There is a sense of insecurity, of frustration, of anxiety that is very wide spread. One of the major incidences of this is the beginnings of a revival of interest in God, the church and religion in life. It is historically true in America that during times of depression, war and other oppressing factors the people come to be more interested in God. A recent survey shows that 94% of the people of the United States believe in God, 56% of the people feel their religious beliefs are very important, and 30% feel they are fairly important. Only 5% state they are not important. The surprise in this is that in all categories, the emphasis on God and religion are higher than in a good many years. Though it is true this points to the feeling of people that there is a definite need of God and his way, it is also true historically that when people turn to God, things get better. The Bible says this will be true and history has proved it so. The closer a people walks with God, the better every facet of life will be.



Rotary Foundation

Rotary International District Governor Joseph P. Blanks has announced the availability of a Rotary Foundation educational awards for young people in his district for study abroad during academic year 1978-79. The awards cover the costs of language instruction, transportation, food, lodging, and tuition.

Rotarians are looking for scholars who are well-rounded, articulate, outgoing people who can interpret their homelands as well as absorb the cultures of their country of study. Candidates must apply for the awards by March 1, 1977 through local Rotary clubs where they reside or study.

The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, the world's oldest service club association, seeks to promote international goodwill and understanding. Its awards programs are supported by voluntary contributions of Rotarians and others worldwide.

The Foundation's awards are placed into five categories, the largest of which is the graduate fellowships. Each graduate fellow must be twenty through twenty-eight years old and have earned the equivalent of a Bachelor's degree.

Students who have completed only two years of study on the university level may apply for the Foundation's Undergraduate Scholarships. Applicants may not be married and must be eighteen through twenty-four years old.

Technical Training awards are available to people who have the equivalent of a secondary education and have worked for two years in a technical field. In the past, students have studied vocations from beekeeping to hydrofoil construction. Technical Training awardees must be twenty-one through thirty-five years old.

Also available are awards for teachers of the handicapped and journalists which are granted to winners of a worldwide competition of candidates sponsored by Rotary clubs. In 1978-79, the journalism awards program's first year, the Foundation will grant twenty awards. Up to 120 Teachers of the Handi-

capped awards will be presented the same year.

Teachers applying for this award must have the equivalent of a secondary school degree, have worked with the handicapped for two years, and be twenty-five through fifty years old.

Applicants for journalism awards, if students, must have completed at least two years of secondary education in journalism. Professional applicants must have been working for two years and be twenty-one through twenty-eight years old.

Over the next three years the Foundation's trustees have committed over \$22 million for their programs. And in concert with their motto of "Service Above Self," none of the program's awards can be made to Rotarians or their families.

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GRANTS SCHEDULED FOR ARTS AND HUMANITIES

The spring deadline for grant application to the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities is February 1, 1977. Matching grants are available to nonprofit organizations in Texas which are engaged in, or sponsor arts and humanities activities in the state.

Priority is given to projects which develop community sponsorship and management, and to programs which encourage artistic excellence, professionalism, sound management, and community impact. The Commission strives for even geographic distribution, and applications from small communities are encouraged.

The Commission offers financial assistance for education programs, touring programs, and community development programs. Publications, festivals and workshops may also receive financial support.

Inquiries about deadlines and application procedures should be directed to the State/Community Division within the Commission.

Following the "Gourmet Foods" theme, youth from the Brackettville 4-H Clubs will prepare main dishes, side dishes, breads and desserts, or snacks and beverages. "A gourmet food is an unusual food served on special occasions or a common food served in a unique or unusual manner," according to Becky Rogers, County Extension Agent-at-Large. Four participants each in the preteen, junior and senior division will earn the right to represent the county in the District 4-H Food Show in Uvalde, the February.

Youth ages 14-18 will compete in the senior division, while the junior division contest involves ages 11-13 and preteens are 9 and 10 year olds.

Food Show contestants will set up displays between 6:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. The public is invited to attend the Awards Programs which will begin at 8:00 p.m. followed by a Tasting Tea.

"Because our foods program emphasizes nutrition, contestants will be asked to demonstrate knowledge of nutrition, meal planning, food buying, and meal service as well as the ability to prepare food," Ms. Rogers explained.

4-H members have been studying foods and nutrition in project groups taught by volunteer adult and junior leaders. Serving as 4-H Foods and Nutrition Project Leaders are Mrs. Rachel Daniels, Mrs. Barbara Voss, Mrs. Debbie Esser, Mrs. Don Packer, Miss Kaye York, Miss Kimberly Trant, Mrs. Jean Gallegos, and Miss Veronica Flores.

Kinney County 4-H Food Show is sponsored by the Morrison Milling Co. in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

BICENTENNIAL GRANTS AVAILABLE

ARLINGTON--The American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas has announced that the U.S. Bicentennial Administration will release a final matching grant of up to \$15,000 to each state.

The money is to be granted to an endorsed Bicentennial entity in the state--a community, county, university, or state association.

Other stipulations for receiving the money are that it must be matched on a dollar for dollar basis with non-federal funds by the entity applying for the funds, that it be used for only one project, and that the project be completed by June 30, 1977.

STATE BAR REPORT:

AUSTIN - Students interested in a career in law should be aware that there is no shortage of lawyers in Texas and the job competition is tough, according to a new State Bar of Texas publication announced today by State Bar President Gibson Gayle, Jr. of Houston.

"Job hunting is very competitive because approximately 2,000 new lawyers are licensed in Texas each year," warns the brochure entitled "You, Your Career and the Legal Profession." It adds: "Law graduates should be ready to consider a full range of employment options if they are to be successful in their job search."

The brochure, prepared in cooperation with the University of Texas Law School Placement Office, was produced as a public service by the State Bar. Individual copies may be obtained free, and bulk orders may be made at a cost of \$4.00 per 100 plus shipping costs, from: Law Pamphlet, State Bar of Texas, P.O. Box 12487, Austin Texas 78711.

Gayle said the brochure was prepared to meet the growing interest in law careers.

"Intensified news media coverage of legal topics, along with increased emphasis on career education in public schools, have heightened student curiosity about the various types of careers in law," Gayle said.

The brochure outlines educational requirements for lawyers, cost of legal education, and the differing careers available to law graduates,

including:

Private practice--ranging from a one-person law office to associating with a firm of more than 100 lawyers, with practice opportunities including such office legal work as preparation of contracts and wills or court appearances to represent a client or argue an appeal.

Corporate law-employment in the law department of a large business, performing legal work varied as the activities of the company.

Government employment--including federal, state or local government jobs involving such activities as hearings conducted by a regulatory agency, prosecution of criminal defendants, representation of government agencies in court, drafting regulations or ordinances, and evaluating the legal aspects of policy decisions or other actions by a governing body or its administrator.

Alternative practice--representation of individuals and groups generally not involved in the legal system, such as the poor, ethnic minorities, consumers and citizen environmental groups, through such organizations as legal services programs or public interest law practices.

Academic positions--including law professors, law librarians, editors and administrators.

Military service--legal offices of the armed services offer benefits which may be more appealing to new lawyers in a time when legal employment opportunities are limited.

Other opportunities--including use of a law degree in other fields such as journalism,

industry, advertising, banking, politics, administration or accounting.

The brochure also includes the names and addresses of all eight law schools in Texas and a list of books helpful in understanding the various types of legal careers.

NURSING TEST SLATED

UVALDE--New students interested in entering the vocational nursing program at Southwest Texas Junior College here will need to take the National League of Nursing pre-entrance examination at 8 a.m. January 29 at the college Health Clinic.

The four-hour examination will consist of general information, judgment, mathematics, reading comprehension and vocabulary. A \$7.50 examination fee will be collected at the time of the test.

A 2 p.m. tea following the examination will be given for all prospective students by the present vocational nursing class at the college. At that time the one-year curriculum, expenses and all requirements will be explained.

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

It is now definitely time to trim your roses. They are dormant but usually don't stay that way very long. Certainly all the dead limbs should be cut out. Any limbs that are overly long or unshapely should be cut back. Care should be taken so that as new growth comes, the bush slopes up into a well ordered bush that displays the flowers to the best advantage.

Generally the more severely the rose is trimmed, the more luxuriant will be the new growth. The root system that led to the original growth will be able to sustain and develop much new young growth which should lead to many months of beautiful roses.

Directory Assistance charging is now in effect statewide.

Basically, the plan calls for charging 20 cents for every call to Directory Assistance over the first 10 made during a monthly billing period.

Here's how the plan works:

Customers with single-line basic service who call Directory Assistance (1411) more than 10 times during a monthly billing period will be charged 20 cents for every call after their tenth. The Directory Assistance Charge also applies to calls for numbers in other towns within your home Area Code — with one

important exception. You won't be charged for calling Directory Assistance in another town that has the same Area Code as yours provided you make a corresponding Long Distance call within your home Area Code. That call has to be placed from and billed to your own phone within the same monthly billing cycle.

To request numbers in other towns with the same Area Code as yours, continue to dial 1-555-1212.

There is no charge for requesting numbers that have a different Area Code than yours. Just dial 1, plus the Area Code, then 555-1212.

Also, there is no charge for Directory Assistance calls from coin telephones or from hospitals.

Some customers not charged.

Visually and physically handicapped people who are unable to use the directory will be exempt from the charge. If you think you, or someone in your family, or a friend may be entitled to this exemption, please fill out the coupon below for more information.

If you're like most people, you'll never be affected by the Directory Assistance charge. In fact, in cities where Directory Assistance charging was already in effect with a **five-call allowance**, only 5 percent of customers were ever charged each month.

More importantly, 95 percent were not. This certainly indicates that 10 free calls a month will more than meet your needs if you can't find a number in the directory.

So look in the book before you call. It will save you 20 cents that we don't want.

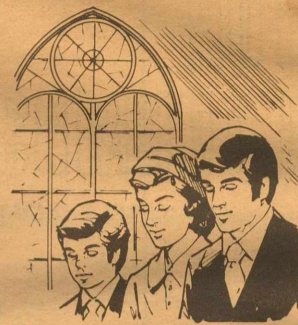
