Fishes in un Aquarium. In a store where birds, fishes and anfmals are sold I watched an attendant putting together the material for a small aquarium. "Is it not great trouble to keep the fishes alive?" I asked. "You must change the water daily, must you not!" "Not more than once a year, was his reply. "That was the old fashioned aquarium before the scientists had discovered for us the oxygen producing plants. You see that bit of plant under the rocks there? Well, that is oxygen producing. We put it in with the fishes, where it serves at once as an ornament and a life giver and preserver. This aquarium that I am now finishing will not require a change of water for at least eighteen months. Then by changing the water it will go another year or year and a half,"-New York Tribune.

To Drive Away Musquitoes To expel musquitoes; take of gum camphor a piece about one-third the size of a hen's egg, and evaporate it by placing it in a tin vessel and holding it over a lamp, taking care that it does not ignite. The smoke will soon fill the room and expel the musquitoes, and not one will be found in the room next morning, even though the windows should be left open at night.


