Cotton Loan Program Sees First Change As USDA **Begins Implementing** '08 Farm Bill

over the next few weeks to fix a Congressional clerical error, the White House has, according to press accounts, mostly dropped their combative stance and accepted that all of the farm bill titles that were subject to the veto override by Congress are now law.

Having come to that understanding, it is hoped that USDA will now focus their complete effort toward implementing the new law and writing or rewriting regulations covering existing programs

and new programs.

At the top of the list of "Todo's" is getting 2008 farm pro-At the top of the list of "Todo's" is getting 2008 farm program provisions implemented as quickly as possible. This, shouldn't bee too hard, since the 2008 Farm Bill directs the 2008 Farm Bill directs the 2008 Farm Bill directs the provisions will begin publication of the USDA to utilize the provisions and existing rules set up for the 2007 Direct and Countercyclical Program (DCP) for the 2008 crop year.

port during the 2008 crop year. Despite the last minute Getting a jump on the process drama that will slowly play out is the USDA Farm Service Agency and the Commodity Credit Corporation, which has already posted the first of many changes that will be made to existing programs.

This initial change is cotton related and involves an immediate change in how USDA calculates the Upland Cotton Adjusted World Price that is used to establish Loan Deficiency Payment rates and other mar-

keting loan program supports.

A New Debate: Sunlight, Vitamin D, and Breast Cancer

ing in the medical community that has made the front page of newspapers and the evening news - using sunscreen increases a woman's chances of breast cancer, while this may be sensational, it may be mis-

A new study suggests that breast cancer patients with low levels of vitamin D are much more likely to die of the disease or have it spread than patients who are getting enough of the nutrient, adding to evi-dence that the "sunshine vitamin" has anti-cancer benefits.


You see, your skin can make vitamin D from ultraviolet (UV) light, but this same light can also cause melanoma and other types of skin cancer. The Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Cancer Council want to remind you to wear products sold in stores with SPF built into them, such as lip balm, make-up and lotions. a broad-spectrum sunscreen of 15 or more on areas exposed to the sun to prevent skin cancer. It is also important to continue to reapply the sunscreen throughout the day.

It only takes about 15 min-utes a day, 3 times a week of being in the sun to make enough vitamin D. Having your body make vitamin D is only one way to get the recommended amount of the vitamin, which is crucial for healthy bones and preventing certain cancers and autoimmune diseases. The National Academies of Sciences currently recommend 200 international units (IU) of vitamin D for children and adults up to the age of 50, and 400 to 600 IU for adults older than 50 years of age.

Some foods contain vitamin D, including fatty fish such as salmon, fortified milk, cheese, fortified breakfast cereals and yogurt. Sunlight is only one source of vitamin D. Just a

There is a new debate loom- small amount of sunlight - not a suntan - is needed to meet the body's daily recommended requirement for vitamin D. Sunscreens do no not contribute to vitamin D deficiency because regular sunscreen use does not eliminate sun expo-

> At this time, it is too early to suggest that vitamin D deficiency increases cancer risk. The Texas AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Cancer Council encourage you to talk to your doctor if you are concerned about your vitamin D levels. He or she may recommend taking a daily supplement of vitamin D.

Calling Varmits With Burnham **Brothers**

Burnham Brothers, the people who made wildlife calls for hunters. The company was in Marble Falls then. Gary Roberson bought Burnham Brothers in 1991 and moved it to Menard. Gary was a banker in Menard and was looking for a career change when Burnham Brothers went on the market. His love of hunting and all things connected with it makes him the perfect person to have the company. He decided not to change the name of the business, since it is the leader in the animal calling industry.

Gary demonstrated some of his calls for me. He got out his little electronic box with a speaker on top of it and played the sound of a bird that sounded like a rabbit in dis-

"That particular sound is a yellow-hammer woodpecker," says Gary. "That's one of the universal calling sounds that has been very successful for us. I've called coyote, fox and bobcat with that sound." Burnham Brothers has hand calls and mouth calls, but since Gary bought the business, he has concentrated on electronic

"We build calls primarily for calling predators like fox, coyote and bobcat. We use actual animal recordings of distress sounds they might make. In other words, we're ringing the dinner bell for that coyote. When he hears that sound he knows that animal is in distress and might be an easy meal. Hopefully, he'll come running.

Years ago I did a report on urnham Brothers, the people recordings to lure animals in for photography purposes. It's an effective way to bring that animal to you.

Hunters are able to control the call with a remote. They can be several hundred yards from a Far East-based AWP in sevthe spot where the call is lo-

'You can turn it on, lower the volume, turn it off when you want. That call comes in a camouflaged bag that you can carry into the woods, set it out and walk away. You don't have to worry about hiding it because it's already hidden.

ing, using digital equipment. Sometimes when he's recording in the field he takes his Border collie with him.

"We'll go out on a foggy night and if you shine your light on a cottontail rabbit, it'll temporarily blind him and the Border collie will catch it. She doesn't hurt it. She has a pretty soft mouth. But once that rabbit goes to screaming, I record it. But for every ten she catches, one, maybe two, will give you the distress sound.

The raw recordings have a lot of extraneous sounds, but those are cleaned up on the computer. Gary has been called the country's most popular game caller and has assembled the largest collection of recorded animal calls. They are sold to hunters all over the world. Coyotes are Gary's favorite game to hunt. He's been hunting all his life. He shot his first whitetail deer when he was




