Revenge is Sweet as Coyotes Make Short Work of the Red Devils

The Coyotes played host to the undefeated Rankin Red Devils, a team that was averaging over 70 points a game and has dominated both of their opponents in the 4th period this year and most importantly last year dominated the Coyotes and actually 45'ed them at their place a year earlier. With all of the above information the Coyotes came into this game hoping to exact a little revenge and even send a message to the rest of the six-man world that the Borden County Coyotes are going to be a team to contend with this year.

The Coyotes came out like a team trying to get revenge and send that message as they played the best defense they have played all season limiting the high octane Red Devil offense to only one score in the game and a total of 87 yards of offense. Meanwhile, the Coyote offense continued its dominance as they scored on every possession in the game. Although Borden County did not garner as many total yards, because of taking the wind in the first quarter and the defense not giving up a first down on the Red Devils first 4 possessions. The Coyotes kept getting the ball back in great field position. Borden County's first score as has been the case all season happened quickly as it took two plays Corbin Sumners followed blocks by his rotating offensive team enroute to a 11 yard score. Riley Herridge kicked the extra point and the Coyotes had a quick 8-0 lead.

After another quick 3 and out the boys wasted little time adding to the lead as Mason Coor scampered 20 yards to pay dirt and after another Herridge kick a 16-0 lead with 4:25 left in the first quarter. On the Coyotes next possession Sumners took to the air as he connected with Korbin Martinez with a 27 yard pass play and with the Herridge kick a comfortable 24-0 lead still in the first quarter. After a 4th straight defensive stop the home team again wasted little time scoring as Sumners set

:09 left in the first quarter. Again Herridge nailed the kick and the Coyotes had an insurmountable 32-0 lead, but on the point after kick a Red Devil player hit Nathan Ham low and dislocated his knee cap and he will be out for a few weeks.

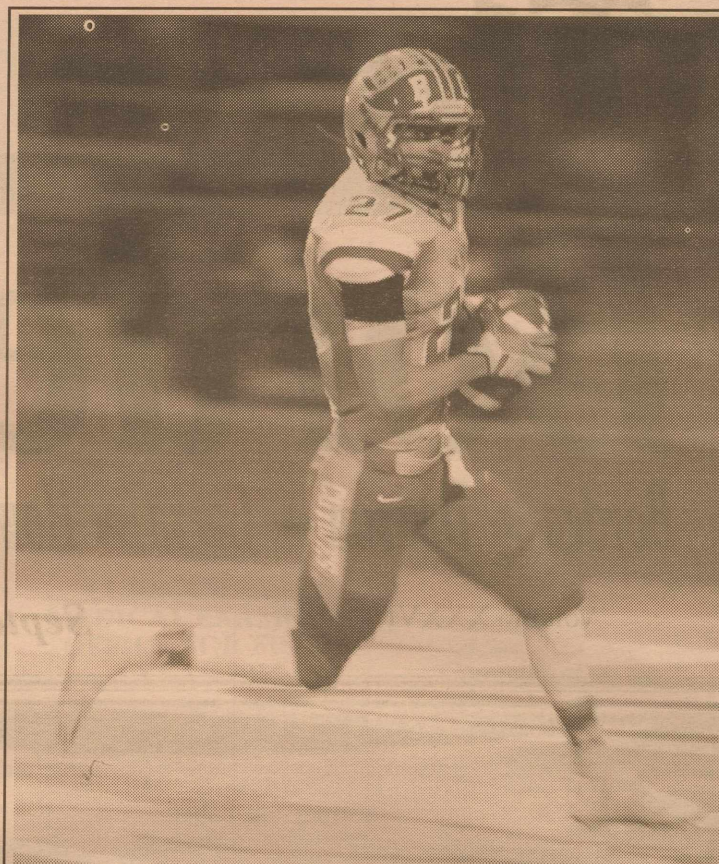
The second quarter saw much more of what the first quarter held for the Coyotes as they continued to dominate on both sides. The Red Devils did manage to score on one drive that was aided by a penalty and a converted 4th down play, but that would be about all they could muster for this contest. The offense, which rotates many players continued its success. The offense rotates Frank Banman, Cayden Vaughn, Ryan Willborn at center, Nathan Ham and Ricky Torres at Guard, Sean Tucker and Noah Morales (who was replacing the injured Colby Pennell in the rotation) at end, Trace Richey, Korbin Martinez and Jayton Lewis at fullback, Corbin Sumners and Mason Coor at Tailback and Hunter Jones at quarterback.

On their first offensive play of the quarter Sumners hit Martinez again with a 56 yard pass and catch into the wind. The Herridge kick made the score 40-0. The home team got the ball back and Sumners scored on a one yard run that was set up by a 16 yard run by Richey. The point after kick was missed making the score 46-0 with 5:35 left in the first half. The visitors managed to get their only score of the game to cut the lead to 46 to 6, but Willborn blocked the kick to leave it at that. The Coyotes answered quickly as they got another Sumners score, this

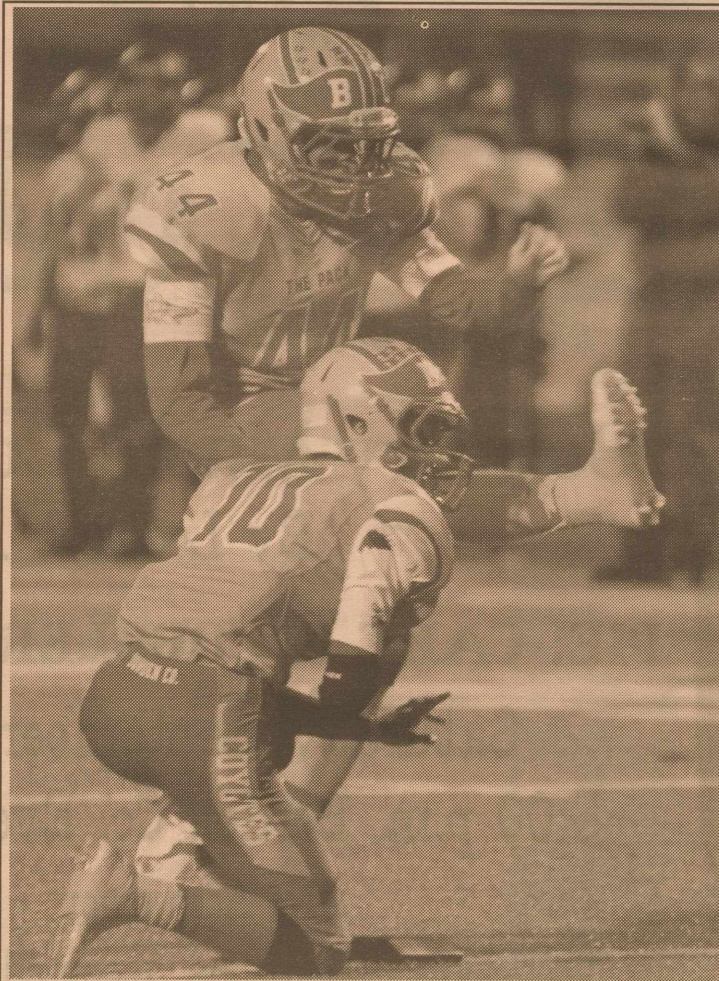
time from 41 yards out. Another Herridge kick made the score 54 to 6. The defense would close the deal and the Coyotes would run out the clock to make this a final at halftime of 54 to 6 in dominating fashion.

Statistically for the Coyotes, Corbin Sumners had 10 carries for 119 yards and 4 TD's and was 2 of 2 passing for 78 yards and two scores and was in on 6 tackles. Korbin Martinez had two catches for 78 yards and 2 scores and was in on 7 tackles. Frank Banman had a catch for 10 yards and two big hits while making 9 tackles. Sean Tucker had an 18 yard catch and was in on 12 tackles with 2 Tackles for loss. Mason Coor had 2 carries for 22 yards and a score and was in on 2 tackles. Ryan Willborn had 2 carries for 15 yards and was in on 2 tackles. Noah Morales was in on 5 tackles. Cayden Vaughn was in on 5 tackles. Trace Richey had a carry for 18 yards and was in on 11 tackles including 2 tackles for loss and two passes broken up. Jayton Lewis was in on 4 tackles. Hunter Jones was 2 of 2 passing for 28 yards and was in on 7 tackles. Nathan Ham was in on a tackle and had several nice blocks. Ricky Torres blocked well and was in on 2 tackles. Riley Herridge was 6 of 7 on extra points and kicked the ball great on kick-offs and was in on one tackle.

Thank you all for your support, this has been a great start to the 2014 season, it is the first time since 2010 that the Coyotes started the season 3-0. The Coyotes will next travel to New Home to take on the 2-1 Leopards.

The Borden County Coyote JV pitched it's second shutout of the 2014 season as they traveled to Rankin and endured an hour plus lightning delay en route to an impressive 47-0 victory to improve to 2-0 on the young season. The JV team consisting of junior Nathan Souder, sophomores, Diego Bernal, Braxton Coor, Dylan Murphy, Steven Carrillo and freshman: Nick Proulx, Brian Torres, Morgan Wilson, Braxton Barnes, Thomas Nix and Josh Murphy has been very impressive in their two scrimmages and now their second game of the season.

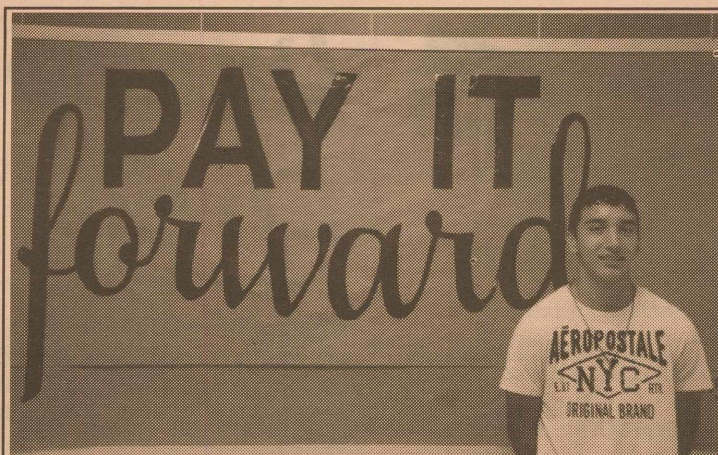
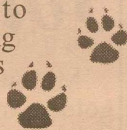
For the second time in as many games the game was halted early due to the 45 point mercy rule. Brian Torres got things started with a nice 15 yard run and then on the extra point Nick proulx found Braxton Barnes in the end zone for the point after and a quick 7-0 lead with 4:17 left on the clock. Torres reached pay dirt again with 6:50 left in the second quarter this time from 43 yards out. Morgan Wilson hit Dylan Murphy for the point after and a 14-0 lead. With 5:02 left in the 2nd Torres again followed the nice blocking of Coor, Barnes, Bernal, Souder and Wilson to increase the lead, this time from 20 yards out. Proulx pumped faked and kept the ball himself this time for the point after and a Coyote 21-0 lead. With 2:11 left in the second quarter Torres added his 4th score this time from 43 yards out. Another Proulx run increased the dominating performance to 28 to 0 at intermission.

The Defense continued its domination in the second half and then the offense continued where they left off as Nick Proulx found Braxton Barnes on a nice 33 yard pass and catch then hit him again for the point after and a 35-0 lead in the 3rd quarter. With 2:54 left in the 3rd Proulx rumbled 40 yards to increase the lead to 41-0. After one more defensive

stop, Nathan Souder set sail on a nice run of his own covering 38 yards and the final score of the game to give the coyotes a 47-0 victory.

Defensively Proulx had 8 tackles and an interception. Souder had 5 tackles and a fumble recovery. Torres had 8 tackles, Diego had 4 tackles and a fumble recovery. Morgan had 4 tackles and a pass break up. Steven Carrillo had 6 tackles, Braxton coor had 4 tackles. Thomas Nix had 2 tackles, Braxton Barnes had 3 tackles Dylan Murphy had a tackle and a pass break up and Josh Murphy had a tackle.

The JV will next play host to New Home, thank you all for traveling to Rankin and enduring the delay. Congrats guys, good luck this week.

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Emergency Tips

You never know the state of mind you will be in when faced with an emergency, oftentimes you forget all important numbers or people to call. You can use this tip for quick and easy access to crucial information. Emergency lists ought to be handy wherever you find yourself, at home or on the go. Include family telephone and cellular numbers, pediatrician and dentist information, poison control, nearest hospital, nearest drugstore, family friend, babysitters, baby's allergies, blood type, etc. Make several copies of the emergency list, and reduce a few to wallet size. If possible, laminate all lists, and keep by the refrigerator and telephone and in wallets, even in the glove compartment of your car.

ICE (In Case of Emergency) numbers in your cell phone. This is helpful if you are unconscious or unable to communicate to someone whom to contact, they can look in your phone for ICE and call your emergency contact.

There are numerous resources out there. Texas Extension Disaster Education Network has numerous resources available (<http://texashelp.tamu.edu/>). The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) (<http://ready.gov/kids>) also has some great tools for helping our youth prepare for an emergency. We never know when one will happen and we should be prepared no matter how small the emergency is.

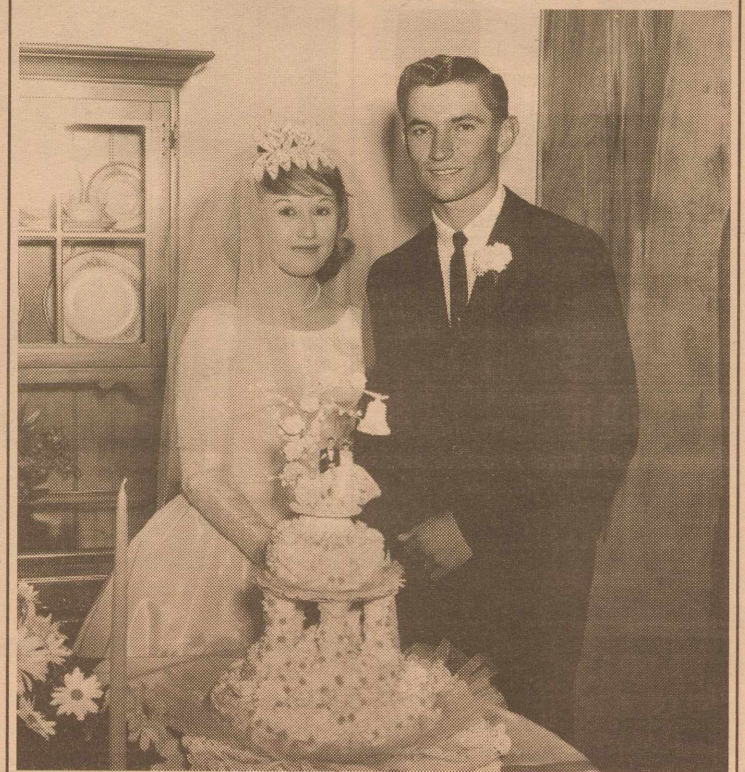
Telchik's Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Gail FFA to Compete Nationally in Career Development Event

The Gail FFA chapter recently was selected to compete for national recognition in an FFA Career Development Event at October's 87th National FFA Convention and Expo.

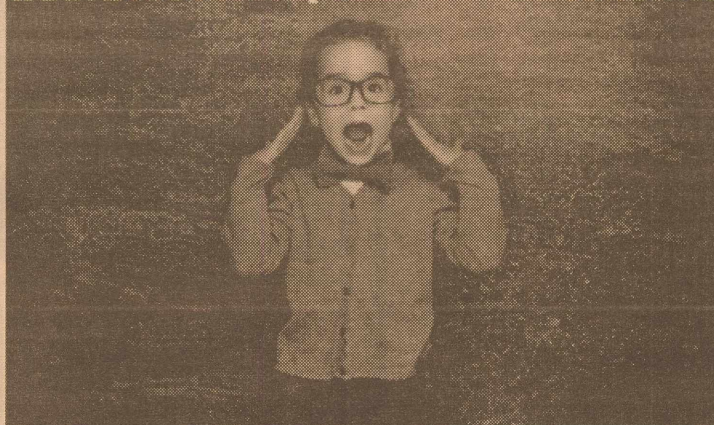
The Borden FFA Chapter will send members to Louisville, Ky., as they vie for national honors in the area of Extemporaneous Public Speaking. National support for the Extemporaneous Public Speaking CDE is provided by American Farm Bureau Federation. FFA members who will represent the chapter in the event include Zach McMeans. The chapter advisor is Kaylee Farquhar.

Extemporaneous public speaking is one of 24 national

CDE areas, covering job skills in everything from communications to mechanics. Individuals are given 30 minutes to prepare a four to six minute speech covering one of 12 agriculture-related topics. Judges evaluate speaking, presentation, content and ability to answer questions pertaining to the topic covered in the speech. Finalists are selected based on speech delivery, content and responses to the questions. National participants will advance through preliminary and semifinal rounds, with the top four speakers competing in the final round of the national event. CDE's help students develop the abilities to think critically communicate clearly and perform effectively in a competitive job market.

The National FFA Organization provides leadership, personal growth and career success training through agricultural education to 579,678 student members in grades seven through 12 who belong to one of 7,570 local FFA chapters throughout the U.S., Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Constitutional Amendments
Special Election November 4, 2014

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1) appear on the ballot as follows:
SJR 1 would authorize the transfer of certain money from the general revenue fund to the state highway fund and the economic stabilization fund. Money transferred to the state highway fund may be used solely for the construction, maintenance and acquisition of rights-of-way for public roadways.

"The constitutional amendment providing for the use and dedication of certain money transferred to the state highway fund to assist in the completion of transportation construction, maintenance, and rehabilitation projects, not to include toll roads."

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
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Borden Pups Open Season With Victory Over Red Devils

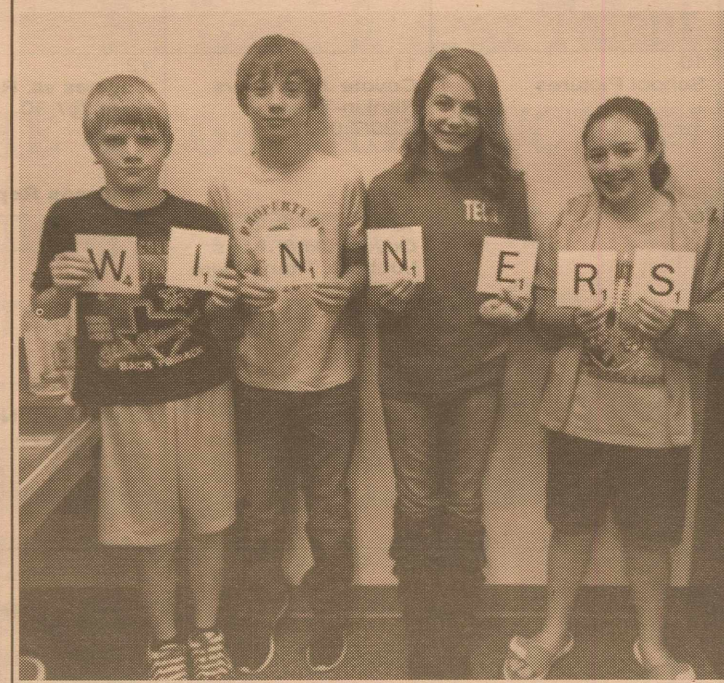
the game at 37-7.

In Show B, he placed 4th and 5th.

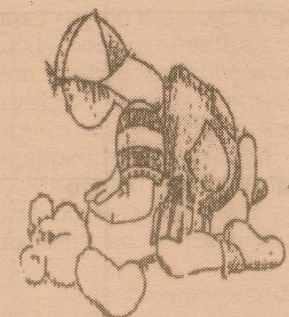
He was also one of two Junior showman to get called back for showmanship in a group of multi ages.
