Father united with daughter after eighteen long years

FORT CLARK -- Very few movie scripts with unhappy endings ever experience much box office success. The public just seems to enjoy happy endings. In westerns, John Wayne always whipped all the outlaws and rode off into the sunset, leaving a very peaceful town behind. Tarzan killed the killer lion and rescued Jane from the bad natives who had her tied between two elephants. Always happy endings.

A reunion recently took place in Houston that would drive a Hollywood script writer out of his mind trying to duplicate.

About six months ago, Ken Minnitti, brother of Charlotte Sweet and Jim Householder, received a letter from the Veterans Administration that they had received from a young Amerasian girl seeking the whereabouts of Minnitti. This young lady's search was for a father she had never seen. She did not even know whether he was still living. This letter was opened by the VA, and after being read, it was forwarded to Mr. Minnitti.

From there, the story unfolds. This story of a father and his daughter being united after nineteen years is heart wrenching and touching. It is about a young helicopter pilot who spent two tours of duty in Viet Nam and

upon leaving he found his young lover expecting his child. His plans to send for her when he returned home never materialized after he was notified she was killed by a communist attack from the north Vietnamese.

The only clue Minnitti had as to the whereabouts of his daughter was a Bataan marking on one end of the letter. The Joint Volunteer Agency, an organization that is funded by the government and specializes in assisting Amerasian people, was contacted on numerous occasions until she was finally located. The problem of locating this young lady stemmed from

Owners must clean lots

Monday evening at six thirty o'clock, Mayor Larry Moore called a special meeting of the city council to order. The meeting, which was held in the city hall, was declared official after a quorum was established. Answering the roll call was Julie Fuentes, Dave Broderick, Louis Dimery, Bernie Cervantez, and Richard Terrazas.

Not on the agenda but allowed to speak to the council was Tom Phillips, representing the Texas Department of Health. He commended the city council and the city workers for the good job they were doing and ended his speech by cautioning them to continue the good work.

Utility ordinance # 244-C was the first item on the agenda and after a request made by Mayor Moore, it was read in its entirety. After it was read, comments on the new proposed ordinance were called for. Alderman Terrazas questioned the price increase at length with public utility superintendent David Tillery, doing a

commendable job of explaining the necessity of the situation. After recognizing the discussion was bogging down, Alderman Broderick made the motion to table the ordinance. After a second the motion carried.

Landfill Ordinance # 1990-4 was read to the council and accepted as read. The ordinance was very explicit as to what could be hauled to the dump and who was eligible. Under definitions, an "eligible user" is all occupied or unoccupied, City of Brackettville, active residential or commercial utility accounts. Also Kinney County residents who do not reside in Fort Clark Springs or Spofford. The council emphasized that residents of Fort Clark Springs and Spofford would not be eligible to haul garbage of any kind to the city owned landfill.

A request was made to rezone 6 blocks in the Brackett Addition

from residential to business for the purpose of establishing a flower shop. A motion was made and seconded and it carried.

City ordinance #260, which includes the cleaning of lots, was read to the council and it was noted that many residents of Brackettville had been cautioned and warned to keep their lots clean, but the request had been ignored. Mayor Moore, after noting the ordinance had been passed in 1988, questioned the enforcement of it. Moore said, "when you send a clean-up notice to two property owners and one cleans his lot and the other says that he doesn't have to clean his lot, then this is wrong." Tillery explained some of the problems that had confronted him on enforcing this ordinance and the Mayor re-iterated, "we (the council) have promised you our 100% support and, I don't believe you fully understand... we will back you in anything you do to see that this ordinance is carried out."

Tree planting

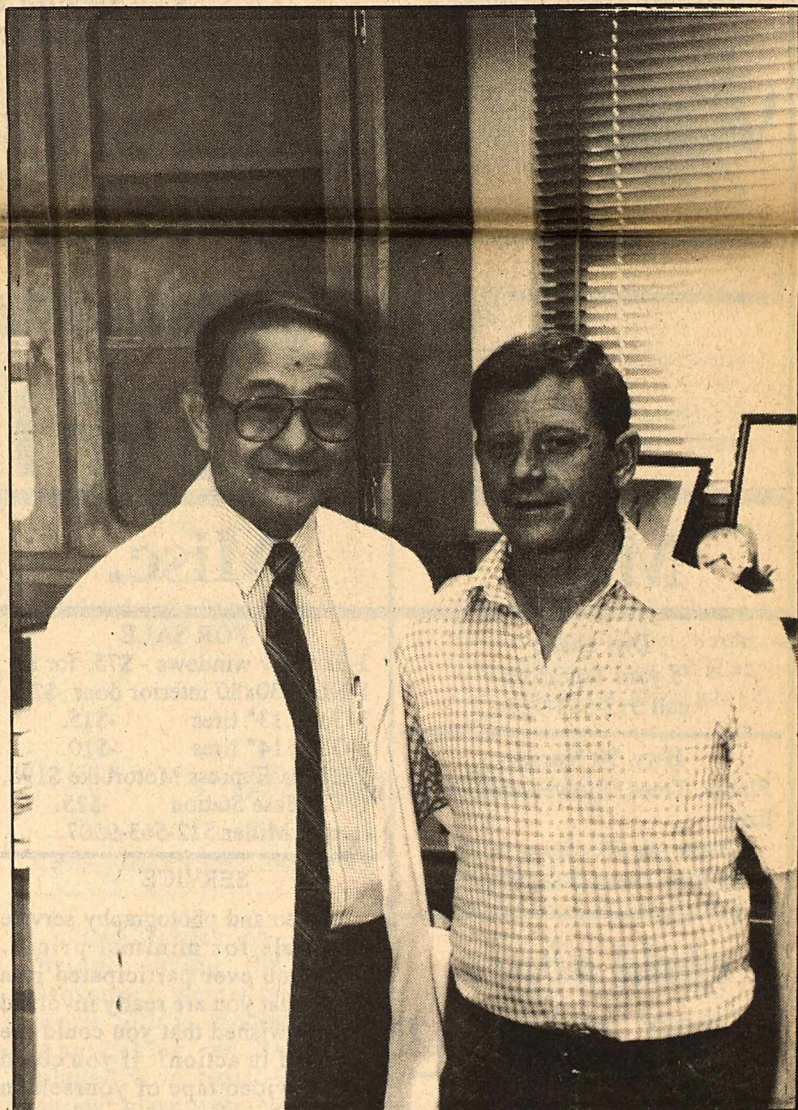

Commissioner Sheedy to head clean-up campaign

COURTHOUSE -- A special Commissioners meeting was called to order by Judge Tim Ward Monday morning at eight thirty o'clock in the county courtroom. With Plunker Sheedy, Alvin McClure, and Ruben Fuentes present a quorum was established. It was noted the Commissioner Joe Garza was unable to attend due to sickness that had him confined to the hospital.

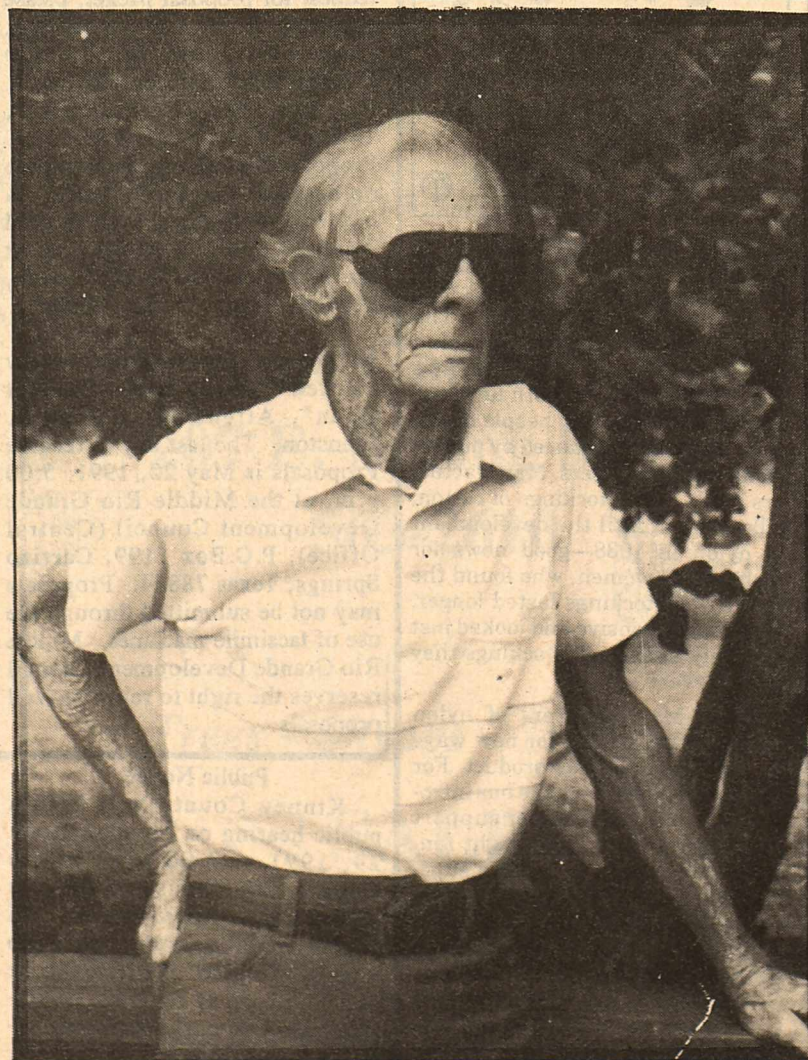
Judge Ward notified the commissioners of the completion of the Senior Citizens Center and explained to them the importance of paying the remainder of the bills that are presently due. Some questions in regards to the added cost were raised and it was explained that some additions were made during the construction that was not covered in the grant. Commissioner Sheedy expressed his views in regards to the project. He felt as though the county had been generous and considerate during the construction. He motioned to pay the bills and it carried.

When the subject of the City Wide Clean-up came up commissioner Sheedy was called on to make the presentation. Mr. Sheedy had devoted many hours researching the project and his presentation to the court was precise and very detailed. The amount of equipment that will be needed was discussed along with the amount of men that would be needed. It was decided that twelve men would be necessary to handle the job and from this pool a maintainer operator and a dump truck driver would be picked. An agreement on the wages to be paid for the workers was agreed on and it was unanimously agreed that commissioner Sheedy should oversee the job.

The commissioners agreed that the purchasing of any new equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc. should be attempted in Brackettville before trying elsewhere.

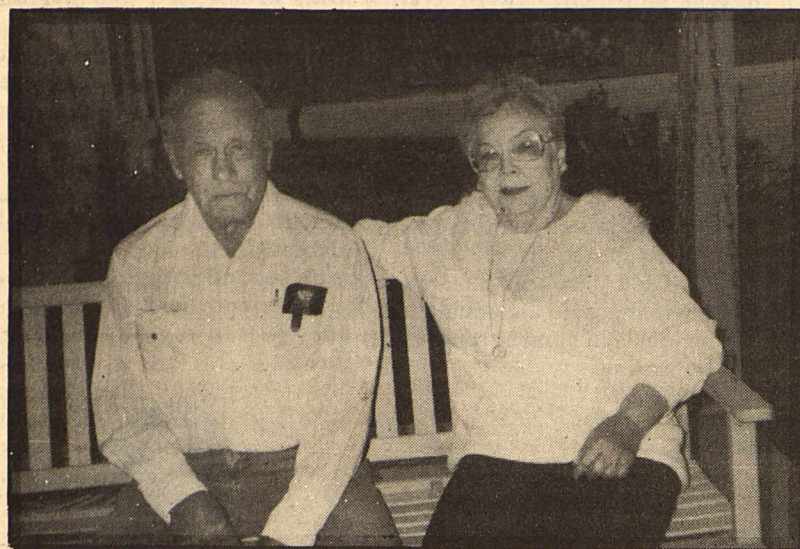

Oscar was in the Air Corp, as a mechanic in WWII. Marguerite worked for a short time at the Fort laundry while Oscar was in the service. She still has her employee card issued by the Provost Marshall in 1944. Ft. Clark has been a part of the Neuman's life from the time the Army occupied the premises to the present time. They came to dances, prize fights and parades here on the Fort.

When the Texas Railroad & Equipment Co. bought the Fort from the government in 1946 and Brown & Root occupied the area, they became members for a small fee that the company offered to Brackettville residents to be able to partake of the activities and the

swimming pool. They lived in Brackettville across from the school at this time.

They purchased a ranch north of town in the 60's and moved there.

When North American Towns purchased Fort Clark, they became members. In the early 80's, after experiencing a bad fall in which Marguerite broke her hip, they sold the ranch and moved onto the Fort into a house in the 49er's. In 1986, they bought the building that once housed the communications for the Fort during the army's stay. It was remodeled by Al Pagel and still carries his name on the door. The Neuman's enjoy this home very much.

Oscar & Marguerite's two sons and four grandchildren, Chad, Chase, Jennifer and Jessica have all learned to swim in the Fort pool.

The Neuman's enjoy seeing the improvements on the Fort and meeting new members. A lot of history has gone on around this fine couple, both in Brackettville and Fort Clark.

horse being fit and able to carry the trooper on the march, it would be a hard day's walk across area such as this, and with all of the required gear and firearms. In addition, with more than several mounts unable to march, there was the possibility of a mission failure.

During these modern times, cavalry troopers are not carried by their faithful mount, but by helicopters, tanks, personnel carriers, etc. Of course these vehicles require the proper care, or the mission may not be accomplished.

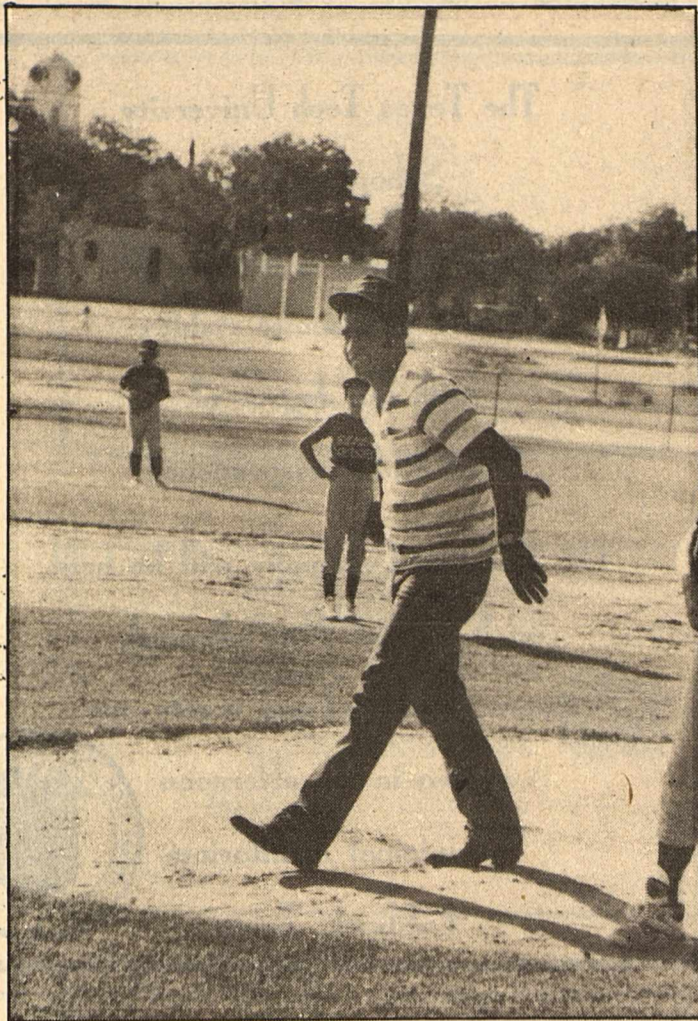

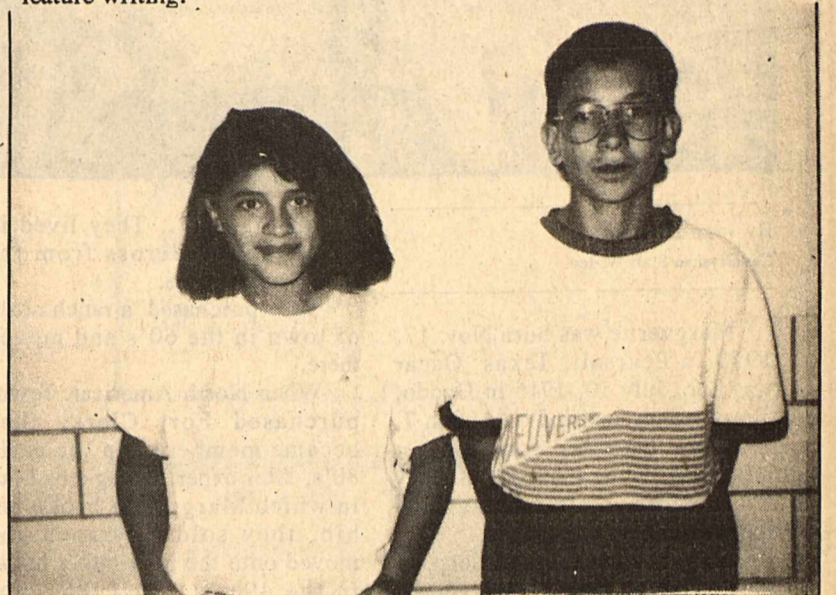
Sims participated in science, but didn't place overall. He placed third in the biology division. He also participated in calculator applications.

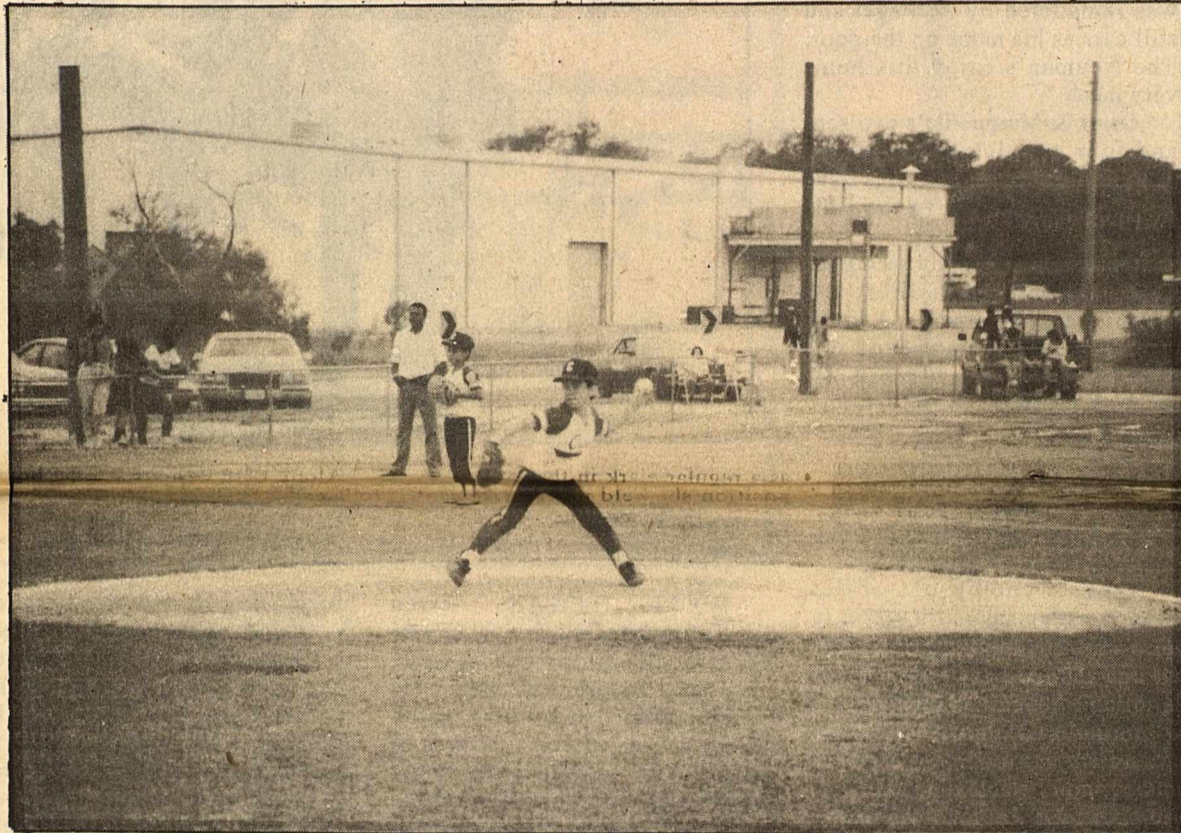
Junior High tennis

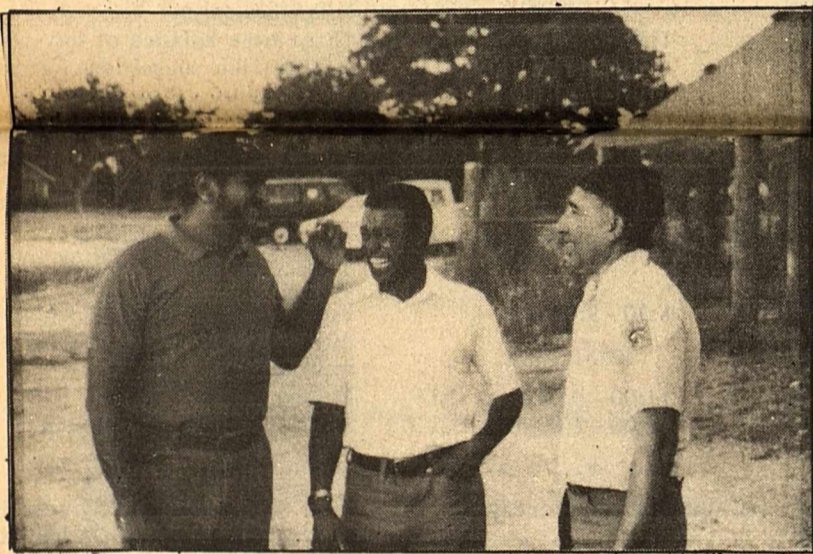

Word Studies

WHY GOD CREATED MAN PART VII

"And they heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. Then the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, 'Where are you?' And he said, 'I heard the sound of Thee in the garden, and I was afraid because I was naked; so I hid myself.' And He said, 'Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?' And the man said, 'The woman whom Thou gavest to be with me, she gave me from the tree, and I ate.' And the Lord God said to the woman, 'What is this you have done?' And the woman said, 'The serpent deceived me, and I ate.'" (Genesis 3:8-13).

Many years ago when I was in graduate school, I remember how the professors used to harp on the line about how much smarter man has become through the centuries. How much more knowledge there was and how much more intelligent man had become. This line of thinking was, and remains, humanistic self-delusion. Our libraries may contain more printed data than previous centuries, but the amount of data any one person can know remains about the same. And psychologically and physiologically man has not changed one iota since Adam! Look at Adam's defense before God, "The woman whom Thou gavest to me..." First, Adam blamed his wife for his sin, and then he blamed God for giving him this woman that caused his downfall. Man still blames his wife, his boss, his children, God, or someone or something for his own deficiencies. In fact, Adam's recorded answer to God proves to me the divine inspiration of the Genesis account because his answer is so typically human!

"And the Lord God said to the serpent, 'Because you have done this, cursed are you more than all cattle, and more than every beast of the field: On your belly shall you go, and dust shall you eat all the days of your life; and I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her seed; He shall bruise you on the head, and you shall bruise him on the heel'" (Genesis 3:14-

15). Verse 14 is obviously directed to the serpent; but the addressee changes in verse 15 when God talks directly to Satan who used the vocal apparatus of the serpent to talk to Eve. That this was Satan is clearly answered in Revelation 20:2 where it states, "And he laid hold of the dragon, the serpent of old, who is the devil and Satan, and bound him for a thousand years." When God promised to put enmity between Satan and the woman, and between Satan's seed and the woman's seed, He was promising salvation for the human race. Eve was deceived, but Adam freely chose to sin, thus Adam's sin was the greater. Therefore, the savior would come from the seed of the woman, Jesus Christ, through the virgin birth. The "seed" of Satan is unregenerate mankind, as explained by Christ in John 8:44. As I explained in a previous article, the old sin nature, or "adamic" nature is passed from the father to his offspring; it is not passed by the mother. Thus the theological reason for the virgin birth.

Genesis 3:16-19 gives us God's individual punishment to Adam and Eve, which I won't include because of space. But I do want to look at Genesis 3:21; "And the Lord God made garments of skin for Adam and his wife, and clothed them." Here is where we are forced to make several assumptions. We have to assume that God was teaching Adam and Eve Bible doctrine as he told them their fig leaf coverings represented human righteousness and were "like a filthy garment" in His sight (Isaiah 64:6). We have to assume that as Adam and Eve watched God kill animals and cure the hides for clothing, that God was explaining to them that "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness" (Hebrews 9:22). And we have to assume that as God was clothing them He explained to them that the clothing that He provided in grace represented imputed righteousness from Himself; that in their previous innocence they were righteous and needed no clothing, but in their sinful state they must have God's imputed righteousness to have fellowship with God (compare God's clothing of Adam and Eve and the clothing worn by the resurrected saints returning with the Lord at the Second Advent in Revelation 19:14).

I am very much in appreciation to the writer of this article, which was published in this newspaper on April 11, 1991. It really makes a person feel great whenever someone else publishes words of praise about them. However, there was an error, of which I must correct.

Unfortunately I was never stationed at Fort Clark during my military career. As a child, I always had hopes of someday being a cavalryman in the U.S. Army. However, when I was old enough to consider the military for a career, the government had sold all of the horses and sold or changed the mission of all the cavalry posts.

I have continually been an equestrian since I was about ten years old. Along with a number of horses, I also owned several surplus cavalry horses, and used them for competition as jumpers, in various horse shows. I attended a private military academy during

my school years, of which I was in the R.O.T.C. mounted cavalry, which included participation with the "Monkey Drill Team". I was an active member of the 1st U.S. Memorial Cavalry in Maricopa County, Arizona, for several years. While stationed at Laughlin A.F.B., I organized and was an active member of the 4th U.S. Memorial Cavalry, for approximately five years. In addition, horse cavalry memorabilia and artifacts are a hobby of mine.

I probably came as close to being a cavalryman as possible, without ever having been a bonafide U.S. Army cavalry trooper. From the reading of my "Old Army Days" articles in this newspaper, some of our readers may have drawn the conclusion that I possibly had been in the cavalry, or stationed at Fort Clark.

Gardening Tips

It's time to replace your cool weather annuals with warm season plants. Some that do good in this area are Begonia and Impatiens for shade. Verbena, Marigold, Periwinkle, Moss Rose, Purslane and Petunias in full sun. Some of the above plants do good in areas of part sun or part shade. Bronze leaf Begonias can handle quite a bit of sun and Petunias flourish with afternoon shade.

Now is a good time to fertilize lawns. Use a 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer-

the time-release sulfur coated ones do best. You will also need to apply some iron, in particular if your lawn is St. Augustine. Some premium fertilizers contain iron - which is good - but, it may not contain enough iron for our area. Additional iron can be applied at the same time you fertilize by mixing coppers - or preferably one of the new time release iron formulas, such as Easy-Grow Sulfa-soil - with your fertilizer at 1 to 1 ratio and apply at a somewhat higher rate.

BRACKETTVILLE - On Saturday, April 20, 1991, thanks to Brackettville, 5 members of the Fort Clark Shrine Club, were out accepting donations for the Houston Crippled Children's Hospital and the Galveston Burn Institute. It was a very successful day and it is good to know that Brackettville still believes in the work the Shriners are doing for Crippled Children.

Currently we have 4 Brackettville children being treated at the Houston Shriners Crippled Children's Hospital, and 1 that will begin treatment on May 9. If you know of a Crippled Child, contact any Shriner and he will either fill out the necessary forms or will put you in contact with one who can. This treatment is absolutely free. There is never a charge to the child or the parent from the time they leave their home until they are returned. There is no state, local or federal funding of any kind sought or accepted by Shriners Hospitals. The cost of trans-

portation, meals and lodging is borne by the Shriners.

In 1990, the Alzar Shrine, which includes the Brackettville Area, with headquarters in San Antonio, drove 180,000 miles delivering 838 patients and 836 parents to the Houston Hospital or the Galveston Burn Center. That is a lot of trips, when you figure a round trip is about 500 miles. This is an average of 15,000 miles per month, and does not include the miles driven by the clubs such as ours, transporting the patients and parents to San Antonio to meet the Alzar Vans. No money collected during the Hospital Benefit Drive is used for transporting the patients. This money is divided between the Houston Crippled Children's Hospital and the Galveston Burn Institute. Travel expenses is borne by individual Shriners, Shrine Clubs and the Alzar Shrine Temple.

Our Motto is "NO MAN EVER STOOD SO TALL AS THE ONE THAT STOOPED TO HELP A CRIPPLED CHILD."

Exchange, met with the commissioners and explained the procedure for attaining revenue bonds.

His presentation was detailed and answered many questions in regards to the various ways money can be raised. He also informed them of the various interest rates that were available with short term bonds probably being the lowest.

Some questions were raised regarding the grant the city was relying on for the swimming pool project. There was concern over the grant being canceled if it was not used in the very near future.

Mr. Charles Trost, who has been instrumental in acquiring the city grant, was called on to clarify some of the questions. He explained that the expiration date on the grant can be extended if there is "due cause" concerning the request. The question of the grant not covering the cost of the project was asked and Mr. Trost replied, "there is no way a project can be

done with the amount of grant money received unless you are very innovative." He continued on by saying, "to complete a project with the money from the grant you have to do the work the way the grant stipulates ... not your way." A change of location for the swimming pool was suggested by Trost because, in his opinion, the geological area that is now designated for the new pool is bad.

Commissioner Sheedy expressed a concern for the city officials after the suggestion by Trost was made. It was Sheedy's feelings that the city had worked too hard and long to make any plan changes now. He said, "I feel like the plans have progressed too far and we should continue with it. I am not in favor of stopping the project now. It would not be fair to the city."

With no official action being taken on the swimming pool project the meeting was adjourned.

Tracks Along the Trail

The trail from Waco and Fort Worth across Indian territory to Abilene became known as the Chisholm Trail.

Jesse Chisholm, a trader among the Wichita Indians built a post in 1865 at the mouth of the Little Arkansas River. From there he drove his wagons south to other trading stations in Indian territory. Sometimes he trailed cattle over the road, it was already marked and well known, so other drovers followed Chisholm's road too. It was sometimes called the Texas Cattle Trail, but soon became known only as the Chisholm Trail. Chisholm died in 1868, the first big year of the trail.

After Abilene began to boom, other villages in Kansas began to challenge Abilene. Joseph G. McCoy of Springfield, Ill. was the promoter who build up Abilene, adding stockyards, a hotel and office and invited Texas Cattlemen to his town.

McCoy organized a Wild West Show and brought Illinois cattle

buyers to Abilene for a Buffalo hunt. All went well until the Texas fever broke out among Illinois cattle and even in the farming area around Abilene.

The citizens of Abilene didn't like the dance halls, the "redlight" districts or the saloons that became centers of disorder and shoot-outs. So finally, in 1872 the Farmers Protective Association gave notice to the drovers to take their cattle elsewhere for shipment.

Some Texans went to Wichita to ship their cattle and some went to Ellsworth. In the boom year of 1872, Texans trailed more than three hundred and fifty thousand head of cattle north to the railroad in Kansas towns.

Until 1885, Dodge City on the Santa Fe Railway was the "Cowboy Capital" of the plains. In those years a quarter of a million head of cattle arrived each year, from Wyoming, the Dakotas and the Central Plains, as well as from Texas and New Mexico.

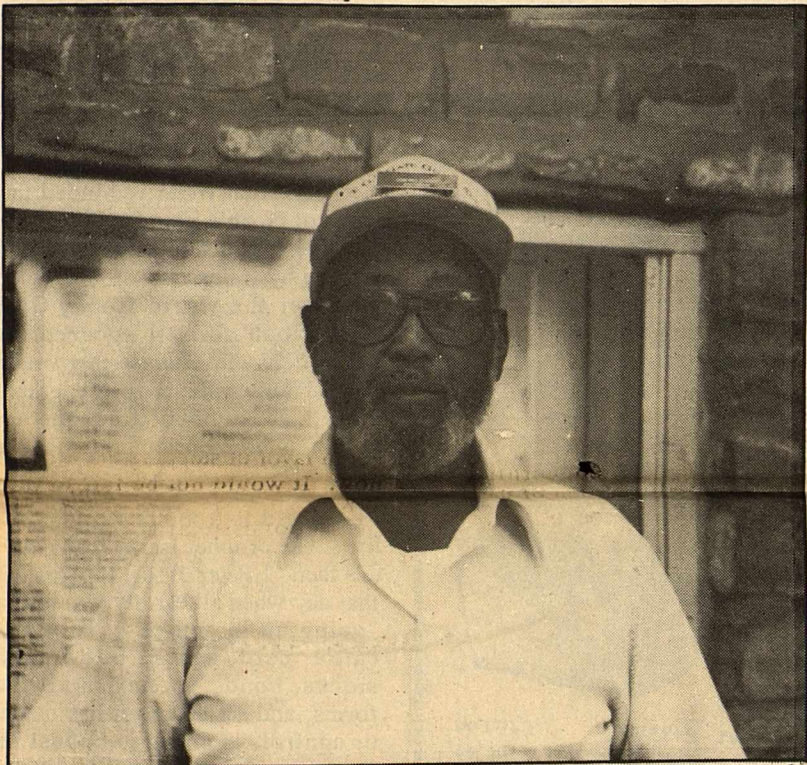
Diane Garza Bravo

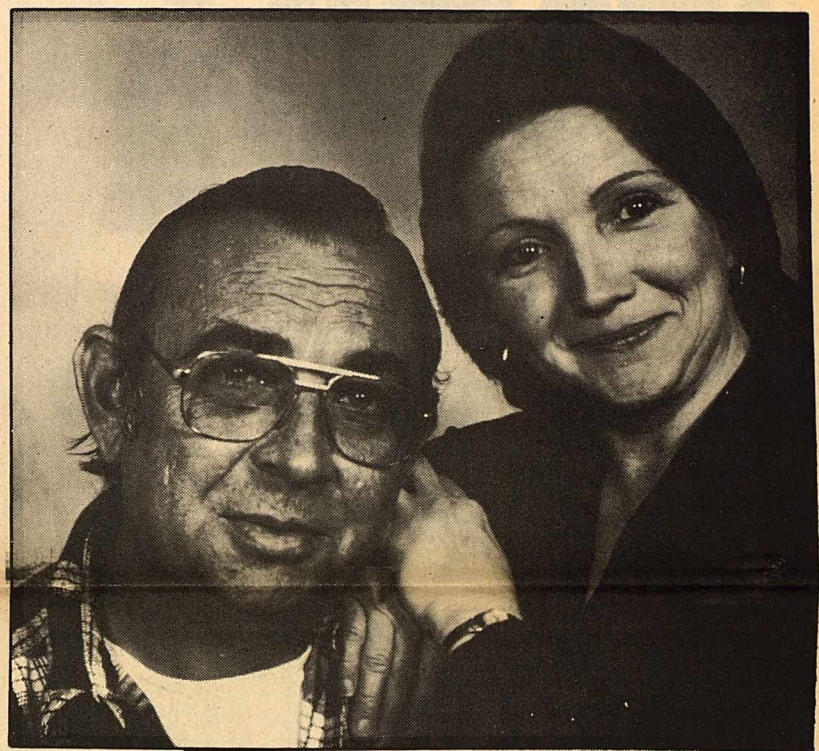
to donate the instrument to the new Center.
