### Muleshoe youth battling leukemia

Sara Hernandez excitedly showed off some of the video tapes she got for Christmas. But quickly lost interest like most six-year-olds do when her mother and older sister starting talking about what the family has been through in the last five months.

Diagnosed with leukemia in August, it's uncertain how many more times Sara will celebrate Christmas.

So the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Amarillo treated her and her family to a day-long shopping spree in the city last week.

The Make-A-Wish Foundation grants wishes to children with a terminal or life-threatening illnesses that are not expected to reach their 18th birthday.

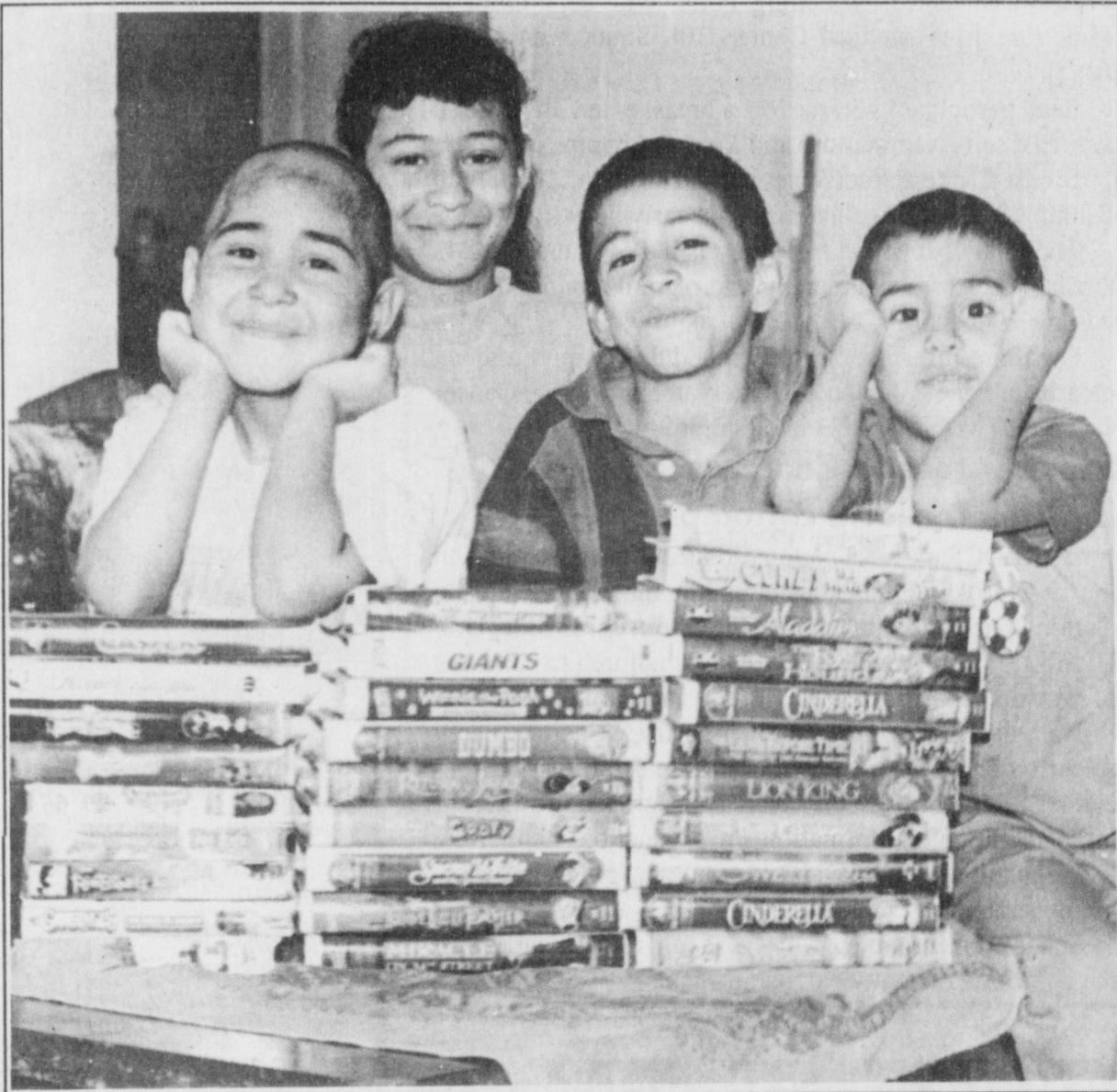
Sara apparently is a big movie buff.

She picked out 30 movies, a new VCR and television, plus a pink bike, complete with matching elbow pads and helmet.

She also found a fully decorated Christmas tree when she returned home that night.

Sara said the trip was "good" as she named off a partial list of her new tapes.

well than going shopping and getting stuff," said Lucia Hernandez, Sara's mom, as she sat in the family's small apartment in the East Sixth Street housing project.

Monica Hernandez, 12,

acted as the family spokesperson because her parents speak only Spanish. Monica was the one who gave her little sister bone marrow during a transplant in August.

"We pay a lot more atten-

tion to her now and are closer to her now than we used to be," Monica said.

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## Lady Mules rebound, reach finals at Sudan

SUDAN — It was like old home week for Muleshoe. Plenty of familiar faces.

Friday, the Lady Mules beat Springlake-Earth for the third time this season, 38-27, in the semifinals of the Sudan Boosters Club Tournament.

Saturday, they played Sudan for the title. Sudan beat Muleshoe, 61-45, three weeks ago.

"We needed to get back on track and need to play Sudan again," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said, somewhat disappointed the Lady Mules played Springlake-Earth a third time (all wins). "We have to learn how to handle Sudan's pressure better because that's what we're going to see in district play."

MHS (13-4) opens District 2-3A play at Shallowater Jan. 5.

Muleshoe lost its last two games before Christmas break, but has rebounded with two solid wins.

Friday, Mandy Cleavinger scored 17 points on 8 of 11 shooting from the field and Muleshoe played its best half of basketball since the Canyon Tournament in early December, according to Gruhlkey.

MHS built a 22-9 halftime lead with the help of a pair of 3-pointers from Carolyn Schuster.

Springlake-Earth did creep within 24-18 after three quarters, but Muleshoe pulled away in the fourth quarter.

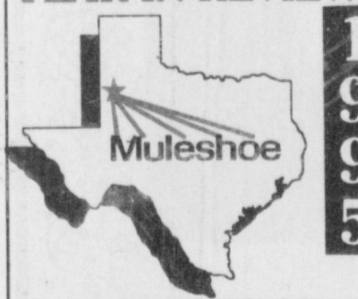
Brandi Harrison had four points and seven assists for MHS.

### Friena tornado; Mules win 2-3A title top summer stories

The following were the top five stories of the second third of 1995:

- Former Muleshoe police officer Chris Lopez was fired April 13 by then Police Chief Julian Dominguez soon after stopping City Manager Dave Marr, Jr. for a traffic violation. The Mules won the bi-dis-

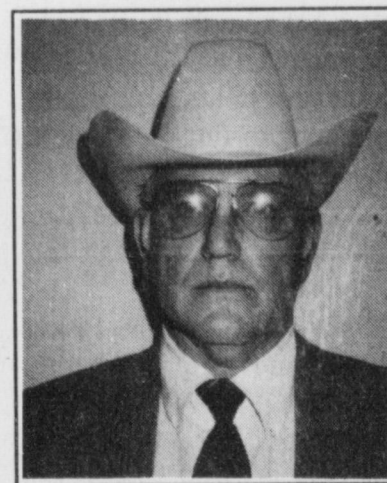
trict baseball title in Amarillo May 15, defeating Perryton 11-6 at the Caprock High School field.

**Filing deadline for 1996 candidacy slated Jan. 2, with several offices up for election**

With several people having turned in applications, the filing deadline for candidates is Jan. 2. Offices up for election to be filed with party chairmen are sheriff, tax assessor-collector, county attorney, county commissioners precincts one and three, and constables.

The first day to receive applications for ballots to be voted by mail is Jan. 12, with Jan. 27 the first day to mail early voting ballots to voters who have requested them.

Early voting in person begins Feb. 21 and ends Mar. 8. Primary Election Day is March 12.

**District Clerk processing passport applications in Bailey Courthouse**

District Clerk Nelda Merriott will process passport applications at the Bailey County Courthouse, 300 S. First St. in Muleshoe.

Many ten-year passports are about to expire and need to be renewed. Merriott said demand is usually lower between the months of October and February.

You will need a completed DSP-11 application form, proof of citizenship, proof of identity, and two identical 2 by 2 photographs. The fee for a 10-year passport is \$55, but those under age 18 pay \$30 for a five-year passport.

First time applicants and those required to use form DSP-11 also pay a \$10 execution fee.

A quick glance around the apartment reveals the Hernandez family doesn't have much.

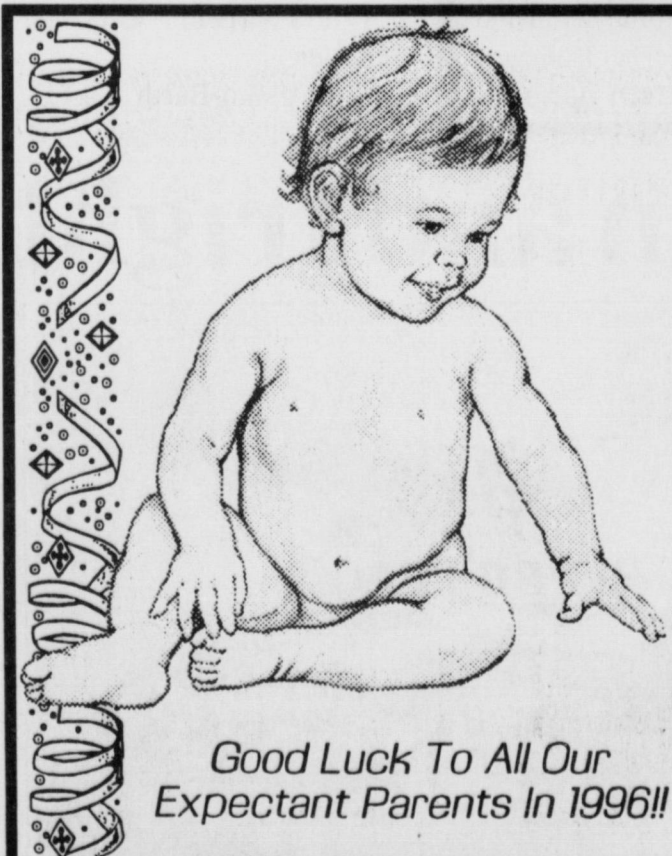

## Thumbs Up

I confess to not owning a tractor. I have plenty of friends nearby with tractors. But in a lapse of good judgement I borrowed one to brush hog a patch of weeds. Experienced farmers, even an 8-year-old farm kid knows that you always drive a tractor *thumbs up*. I didn't remember.

As I was farming around I managed to hit a post with the front wheel. The steering wheel spun like a helicopter blade and jammed my protruding thumb! I swelled up so big it wouldn't fit through the neck of a quart jar.

I only mention this humiliating self-inflicted injury because Dr. Willis sent me a scientific report regarding wound response in plants. It said, in effect, that localized injury in one part of a plant causes a protective response in another part of that plant. For instance, when a caterpillar gnaws on a near leaf, a change occurs in a far leaf that inhibits that type of caterpillar's digestive enzymes.

It is therefore a natural assumption that if plants are able to protect themselves, that the human body, particularly my human body would work to prevent further similar injuries to itself.

But when you listen to rodeo cowboys recount the list of their broken bones it is obvious that some human bodies forgot to read the scientific report. However, it is possible that no protecting mechanism could



safeguard people who leap off galloping horses onto stampeding steers or tie themselves to twelve hundred pounds of horns and hair and them scream, "turn 'im out!"

I admit, there is some sort of warning that goes off in your brain the second time you realize you have not completely latched the head gate. Or you're fixin' to stab yourself with the pistol grip syringe again, or you've just set yer hair on fire with the branding iron like you did last year.

So you would think that through experience, if nothing else, the body would learn to be more careful.

I confess to not owning a roping arena. I have plenty of friends nearby with roping arenas. Four days after I had stove my thumb on the tractor, I was roping at a friend's. Even a novice trail rider with a law degree knows when you dally you always keep yer thumbs up. I didn't remember.

I managed to double hock a speedy little steer, set my horse, go to the horn and catch that same thumb under a coil. It peeled a square foot of skin off the outside and mashed the tip till it looked like the paddle of a butter churn. It turned black. Now when I put my hand in my pocket it looks like I'm packin' a roll of silver dollars.

But all is not lost. It has occurred to me that since the injuries were both crop and livestock related, something good could still come from my misfortunes. So I have submitted my swollen digit for consideration as Poster Thumb for the "Diversified Farming Movement."

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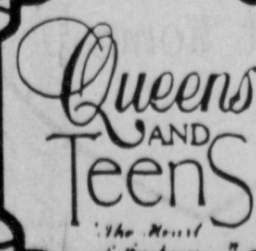
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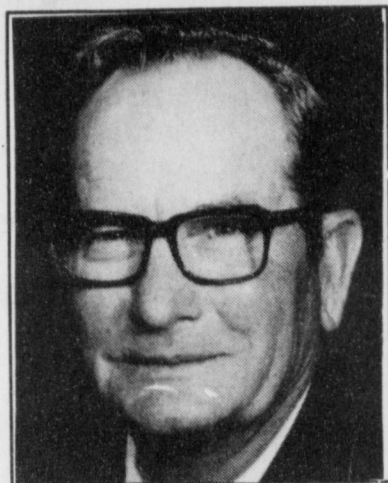

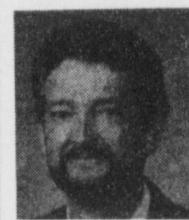

But not all independence is of the healthy variety.

I'm thinking particularly of a being once known as Lucifer, the "light-bearer," whose fierce independence cost him Heaven and earned him the title "Prince of Darkness." John Milton, in *Paradise Lost*, sums up the fallen one's philosophy: "Better to reign in hell than to serve in heaven." Some might call him a rugged individualist. "I am my own," sums up Satan's attitude, C. S. Lewis writes and calls it the guiding principle of Hell. How frighteningly easily it becomes the guiding principle of our lives!

prosper. I still believe it's a dream worth dreaming, that free men and women in this great land are limited mainly only by how willing they are to dream it.

Rugged individualism. In Texas, we have a large dose of it. In a state that was, not so long ago, a wild frontier where a man's nearest neighbors, not counting jackrabbits and rattlesnakes, were a hundred miles away, our people learned early on to be pretty independent.

Often, that's good. Independence joined with maturity is healthy. Our society needs more of it, not less. We very properly begin trying to instill it in our children from the time the umbilical cord is cut right up until the day comes for them to launch out on their own.

The one claim the Christian can never make is, "I am my own." He knows he is not. The Christian is Christ's, "bought with a price," the very blood of God's Son. And the more mature the Christian becomes in the Lord, the more he or she recognizes his or her utter dependence on Christ.

We are called, after all, to be Christians, not "Marlboro men" who claim to need "nuthin' and nobody." We need each other. We need the other, and our real freedom comes when we cast aside the false pride which is our chain and confess our total dependence on Him and His love.

That's worth remembering as we launch into 1996!
