
Toombs Receives Award





Travel Through Time in Del Rio and Uvalde

Visitors to the "Southwest Texas Badlands" can trace a rich and diverse tapestry of Texas history. From the 4,000-year-old cave paintings of some of the earliest Texans, Del Rio and Uvalde offer a wide myriad of activities for the Texas traveler.

Although the words "Texas history" conjure up images of Spaniards, cowboys, and the Alamo, there were residents here long before the first settler stepped off a ship from the Old World.

Forty-five miles to the west of Del Rio, cave paintings more than 4,000 years old provide evidence of these primitive Texans. Visitors can see these early specimens of Texas art at Fate Bell Shelter in Seminole Canyon State Historical Park. Located in Val Verde County, Fate Bell Shelter can only be seen as part of a guided tour. Camping facilities in Seminole Canyon are also available with reservations. 915/292-4464.

Over 3,200 years after the cave painters left their mark in Texas, the Spaniards and Mexicans arrived. The Mexican influence is still very prominent today in Del Rio, "The Queen City of the Rio Grande," and its Mexican sister city, Cuidad Acuña. Visitors to Cuidad Acuña can sample from the large selection of restaurants, bars, and shops across the border. Prices tend to be lower across the river and since Del Rio is closer to the major metropolitan areas of Texas

than many border towns, it is easy to take a quick and inexpensive trip across the Rio Grande.

In Del Rio, the Whitehead Memorial Museum chronicles the Old West of the late 1800s. Visitors to the outdoor museum visit the original Perry Store, a trading post from 1870 which serviced both Texas and Mexico. Also on themuseum grounds is a replica of the Jersey Lilly, a court and saloon in which Judge Roy Bean dispensed justice in a unique, homespun way during his reign as "The Law West of the Pecos" in the 1880s. As the area continued to evolve,

more civilized elements began to emerge. The Val Verde Winery in Del Rio is the oldest bonded winery in Texas. The Italian Qualia family has run the winery since its inception in 1883. Several of the eight wines produced here have received acclaim from serious wine connoisseurs.

At the Uvalde Grand Opera House in the historic downtown, visitors can find a restored opera house and museum, originally built in 1891. Although free tours are available, the theater is still used often for a variety of performances.

During the Depression Era, President Franklin D. Roosevelt initiated programs to improve the country and utilize its work force. In 1935, the Civilian Conservation Corps built Garner State Park. Named after John Nance Garner,

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Uvalde native and Roosevelt's Vice President, Garner State Park's role in the New Deal pales next to the natural beauty and variety of activities available within its boundaries. Located alongside the Frio River outside of Uvalde, Garner State Park is the most popular campground in Texas and offers great fishing, swimming, tubing, miniature golf, hike and bike trails, and nightly dancing.

Emerging from the Depression, the United States entered World War II. The Laughlin Air Force Base, eight miles east of Del Rio, was activated in 1942 to train pilots to fly the B-26 medium bomber. Today, it is responsible for training new pilots for the U.S. Air Force and allied nations. Tour groups are welcome and guided tours are available on weekdays with three weeks advance notice.

Halfway between Del Rio and Uvalde, the Alamo Village Movie Location is a working movie set built for the 1959 John Wayne epic *The Alamo*. It features an authentic replica of the Alamo and a neighboring Old West town. The set has been used recently for the television miniseries *Lonesome Dove* and James Michener's *Texas*. Visitors are welcome to explore the movie set and will find that filming still takes place and that during summer months, music, melodramas, and staged gunfights are offered.

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In 1969, U.S. President Richard M. Nixon and Mexican President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz dedicated the dam that created the Amistad Lake and Recreation Area. The dam has created 850 miles of scenic shoreline along the Rio Grande. Visitors driving across the toll-free dam into Mexico will notice that the midpoint is marked with seven-foot American


