It did not take Valley long to open up Monday's scoring first, finding the end zone just 24 seconds into this contest on a 48-yard run. The Patriots kicked their first PAT to take the quick 8-0 lead.

It appeared that Borden County would just as quickly tie this game up, but an illegal blocking penalty flagged an apparent Corbin Sumners' kickoff return for a touchdown.

Valley extended its lead to with 3:57 left in that first quar-ter on a fourth down play. They also kicked that PAT to go up 16-0.

Borden County cut Valley's lead to 16-6 with 2:38 to go in the first quarter when the freshman Sumners scored from 38 yards out.

Valley hiked its lead to 23-6 with 7:49 to go in the second quarter when it scored its third touchdown on a seven-yard

Borden County did not score its second touchdown until 4:51 left in the second quarter on a one-yard run by Sumners. Riley Herridge kicked that PAT, pulling the Coyotes within nine at 23-14.


Valley, however, started pulling away thanks to two late touchdowns in the final 4:51 of the second quarter to open up a 35-14 halftime lead.

Borden County opened up the second half scoring with 1:41 to go in the third quarter on a six-yard touchdown pass from freshman Hunter Jones to junior end Mason Coor. Herridge kicked that PAT, making it a 35-22 ball game at that point.

Valley did not score in the 16-0 scoring on a 23-yard run second half until the 49 seconds of the third quarter on a two-yard run. The Patriots kicked that PAT to go up 43-32 after the first three quarters.

Borden County appeared heading toward the first touchdown of the fourth quarter before fumbling that opportunity away inside Valley's five-yard

# **Coyotes Make All-District Honors**

Due to its major youth movement this fall at Gail, the general consensus had been that Borden County was a year or two away from sitting back on its normal perch on top of the six-man football world.

2013 season, those people looked right.

A tough schedule, loaded up with Top 10 opponents, forced these young Coyotes into growing up the hard way. And they did.

Borden County finished up this season winning five out of its last six outings to go two addition to having real good rounds deep in the Division I foot speed which always puts state six-man football playoffs a lot of pressure on your oppobefore getting knocked out by another traditional power, Val-

ley. With still another league championship in the trophy case at Gail—their sixth straight under Coach Trey Richey—Borden County dominated the Division I District 4 all-District Six-Man Football Team released this week

Richey is that league's Coach of the Year.

Borden County's Tristen Benavidez and Klondike's Nathan Sevedge are not only that league's Co-Defensive MVP's but also its two all-star selections for next summer's Division I six-man all-star game which will be played at Wichita Falls.

Benavidez, one of only three seniors on this year's Borden County football team, put up good numbers on both sides of the line of scrimmage. Benavidez was their leading tackler with 157 tackles, in-cluding 16 for losses. He was also their second leading receiver with 25 catches for 499 yards and seven touchdowns.

'He's got tremendous heart, which helped him play this game the way it's supposed to be played," Borden County's Coach Richey said of Benavidez.

'He's also a tremendous leader-one who led by example. He's always on time and worked hard every day. He even helped start some of our practices.

In his first year in high school, Sumners put up outstanding numbers for the Coyotes. He ran for 2,038 yards and 21 touchdowns in 174 car-With a 1-5 start into this ries. He also had 19 catches for 419 yards and four other scores. Sumers also ran back two kick off for scores as well as one interception. "Corbin had a big hand in a

lot of the things we did this season as a football team," Richey said. "He's one of those kids who's hard to tackle, in nent.

"He's got a very exciting future. He's got a tremendous upside in this game."

Benavidez also earned firstteam all-district on offense at fullback.

Other Coyote gridders tack-ling first-team all-district are sophomore Colby Pennell at fight end; sophomore Korbin Martinez at wide receiver and cornerback; junior Frank Banman at center and defensive line; freshman Hunter Jones at utility back and safety; and junior Riley Herridge at kicker.

Richey always has been big on preaching team work to his players. That same train of thought is necessary when it comes to his coaching success. "This really should go to our whole staff," Richey said of his

Coach of the Year honor.

"I'm not about to start tak-ing all the credit. It's been a total group effort all the way around. If there was ever a year where it took everybody all llback. pulling in the same direction, Sumners was also a first- this was it.

"We've got a good blend on this staff. Three of us grew up together over at Jayton and then we've known Coach B (Peter Benavidez) forever. It just took everybody staying the course, just like to took all

of us staying patient." Richey's seventh year as the head coach at Gail definitely has been special. Now with Tristen Benavidez all-star selection, this season has one more game left in it.

Richey already can see Tristen making an impact in this all-star gem, which beginning next summer will be played at Wichita Falls.

"He's such a competitor, which makes him somebody good to have on your side," Richey said. "Whoever ends up getting the chance to coach him next summer will have to be excited just in the way that Tristen always does things right.


"Being able to go two deep (in the playoffs) only gave us that much more experience going into next year.






