## Coyotes Back to Winning Ways With District Opener Victory Over Cougars

The Borden County Coyotes got back to their winning ways, hopefully starting another long streak as they entertained the Homecoming crowd with a nice 56 to 6 victory over the visiting Klondike Cougars. The Coyotes were dominant in all three phases of the game as they were a perfect 7 for 7 on extra points by sophomore Helio Rosales and constantly pinned the visitors deep in their own end of the field with solid kick-off coverage all evening long. The only negative on the night was another season ending injury on a play as sophomore, Austin Cope, making his first appearance in a month recovering from an illness. Austin went up for a pass in the endzone and as he fell to the ground he was pushed and hit the ground awkwardly and wound up dislocating his wrist and fracturing a bone in his wrist as well to bring his 2010 season to a disappointing close.

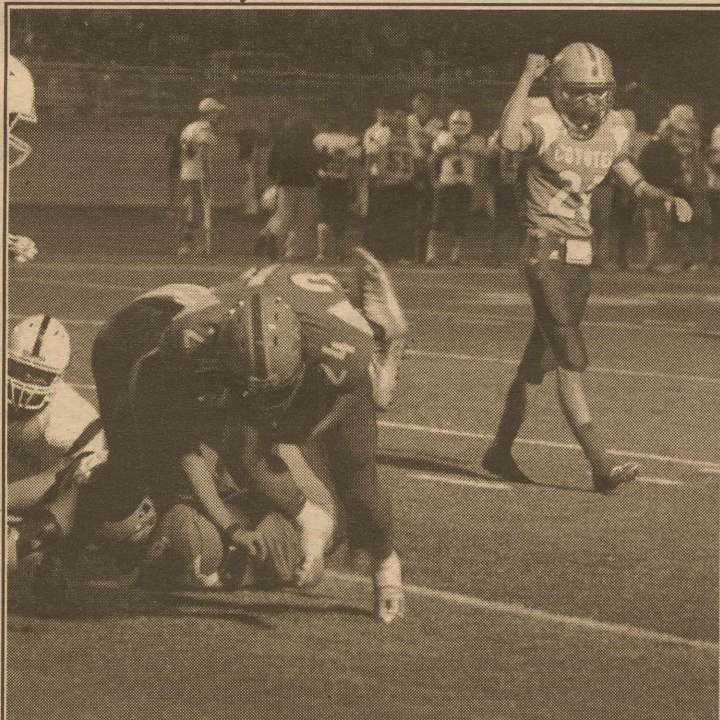
The Coyotes got off to a quick start as they held the visitors to a quick 3 and out, in fact, the first team defense of lineman John Hensley, Derek Tatum, linebacker Quint Shafer, corners Tony Soto and

Zach Telchik and safety Tanner Richey did not give a first down during their time in the game. Meanwhile, the offense started fast and never looked back as Tony Soto got the Coyotes their first of 4 first quarter scores on a 7 yard run.

Rosales hit the first of his seven to give Borden County an early 8 to 0 lead.

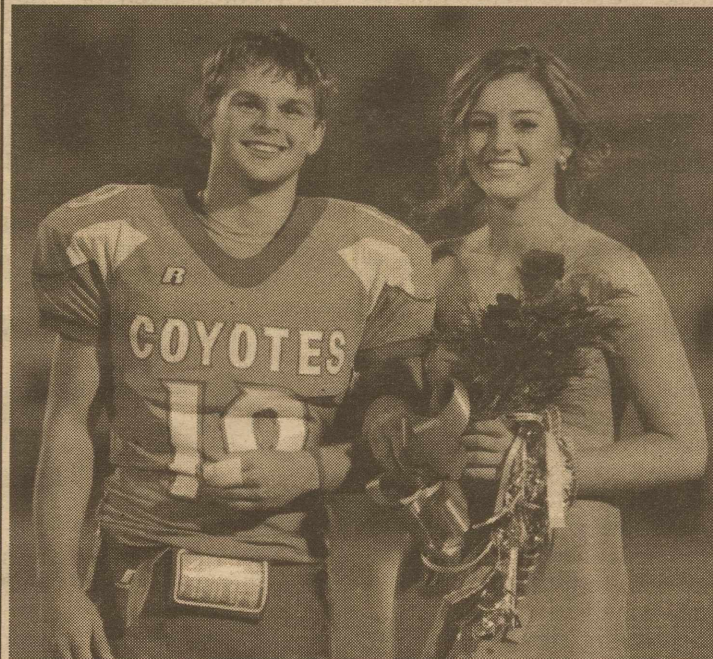
Just over a minute later, Austin Fields had his first score on the evening from a

## FSA Issues Final '10 Direct Payments

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service announced the revised Average Price Received by Growers for the 2009 Upland cotton marketing year on October 8, 2010. That same day the USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) published a notice to State and County offices (Notice DCP-243) which detailed the final Counter-cyclical Pro-

gram payment rates for Upland cotton and Peanuts.

The FSA notice also authorized State and County offices to begin processing the final 2009 Upland cotton and Peanut Counter-cyclical program payments on or about October 8.

As was detailed in last week's "Cotton News," the-

yard out. Fields then got his second score only 14 seconds later following a Derek Tatum fumble recovery from 14 yards out to push the Coyote lead to 24 to 0. With :30 left in the first Tanner Richey hit Quint Shafer in the corner of the endzone from 17 yards out to push the lead to 32 to 0 after one quarter of play.

Richey hit Soto on a nice 5 yard pass and catch play early in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter to make the score 40 to 0. Richey intercepted a 4<sup>th</sup> down pass by the Cougar quarterback and traveled 43 yards to pay dirt to make the score 48 to 0 following Rosales' 6<sup>th</sup> kick of the game. After a nice interception by backup linebacker, freshman TJ Basquez, the 2<sup>nd</sup> team offense wasted little time getting into the scoring act as Steven Howard scooted in from 12 yards out to make the score 56 to 0.

The Cougars got their initial first down of the game converting a 4<sup>th</sup> down on the 2<sup>nd</sup> team and then got on the board 3 plays later when a batted pass by Howard landed into the waiting arms of another Cougar and a 44 yard score to make the score 56 to 6 with :17 left in the game. That would bring a close to the 2010 homecoming game and get the Coyotes to 1-0 in district play.

Leading the way for the Coyotes was David Rodriguez with 9 carries for 107 yards and

2 tackles and a pass broken up. Quint Shafer had 4 tackles, one for a loss and one catch for 17 yards and a score. Zach Telchik had 4 tackles a pass break up and made his career debut at quarterback as the backup QB. TJ Basquez had 2 tackles and an interception. McLayne Hall had 3 tackles a pressure and a sack. Steven had 1 carry for 12 yards and a score and was in on 5 tackles. John Hensley had 5 tackles, a pressure and two for loss. Tanner Richey was 2 of 5 passing for 22 yards and 2 scores. Tony Soto had 5 carries for 49 yards and a score a catch for 5 yards and another score and was in on 3 tackles, one for loss and a caused fumble. Austin Fields had 7 carries for 54 yards and 2 scores and was in on 2 tackles. Derek Tatum had 4 tackles, a pressure a tackle for loss and 2 fumble recoveries. Helio Rosales was 7 for 7 kicking and was in on 2 tackles with a huge hit being applied on a Cougar. Matt Roberson was in on a tackle and a pressure.

The Coyotes next travel to O'Donnell for a huge ball game as they look to continue their winning ways and also hope to work toward defending their district title. Kylee Dean (17:35), Zoie Key (18:17), Taylor Roberts (19:21), Lexi Cheatham (19:48), and McKenna Campbell (19:54) also ran well. # Coyote Jv Pluck the Eagles

The Coyote JV football team traveled to O'Donnell Thursday to play Sands on a neutral field. The Coyotes scored first on a 5-yard pass from Collin Telchik to Jared Smith. Kurt Shafer kicked the extra point and the Coyotes led 8-0. Sands, however, responded with a sustained drive of their own which resulted in a 19-yard touchdown pass. The point after failed. With a two point lead, the Coyotes put together another good drive which Collin Telchik capped with an 8-yard touchdown run. Kurt Shafer again booted the ball through the uprights.

But again Sands responded—this time not with one score but with three unanswered touchdowns and one-point conversions. At the end of the third quarter, the score was Sands 27, Borden County

16, and things were not looking good for the Coyotes.

But the Coyotes managed to rally in the fourth quarter, scoring on a Telchik 75-yard run and a 1-yard run by Matthew Ham. Neither point after was converted. Still, the Coyotes took a 28-27 lead which they would not relinquish. The win was the Coyotes first of the season.

Leading the Coyote offensive attack was Collin Telchik, who was 7 of 9 for 85 yards passing and carried the ball 9 times for 102 yards. Tristen Benavidez caught 4 of Telchik's passes for 55 yards. Kurt Shafer caught one for 18 yards. Luke Burkett caught one pass for 7 yards. He also rushed the ball 3 times for 18 yards. Jared Smith had one reception for 5 yards. Matthew Ham had 3 carries for 7 yards.

Brady Dowds, Zach McMeans, Jared Smith, Michael Taylor, Luis Andrade, Matthew Proulx, and Kurt Shafer all contributed key blocks throughout the night.

Defensively, Brady Dowds led the team with 6 tackles, including several huge stops late in the game. Tristen Benavidez and Luis Andrade contributed 5 tackles each. Jared Smith and Luke Burkett each had 4; Collin Telchik and Austin Tyler 3; and Matthew Proulx 2. Though the defense bent in the first three quarters of the game, they managed to stand their ground when it mattered most and essentially won the game for the Coyotes.

tion before faking the trap and quarterback Thomas Harrison hit his target Joel Andrade on a nice 21 yard scoring strike. Harrison hit Robert Jordan on the extra point to give the Pups a brief 13 to 12 lead. This lead would be just that, very brief as the Bearcats returned their 2<sup>nd</sup> kick-off of the game to regain the lead at 18 to 13 late in the first half.

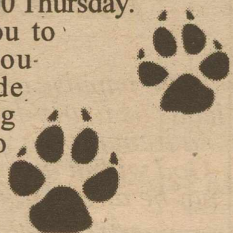

In the 2<sup>nd</sup> half, both teams

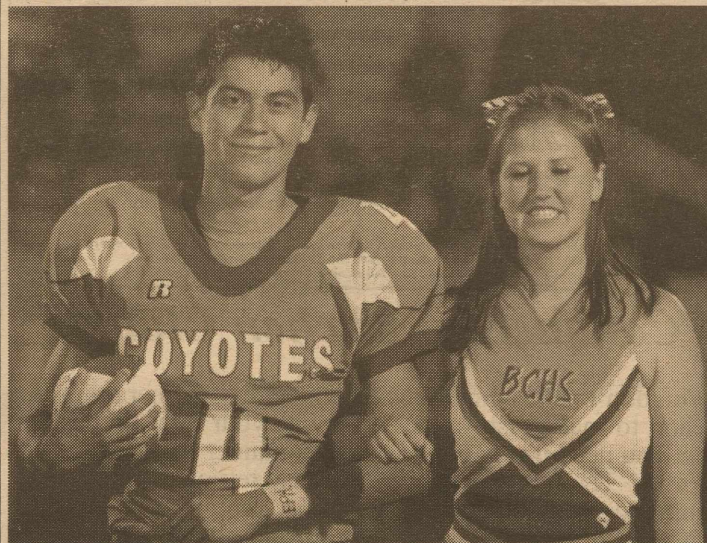

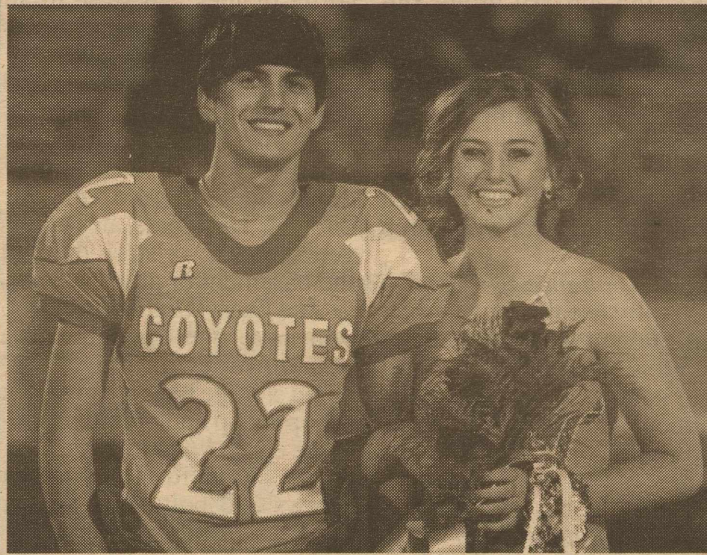

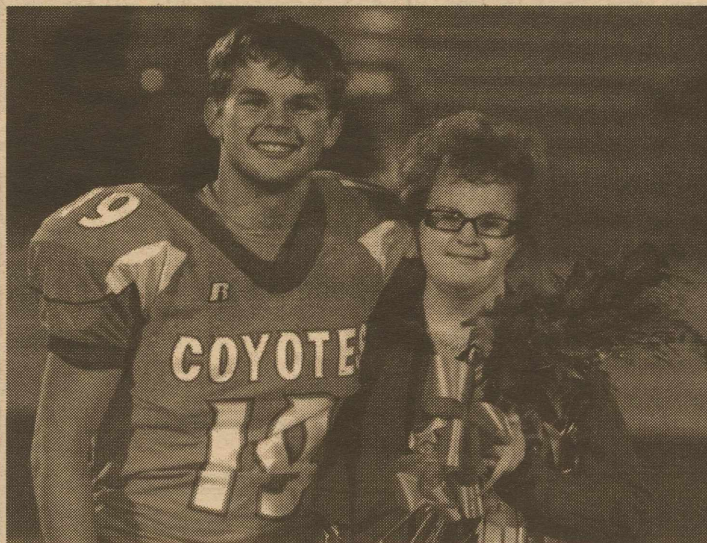

### Conquering Kitchen Clutter

You don't need a high-tech kitchen to make tasty meals. What you need is a good spatial plan! The best kitchen is organized, with a place for each item. It's easy when you follow these tips!

**The Kitchen Zones.** Start off by seeing your kitchen as a group of zones defined by activity. There's the prep zone, the appliance zone, the cleanup zone, the cutlery zone, the china zone, etc. Once you've defined your zones, store related items close to where you use them. For example, keep your plates and cutlery near your dining table, glasses next to the fridge and knives and cutting board near your prep counter.

**The Appliance Check.** Do you really use that huge mixer that's taking up space on your counter? When was the last time you made popcorn in the popper? If you don't use an appliance on a daily basis, keep it out of sight (in a cupboard, in the basement, etc.).

**The Container Theory.** Organized shelves often look uniformly "contained." So give a uniform look to items like pasta, flour, sugar, etc. by storing them in plastic containers or nice canisters.

**The Spice Solution.** Tired of having to sort through a mess of spice bottles to find just that one you want? Invest in a spice rack that twirls on its stand. Or

fill a large container minus the lid with your spice bottles. Put the container inside a cabinet for easy retrieval.

**The Recipe Code.** Is your precious shelf space being usurped by cookbooks you no longer use? Shift them to another bookshelf or throw a recipe book-swap party with a friend. Donate extras to your local library. Or print your favorite recipes and store in an old photo album, inside the picture slots.

**The Emergency Stash.** Have you been saving up cans of food and jugs of water for emergencies? Great. But they don't need to live in your kitchen. Designate an "emergency closet" or stash them in the basement or attic.

**The Everything Drawer.** Do you have one drawer where you throw everything? Zippered storage bags are great for scooping up and organizing all those errant knickknacks. Designate individual bags for screws and bolts, another for batteries, one for pens and pencils, one for stamps, one for adhesive bandages, one for miscellaneous items (when you cannot recall what something is!), and so on—the list is endless. The see-through plastic helps me quickly sift for what you want.

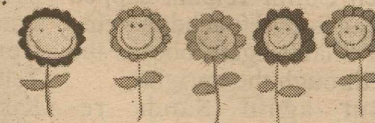

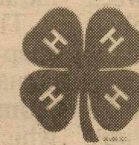

## TxDOT Cautions Motorists to Watch Out for Deer During Season

AUSTIN—Tis the season to be cautious—deer season that is.

Along with cooler weather, fall months bring about an increase in deer activity so Texas motorists should keep a close watch for animals that occasionally wander onto the highway, especially at night.

According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) more than 7,000 animal-related crashes occurred on Texas highways in 2009, many involving deer. Twenty-five of those crashes involved a fatality.

“Deer-vehicle collisions increase during the fall because the animals are more active,” said Carol Rawson, Traffic Operations director. “It’s this time of year that motorists need to be extra watchful and take steps to avoid collisions.”

Texas Parks and Wildlife

(TPWD) biologists predict an increase in deer population this year because of plenty of rain that has created an ideal environment for wildlife to flourish.

Deer-car accidents tally to more than 1.5 million crashes in the United States, costing an estimated \$1.1 billion in vehicle damage, according to recent reports from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

The Institute suggests the following defensive driving tips to avoid hitting a deer:

Drive carefully in areas known to have high deer populations. Places where roads divide agricultural fields from forestland are particularly dangerous.

If you see a deer, slow down. Others are probably nearby.

Use high-beam headlights when there is no oncoming

traffic. The high beams will reflect off deer’s eyes and warn you of their presence.

If a deer is in your lane, brake firmly but stay in the lane. The most serious crashes occur when drivers swerve.

Don’t rely on deer whistles, deer fences or reflectors to deter deer.

Wear seat belts.

If your car strikes a deer, don’t touch the animal. If the deer is blocking the highway, call the police.

Remember, it is unlawful to possess a deer or part of a deer that has been hit by a motor vehicle. For more information on fish and wildlife laws, go to <http://www.tpwd.state.tx.us/publications/annual/general/penalties/>.

vised figures only made a small difference in the final 2009 Counter-cyclical payment rate. Officially the FSA notice confirmed PCG’s estimate of a final 2009 Counter-cyclical payment rate of 1.68 cents per pound.

Growers who asked for and received an advance 2009 Counter-cyclical payment in February 2010 will receive a final payment rate equal to 0.65 cents per pound (\$0.0065/lb.), the difference between the final CC payment rate and the 1.03 cent per pound advance payment rate.

For Peanuts the final 2009 Counter-cyclical payment rate was set at 1.25 cents per pound. Like cotton, peanut growers who received the 2009 advance Peanut Counter-cyclical payment of 0.46 cents per pound (\$0.0046/lb.) earlier in the year can expect a final Peanut CC payment equaling 0.79 cents per pound (\$0.0079/lb.)

Revised Upland cotton monthly marketing and price numbers will be published at the end of October 2010.
