Garcia is being held without bond and is alledgedly an illegal alien.

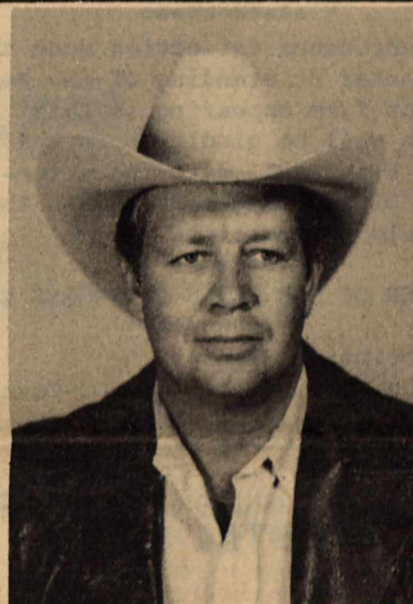

DEADLINE NEAR ON ALL-RISK WHEAT INSURANCE

September 15 is the last date on which applications will be accepted for All-Risk Insurance policies on 1983-crpop wheat. All-Risk Crop Insuranc Field Operations Director F.W."Red" Crouch, Jr. says that a list of local agents who offer thhe the ocunty ASCS office.

Crouch says that the number of applications received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high. "One major reason", Crouch notes, "is the countinuing increase in crop production costs. Many wheat growers simply do not have the necessary cash reserves or additional borrowing capability to take a chance on losing the money that they will have invested in their crops."

"Another reason," the insurance official contends, "is the reduced cost of purchasing insurance." The federal government, in an effort to

encourage participation in the program, pays up to 30% of the cost of the protection. Anticipated sign-up also is expected to be higher because a growing number of lenders are requiring or suggesting that borrowers carry ar least enough coverage to provide for repayment of production loans.

PROPERTY TAXES—

GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions. As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill, named after state representative Wayne Peveto, is a tax reform law: legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable.

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the responsibility of setting all property at its full value—as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entities.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpayers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation. My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature—then doing an about-face and calling it bad legislation after it was passed. The Peveto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which *must* be dealt with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. 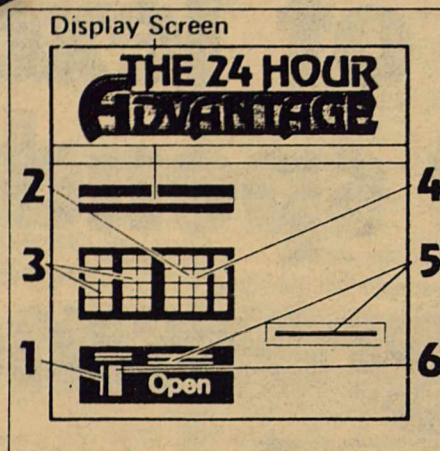

RANCHERS ROUNDUP PROCEEDINGS AVAILABLE

Ranchers who were unable to attend the recent International Ranchers (IRR) Del Rio can still benefit from the information and technology presented during that three-day conference.

A limited number of the IRR proceedings, a 472-page bound book which contains 80 percent of talks presented, are being offered for sale at cost.

Some 100 ranching experts and industry leaders from 12 states and four countries shared their expertise with 631 participants who came from 25 states to take part in the big ranching conference dedicated to survival of the ranching industry.

The proceedings contains papers on beef cattle, brush management, wildlife, sheep and Angora goat production, Women in Ranching, plus inspiring, stimulating general session talks.

IRR coordinators point out the book makes an excellent reference text and provides producers with many ideas on cost-cutting and effective ranch management.

"We realize that many ranchers

and landowners could not attend the IRR for a variety of reasons," said Drs. LeRoy Hoermann and Larry White, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Livestock and Range Specialists, respectively. In light of all the good practical information relative of effective ranch management and alternative income opportunities that those producers missed, we are pleased to make the proceedings available."

The coordinators said many ranchers who attended IRR-'82 also purchased extra copies of the book when registering, an indication of its instant popularity. Several hundred ranchers also purchased the book last year after the Roundup. Comments from ranchers indicate the book was extremely useful.

The 1982 IRR proceedings can be purchased by sending \$25 to IRR Proceedings, P.O. Box 1849, Uvalde, Texas, 78801. Checks should be made payable to "International Ranchers Roundup."

"If last year's orders are any indication of the book's usefulness, we expect ranchers will also take advantage of the opportunity this year, too," the coordinators stress. "It's very seldom that this much expertise and practical information

is gathered into a single publication for this price."

Prominent ranchers last year likened the IRR with "trying to take the Texas A&M animal science curriculum in three days." The Uvalde Leader-News reported in a recent issue that many ranchers were heard to say they gathered more useful information in these few days of activities than in any conference on ranching they had ever attended.

MOTOR CARRIER INDUSTRY SUPPORTS STRENGTHENING OF TEXAS DWI LAWS

The leadership of the Texas truck and bus industry has gone on record in support of legislation to strengthen laws relating to driving while intoxicated.

Meeting August in Kerrville, the board of directors of the Texas Motor Transportation Association (TMTA) voted to back efforts in the 68th session of the Texas Legislature for tougher motor traffic laws relating to the arrest, prosecution and conviction of drunk drivers.

threat it poses to all drivers and their families," said Robert Floyd, TMTA vice presidnet of public affair:

"The Department of Public Safety has determined that nearly one-quarter of the state's traffic fatalities last year were directly attributable to drunk driving," Floyd continued "and the DPS further estimates that that proportation would be 50 percent if state law required alcohol measurements from all drivers in fatal accidents.

"Motor carriers are extremely safety conscious and have long supported law enforcement agencies in their efforts to keep Texas highways safe. TMTA's DWI policy expresses the truck and bus industry's commit-

ment to join in the fight against the increasingly serious problem of drunk drivers."

In another motor carriers effort to combat drunk driving, four veteran drivers have organized Truckers Against Drunk Drivers (TADD). The group plans a nationwide campaign to enlist the aid of all truck drivers. The four drivers own and operate their own rigs, which are leased to Melton Truck Lines, Inc. of Shreveport, Louisiana. Duncan McRae, Jr., executive vice president of Melton, is a member of the TMTA board of directors.

TMTA represents 900 trucklines, intercity bus companies and allied industries operating in Texas.

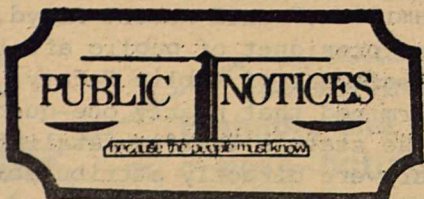

**PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5
ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land

La enmienda establecería el límite de gastos de asistencia pública estatal a \$160,000,000 para el bienio 1982-1983.

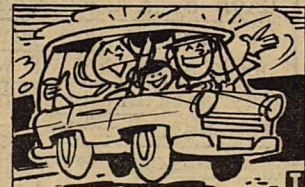

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

New law results in temporary bonus for some SSI recipients low-income aged, blind and disabled people who get a federal supplemental security income check, who also get social security, actually have received more than this year's 7.4 percent cost-of-living increase for July and August. But, social security officials say, the September SSI checks will be reduced for these 'dually entitled' persons, so that both checks combined will be no more than 7.4 percent higher than the combined checks in June.

According to Miss Elvia F. Fuentes, Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office, the two month bonus came about because a 1981 law provides that changes in an SSI recipient's other income won't affect the amount of the SSI check in most cases for two months. Two months after the change, such as the social security benefit increase, the SSI check is adjusted Miss Fuentes said.

I wanted to assure the persons who are getting both social security and SSI that, although the September SSI check will be reduced

somewhat, that total of both checks will be 7.4 percent higher than what they were getting in June, Miss. Fuentes said.
