



Choosing the Correct Backpack for Your Child

It's that time of year again—back-to-school time! Many parents and children prepare for that first day of school by doing some back-to-school shopping, which often involves buying new clothing, pens, pencils, paper, mårkers, etc. However, backpacks are one of the biggest necessities for both college-aged and younger students, and it's important to choose wisely.

There are so many back-

packs to choose from, and choosing the right one for your child is not always easy. Back-packs come in all sizes, colors, fabrics, and shapes—all of which help kids express their own sense of style. As practical as backpacks are for those who use them, backpacks can cause strained muscles and joints and back pain when worn incorrectly.



The human spine is made up of 33 bones called vertebrae, and between the vertebrae are discs that act as shock absorbers. When something heavy—such as a backpack filled with books—is incorrectly placed on your child's shoulders, the force of that extra weight can pull your child backwards. To compensate, your child may bend forward at the hips or arch his or her back, which can cause your child's spine to compress unnaturally. Because of the heavy weight he or she is carrying, your child might begin to develop shoulder, neck, and back pain. What can we do about this? The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that before you purchase a backpack, look for the following five criteria:

· Choose a lightweight

backpack that doesn't add a lot of weight to your child's load. For example, although leather backpacks look cool, they weigh more than traditional canvas backpacks.

 Choose a backpack with two wide, padded shoulder straps. Straps that are too narrow can dig into shoulders.

· Choose a backpack that has a padded back, which provides increased comfort and protects the wearer from being poked by sharp edges (such as pencils, rulers, notebooks, etc.) inside the backpack.

• Choose a backpack that has a waist belt, which helps

5. Caref distribute the weight more evenly across the body.

Choose a backpack that has multiple compartments, which also helps distribute weight more evenly.

Although most backpacks come with two shoulder straps, this doesn't mean that your kids will use both straps! Many kids wear their backpacks over just one shoulder, which is the wrong thing to do. This makes the person lean to one side to offset the extra weight, and they might develop lower and upper back pain and strain their shoulders and neck.

Wearing the backpack incorrectly can also lead to poor posture. So, make sure your children wear the backpack using both straps. It's also a good idea to tighten the straps enough for the backpack to fit close to the body, and it should sit 2 inches above the waist.

Girls and younger children may be especially at risk for backpack-related injuries because they're smaller and may carry loads that are heavier in proportion to their body weight. Doctors recommend that people—especially children—carry backpacks that are no more than 10-15 percent of their body weight. For example, if a child weighs 80 pounds, 15 percent of his or her body weight is 12 pounds. So, for an 80 pound child, the backpack and its contents should not weigh more than 12 ounds—but remember, lighter is always better.

Lifting and Positioning Backpacks

Children also need to know how to lift and position their backpack. Improper lifting can cause damage. Teach your children these four simple steps to safely lift their backpacks:

1. Face the backpack before you lift it.

Bend at the knees.

3. Using both hands, check the weight of

the backpack.

4. Lift with your legs, not

5. Carefully put one shoulder strap on at a time; never sling the backpack onto one shoulder.

Another Option

Another option to consider when purchasing backpacks is to look for a backpack on wheels. However, these types of backpacks may be less practical than traditional backpacks because they're difficult to pull up stairs. If you're thinking about purchasing a rolling backpack for your child, contact the child's school first to be sure that they are allowed. Many schools don't allow rolling backpacks because they pose a tripping hazard in the hallways



Cotton Market Comments

World Production, Use and Stocks Estimated Lower for the Next Year

World cotton forecasts for this season show lower supplies, use, and ending stocks than last season. World ending stocks have decreased to only 41% of use. This is down from 49% last year. Foreign stocks, Chinese stocks, export nations, and U.S. stocks have decreased substantially from a year ago. The "A" Index has gradu-

ally increased for the last 12 months to almost 80 cents and is expected to average about 10 cents more than the 74 cents for the last season.

The U.S. crop was lowered slightly, exports were increased for this crop, and ending stocks were decreased, compared to the July report. At the beginning of the season, crop size and exports are subject to considerable adjustments as the crop season ma-

The Texas upland cotton crop was placed at 5.2 million bales, 3.0 million less than last year's 8.25 million. Harvested acres at 3.4 million is 1.3 million less than planted. That is, 28% of the Texas acreage is abandoned. Yield per harvested acre at 734 lbs. is more than 100 lbs. less than last year. Yields are below average for the Rio Grande Valley, Coastal Bend, and Blackland areas.

Cotton across the High Plains and Rolling Plains is still young and needs another two months of favorable growing weather. There are nearly 2 million acres of irrigated cotton in this region that has good potential. However, the Texas crop remains vulnerable to dry weather and lower temperatures in September and Octo-

Fewer acres and reduced yields are the main reasons for a 28% estimated drop in U.S. production from last season for the smallest crop since 12.2 million bales in 1989. The result is the expectation of dropping the surplus of over a 10 million bale carryover from last season to less than 5 million by the end of the 2009 crop

A smaller excess supply a year from now sets the stage for limited cotton stocks in 2009/10. December'09 futures price will have to rally well above 85 cents per pound to encourage more acreage, unless grain prices decrease substantially. However, the current glut in cotton stocks will hold December '08 futures to an estimated 65 to 75 cent range because of weak export de-

The demand for textile goods has been reduced due to higher fuel, food cost, and gen-

eral inflation in the U.S. Also, the generally weak economies in many foreign developed and developing countries contribute greatly to the decreased buying of cotton goods.

The price of cotton is gaining support from reduced world production that more than offsets a slow down in mill use. The world price has already increased. World ending stocks-to-use is now projected to decrease to 41% by end of the season. That would be the lowest stocks/use since 1994/95 when the "A" Index averaged 91 cents for the sea-

The cotton futures market has returned to responding somewhat to the fundamentals of supply and demand. However, the price and basis (difference between futures and cash markets) remain very volatile and unpredictable. The cotton marketing system that worked reasonably well in the past does not exist at this time.

Price discovery and price risk management are not reliable enough to effectively plan ahead. Hedging cash price is not reasonably reliable. The net effect is lower prices for producers because of increased marketing costs.

The income and price "safety net" provided in the 2008 Food, Conservation and Energy act did not take into consideration that production costs have soared to new levels. Thus, with forward pricing also more expensive, pre-paring a net cash flow for 2009 will not be easy for agricultural lenders and producers.







Traveling With A Monkey

Tommy Lucia grew up in saddles for the National Finals Minnesota during some rough rodeo. It's a very light; custimes. When he was eleven years old he set pins in a bowling alley until 1 AM and had three paper routes. His mother worked day and night to feed the family. When he was fifteen he went to his first rodeo and his life was changed for-

ever.
"I wanted to be a bull rider,"

says Tommy, who now lives in Weatherford. "So I started going to rodeos, competing in bull riding and bareback events. It was a challenge to see if I was tough enough." He became a rodeo clown at age 19 and for 20 years performed at rodeos all over the country, including the National Finals Rodeo. During that time he trained animals for various clown routines.

"I would train a goat, a dog or a horse. I had a lot of original acts and used all kinds of animals. It takes a long time to train one. You have to get to know the animal and he has

to know the animal and he has to know you."

He quit clowning in about 1982 and started doing specialty acts. At rodeo arenas these days, he has a monkey named Whiplash who rides a border collie while the dog pens some sheep.

"The sheep are Barbado. I use those because they stay so wild and it makes the dog really have to work. I've been using Whiplash for more than 35 years. He rides in a special saddle made by Cactus Saddlery in Greenville that makes

rodeo. It's a very light; custom fit saddle for the dog's back. It's not like a saddle for a horse where you cinch it up. We don't draw it tight because we want the dog to be able to breathe good and have freedom of movement. It takes a long time to get that just right so Whiplash can ride and balance himself. Of course his tail is wrapped around the dog. His front feet have hold of the hair on the dog's front shoulders and he's got the saddle horn or bars to hang onto. So he sits up there and rides."

The monkey and dog make a good team. No matter how many quick stops and turns the dog makes, the monkey stays on. During the act he wears a shirt, bandana and hat and makes all sorts of movements when the dog is crouched on the arena floor. He'll look at people in the stands or reach down and pick up some dirt.
"I don't think the word teach

is in the monkey's realm of understanding. I call it negotiate. You have to make it interesting for the animal, something they're going to like to

day.


