Aging And Health Care Officer Wears More Than One Hat

(Editor's note: In a continuing series, this is the latest story written especially for *The Bailey County Journal* and *The Muleshoe Journal* by Nora Joyce, journalism student from Texas Tech University. This series is made possible by a grant from the Readers Digest Foundation.)

Being head of three different subdivisions of the Bailey County Aging and Health Care office, Glen Williams finds himself fairly well occupied when he goes to work in the Bailey County courthouse.

As community service advisor for the Texas Department of Aging, Williams works with senior citizens, answering any questions they may have concerning Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, insurance and wills.

"If I don't have the answer, which is unlikely, I will find someone who does. That's what

my job is all about," Williams says.

Established in 1978, Williams' office has helped literally hundreds of people with a wide variety of questions, the most common of which involve how to change one's address on government forms, how to file for Medicare/Medicaid, and what to do if a Medicare/Medicaid card is lost.

Williams also helps answer questions regarding estate settlements and wills, and he will help write letters to the proper people or agencies that need to be addressed along these lines.

Williams' duties also include running the Indigent Health Care program, which was established

Registration for the Spring sessions of the South Plains College Division of Continuing Education at the Muleshoe Community College Center will be Monday through Friday, January 3-11, from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. in the office of the Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, school administration building.

Spring classes will begin on Monday, January 16, 1989, with spring break March 20-24.

Books will be sold on the first night of class, and final exams will be given May 8-11.

Elizabeth Watson, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, said a minimum enrollment of fifteen persons is required for a course to be conducted.

Cost is given first for semester hours in-state, followed by out-of-state.

in Bailey County in 1986. The county commissioners' court, under Texas law, is responsible for the indigent people of his respective county if they have no coverage by Medicare, and application for this service is made through Williams' office.

A mandate passed two years ago with the establishment of this program says that to be eligible for the health care program one must be a resident of the county where they apply, and not possess more than \$1,500 equity in a car and home combined, and no more than \$1,000 worth of other resources. Basic health care will be provided to the person if they are eligible.

Williams also serves as Bailey County's Veterans' Service Officer. After World War II, the Texas legislature mandated that each County Commission should appoint a Veterans Service Officer to help veterans and their families with any questions concerning their legal rights and privileges as veterans. In this capacity, Williams helps with such things as widows' benefits, survivors' benefits, pensions, hospitalization information and

GED Testing

Next Weekend

At High School

The General Educational Development (GED) test will be given in Muleshoe on Friday, December 16, and Saturday, December 17, at Muleshoe High School.

Individuals interested in testing for a certificate of high school equivalency will need to be present at both testing sessions.

The following requirements apply to interested persons:

1. Minimum age is 18, but a 17 year old is eligible with parental or guardian consent.
2. Must be a resident of Texas.
3. Must be officially withdrawn from school and must not have received a high school diploma from an accredited high school in the United States.

Testing will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Friday and continue at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday.

Snow, Ice Temporarily Slow Down Area Traffic

If people were not in 'The Christmas Spirit' before Thursday, they couldn't have helped but think more about Christmas as snow fell all day on Thursday in the Muleshoe area.

With a fairly stiff wind, conditions were almost blizzard-like throughout the day, slowing traffic to a crawl through most of the day.

The area's first traffic accident occurred shortly before midnight Wednesday when a semi-truck

load of liquor was overturned approximately two and a half miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 84.

The 56-year old driver of the truck was brought by Bailey County EMS to West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe for emergency treatment before being transferred to Clovis.

Officers directing traffic at the accident, along with members of the Muleshoe Fire Department and EMS personnel, found road and weather conditions 'less than ideal' and caution was being urged radio-to-radio as additional emergency personnel were called out to assist at the accident site.

Traffic was re-routed for a couple of hours while the accident was investigated, and while waiting for a large wrecker from Clovis to make its way to the accident to set the truck upright and remove it from the completely blocked eastbound lanes of the highway.

Several accidents were reported in the City of Muleshoe beginning around mid-afternoon on Thursday. Although vehicles were banged up and many had to be removed by wreckers, no additional injuries were reported.

Schools in Muleshoe started an hour later than usual both Thursday and Friday, and the school buses traveled only on pavements picking up youngsters for school.

Friday morning, after a low of nine degrees, the sun came out and quickly started melting the four inches of snow that had fallen.

By late afternoon Friday, the roads and most sidewalks were mostly cleared, with only a few icy spots remaining by Saturday morning.

However, freezing rain and snow were predicted for the weekend. At presstime, cloudy skies were the rule, but the temperature at 8 a.m. was an almost balmy 32 degrees.

National Weather Service of Lubbock predicted a 70 percent chance of snow with accumulations of one to two more inches of snow for Saturday. Saturday night, the prediction carried a 40

This week, The Anchor Brothers received a letter from a radio

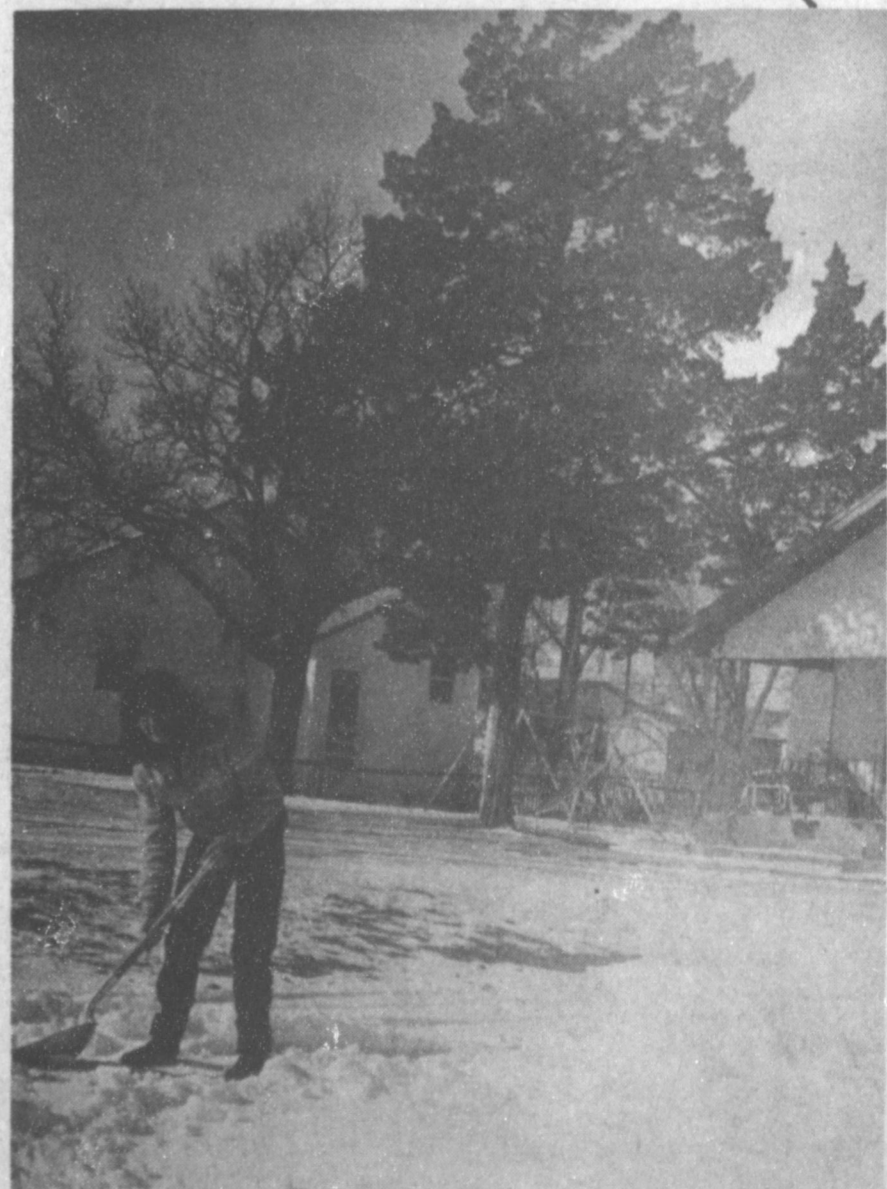
station in North Carolina, which said, "this is the best gospel record we have ever received."

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

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Parenting For Enjoyable Christmas

This time of year the magazines are filled with pictures of clean, beautifully dressed, calm, smiling children happily playing with their Christmas toys.

That may be one reason why Parents become frustrated or even angry when their children fuss, whine or misbehave during holiday celebrations.

"Young children will respond differently to Christmas activities depending on their age," said Dr. Sarah Anderson, a child development expert and mother of three.

"Parents can save themselves a lot of grief by knowing what is normal and predictable behavior from young children and planning their family activities accordingly," she said.

Anderson, who is a family life specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University, suggested parents consider the following:

- Babies under 12 months can easily feel overwhelmed by too many toys, relatives or food. Give the baby plenty of rest and time alone with you.
- Toddlers will be lovable and cute, but not too involved in Christmas. Some toddlers will be fearful of strangers, including visiting relatives. Child-proof your Christmas decorations, since toddlers will want to touch hot lights, pull on electrical cords and handle decorations that arouse their curiosity.
- Two-year-olds will be excited about the lights and decorations. They can't wait to open gifts or eat the cookies and they may throw tantrums to prove it. Two-year-olds are just as likely to play with the box as the toy inside and since they don't share well yet will often hit and grab toys.
- Three-year-olds will love gifts, both the box and the gift inside. They're more likely to have a sunny disposition on Christmas and be able to play with other children. So getting together with relatives may be easier. However, parents will still want to limit the extent of activities. Any three-year-old who has been too excited for too long is capable of fighting and acting out.
- Four-year-olds can remember well and anticipate activities. They love the holidays, including parties and events, especially if they're not too long. They can participate in decorating and other simple projects in advance of Christmas. In general they should get along with visiting relatives, and some sometimes be rude and uncooperative when tired or overextended.
- Five-year-olds will show improvement in behavior because they are beginning to set their own limits. This is an ideal year to read about Christmas to them. Since they like to help and do things alone, it's also a good year for projects. This may also be the first year for really liking Santa.

Is carving the turkey always a chore to avoid at your house during the holidays? It doesn't have to be this way. We have a chef with some expert advice who can show how it's done perfectly every time.

On Tuesday, December 13 at 9:30 p.m. and on Thursday, December 15 at 12 noon, the show will feature recipes for entertaining, dieting to lose weight, and attractive holiday decorations from a brown paper bag.

Dot Smith is the founder and president of Pepper Patch in Franklin, TN, and will share some of her favorite recipes for entertaining. Pepper Patch uses only the freshest homegrown ingredients and all the products are baked with homemade goodness.

As Americans become increasingly weight conscious, more and more fad diets appear on the market. The trick to dieting is to

lose weight--and keep it off--without giving up all those tempting foods. Dr. Martin Kathahn of Vanderbilt University will explain how this can be accomplished.

GINGERBREAD RECIPE

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened; 1/2 cup brown sugar; 1/2 cup molasses; 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour; 1 tsp. baking soda; 1 tsp. cinnamon; 1/2 cup water; 1 tsp. ginger; 1/4 tsp. salt; 1/4 tsp. cloves.

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly with electric mixer. Beat in molasses. Blend all dry ingredients. Alternately add blended dry ingredients and water to the butter-sugar mixture. Dough will become very stiff so the last dry addition may

need to be blended by hand. Work dough until smooth in consistency. If dough sticks to hands, dust them with flour. (Be careful and not use too much flour as it will make dough dry and hard.) When dough is easy to work, you're ready to roll it out and make house pieces. If you're not going to make your house right away, wrap dough in plastic and refrigerate. Refrigerated dough will keep for a week, but remove it 3 hours prior to rolling so it softens and is pliable.

Roll out dough on back of cookie sheet. (Lightly coat cookie sheet with vegetable oil or Pam to facilitate rolling out dough.) Dust pattern with flour. Lay on dough and with sharp knife, cut around pattern. Remove excess dough by lifting it away from pattern pieces. Bake at 375 degrees for 8-10 minutes. While pieces are still soft, place pattern pieces on top and trim edges to shape, if needed. Make at least 48 hours before assembling.

ROYAL ICING: MERINGUE RECIPE

(Used to assemble house, decorate and to attach decorations. It dries very hard.)

3 level Tbsp. Wilton Meringue Powder Mix; 6 Tbsp. water; 4 cups sifted powdered sugar.

Beat all ingredients at low speed for 7-10 minutes, (10-12 minutes on High speed for portable mixer) until icing forms peaks. Can be stored in an air-tight container and re-whipped before using. Yield: 3 cups.

To give royal icing decoration a shiny snow-like effect, add 1 tablespoon corn syrup to 1 cup royal icing.

health care. "Veterans and their families naturally have a lot of questions about these things. Twelve million men came back from World War II alone. That doesn't include veterans from the Korean and Vietnam Wars, whom we also help," Williams says. The Bailey County Aging and Health Care office offers Meals on Wheels and a van transportation service, both of which are very important to the elderly in the community.

Meals on Wheels offers those who qualify one hot, nutritious meal delivered at noon every day by volunteers. Currently, the program serves 25 people in the Muleshoe area, and an individual's income has no bearing on qualifying for the program. To be eligible, you need only be 60 years of age or older and unable to prepare adequate meals, or have someone do it for you. For married couples, if one person qualifies, that automatically qualifies their spouse for Meals on Wheels.

The Office of Aging also offers a van transportation service that takes people who are unable to drive themselves, to places they need to go. The service will only to to places that service a particular need of a passenger, such as a doctor's office, hospital, post office, barber, or grocery store. It will not take people for tours or shopping trips. The van goes to Lubbock, Amherst, Amarillo and occasionally Plainview, making close to 100 trips a month, and logging between 20,000-25,000 miles per year.

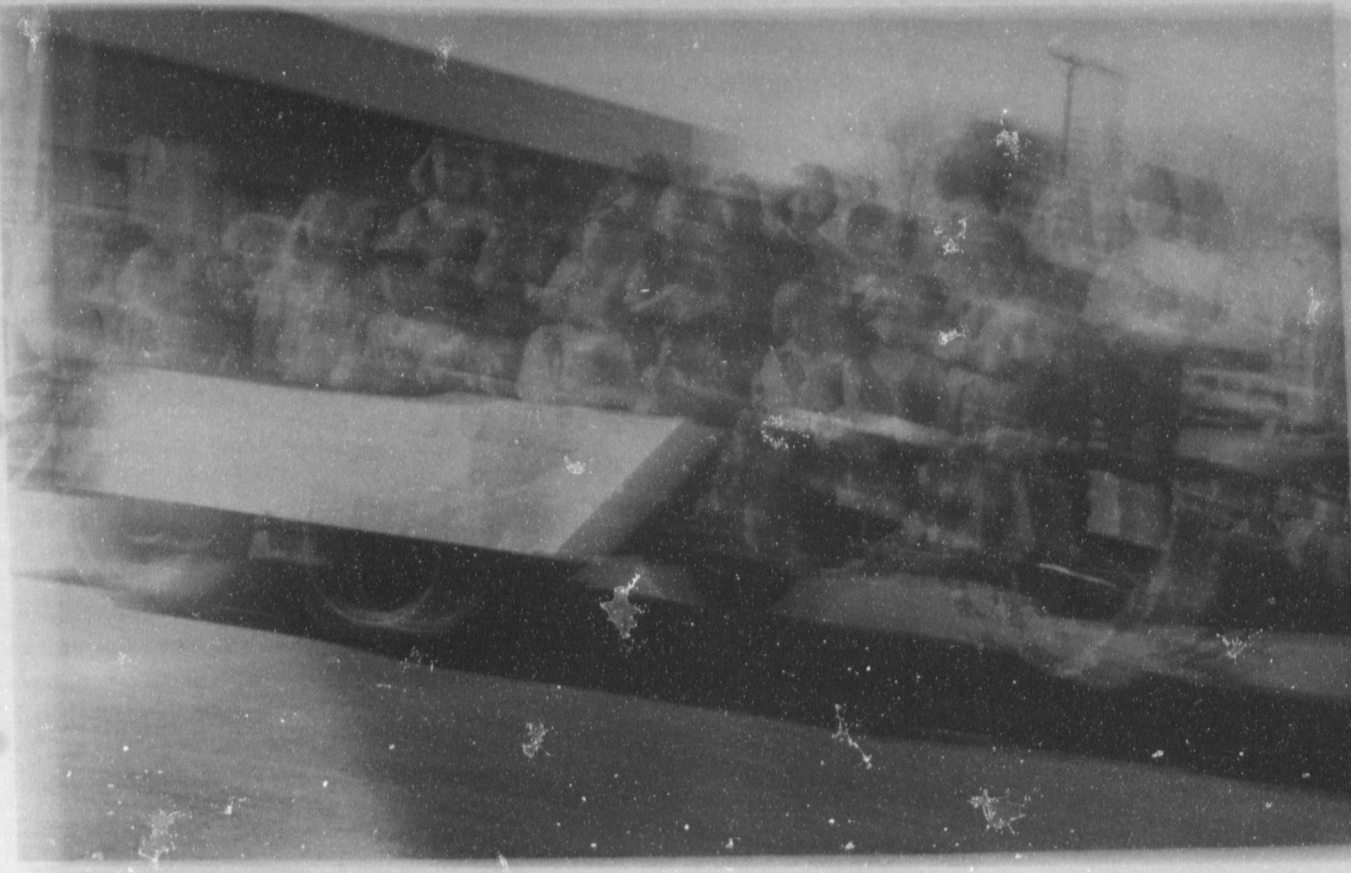
