Secondly, I have conferred with some of our members in the Texas Press Association who have a charitable rate which runs approximately 70% of the normal advertisement rate.

Thirdly, it is essential for us, as a newspaper, to be able to justify our costs.

in our community have taken advantage of our free advertising to work with you in the future. and yet, have felt free to advertise in other publications outside our county and spend hundreds of dollars in advertising,

yet, not spend a dime with our local newspaper. Some of these gaul to use our photographs in the paid advertisements of other periodicals.

We do not object to publicizing Kinney County outside of Kinney County, however, as the old saying goes, "Charity begins at home".

Fifth, in the future all charitable ads will be carried in our newspaper at 50% of the normal commercial rate (the normal charitable rate is 70% of the commercial rate). This will include any non-profit organization, church group, soriety, etc, and will become effective immediately.

I am sorry to have to initiate this as our paper is here to serve our community, but it hurts a little bit when the people you help rub your nose in it. We have been honored to assist all Fourth, certain organizations the community organizations in the past, and we will be pleased

It will very soon be time to be growing tomatoes. There are many, many, kinds and sizes. The patio is a tomato designed to be grown in large pots if desired. Some of the marble size tomatoes can be grown in pots and hanging baskets. If you plan to grow your own plants, you should already have your seeds planted in trays, peat pots, plastic cups, egg cartons and such. They must be kept moist to touch to do well. They must also be given all the light possible. They can be planted outside

very early provided they are protected. It is good to slip a milk carton or coffee can down over them to protect them from wind the first two or three weeks. These containers should be open on both ends, of course. When there is danger of frost or freeze, these containers should be closed with paper over the top. Paper should be removed in the daytime. The earlier tomatoes are grown, the better the chance of a good crop of good tomatoes.

All in all, it is difficult to find a better or more dependable all round tomato than the Rutgers or Marglobe. These are regular size commercial type tomatoes that grow on hardy vines that do well in this area.

Enough commotion has been raised that license fees for CB's have been suspended. No amount of mental gymnastics can make possible the understanding of some people or the rulings of some of our judicial bodies. If a person cannot afford five dollars a year for a CB license, he can't afford the CB. Every conscientious CB'er should be glad to pay the fee and thus, make possible more agents to oversee and control the CB'ers. 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# HOPI INDIAN SHORT COURSE SCHEDULED

UVALDE--A Hopi Indian chief's daughter will conduct a short course February 19-20 at Southwest Texas Junior College here for students and area residents interested in studying the development of the Hopi Indian culture.

Reared on a Hopi reservation in Arizona, Chizomana will travel to Uvalde from her home in California. The two-day short course will include a brief history of the tribe and a study if their social development, kinship, courtship, marriage, child raising, and the relationship of their religious culture to the arts and crafts of today.

Sponsored by the SWTJC
Anthropological Society and
the Department of Anthropology,
the short course will be of
special interest to students
and teachers of history,
anthropology, social science
and art.

"More has been written about the Hopi Indians than probably any other tribe in America," explains Charles

F. LaRue, anthropology instructor at the college and coordinator of the short course. "They are a very private and peaceful people and were the only tribe in the nation never to go to war against the United States."

Chizomana has conducted similar short courses at Northwestern University, Ohio State University and the University of California at Los Angelos, Santa Barbara and San Diego.

Last spring LaRue took a group of 30 college students and area residents to Arizona to study the Hopi

culture. The anthropology instructor is currently planning a similar trip to the Hopi reservation during the college spring vacation in March.

LaRue met Chizemana while attending one of her short courses in Santa Barbara, Calif. As advisor to the SWTJC Anthropological Society, he enlisted the aid if students in cillecting leterally thousands of wild turkey feathers used by the Hopi Indians in their religious ceremonies.

The two day course will meet from 8am until 4:30 pm
February 19 and 9am until
4:30 pm February 20.
Cost of the course will be
\$25, which includes textbook fees. Those interested inregistering may send the enrollment fee to Charles F.
LaRue, Department of Anthropology, Southwest
Texas Junior College, Uvlade, Texas, 78801.

Anyone seeking further information may call 512-278=2615. Upon receipt of tuition, LaRue will mail course details to each student and assist in any housing arrangements that may be necessary.


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
