You're always busy There's just not enough time in each day to do all the things you need or want to do. You try to be as efficient as possible. It's as if you're on a treadmill. And no matter how fast you run, the treadmill is moving a little faster than you

You're exhausted at the end You're exhausted at the end of each day. In spite of your hectic schedule, you are not really accomplishing what's important to you. You have goals but they are elusive. You may feel frustrated. As

you get busier, your irritation threshold drops and you react to minor irritations that never used to bother you. You're trapped in a vicious cycle.

Activity is safer than pro-ductivity. Since productivity involves working towards your goals, there is a perceived risk of failure. If pursuing one's goals is postponed, the chance of failure is also deferred.

Activity involves no risk. Nothing is on the line when you keep busy with chores, home improvement projects, errands, etc. Granted, some activities are a necessity. But there are many that are performed at the expense of pursuing your goals and dreams.





County Educational Presentation Contest, Share-the-Fun and **Public Speaking Project**



PUBLIC NOTICE

On January 13, 2011, Sharyland Utilities, L.P. ("Sharyland"), a regulated electric utility company, filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") entitled Application of Sharyland Utilities, L.P. to Approve Study and Plan Pursuant to the Commission's Order in Docket No. 37990 Concerning the Movement of Sharyland's Stanton and Colorado City Divisions from the Southwest Power Pool to ERCOT ("Application").

The Application included a study which analyzes and evaluates issues related to moving Sharyland's Stanton and Colorado City Divisions from the Southwest Power Pool ("SPP") power region to the Electric Reliability Council of Texas ("ERCOT") power region. The study evaluates seven options which present varying configurations and costs that impact both ERCOT and SPP. The study designates one of the options as "preferred" but also determines that each option is feasible. Three of the options would transfer all of the Stanton and Colorado City Divisions to ERCOT, while the other four options would transfer some service to ERCOT, with some customers remaining in SPP. The Application asks that the Commission (1) find that the study complies with the requirements of the Commission's Order in Docket No. 37990 to conduct such a study and (2) select one of three options presented in the study that would result in a total transfer of Sharyland's Stanton and Colorado City Divisions to ERCOT and direct Sharyland to implement that option.

This Application has been assigned Docket No. 39070. Interested persons will be afforded the opportunity to participate in this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this proceeding is March 29, 2011, and a letter requesting intervention should be received by the Commission by that date.



Those POW's in Marfa Were **Real** Artists

When Rommel's Afrika Corps was defeated in World War Two, some of the German "During the war, Americans couldn't get chocolate. But these prisoners got chocolate prisoners of war were sent to Marfa. They were quite happy with the move.

"Imagine being a German soldier in the desert, getting shot at by tanks. It's 130 de-grees. It's filthy and your hungry and tired and miserable and you don't know if you're going to live or not. All of a sudden it's over and you're here in Marfa, Texas in this wonderful climate."

Those are the words of Mona Garcia, who bought the building on the old Fort D. A. Russell where the prisoners were housed. She says some of the prisoners were high-ranking officers who had a high appreciation for the better things in life. They settled in to West Texas just fine. There were no threats of escape. "They loved gardening. There was a gorgeous rose garden there that the German POW's started and maintained. They grew herbs and vegetables and were so prolific that they let them go and sell them on the grocery store parking lot. At Christmastime they were allowed to go about the town and sing Christmas carols in German

There was some military discipline at the camp. Mona says every afternoon at 4 o'clock the German commander of the POW's was allowed to march his men out the back gate of the fort down a small road to highways around Marfa, then return to the fort.

these prisoners got chocolate once a month. On their marches, they passed out chocolates to children."

Some of the prisoners were talented artists. To occupy their time they started painting floor-to-ceiling murals on the walls. The scenes depict medieval arches and gates in west Texas pastures complete with Hereford cattle grazing be-neath a perfect sky. You see cowboys on the range at work. Apparently the POW's had excellent observation skills on their marches around Marfa. They were able to retain the details of what they saw and transfer them to the murals. The work is of high quality. Mona brought in restoration teams to examine the murals. 'They found out that they were painted fresco style with oilbased house paint just like Michelangelo painted the chapels in Italy. They wet the wall with a new coat of plaster and while it was still damp, they painted a three-foot square at a time. They're quite remarkable and are really beautiful.'

Mona says the 186 prison-ers were at Marfa two years and left behind some important art. She is raising money to have the murals restored. Some were damaged when part of the roof deteriorated. The son of one of the artists has visited the murals. Four of the prisoners took up residence in the Texas Mountains after the war.
