
#### **Present Day** Myths JOE TOWNSEND

KAZEN IN WASHINGTON

As I prepare this report, several days before it will appear in print, the situation in Iran causes me deep concern. Top priority must be the safety of the Americans being held hostage, and we must realize that the situation calls for strong diplomatic have been serious problems, and action. Retaliatory violence could more may be ahead. Feed, lives ignite drastic actions by the captors of our people there. The incident at the American Embassy in Tehran is unlike any we have faced before, so we have no preplanned policy or procedure.

Under international law, the host government is charged with protecting the safety of foreign personnel and property of nations with which it has diplomatic relations. The Ayotolla Khomeini has not only rejected diplomatic relations. The Ayotolla Khomeini has not only rejected that obligation, but has encouraged the Iranian radicals and given them his sanction.

WOULD DEPORT HOSTILE GUESTS It is time to make it clear that we will not tolerate Iranian students who are in this country, to obtain an education in the best educational institutions in the world, taking to out streets in political demonstrations against the United States and in support of Khomeini's axtion. I am, therefore, co-sponsoring legislation that would authorize innediate deportation of nonimmigrant alien students who abuse our nation's hospitality. As long as they apply themselves as students, they are welcome, but the moment they evacuate the classroom and cease to comply with the purpose for which they were admitted, they should be subject to immediate deportaion.

I find the conduct of the Iranian leaders disgusting, but in hopes that reason may prevail, I have joined a number of my colleagues in the House in writing a letter to the Ayatollah Khomeini, asking his prompt interventon meini, asking his prompt intervention to free the Americans held in our embassy and to insure the safety of other Americans there.

#### PROTECT GRAIN FARMERS

The House last week passed an amendment to the Agricutlure Adjustment Act that in effect pro vides frain farmers with a measure of protection against the major increases in production costs. In September 1978, farmers were paying 46 cents a gallon for diesel fuel. Today the cost is 81

cents. Seed wheat has risen from \$5.90 a bushel to \$7.40. A twowheel drive tractor that cost \$25,000 last year now is priced at \$29,000. Overall farm production costs have climbed 14 percent in one year.

The bill we passed will not affect consumers because the major grains are selling over the proposed target prices, but what we have done is pass legislation to increase the target prices on wheat and feed grains for 1980 crops by 7 percent. I recognize that agriculture is the keystone of our economy, and that we must assure that farmers earn enough from their labor and investment to continue their food

production.

#### FEAR TROUBLE AHEAD

The past year was resonably good for many farmers. They have had record crops, and prices have been sustained by increased foreign purchasing. Yet there stock and fuel costs rose, as dis interest on bank loans, during 1979, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture last week warned that we must expect a substantial reduction in farm income in 1980. USDA experts say the \$31 billion earnings of 1979 will go down to \$24 billion in 1980, for a drop of almost 20 percent.

In voting for a 7 percent increase in target prices, we stayed within the President's guidelines for fighting inflatior fully realizing that it may not

be enough to cover the farmer's inflated cost of production and a fair return for his product.





The Pickle-Bentsen bill will in the cattle industry by allowing increased imports during periods and is one of the primary reasons imports during periods of depressed prices. This countercyclical control of imports will add staquality beef at reasonable prices according to Wheeler.



#### More bighorn Texas sheep

AUSTIN—The numbers aren't large yet, but Texas game management officials are hoping that the bighorn sheep released in the Sierra Diablo mountains will multiply and come off the endangered animal list.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. recently set loose seven more desert bighorns which had been pen raised.


They will join about a dozen other bighorns which have been released in past years.

Once numerous in West Texas mountain areas, the desert bighorn herds had been largely wiped out by 1900, due to excessive hunting and disease.

The first sheep to be released came from Arizona. The three rams, two ewes and two lambs freed recently came from Mexico.

Texas has great numbers of deer in all parts of the state and many antelopes in West Texas. Both animals often are seen from the highways.

Another animal found in growing numbers is the coyote. It has spread so fast and far that stockmen are concerned about losses due to the predator.



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Symposium Discusses Fire

EXPERIENCE BEST TEACHER WHEN

BURNING BRUSHLAND

Carrizo Springs--An expert on the use of fire to control brush on Texas rangeland told ranchers and ranch scientists meeting here this week that experience in the best teacher for prescribed burnings.

"Wildfire are frightening but prescribed burns are less dangerous because they are generally conducted under moderate weather conditions with prepared firelines," said Dr. Henry Wright, a Texas Tech University researcher who has done extensive work on prescribed burning.

Dr. Wright addressed a symposium on Prescribed Burning for the Rio Grande Plain.

"Prescribed burning is danger ous to the inexperienced,"
Wright told the audience. "In-

expereinced people can easily become overconfident and allow fires to get away."

The Texas Tech researcher said prescriptions are helpful in the planning of a burn, but they do not protect against the intangibles such as a hill on the side of a pasture that might cause unusual winds, or a canyon that may aid the formation of an intense firewhirl to throw firebrands great distances.

"This is why experience in fire behavior is stressed before letting people strike out on their own," Wright said. "Experienced people weigh the intangible along with weather and fuel moisture when they plan a prescribed burn."

The secret to all prescribed burning is to let the weather work for you," Wright emphasized. "When all the environmental factors are with, the job is easy."

tors are with, the job is easy."
Dr. Wirght joined other researchers and educators from
Texas Tech and Texas A&M University in exploring the benefits
and problems involved with using fire as a management tool during the one-day symposium.

Dr. Larry White, an area range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, told the group that "many rancher will be skeptical bout using fire, and many others will be unwilling to take the time to learn to prescribe burn.

"It is my opinion that these people unwilling to learn should never strike a match," Dr. White


Dr. C.J.Scifres, a professor of range management at Texas A&M said he believes fire has a place in the future as another ranch management tool."This is the first time Texans in Texas have met to discuss the technological benefits and uses of fire," he said.

"Modern man generally reviews fire as a technical tool in a negative way. It is tough to balance the 'Smokey the Bear' educational campaign against the judicious, timely use of fire as a technical tool."

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
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### CAVALRYMAN MAIL | Sheep & Goat Raisers' News

It's usually wise to assume when dealing with the government that there's more to any announcement than meets the eye. 'Our most recent application of that sage principle, however, may have caused more skipped heatbeats than necessary.

When Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus last Friday (nov.9) annouced his official policy on the federal predator control program, a lot of stockmen took to comparing him somewhat unfavorably with Iran's flaky Ayatollah. Not that they operate anything like, but the two of them would have run a close race for unpopular man of the year in sheep country.

It wasn't exactly what Andrus' announcement said that caused so much uncharitable feeling, but more what everyone assumed he had yet to say. His announcement was such a skimpy affair that it was generally taken as no more than a skeleton outline -- the bulk of the policy was undoubtedly still to come and would surely cover several pages of fairly specific program

It was anticipation of what those specifics would be--based on the unmistakable environmnet alist flavor of the original statement -- that had the sheep camp up in arms. The "skeleton" statement has called for a phaseout of lethal preventative predator control, for instance, which it was feared would prove to be rapid and ruthless when the "rest of the story" was revealed. The statement also called for deemphasis of lethal corrective con trols, a strong hint that effective and proven measures were to be scraped in favor of the untried and unlikely "avoidance" schemes of anti-control activiti ists. Vague references to tightening aerial hunting and steel trap restrictions were likewise expected to be fleshed out in alarming detail, as were other equally vague but unsettling elements in Andrus' announcement.

This time, however, the old admonition to read between the lines may not have proven out. The general policy will, of course, have to be fleshed out, but Andrus' now public affairs officer says the fleshing out will be done somewhere else along the line. Andrus' "Skeleton" outline was actually the whole announcement -- there will be no more. In other words, "what you see is what you get.

In Interior spokesman also calmed certain specific fears about what will be done with the policy elsewhere. For in-

stance, there will be no government-dicated livestock management procedure imposed as a condition for receiving predator control assistance, nor will the m-44 be prohibited, nor is there any sort of timetable for the 'phaseout" of lethal preventative control. Interior is also not

considering the idea of forcing livestock off public land areas where predator problems are

severe, or of forcing a change in those areas to types of stock less susceptible to predation than sheep.

The Andrus policy does call for emphasis on non-lethal control and for "avoiding conflicts between livestock and predators. but the emphasis is apparently mostly philosophical. According to the Interior spokesman, the actual program will be pretty

musch business as usual with a long range goal of someday kill-

ing fewer predators while at the same time protecting livestock. As for the announced "phaseout" of lethal controls, it is to be accomplished as non-lethal methods are developed and proven.

There is even one particularly bright spot in the policy, though it stands so close to an exceedingly dark one that it's been overlooked by most reviewers The dark spot is Andrus; inststence on halting all further research into 1080. The bright spot is his flat assurance that research into other toxicants will continue and at a steppedup pace. This marks the first time in nearly two decades that officaial policy has actually supported and affirmed toxicant research--until now it's generally been a case of "we'll keep on plugging at it until someone gets around to calling our hand.

There's still a chance that whoever translates the policy into pratice will be of the environmental ilk and manage to weaken the program unreasonably, but for the time being at least, we may be permitted a certain measure of optimism, Now that would be a refreshing feeling!




