Coyotes Come Up Short in Upset Bid of #1 Water Valley

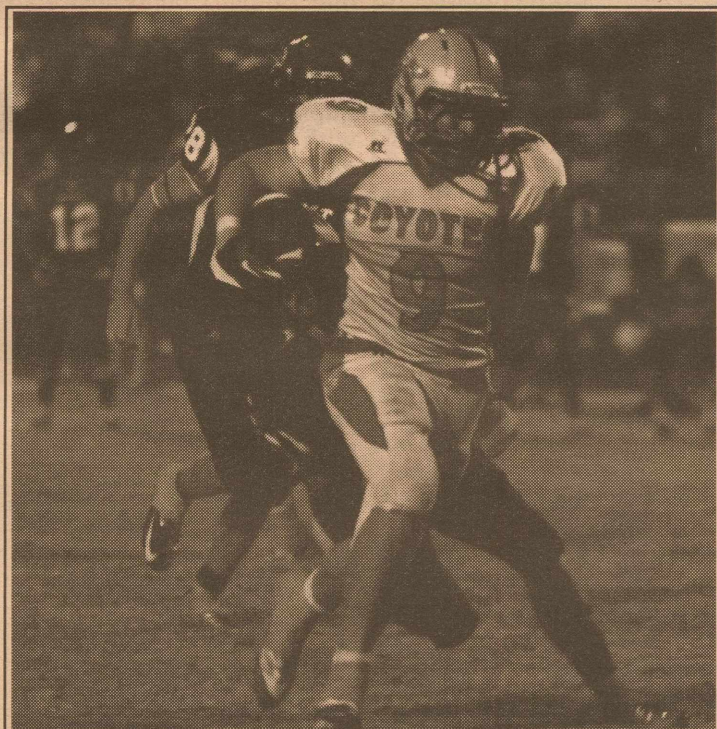
The Borden County Coyotes came up a little short in their bid to topple the #1 Water Valley Wildcats on the road in Water Valley. The Coyotes got off to a great start holding the potent Wildcat offense to a quick 3 and out and then scoring on their first offensive play of the game as Tanner Richey followed the blocks of Kurt Shafer, Helio Rosales, Matt Roberson, Jared Smith and TJ Basquez as he set sail on a 57 yard touchdown run to give the Coyotes a quick lead. The Rosales kick made the score 8-0 for the visiting team. On the next series for the home team they narrowly completed a 4th down pass to keep the drive alive and then reached pay dirt to tie the score with 5:29 left in the first quarter. On the next Coyote offensive possession they were hoping to catch the Wildcats napping with a sweep pass, but the defense was not fooled and the result of an overthrown pass was an interception, the first of three on the game. However, the Coyote defense answered and held the home team out of the endzone as a sack by TJ Basquez of the Wildcat quarterback put them in trouble before an errant pass allowed them to take over on downs. The Coyotes had to overcome two holding penalties on their next drive but they were able to finally overcome

these issues to reach the endzone as Richey crossed the goal line from 2 yards out to regain the lead at 14 to 8. The Wildcats quickly responded throwing the same pass on back to back plays, the first was broken up by a bone jarring hit by Richey, but the second time, Richey was a little tardy and as a result the Wildcats were able to slip a tackle

and scamper on in for the score to take their first lead at 16 to 14 with 6:51 left.

On the next Borden County possession it looked as if the Coyotes would overcome a couple of more holding penalties to get on the board, but a penalty on a touchdown pass took points

Slow Down

Your day is hectic. Everything is rushed. You are constantly jumping from one crisis to another. It seems as if there just isn't enough time for all that has to get done. At the end of each day you feel drained. You don't feel fully rested in the morning because you are stressing about the day ahead.

Even the weekends don't offer much relief. Friday night you are exhausted. Saturday is spent running errands. On Sunday you start to anticipate Monday when the cycles starts again. Consequently, your stress level starts to escalate before your new week begins.

Life is in high gear. There isn't enough time in a day to accomplish all you need to. This thrusts you into crisis mode where you rush from one task to another. You may snap at those around you while your level of patience drops. As you fall farther behind, your frustration grows.

Feeling overwhelmed contributes to mental fatigue which causes physical fatigue. When you feel burned out, everything is magnified. Small issues, that would normally be of no concern, get blown out of proportion.

Life in the fast lane is a recipe for burnout. It puts you on a treadmill that goes just a

little faster than you are able to keep up with. Although you are busy all the time, you don't feel satisfied. Just when you are at a breaking point, some new crisis pops up that demands your attention.

What's the solution? Slow down. Prioritize. Many situations viewed as urgent are only emergencies because of the way you treat them. When you get stressed out, your nerves become frayed causing you to hop around without any specific strategy. The more frantic you become, the more you are susceptible to stress.

There is much less urgency than you realize. Many of the situations you face each week will not lead to disastrous consequences if they are not immediately addressed. Your objective is to recognize that the world will not stop turning if you choose to put some tasks on the back burner.

Say no to non-priority activities you don't want to do. It is ok to decline social invitations or to turn down requests to volunteer your time. You are not in competition with nor do you have to impress anyone. Your schedule should not be based on what someone else does.

Downtime can eat into your

Pups Take Two From Water Valley Wildcats

The Borden County Pups split up and played two games against the Water Valley Wildcats hear on Thursday. The first game was comprised of all but two 7th grade players, this team consisted of Brian Torres who had 8 tackles and a fumble recovery, Nick Proulx 8 tackles, Braxton Barnes 8 tackles, Thomas Nix 6 tackles, Thad Basquez 9 tackles and a fumble recovery, Morgan Wilson 8 tackles and a fumble recovery for a score, Kable Kleck 5 tackles and a fumble recovery and Clayton Addison with 4 tackles. These young Pups got off to a very fast start as Brian Torres raced 43 yards for a score to make it 6-0 less than a minute into the contest. The visiting Wildcats quickly answered to tie the game at 6 but that would be all she wrote for the visitors. The Pups took the lead for good with :27 left in the first quarter on a nice 20 yard run by Nick Proulx and the Morgan Wilson to Braxton Barnes pass and catch gave Borden County a 13 to 6 lead. The Pups recovered a fumble moments later and then on the final play of the initial period padded their lead on a 34 yard run by Torres. This brought the score to 19-6 after one quarter of play. The Pups then continued to dominate defensively holding the Wildcats to minimal yards before closing the half with another score, this time thru the air as Wilson hit Barnes on a nice 20 yard pass play to make the score 25 to 6 at half.

The Pups continued the onslaught in the 3rd quarter extending the lead on another Wilson to Barnes connection, this time from 15 yards out. Thomas Nix got across the goal line for the extra point and a comfortable 32-6 Pups lead only a minute into the second half. With 1:53 in the 3rd, Torres put the pups on the board again, this time from 20 yards out. Following the score, Wilson found Kable Kleck in the endzone for the point after to give the Pups a 39 to 6 lead. The defense got into the act on the next possession as Morgan

Wilson scooped up a loose ball and rumbled 32 yards to pay dirt to extend the lead to 45 to 6 going into the 4th quarter. Neither team scored in the 4th as this would provide the final score and the first victory of the night for the Borden Pups.

The Borden County 8th graders of Kace Lott, Kale Yarbro, Corbin Sumners, Braxton Coor, Hunter Huse, Dylan Murphy, Diego Bernal, Jayton Lewis and Hunter Jones (missed his second game with an injury) were joined by 7th graders Ryan Wilborn and Trace Richey took on the 8th grade bunch of Wildcats who had not lost a game in two years. In fact they have not had a game within 24 points in two years. This game pitted two very good junior high football teams and might very well be two teams that clash for years to come. The game was very physical and with the physical play turnovers were experienced as well as both teams had trouble hanging onto the ball. The Pups had 3 fumbles while the visitors lost 4 of their own. Recovering fumbles for Borden County was Sumners, Ryan Wilborn and two by Richey. These fumbles were caused by Wilborn twice, Kace Lott once and Richey once.

The home team got the ball to start the game but the first of their 3 turnovers ended the threat and moments later the visiting Wildcats had a 7-0 lead with 1:18 remaining in the first quarter. Corbin Sumners followed some nice blocks by Coor, Lott, Lewis, Yarbro and Richey to the endzone from 35 yards out to cut the lead to 6-7 with :28 left in the first. After recovering a Wildcat fumble, Sumners found Richey on a 12 yard pass play to give the Pups their first lead at 12 to 7. Wilborn barreled his way into the endzone to make the score 13 to 7 with 6:49 left in the 2nd. Moments later the Wildcats tied the score at 13 on a 45 yard run of their own with 5:56 left. The Pups committed back to back turnovers deep inside Wildcat territory, but their defense stiffened and held the

visitors out of the endzone. Just before the end of the first half Ryan Wilborn sacked the Wildcat quarterback from behind jarring the ball loose and after 3 or 4 players had their hands on the ball Sumners scooped the loose pigskin up and rumbled 45 yards to the Wildcat 12 yard line with less than :20 seconds left in the half. On the first play Richey found Braxton Coor open in the endzone for an unlikely turn of events giving the Pups a 19-13 lead and on the point after Richey found Lott to push the lead to seven at 20-13 going into the locker room at half.

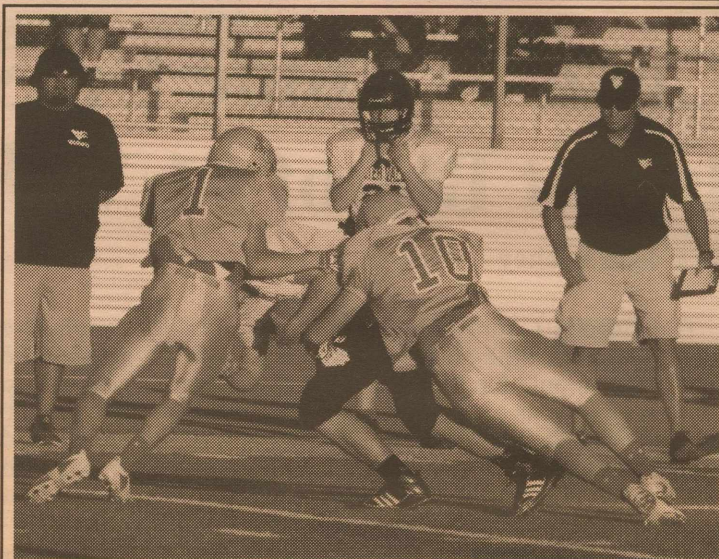
The second half started well for the Pups as another Wildcat turnover lead to a 14 yard Richey run and with a Sumners to Wilborn extra point a 27 to 13 lead for Borden County with 6:43 left in the 3rd. The visitors would not go away as they cut the lead to 27-19 with 4:25 left in the 3rd.

The Pups began to dominate on the offensive side as they scored on the first play from 54 yards out on a Richey to Lott pass play to make the score 33-19 with 4:05 left in the third. On the Pups next possession another one play drive occurred, this time a Richey 46 yard run with 2:58 left in the quarter and a 39-19 lead. The Wildcats would not go away as they scored with :35 left in the third to cut the lead to 39-25. The Pups would then use a third consecutive one play drive to answer as Richey found pay dirt from 43 yards out with :24 seconds left in the quarter and a 45 to 25 lead. After a caused fumble by Lott and a recovery by Richey, he found Jayton Lewis for a 4th consecutive one play drive from 45 yards out for another Pup score with no time on the clock in the 3rd quarter. Another Wilborn extra point run made the tally 52-25 heading into the final stanza.

The Wildcats managed to slow things down a bit with a long drive to get back on the board, cutting the lead to 52-31, but for a sixth consecutive

time Borden County answered with a one play drive. Richey sprinted in from 43 yards out to all but seal the deal for the Pups building a 58-31 lead with 4:21 left in the game. Neither team would find the endzone the rest of the contest giving the Pups a huge victory over a very good junior football team and knocking the Wildcats from the ranks of the unbeaten teams.

Leading the way for the Pups was Richey with 167 yards on 8 carries and 4 scores, a reception for 12 yards and a score and 7 of 9 passing for 140 yards and 3 scores and was in on 15 tackles. Corbin Sumners had 3 carries for 62 yards and a score and was 1 of 1 for 12 yards and a score passing and was in on 7 tackles. Jayton Lewis had 3 carries for 43 yards and 1 reception for 45 yards and a score and was in on 18 tackles. Kace Lott had 2 receptions for 57 yards a score and an extra point and was in on 9 tackles. Kale

Yarbro had two receptions for 19 yards and a point after and was in on 15 tackles, Braxton Coor had 2 catches for 19 yards and a score and was in on a tackle. Hunter Huse had several nice blocks. Dylan Murphy had 2 tackles, Diego Bernal had 2 tackles and several nice blocks, Ryan Wilborn had a catch and two runs for extra points and was in on 18 tackles. Hopefully in a week or two we will get Hunter Jones back. The Pups will next travel to Loraine to take on the Bulldogs of Loraine. The following week they will split up again, this time starting at 4:30 with the B bunch playing Lubbock Kingdom Prep and the A group will play Jayton. Following these two games, the JV will play Plainview Christian. But, remember, this week the Pups will be in Loraine.

Thank you all for your support. This group continues to impress and really has us excited about what is in store for Coyote football.

off the board and then a mistake by myself cost the Coyotes another 15 yards to put the offense in a big hole and as a result they were unable to regain the lead. Meanwhile the home town Wildcats capitalized on the mistake and reached the endzone to push the lead to 24 - 14. This would mark the biggest lead on the evening by either team. The Coyotes would waist very little time answering as Richey again followed some nice blocks to hit pay dirt from 44 yards out and following the Rosales kick the score was now 22-24. The Wildcats almost answered, but a nice hit on a Wildcat receiver in the back of the endzone by Richey carried the receiver out of the back of the endzone which brought a close to a very competitive first half.

In the 2nd half the Coyotes got the ball first and wasted very little time. A nice run by Basquez set the visiting team up inside the 15 yard line then on the next play Richey found the endzone from 11 yards out to give the Coyotes the lead again at 28 to 24. Unfortunately the Wildcats got rolling in the second half and they answered quickly to regain the lead at 30 to 28 with 8:11 remaining in the 3rd quarter. Richey again found pay dirt for the Borden County team, this time from 44 yards out, and with the Rosales kick again had the lead at 36 to 30. Again the home town Wildcats answered to again regain the lead at 38 to 36 with 1:02 remaining in the 3rd quarter. The Coyotes got another long run from Richey late in the quarter, which would prove to be the final play for Richey as a head injury would force him to the sidelines for the remainder of the game, but the Coyotes responded as Ricky Torres allowed the visiting team to regain the lead on a one yard plunge and with the Rosales kick with 9:17 left the Coyotes owned a 44 to 38 lead.

Moments later the #1 Wildcats tied the score at 44 with 7 minutes left in the game. The Coyotes behind a nice run 28 yard run by TJ Basquez which again gave the visitors the lead

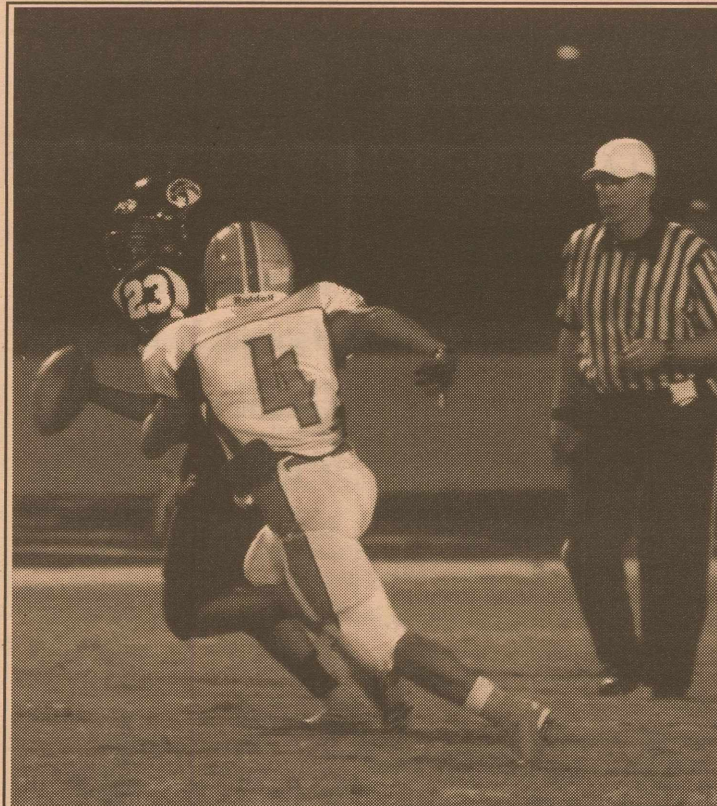
with 4:19 in the game. The lead was 52 to 44 following a Rosales kick. Only two plays later, however, the Wildcats again tied the contest with 3:53 left in the game. The next Borden County possession found the Coyotes facing a 4th and 9. Ricky Torres took the pitch and looked poised to make the first down but a hard tackle around his knee left Torres a yard short of the first down, but more importantly may have brought a close to the 2012 season for the sophomore running back as he left with a possible ligament tear in his knee. With the first stop of the second half for either team the Wildcats quickly took advantage of the Coyotes disappointment and grabbed what would prove to be the final lead on the final points of this hard fought battle and as a result remain #1 for the Wildcats with a 60-52 victory over the Borden County Coyotes.

Our Borden County Coyotes have a lot to be proud of, they overcame injuries, adversity and turnovers to only fall one play short of beating the number one team in the state. The Coyotes had a lot of positives come from this complete team effort to hang with the top team.

Leading the way offensively was Tanner Richey with 21 carries for 303 yards and 5 scores, also one reception for 12 yards. TJ Basquez had 16 carries for 107 yards and a score and two receptions for 23 yards. Korbin Martinez had 3 carries for 9 yards and a reception for 9 yards. Ricky Torres had 2 carries for 9 yards and a score and Jared Smith was 4 of 6 passing for 36 yards.

The Coyotes will next travel to Aspermont to take on the Mineral Wells Community Christian Warriors at 7:30 Friday night.

Thank you all for your support. We all appreciate all the support you give us and we are so proud of our young men for their hard work. We are getting better and will continue to improve as the year progresses as we continue toward our first goal of a possible fifth straight district championship.

lot of energy without any measurable results. Productivity entails measurable accomplishments.



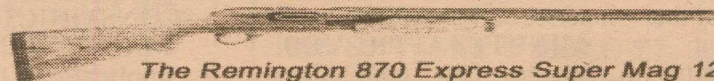

ROSS SHARP, County Judge, Presiding; **MONTE SMITH**, Commissioner, Precinct N. 1; **RANDY ADCOCK**, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; **ERNEST REYES**, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; **JOE BELEW**, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; **JOYCE HERRIDGE** County Clerk and Ex-Officio of the Commissioners Court constituting a quorum, when the following proceedings were had, in accordance with the posted agenda.

Other officers Present:

County Treasurer, Sharlot Stone and Ben Smith, County Attorney.

CALL TO ORDER

Judge Sharp called the September 25, 2012 Special Session of Borden Co. Commissioners Court at 8:35 a.m.

MINUTES APPROVED

Minutes of the Commissioners Court Meetings of September 18, 2012 were read. Commissioner Reyes made a motion to approve said minutes. Commissioner Smith seconded the motion. Motion carried.

2011 AUDIT

He always ended his shows with the phrase 'God Bless.' He was just a great man."

When Gary asked Red about the braces he was wearing, the comedian said they were from too many pratfalls. Gary was elated after the visit and couldn't wait to tell his wife and friends about getting to visit with Red Skelton. Of course they didn't believe him when he told them about his visit with the comedian. But Gary had the last laugh.

"We went to the show that night, and at the end of his performance he asked if anyone in the auditorium had any requests for one of his pantomimes. He said, 'before we get started with that, I'd like to recognize someone in the audience. Can you get the spotlight on this man? His name is Dr. Gary Gosney and we had a nice visit this afternoon. He's a veterinarian from Temple, Texas and I learned more about my pet than I thought I'd ever know. He told me his favorite act of mine was the old man at the parade, so this is for you, Gary' and he did the skit."
