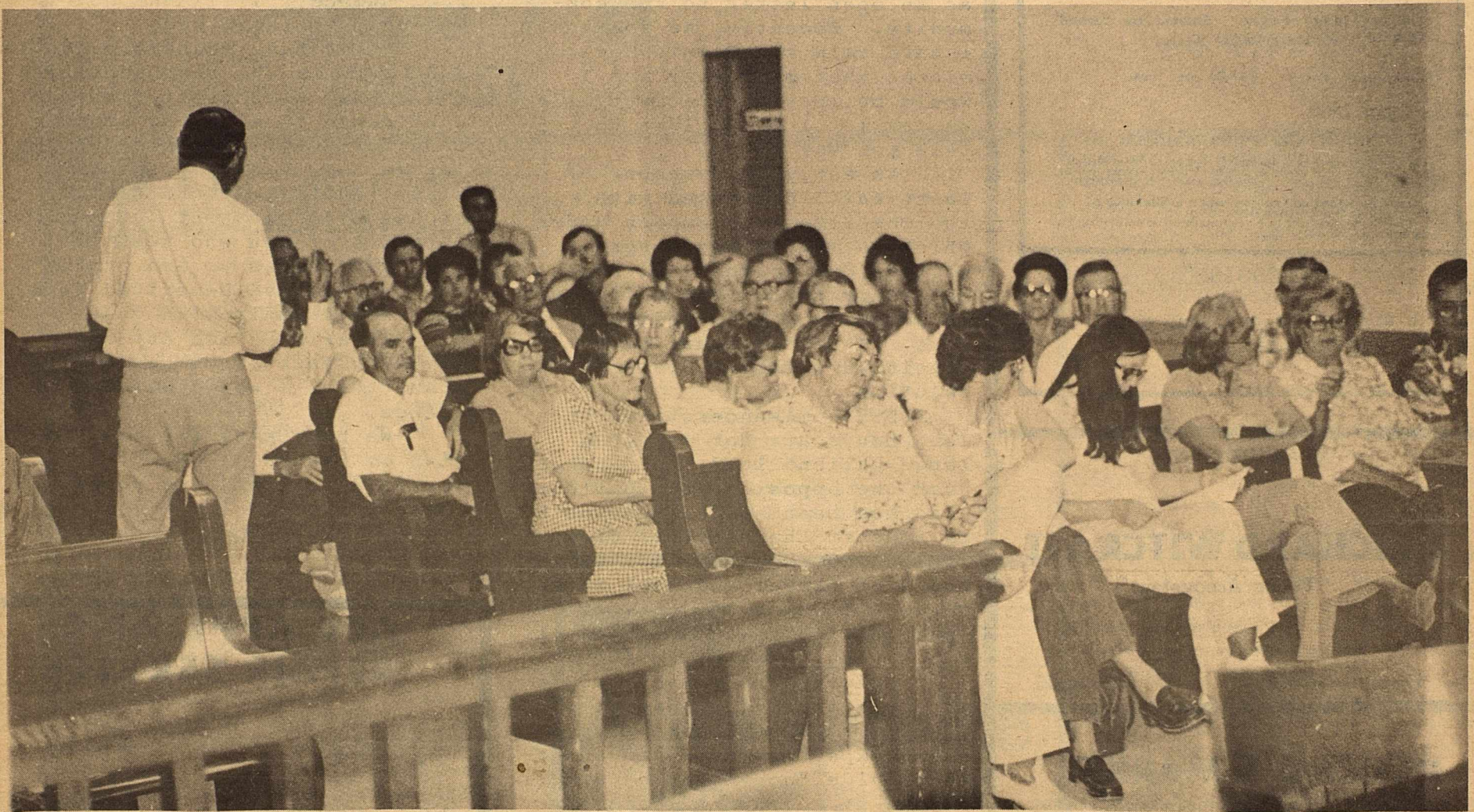

Dear Mr. Loos,

I am writing you this not in retort or rebutal but more as an open letter to the community. Recently, as you know, I have told the Clinic Committee that my family and I would be leaving Brackettville on May 1. I would like to tell you why.

As early as December of last year I discussed with the Committee the burden under which my family and I were working due to the long hours necessary to do what I felt was an adequate job of medical care. The long hours have continued without apparent solution.

Don't misunderstand, the long hours are not due to a large patient load, but rather just the opposite, the patient load has been small, too small to support the services of my staff, and I put in many extra hours of travel and work in an attempt to increase our patient load, but this was to no avail for several reasons.

Unfortunately many people have continued for reasons of their own to seek care elsewhere expecting my staff and I to provide "convenience" and "middle of the night" care for them, even though they did not care to see us for their regular health care. This has been unfair to my staff and in some instances to myself. I can only assume these people felt the care we rendered at the

Family Practice Center was not what they wanted.

The last six months for example, I have put in seventy hours per month driving from place to place, and from eighty to one hundred hours per week with patient work, charts and waiting time at the hospital between patients.

When the Clinic first began many people and groups made many promises of time and money, to these who fulfilled these obligations, the Clinic is indeed grateful. To those who saw fit not to I can only wonder why, and speculate that perhaps the promise was expediant and fulfillment not intended to begin with.

There have been many people and families who have supported the Clinic with their time and confidence in allowing us to care for them. To these people let me say thank you from my staff, and myself and family, it has been pleasant and rewarding. To those of you who took us into your lives we are grateful and we have benefited from our relationship with you.

If at any time any one wants to talk to me personally about this, I would welcome the chance,

We have many friends and plan to return as often as possible to visit and renew these bonds.

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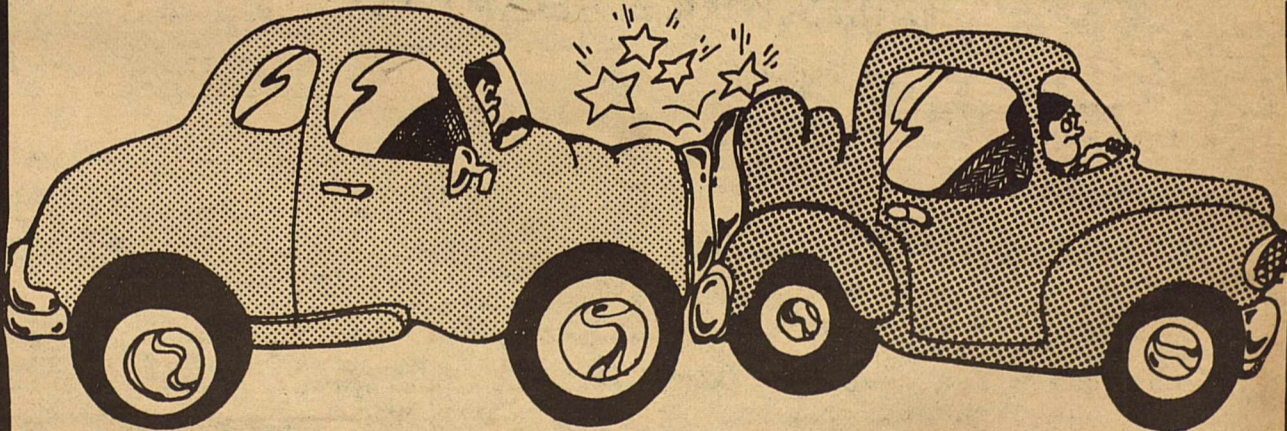

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS



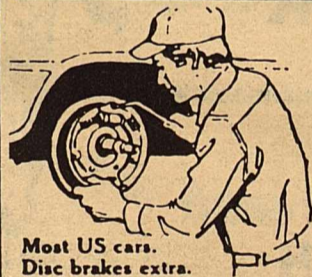

Many will be receiving beautiful pot plants for Easter. Pot plants out last fresh cut flowers by far. Easter lilies if watered properly and given lots of light will bloom until every bud has become a flower. Each blossom should be cut off when it begins to dry and shrivel up. The plant can be left in the pot or immediately planted in the ground when it finishes blooming. If planted outside it should last for years and should multiply until eventually there would be many of them. Azaleas should be kept as cool as possible, given filtered light and kept moist to touch. When through blooming they too can best be planted in the ground. Choose a spot somewhat protected from intense sun. Keep watered and they will do well. They do not freeze in winter and will reward you with beautiful flowers next spring. Hydrangeas need about the same treatment and they will grow larger and larger each year. They will freeze back in winter but come back in the spring. Don't just throw your pot plants away when they are through blooming--Make them last for years.

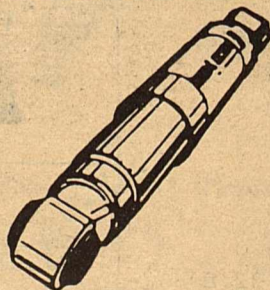

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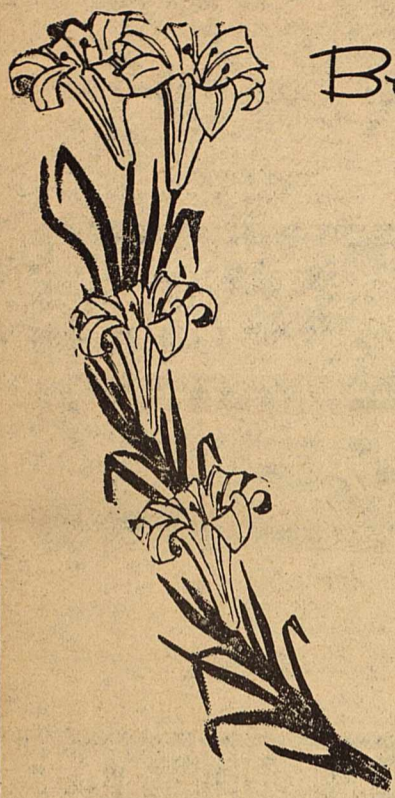

Carl Esser Reports:

GOALS OF BEEF RESEARCH AND INFORMATION PROGRAM

What are the goals and proposed beef research and information program?

If eligible livestock producers vote in favor of the beef checkoff program this spring, it is designed to allow the establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, producer and consumer information with respect to use of cattle, beef and beef products, says Carl Esser, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Similarly, the program would allow the establishment and conducting of research, market development projects and studies with respect to production, growing, sale, processing and distribution, marketing or utilization of cattle, beef and beef products, the Extension agent said.

The program also would include development and expansion of foreign markets.

The checkoff is designed as a self-help program, where the

producer would be contributing 3/10 of one per cent of the sales of his cattle. For example, for a producer to contribute \$100 to the program, sales from his cattle would need to be \$33,333 annually.

Nearly \$40 million would be generated in the program's first year of operation, based on the assessment rate as outlined in the proposed program. The program would be administered by a Beef Board of not more than 68 members from eligible producer organizations of each state or geographical area. Texas should have a representation of about seven members on the Beef Board, to help determine how the checkoff monies would be spent.

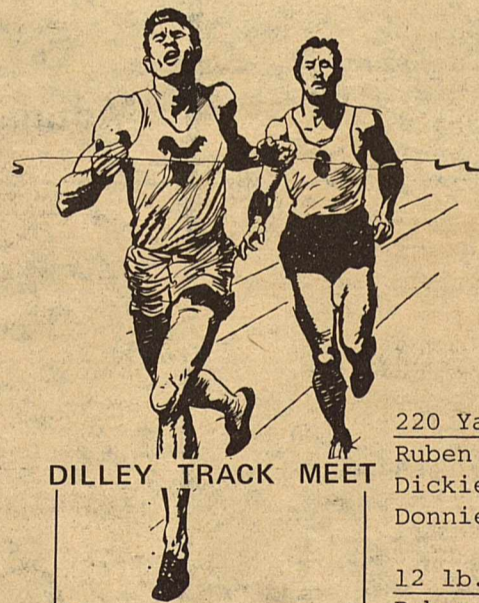

Special out-of-town guests were Talamantez' brothers, G. C. and Raymond Talamantez, their wives, and Martin Luna, all of Brackettville.

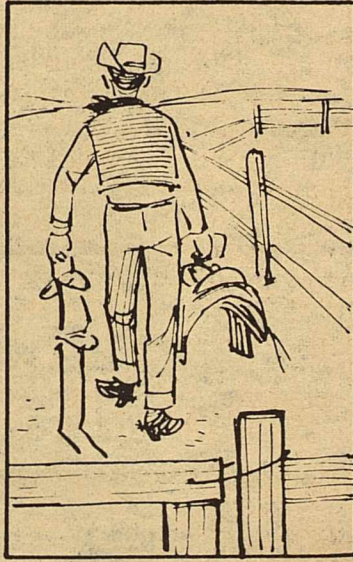

Mr. and Mrs. Tomas Talamantez celebrated their 50th anniversary on February 19 in San Pedro, California.

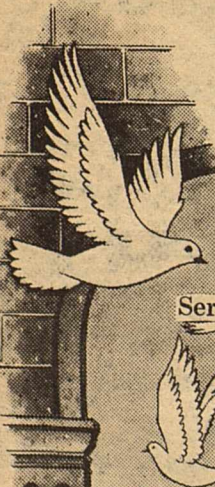

ROADWORK TO BEGIN

Work in the Brackettville area is included in a special \$60 million Program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. This special program is necessary to overcome damage to roadways caused by prolonged wet weather this past year and unusually heavy trucks using the roads.

District Engineer Fred Clark of Del Rio said the work will include reconstruction of section of FM Highway 1572 between State 131 at Spofford and US 90. Sections of roadway not scheduled for this reconstruction will be seal coated. This work will be contracted in June, at an estimated cost of approximately \$232,000.

"It is intended that first pri-

ority be given to repair and rehabilitation of surfact and base failures caused by severe weather this winter," Engineer-Director Luther DeBerry wrote District Engineers, in establishing criteria for the 1977 Rehabilitation Program.

All areas in the State will share in this Rehabilitation Program, which will use financing that might have been available for highway improvements

As it is, the Program will do little more than attempt to put the highway system back into shape it was before the ravages of the past winter.

The Program goes beyond normal maintenance. But it does not include any projects that would require any additional right of way.

Normal maintenance can take care of minor cracks and holes, however prolonged wet weather damage required digging out areas where the base has failed, and rebuilding the roadway, literally from the ground up.

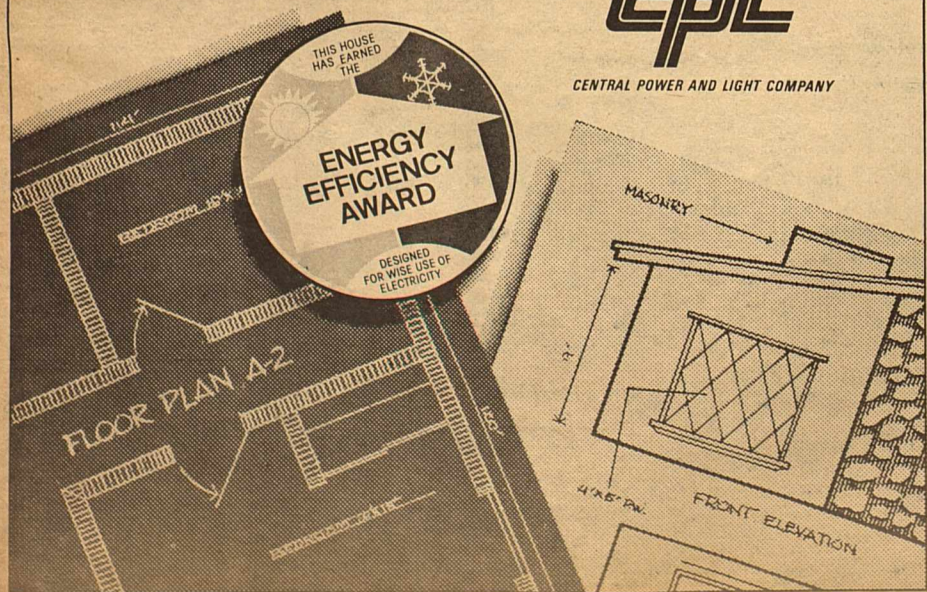

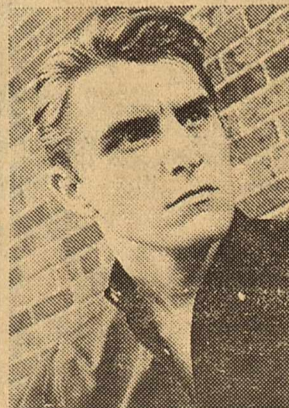


Theatre Professional to Produce May 4th Statewide Performing Arts Showcase

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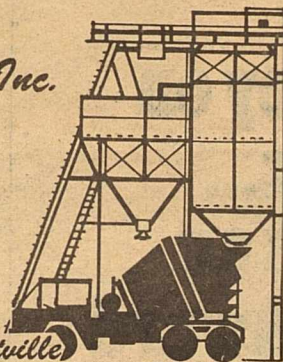
