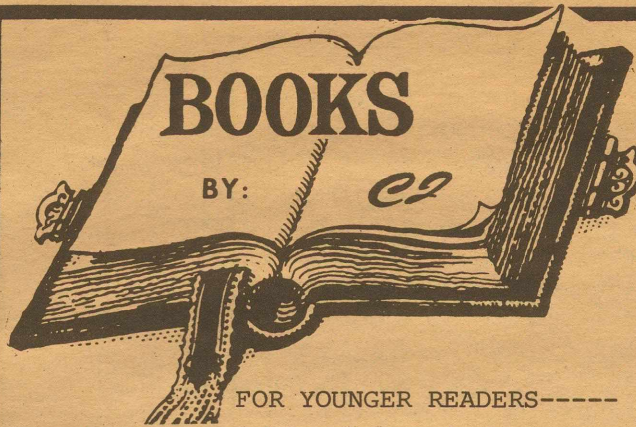
A 1944 graduate of Temple High School, Marks has a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University, 1950. He served in the U.S. Air Force from 1945 February, to August 1946.

Thomas, state conservationist for Texas since 1972, is being promoted to the position of assistant administrator for SCS in Washington, D.C. He entered SCS in 1954 as a soil conservationist at Lubbock and later served as district conservationist and area conservationist at various locations in Texas. In 1968, he was promoted to assistant state conservationist at Temple and to deputy state conservationist at Nashville, Tennessee in 1971. He was assigned to his present position one year later.

Thomas is a 1954 graduate of Texas A&M University where he was a member of the track team. He served as an army officer in Korea from 1954 to 1956.

The House on Pendelton Block

(Hastings House, \$5.95. Ages 10 to 14) Chrissie Ransom, is wrested from the familiar world of her childhood when her family moves from Georgia to Texas. At first overwhelmed, and not a little frightened by the vast, once-splendid mansion that is her new home, Chrissie soon becomes absorbed in the house's musty mysteries. Exploring the odd circumstances of the house's previous owner and investigating the strange behavior of her neighbors, she eventually uncovers both a crime and a surprising criminal. The unraveling of the plot, as well as Miss Waldron's skillful evocation of house and street, her unsentimental view of family life, and her honest portrait of a sensitive, intellectually resourceful young girl contributes to the appeal of this novel.

The Charlie Brown Dictionary

(Random House, \$7.95. Ages 4 to 7) The "Charlie Brown Dictionary" is geared to children who are just beginning to examine words and their meanings. It contains 2,400 words delightfully surrounded by the entire Peanuts gang.

It recognizes the need to simplify the dictionary format and is based on the "Rainbow Dictionary" by Wendal W. Wright. It's a book parents will enjoy going over together with their youngsters.

You see the word alone in large, bold type followed by two or three examples of the meaning of the word.

Example: FOOL. Charlie Brown acted like a FOOL. Charlie Brown acted like a SILLY PERSON. He did not use good sense. He tried to FOOL the baby. He pretended he was a bear. But the baby was not FOOLED. She knew who was growling at her.

This will make a fine gift for youngsters in the four to seven age group.

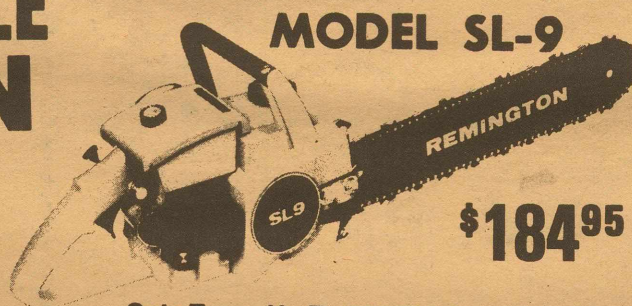

He's the only animal in the wild which an unarmed man can easily kill for food it he's lost and hungry. I've never been lost in the mountains without food but always respected the fact that it could happen and that it might happen to someone else. It's always a good idea to remember that the time could come when you may be in need and also when another may be in need. So never burn all your bridges, never block all the rear exits, always keep in mind there could come a "rainy day" While God will help in those circumstances He helps only those who help themselves. He does for us only what we can't do for ourselves.

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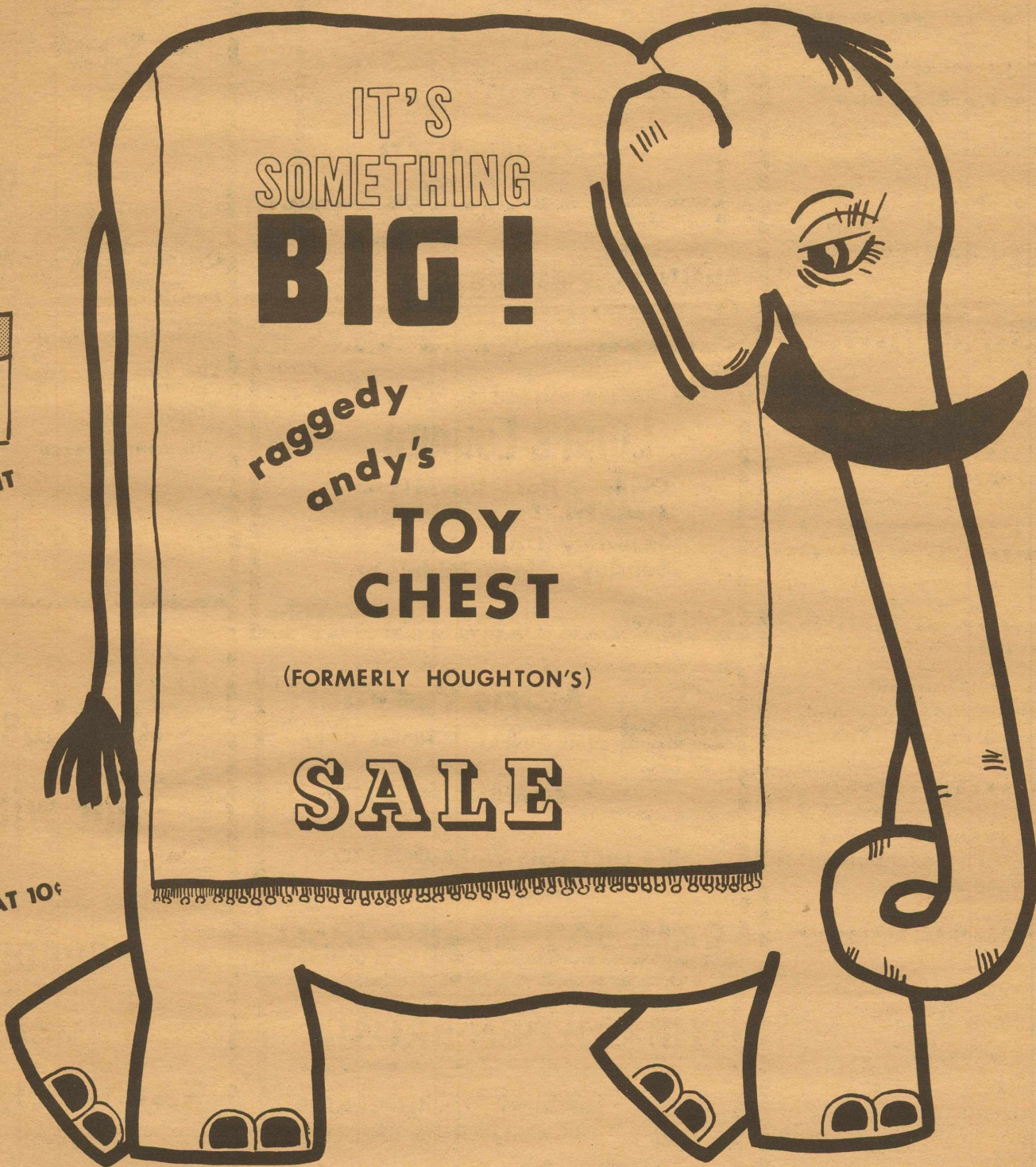
