NOTICE TO OVERSEERS OF ROADS.

As there has been several complaints to me about the different Overseers not keeping their roads in repair, I hereby call the attention of the overseers to the law which will be enforced from now on against an overseer that fails to do his duty.

"If any overseer of a public road in this State shall willfully fail, neglect, or refuse to perform any duty imposed on him by law: or shall so fail, neglect or refuse to keep the road, bridges, and causeways in his precinct or cistrict, clear of obstructions and in good order: or shall wilfully suffer such roads, bridges, or causeways to remain uncleared or out of repair for 20 days at any one time, he shall be fined ot less than \$10.00 ner more than \$25.00."

The overseers of the County will please take notice of the above law and comply with same for in case you should default in same it will become my painful duty to file complaints against such overseers as fail to do their duty. Feople are continually
