


# PREPARATIONS FOR SHOW UNDERWAY

At 1:00p.m. the sifting of lambs, steers, and hogs will begin, followed by the judging of market hogs at 2:30 p.m. and the judging of commercial steers at 3:30 p.m. Judge for the hogs and steers will be Mr. James Bevel, Vo. Ag. Teacher of La Pryor. On Saturday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. the market lambs fill be judged starting with



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

# BAGWORM CONTROL PROGRAM EXPLAINED

UVALDE--Vigilance during the cold winter months is the best way homeowners can control bagworms which infest their evergreen plants, especially cedar.

"Bagworms can be found on many kinds of shrubs and trees," said Dr.J.W. Stewart, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Uvalde, "but they show a special fondness for cedars."

He said the best time to treat for bagworms for the 1977 growing season is now while the weather remains cold. "This is a very simple process and involves only the removal of the old cases or cocoons which rang from the tree limbs," the entomologist said.

After removing the cases, Stewart says people should deposit them in the trash or burn them. He cautioned not to drop them on the lawn below the shrub or tree.

During the winter months, the cocoons seen hanging on the trees or shrubs contain only

eggs. Stewart said these eggs hatch in the spring and the small larvae (Caterpillars) emerge from the cocoon and spin a small one of their own. The cocoon is gradually enlarged as the larva sheds its skin and grows. The larva never leaves its cocoon.

As these larvae grow and mature, foliage on the tree or shrub declines since this is the only food. When they reach adulthood, the larva will seal off the cocoon and form a pupa, which then transforms into an adult moth. The female moth is wingless and never leaves her cocoon, but the winged male moth leaves his cocoon to search for the female.

When the female is found and the moths mate, the male soon dies. The female moth remains in her cocoon where she deposits her eggs and dies. Her remains form a plug on the lower end of the cocoon. The eggs remain inside the cocoon until the following spring.

# EAGLE PROTECTION LAW UNDER FIRE

"Thank heavens we have people who are concerned about the future of our wildlife. However, I do feel that protectionists... must look at the facts, and if indeed, the evidence proves need of predator control, then they should be the first to support well-planned control programs," said secretary Bill Sims of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

"Yes I do say that we are not interested in the eradication of eagles, but I also believe should be able to take a certain number of eagles -- just enough to stop predation. What Wildlife Center concerning golden eagles. In attend were (representatives of various preservation groups, wool growers.) The following are the main points I gleaned from the meeting.

1. Eagles are the property of the United States of America and the Interior Department is responsible for their wellbeing as well as for any problems they cause.

2. There are more eagles today than in many years, and there is no way they can be considered an "endangered species". A recent survey conducted by the Interior Department reported over 40,000 in the 17 western states.

3. There are very few bald eagles in the western and Southwestern part of the United States. The bald eagle is primarily a fish eater and is found near large bodies of water. (This minimizes the chance of mistaking a young

bald eagle for a golden eagle.) 4. Montana studies by Dr. Bart O'Gara of the University of Montana verified eagle predation on baby lambs.

5. The group agreed that it is possible to determine whether or not a lamb has been killed by eagles. (Capillary bleeding around talon marks on the carcass will prove that such punctures were made prior to death, rather than during carrion feeding. Location of talon punctures is also a factor.)

9. A high-ranking employee of the Interior Department admitted that eagles are kill ing lambs and that they don't know what to do about it. (Sims replied that taking of a certain number of eagles would maintain a healthy, yet safe nopulation.)

10. The group plans to meet again in January or February of this year.

Sims then addressed the question of predation levels; it has been charged that eagles account for only one per cent of all predation, an insignificant loss, according to protectionists. It was Sims' contention that the one per cent figure equalled 10,000 to 15,000 head in Texas alone.

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"If these animals had been allowed to reach maturity they would have provided 750,000 pounds of lamb and cabrito ... not to mention the wool and mohair.'

Sims further stated that research by O'Gara showed that eagles, by nature, concentrate in certain limited areas, causing heavy damage to particular

Addressing himself to other points of contention, Sims debunked claims that eagles are effective rodent controllers, and explained the lack of lamb and these birds might be 1,000 or more miles from their nests."

In his summation, Sims described the farmer and rancher as the conservationists' friend. "We provide a habitat for ... (wildlife) yes, the same grass and weeds our sheep and goats eat. It all boils down to the fact," he explained, "that when a bunch of people start getting hungry, then maybe they will be able to understand that lamb chops might well taste better than roasted eagle breast or coyote chops!"



# TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS I

We are having a cold and wet winter. On almost every hand we hear complaints about the rain and wet. However, just because we have days of drizzle and mist by no means can we assume everything has enough moisture. In reality the amount of rain this past month has been quite small. The drier the soil, the more freezing weather will damage plants, shrubs and grass. It would be a good idea to check your soil and see really how moist it is. You'll likely find you need to water. Because grass is brown and trees and shrubs are bare is no sign water is not needed. You'll have a better yard in the spring and summer if you make certain your yard is well watered through the winter.

# BEGINNING JANUARY 7, THERE WILL BE A CHARGE FOR DIRECTORY ASSISTANCE

Here's how the statewide Directory Assistance charging plan will work:

Customers with single-line basic service who call Directory Assistance (1411) more than 10 times during a monthly billing period will be charged 20 cents for every call after their tenth. A maximum of two numbers may be requested during each call to Directory Assistance. Multi-line customers will have an additional allowance of one call for each line, up to 25 lines.

The Directory Assistance charge also will apply to calls for numbers in other towns within your home Area Code — with one important exception. You won't be charged for calling Directory Assistance in another town that has the same Area Code as yours provided you make a corresponding Long Distance call within your home Area Code. That call has to be placed from and billed to your own phone within the same monthly billing cycle.

To request numbers in other towns with the same Area Code as yours you will continue to dial 1-555-1212.

There will be no charge for requesting numbers that have a different Area Code than yours. Just dial 1, plus the Area Code, then 555-1212

Also, there will be no charge for Directory Assistance calls from coin telephones or from hospitals

Some customers not charged.


