

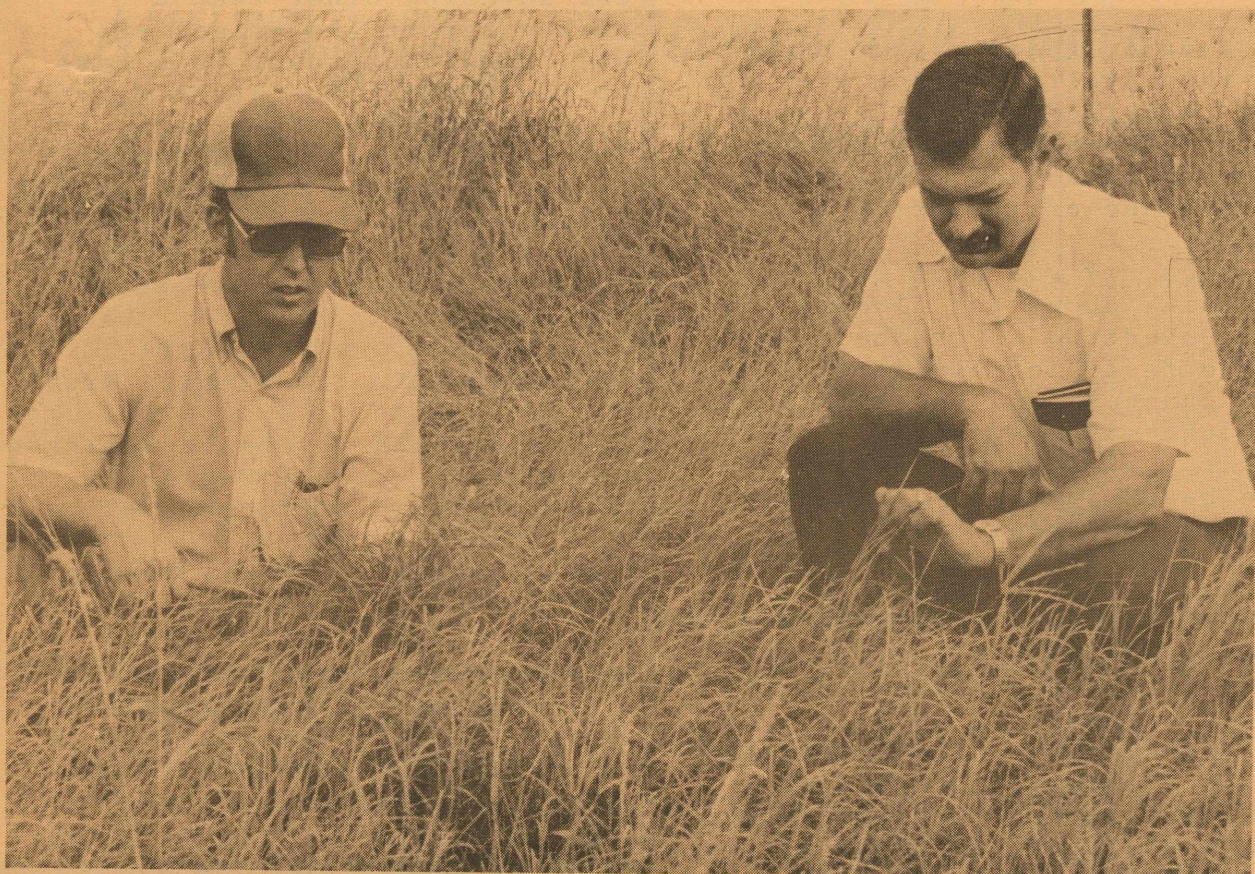

NEW GRASS STUDIES UNDERWAY



Reclamation demonstration work underway in preparation for lignite mining in Atascosa County is being conducted by Area Extension Agronomist Ed Colburn of Uvalde. Here, Colburn (right) and San Miguel Project Director Marshall Darby check the demonstration site. Early results here indicate landowners may have better pastures after mining and reclamation efforts than they had before.

EDITORIAL BY GEORGE !

A Citizen's Participation Meeting was held November 29, at the Kinney County Courthouse with approximately 30 people in attendance to discuss the usage of Federal Funds under an upcoming grant. The meeting was chaired by Mayor William Mendeke and Secretary Roland Williams.

The Community Council and the Citizen's Participation Committee had recommended the funds be utilized for additional street paving and improvements on the water and gas line systems within the city, particularly emphasizing the need for area shut-off valves to prevent the entire city from being cut off due to a major break in either the water or gas lines.

A recent example was pointed out when one of the fire plugs on Ann Street was knocked over in a recent car accident --- disrupting the entire water system for hours. Secretary Williams and Mayor Mendeke stated, "that had it not been for the ability to borrow supplies from the City of Del Rio, that Brackettville could have been without water for days.

The addition of area cut-off valves would allow small segments of the City to be cut-off without disturbing the rest of the town."

According to our sources, there were three (3) times the amount of people at the Junior High Basketball game than at the Community Council Meeting. There was a noted lack of attendance of people who had been appointed to the Citizen's Participation Committee --- also, a noted fact of some elected officials who did not respond to the Community's needs. When these people accept a position of community service, they should either serve or resign. It seems that a number of our local Quasi politicians accept appointment and then do not serve.

The project for funding our community is very important --- and I will remember when over 100 people turned out on a street paving meeting such as this --- evidently their streets are paved and they could care less.

There is another meeting tonight.

Anyone who does not attend, please do not complain to this newspaper or the city council about local conditions.

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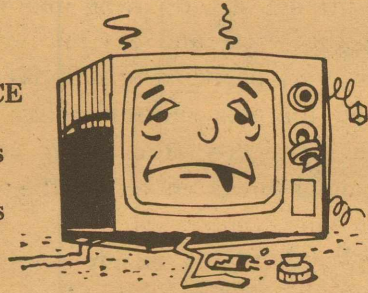

I enjoy reading your column in the Cavalryman each week for the good laugh I get out of it. But I have a question for you. Who appointed you the local expert and critic of CB's and CBers?

Recently you have been complaining about the 'locals' chit-chatting on channel 19 (in effect, legally jamming the channel) and the Smokies and the way they work. I will admit that I have been one of the bases jamming the channel and keeping many travelers from getting their 'smokey reports,' but if the police object to it, all they have to do is tell me and I will clear the channel for smokey reports to flow freely.

Speaking of smokey reports, which I know you are a firm believer in from hearing you on 19 all the time, they are illegal under the Texas Penal Code, section 38.05 'Hindering Arrest,' which states in part: an offense to "warn another of impending discovery or apprehension." 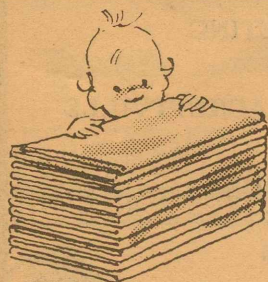

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PECAN SHOWS SCHEDULED

HONDO--Two pecan events will claim the attention of many South Texas pecan producers during December.

Both area and regional elimination shows are scheduled during the month. These include the Wintergarden Area Pecan Show involving producers from 13 counties and the South Texas Regional Pecan Show in San Antonio. These shows literally pit kernals against shells to produce winners which will compete in the State Pecan Show.

In addition to these shows, many other county pecan shows are held in this area of Texas

during late November and early December.

The Hondo Show, now in its seventh year, will be held in Hondo Coty Hall on Dec. 7-8. Winners from this show will advance on and compete against other South Texas pecans at the South Texas Regional Show scheduled for the lower level of the Wonderland Shopping Center in San Antonio, on December 14-16.

Glenn Bragg, Medina County Extension Agent, is coordinating both shows. In the Wintergarden show, Bragg says growers may make one entry of each improved and papershell variety they grow, and they may enter as many different native or seedling varieties as they desire.

"Each entry must have been grown by the person entering them in the Wintergarden show," Bragg said, "and each entry must consist of 45 nuts."

The County Agent said first and second place winners in the Wintergarden show will be sent on to San Antonio for regional judging. Third place entries will be considered also for the regional show by judges. He said those entries which place first, second and third in the San Antonio show will be entered in the State Pecan Show.

Counties eligible to compete in the Wintergraden Area Pecan Show are Dimmit, Edwards, Frio, Kinney, LaSalle, Kerr, Maverick, Medina, Real, Uvalde, Val Verde, Zavala, and Bexar.

Activities on Dec. 7 will include sorting and counting of pecans, classifying, weighing, recording, cracking, and shelling. Judging and the announcing of winners also will take place on that day. The following day, entries will be on display.

The second day of the show will be devoted to a Pecan Bake Show. The food categories are cake, pie, cookies, candy, breads and miscellaneous dishes such as cheese rolls, snack foods, etc.

The categories will be entered in two divisions--adult and junior (for those 18 years of age or under). The grand champion will receive a \$50 cash reward, and reserve champion will receive a \$25 cash award. Other cash prizes and ribbons will be awarded for other places in the contest.


to chop trees for their annual Christmas tree sale, according to Marcelino Valdez, Jr., Chapter President.



Sheep & Goat Industry List Guidelines

It doesn't take an old and wrinkled rancher to tell you that in order to make a living off of livestock, you have to get a few of them on the ground-- you simply can't sell something until you produce it, unless you're one of those fellows that enjoys running from law-

suits or maybe running for the Texas Supreme Court.

It works that way in the Angora goat business and a successful mohair producer will be the first to tell you that it takes a lot of sleepless nights and hair-pulling (his, not the goat's) around kidding time.

A committee of experts called together by the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association and comprised of producers and representatives of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and feed and drug companies spent a great deal of time investigating kidding practices in search of a list of guidelines for improving Angora kid crops. Their finds and recommendations were published in a report released early in November during the Angora Goat Field Day at the Sonora Experiment Station.

The committee report listed

two basic options in respect to kidding systems. The least complicated of the practices was that of range kidding, while a much more detailed and, often more successful, program involved an intensive kidding system.

Range kidding was described as "usually necessary for large flocks and those without facilities or labor to manage the flock more intensively." The report went on to mark death loss of kids, however, as the major cause of loss of reproductive efficiency, pointing to poor mothering as a "significant part of the problem."

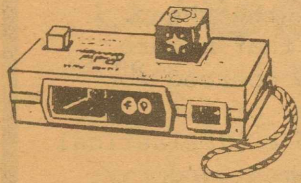
Offering suggestions for those who use the range kidding method, the committee recommended placing small numbers of does in small pastures or traps during kidding, suggesting that the chosen pastures offer only one watering place, and asking that odd-shaped pastures be avoided. A single, high-ground bedding place was also suggested. All the recommendations were designed to minimize the chances of does losing their kids.

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

Are you thinking of planting roses? This should be done in January. Roses need well-drained soil. To have this it is usually a necessity in this area to mix some peat mulch or even better some wood bark mulch to the soil. This can easily be done by spreading about 2 inch to 3 inch layer on top of the ground and working it in with a spading fork or shovel. While working this into the soil it is good to add some all purpose fertilizer and some copperas and work it too into the soil. With this prepared bed you should have little trouble with roses. Roses must be planted or moved while dormant. It is helpful to use some root stimulator when planting roses. After planting roses can not take too much water. They should be allowed to dry out at ground level and then should be thoroughly and deeply watered. They require a minimum of about 8 hours a day of direct sun to do their best. On another day we'll discuss types of roses.

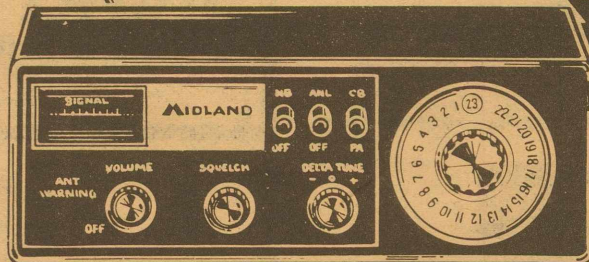

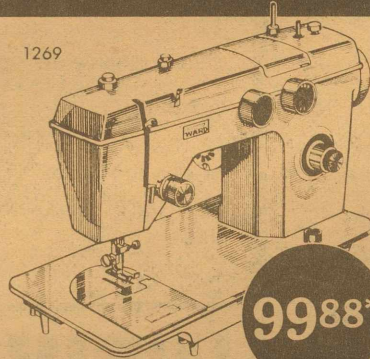

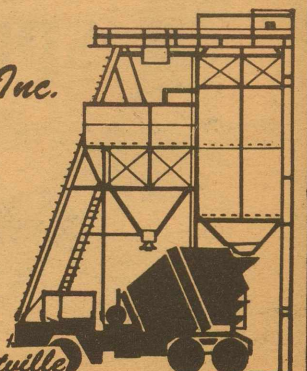
