PUBLIC HEARING ON SOLID WASTE LANDFILL

In keeping with provisions of the "Solid Wast Disposal Act", Article 4477-7, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, a public hearing will be held by the Texas Department of Health on MAY 17th, 1979, at 10:00 a.m. on the application for a permit by the City of Brackettville for a municipal solid waste landfill The hearing will be held in the Civic Center in Brackettville. The facility involved as a proposed 7.5-acre Type II landfill to be located south of Brackettville 400 feet east of State Highway 131 and 1 3/4 miles south of US Highway 90.

Municipal solid wast facilities throught Texas are under the jurdiction of the Texas Department of Health and are required to be operated in accordance with the Department "Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations". The Department's jurdiction included the collection, handling and storage of solid waste and disposal by energy and material recovery, sanitary landfill, composting or other approved methods.

To assure that all municipal solid waste sites are located and operated in such a manner as to minimize potential hazards to the health, welfare and physical property of the people and the environment, each disposal facility in Texas is required to be evaluated by the Department of Health prior to receiv-

Continued from Page 1 ing a permit. The last is appliable to municipally-owned as well as privately owned solid waste sites. Each applicant for a permit for a solid waste facility in Texas -- and there are approximately 1,200 such facilities -- is required to sub nit supporting data and/or a design of the facility as a basic part of the application for a permit. All information concerning the facility. as well as copies of the Department regulations, will be present during the public hearing and be be available for review by all interested parties.

The public hearing is an important part of the Department evaluation process prior to making a determination on whet her or not a permit should be issued. The purpose of the hearing is to insure that all interested parties have full knowledge about a solid waste disposal facility and that they are provided an opportunity to present testimony relating to the facility. The permit applicant, or a representative of the applicant, will be present to answer questions.

Public hearings on municipal solid waste facilities are conducted in accordance with the "Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act", Article 6252-13a, a Texas Revised Civil Statustes, according to Mr. Jack C. Carmicheal, P.E., Director of the Division of Solid Waste Management, Texas Department of Health. The hearings are conducted by an attorney from the

Department. Although a hearing is an open meeting, it is a formal meeting and all testimony is under oath. Anyone may appear to testify with or without an attorney, said Mr. Carmicheal but all evidence submitted must be legally admissable (as opposed to hearsay) if such evidence is to be used as a basis for decision by the Department.

Copies of the complete application and supporting documents are available for review by any interested party at the Division of Solid Waste Management, Texas Department of Health, 1100 West 49th Street, Austin, Texas 78756: telephone number (512) 458-7271 and at the Department's Regional Office located at P.O.Box 630 Old Memorial Hospital Building Garner Field Road, Uvalde, Texas 78801, telephone: (512) 278-7173.

Also in the Auxiliary schedule is a Saturday morning program on copper enameling by San Angelo area artisan

Sharon Templeton with assistance by Betty Templeton and Nancy Hall. Another auxiliary function will be a showing by San Angelo hand weaver Debbie Daniell, who not only works entirely in such natural fibers as wool and mohair, but follows through with her fabrics by incorporating them into designer fashions. Her finished products are distributed through such large markets as the Dallas Apparel Mart.

The trace show opens briefly from Five to Seven p.m. Thursday and then runs through Friday and Saturday.

Savroy's seminar, concentrating on the "hub" system of rotation grazing, will start with a lecture session beginning at 7 p.m. Thrusday in the San angelo Convention Center. On Friday morning a seven-member panel representing the Bureau of Land Mangement, U.S. Forest Service, Soil Conservation Service, Texas Extension ans Experiment systems and private livestock producers will respond to the "hub" program. There will be a small registration fee for the Savory program.

The TS&GRA meeting proper begins with registration from 10 to 4:30 p.m Friday, followed by the committee meetings that afternoon.

A reception and western dance are scheduled at the Holiday Inn Friday evening.

The Association business session will run all day Saturday, followed by a reception and the annual awards banquet.



There are a good many problems developing in ash trees. In many the leaves, particularly the young and new ones, are curling under and drawing up. This is caused by insects on the under side of the leaves. In many trees many of the leaves are turning crisp and brown around the edges. This is caused by a fungus and a soil deficiency. Some trees are sparsely leafed and yellow. This too is result of a lact of proper nutrients for the trees. For insects the best treatment is spraying with an insecticide. You can add a foliar feed to the mixture and a fungicide and take care of all three problems at one time. Any good Nurserman can recommend products to meet your need. The main thing is - "Don't Delay".



DROP COOKIES WITH HONEY

3 c sifted flour
3 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 cup chopped almonds
1/2 cup chopped citron
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup honey
2 egg yolks, well beaten
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup sugar

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon; stir in almonds and citron. Cream butter beat in sugar and honey. Add egg yolks and vanilla. Gradually stir in flour-nut-fruit mixture. Drop batter from teaspoon on greased baking sheet and bake at 350 to 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. Substitute pecans for almonds if desired. Makes seven dozen cookies.




YEARBOOK RAFFLE

Note: If no request to become a party or petition for hearing is timely filed with the Commission, the Commission may proceed without a hearing on the application for a Certificate of Need at any time after June 8, 1979, upon written request by the applicant.
