MODERN HYPNOTISM
A Course of Instructions

BY J. C. TAYLOR.

Lesson IV.

THE SUCCESSFUL OPERATOR.

The successful operator does not indulge in frivolous conversation. He should appear generous and kind; should give everyone a pleasant greeting, but should allow no intimacy to be established between himself and those whom he wishes to hypnotize. He should be prepared to defend his position at all times and should exercise great care that every move and every expression indicate self-confidence.

The successful operator takes thought of his personal appearance. Soiled clothing, long finger nails, and breath foul with the scent of tobacco or whiskey may be very annoying to a subject. Above all things, a successful operator is one who has faith in his ability and has the energy to TRY.

SELECIING A SUBJECT.

It is important that you exercise much caution and judgment in selecting your first subjects. One with whom you have been constantly associated is naturally reminded that he has never observed any extraordinary powers within you, and though he may express perfect willingness, and may feign absolute confidence in your ability to hypnotize, yet he is almost sure to entertain a stubborn doubt, to remove which, your skill may prove insufficient. It is best to select a stranger for your first experiment. When you have selected a subject leave nothing unsaid nor undone that would tend to impress him with your hypnotic powers. In discussing your ability to hypnotize, do so in a convincing and not in a boastful way.

Do not, under any circumstances, allow your prospective subjects to be made skeptical. This is very often done unconsciously. Thinking he is aiding you in securing a subject, a friend often remarks: "Sit down and let him try you, he can't hypnotize you." Permit none of this, but let every suggestion of yourself and audience indicate perfect faith in your ability. In order to do this you will have to select your audience at first. Later you will be able to counteract these influences by a bold and confident manner. Until you become a practical hypnotist, you should not experiment on defiant persons, those who say, "I don't believe you can hypnotize me. Let you may try if you wish." You should become more skilled in the art of forcible suggestion before measuring forces with them. They form a stubborn class, so wrapped in their own theories that it is difficult for a beginner to lead them to concentrate their minds on the desired end. Select for your subjects those who are intelligent, healthy, jovial and sympathetic. After a few experiments you can easily discriminate between the susceptible and the insusceptible.

TWO METHODS.

In hypnotizing, an open or a secret method may be employed. The secret method has probably never been taught except by personal instructions. It can be successfully taught by mail, however, and though I have decided to exclude it from the paper, this lesson will be published in due time, and, with the remainder of the course, will be obtainable at this office.

In the next lesson I will give the practical side of the open method. In the meantime you may review the first three lessons, and prepare to experiment—not mockingly, but seriously.
