A QUICK READ OF THE NEWS

Muleshoe Police still active

The Muleshoe Police Department handed out 146 citations and made 28 arrests during the month of September. More than half the citations were for operating a motor vehicle without either insurance, registration or a driver's license. The MPD also issued 17 speeding tickets and 12 tickets for running a red light or stop sign. More than half the arrests were alcohol or drug-related.

Eight people were arrested for public intoxication and two others for driving while intoxicated. Muleshoe Police also made five drug arrests. Last month's numbers were 218 citations and 20 arrests.

One big hangover in 1931

One of Harvey Sterling's first duties after being sworn in as Bailey County Sheriff in January of 1931 was to break up a bootlegging operation in the eastern part of the county.

When Sterling, deputy Jim Cook and constable Shorty Bartley raided the operation, one of the bootleggers jumped in a car and took off — with the Bailey County lawmen in pursuit.

Pulling alongside, Sterling tried to jump from the running board of his vehicle onto the fleeing car in Hollywood "B" movie like fashion. But Sterling fell off the car, and to add injury to insult, was plunked off the head by a container of hooch the boot-legger threw out of the car. Sheriff Sterling caught his man, and except for a lump on his head and a bruise to his pride, escaped serious injury.

The campaign is being kicked off in Muleshoe with the help of Muleshoe and Bailey County merchants, businesses and individuals. These promoters of 4-H are sponsoring an annual show of support for the program in a signature page in Thursday's *Muleshoe Journal*.

The local tribute ties in with other 4-H clubs from across the country who are doing a variety of

community service activities.

The campaign goal is to motivate youth to become involved in helping their communities through volunteer and community service projects.

The campaign's premise is that youth are an untapped resource for community service and that youth and their volunteer efforts can be of benefit to themselves and their communities.

In Muleshoe, the Bailey County

4-H clubs combine their efforts for a variety of community service projects, throughout the year. Annual events include food drives, a Christmas toy collection for needy children, and community clean-up and improvements and volunteering at the local nursing home throughout the year.

The Bailey County 4-H members and leaders will also be providing the refreshments for the local blood drive on Oct. 23 at First Methodist Church, Muleshoe.

4-H "Are You Into It?" targets youth ages 10-13. Campaign focus groups found that youth viewed volunteering as "cool" and considered environmental projects and food/clothing drives to be the most familiar forms of community service. The focus groups also cited peer involvement and the opportunity to participate in fun activities as reasons to volunteer in their communities.

'Horns stomp Chargers

LAZBUDDIE — Only the 45-point rule stopped Lazbuddie.

Clinging to a five-point lead early in the second quarter, Lazbuddie exploded for 42 points over the next 12 minutes and routed El Paso Jesus Chapel 76-29 Friday in a non-district game at Longhorn Stadium.

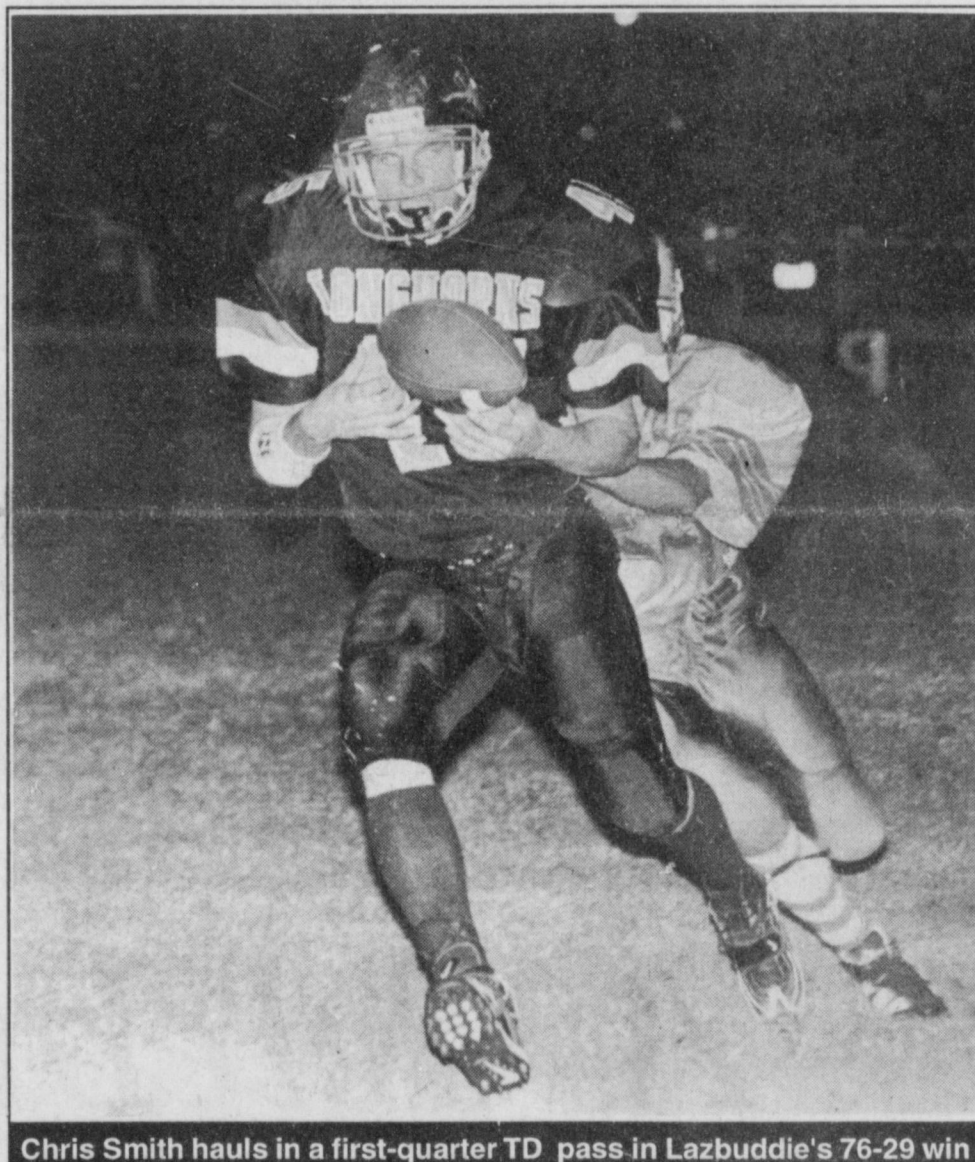
The game ended two minutes into the second half on Adam St. Clair's 78-run touchdown run.

No. 8 Lazbuddie (4-1) racked up 542 yards in a little more a half.

Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson was expecting a shootout after the teams combined for 327 yards and seven touchdowns in the first quarter.

But two interceptions by Longhorn junior Dustin Weir turned the tide in the second quarter.

"I was so nervous before the game I had butterflies because (Jesus Chapel) had been scoring so many points," Scisson said. "Even after we got the big lead, I told the kids not to get complacent because things can change so quickly in six-man football."

The Chargers (4-1) had been averaging 57 points a game.

Josh Morris threw for 300 yards and six touchdowns in Lazbuddie's 62-point first half.

Chris Smith was the junior quarterback's favorite target, hauling in nine passes for 187 yards and four

touchdowns. Smith also capped Lazbuddie's 34-point second quarter with a 33-yard interception return.

"That is by far the best game he's played in the four years he's been here,"

Council explores property options

Former City Manager Dave Marr viewed the land purchase as a gold mine. Many citizens think the City of Muleshoe got the shaft.

A discussion of the 5,000 acre tract of city-owned land known as the "East Well Field" will highlight a special meeting of the Muleshoe City Council at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in the council chambers.

"We need to determine exactly what we have," current Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher said. "We need to find out what are our options."

The City purchased the land for slightly more than \$1 million in 1994 from Barrett & Crofoot. The City borrowed \$800,000 to pay for the land.

The pasture land that straddles the Bailey County-Lamb County line was primarily intended for economic development and future water rights.

A recent study by the City's engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper of Lubbock showed there is enough water under the land to supply the city for 20 to 40 years.

Several questions remain, Fisher said. How much of the water is retrievable and at what cost? And is it all suitable drinking water?

The City has already has an ample long-term water supply south of town that will last well into the next century, according to Fisher.

"So the question is should we get rid of the land and take help take care of our pressing needs?" Fisher said.

Fisher said options include selling both the land and water rights, selling the land and keeping the water rights, or leasing the land.

The Council will also consider selling other city property during the meeting.

The City currently owns 57 building lots plus 33 additional acres it is not using.

Muleshoe upsets Dalhart on road

DALHART — Matt McClanahan threw two touchdown passes and Muleshoe snapped a three-game losing streak by beating Dalhart 15-6 Friday in a District 1-3A game.

Junior fullback Greg Pena rushed for 111 yards on 21 carries, helping the Mules (2-3 overall, 1-1 in district) offset four turnovers and 13 penalties. The Mules finished with 310 yards, including 221 rushing.

Muleshoe forced six Dalhart turnovers and limited the Golden Wolves' to 93 yards passing.

Dalhart (1-4, 0-2) didn't score until late in the fourth

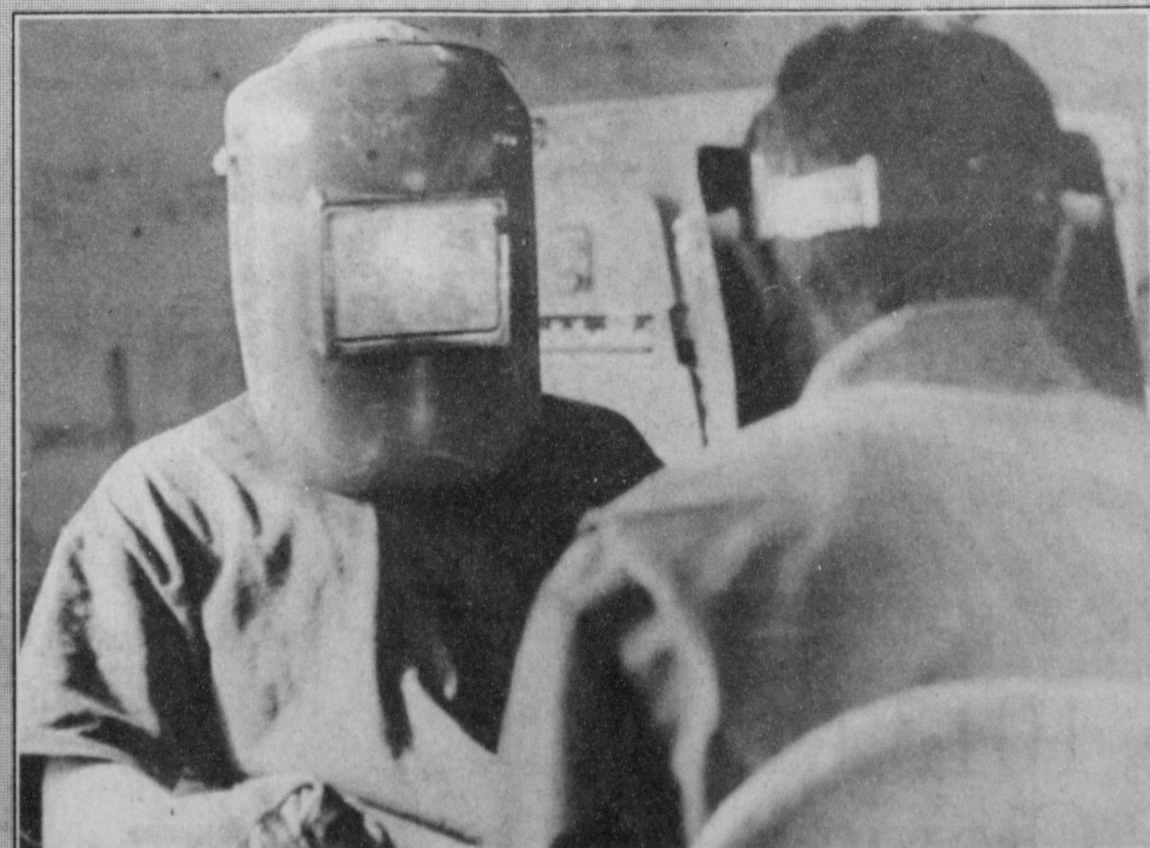

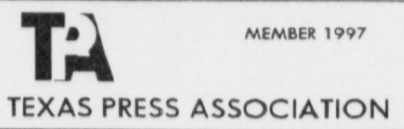

Combest opposes pay raise

WASHINGTON D.C. — U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) once again declared he will continue to oppose efforts to raise the salaries of the members of Congress.

"When I asked the people of the 19th Congressional District to hire me for the job as their representative, I knew what the job paid. They accepted me for the job and I accepted the terms of that employment," said Combest.

However despite objections by Combest, Congress could see their first pay increase in five years.

This year the annual budget of the U.S. Treasury Department and the U.S. Postal Service passed through Congress

without the customary measure to reject an automatic cost of living increase for Senators and Representatives.

Combest voted against the

funding bill feeling Congress had ample opportunity during final negotiations to include an amendment rejecting the automatic salary increase.

Texas legislators increasing pensions

AUSTIN— Texas legislators, who haven't received a pay raise from voters since 1975, have quietly been increasing retirement benefits with little public notice.

Legislators, who can not raise their base salary of \$7,200 without voter approval, have been steadily increasing their pension benefits, twice this year already.

By increasing pensions, lawmakers have the power to reward themselves at the end of their career instead of while they are serving when compensation is determined by the voters.

After serving 12 years, legislatures qualify for an annual pension of \$26,488 according to the Employees Retirement System.

After 21 years, a lawmaker qualifies for \$46,352 a year in retirement pay, and after 30 years of service the pension jumps to \$66,217 annually.

Alert engineer avoids accident

An alert Santa Fe railroad engineer avoided a serious accident Thursday after a grain truck got stuck on the tracks.

The engineer told Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks that he stopped the train when he saw reflector lights of the trailer up ahead.

"It could have been a real bad situation," Hicks said.

The grain truck became stuck shortly after 7 a.m. when the wheels of the trailer fell into a bar ditch as the driver was trying to make a sharp turn onto County Road 163 near Wilson Drilling Co, leaving the tractor part of the rig on the tracks.

The westbound Santa Fe train stopped about 100 yards short of the truck.

Witnesses saw the driver jump out and run from the truck as the train approached, Hicks said.

It took about an hour to clear the tracks. The driver of the truck was not cited.

This week I share with you the good words of Edward Fudge, from Houston, as he points us toward the God of creation.

I can scarcely imagine a cathedral more magnificent, or one more conducive to fellowship with the Maker of heaven and earth. Fiery-red sumacs form a natural vestibule into this holy place. Their branches, thick and low-

Surrounding the back fields on three sides are these marvelous woods. Here I have come for solitude, and for communion with the Creator.

"Will I ever be able to live amid such beauty?" I ask the Father. My soul aches to do so. I was reared in such a place, as were my ancestors for the 275 years I have been able to trace. The New Earth will surely include forests—even the Great City is built around the Tree of Life. Is this too much to ask?

I wait in silence for an answer. It seems to come in the sentence which next flashes to mind. "You do—today." Those three simple words trigger more reflection.

"What a gift!" I exclaim. "God has given me 'today,' and I am able to praise him here in these woods!"

Too soon, it is time to return to the house. The sun shines through the variegated leaves as I exit this cathedral not built by man. Surely this is the reality stained-glass windows attempt to reproduce.

My heart is at peace. God has given me "today." My task and pleasure is to use it to his glory. A lifetime, however long or short, consists only of "today," and another "today," and as many "today's" as God sees fit to apportion. It is all we have. It is enough.
