the specialty of the house and she said "bugs". I had barbecued bugs and they were real good, tasty sea food," he continued.

"We also went to Sea World and Dream World. We also saw Kangaroos and Koala bears,"
Helton said. "The Lions Club vest opened doors every where we went."

"While there we saw banana, avocado and peach, all kinds of fruit plantations. I asked a man about their type of irrigation and he said, "300 inches annual rainfall.

"We saw sheep country and wild kangaroos, small ones up to four feet tall. We were warned they could be quite agressive. All the trucks and cars had what I called cow catchers (large bumpers). If you bump one on the ground its nothing, but if it hits the windshield it will come right through," Helton said.

"We attended a Lions Club meeting. Here our installations last about one and a half hours. Over there it began with cocktails at 7 p.m. and they toasted everything and it was about 12:30 a.m. when the gavel rang goodnight. It was very enjoyable."

Helton is from Clovis, N.M. and he met Joe, a contractor plaque in appreciation of her friend and they toured Sidney Harbor.

"We saw one house that was placed on the market for \$20,000,000 but when the bank foreclosed on it, it sold for \$12,000,000," Helton said.

The Mules kicked off to the Brownfield Cubs, with the Cubs putting the ball into action on the Mules 40 yd line. Quarterback Noel Garcia carried the ball down the outside for a 17 yd puckup for the first, first down of the game. Shad Evans picked up another 16 yards on a pass from Garcia.

Flags were on the play and the Mules were penalized for holding. In the next play Garcia took the ball right down the center for another 5-6 yd pick up, before having to punt the ball to the Mules.

The first half of the game was a defensive half for both the Cubs and Mules.

The first touchdown of the game came when the Cubs crossed the endzone with 7:13 left in the first quarter. The kick was good and Brownfield took the lead 7-0 over the Mules.

The Mules took over on the 30 yard line, fumbled the ball and recovered it for a 2 yd loss. Flags were down on the play with the 8 vd penality being against the Cubs and the Mules received an automatic first

We are all aware of the deductions that are made from our paychecks and contributed to Social Security. In most cases, these payments are required by law to be made to the Social Security Administration so individuals who are ready to retire or are incapacitated due to an injury can

receive Social Security benefits. I have received several letters from people who are interested in finding out what Social Secruity benefits they are entitled to receive when they retire or suffer an injury that prevents them from working.

While we at the Texas State Treasury do not maintain such records in our office, we have put these individuals in touch with the correct agency, the Social Security Administration, which is a federal agency. The Privacy Act, which is designed to protect you, only entitles the Social Security Administration to divulge your earnings history to you or a person representing

Therefore, you should contact that agency directly to request a copy of your complete Social Security statement. They will send you a form to fill out and return to them. In six weeks or less, you should receive a statement that will reflect your Social Security earnings history, how much you have paid in Social Secruity taxes and your estimated future Social Security benefits. Dear Editor,

I am writing in hopes of dispelling the far-flung myth that law enforcement officers support gun control. The police administration on Capitol Hill, most of who haven't been on the street for decades, do not speak for the majority of rank and file police.

Semi-automatic gun bans in some states put law-abiding gun owners at risk of arrest and prosecution for refusing to register, surrender or otherwise dispose of their guns. Now a similar nationwide ban is proposed. I want to arrest criminals, not lawful citizens made into common criminals by means of misguided laws. That's why I oppose semi-auto gun ban proposals and other worthless anti-gun laws masquerading as crime control.

My job would be a lot easier if our elected officials would dedicate more time, money and effort toward developing anticrime tools which legislate against the criminal not lawabiding citizens. Let's cut out the easy parole and courtroom injustice and start enforcing the



Lazbuddie Team Restores Post Office

How can you reach outside yourself to touch the lives of others and, at the same time, enrich your own life as well as make a significant contribution to your community? Say, "YES!" And that's exactly what several people in the Lazbuddie community have

A worthwhile new program called Y.E.S. (Youths Exchanging with Seniors) was implemented at Lazbuddie during the last school year. The program involves student volunteers from community youth organizations, F.H.A. and 4-H, who are specially trained to be of service to the elderly, their adult leaders and advisors, and senior citizens who are willing to interact with the young people and receive special services from them.

Lazbuddie's Y.E.S. is under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Lust, the school's home economics teacher and FHA advisor. The Parmer County Y.E.S. program is part of a twentycounty pilot project in Texas created to help communities reach out to its senior citizens through student service volunteers and to foster interchange of ideas and good will between the young people and the seniors.







Bill Revamps Purchasing

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock reports the Texas Senate passed legislation that would crack down on state agencies' use of government-owned vehicles and begin consolidation of the dozens of state personnel offices into a central personnel agency.

The measures were part of a bill to revamp the State Purchasing and General Services Commission and implement several cost-saving provisions of the Sharp audit report.

"This legislation will force agencies to cut back on some of the unnecessary expenses and begin consolidating duplicate functions--like personnel offices--that can be found in virtually every state agency," said Bullock after the vote.

The bill would recreate the State Purchasing and General Services Commission as the General Services Department and allow the Governor to appoint the executive director of the new agency, Bullock said.

The legislation also creates the Texas Office of Personnel Services, as recommended by Sharp's Texas Performance Review, to be a central agency responsible for accepting job applications and establishing a

uniform state personnel policy. la Among the bill's cost-saving provisions is one requiring all state agencies to participate in state travel services and another consolidating most state vehicles into the state vehicle fleet. Vehicles assigned to agencies providing vital services will be exempted.

Bullock said the bill would also transfer state telecommunications functions from State Purchasing to the Department. of Information Resources "to allow for an integrated and unified approach to using technology to provide better service. for the clients of state government."

Bullock praised the Senate sponsor of the bill, Senator Gonzalo Barrientos of Austin, for his efforts in guiding the legislation through the Senate.

Let's talk about labor - work, if you please, for that is what labor is. Labor has come a long, long way since ancient times when work was closely related


