Coyotes Get Big District Opener Win Over Wildcats

The Borden County football team traveled to Grady to take on the always tough Wildcats in the district opener for both teams. Billed as the teams to beat entering the 2014 season, this game was expected to be a battle and it did not disappoint. The Coyotes got off to a great start, and then had a little lull toward the end of the 2nd and 3rd quarters only to come on strong and finish out a very hard fought contest and ultimately come away with the most important part of the evenings contest, a district victory and a 1-0 record. Although this may not have been the Coyotes best game of the 2014 season it ended just as it needed with the Coyotes on top 52 to 24 and a foot in the door of a return trip to the play-offs and ultimately a win away from possibly garnering their 7th straight district championship if things fall into place in week two of the district race.

Borden County came out and put a quick stop to the Wildcats first drive of the contest as defensive starters, linebacker Frank Banman, ends Sean Tucker and Trace Richey, corners Korbin Martinez and Jayton Lewis and safety Hunter Jones forced a quick 3-

out. In fact, this group would come one play away from pitching a shut-out in the first half. After a nice punt pinned the Coyotes deep in their own territory, they used a rare multi-play drive to come away with points as a 6 play drive culminated with Hunter Jones connecting with Trace Richey on a 40 yard scoring strike to give Borden County a 6-0 lead with 6:33 left in the quarter. The group of snapper Tucker to Mason Coor and kick by Riley Herridge added the point after kick to give the Coyotes the early 8-0 lead, a lead they would not relinquish all evening long.

On the next defensive series a 4th down tackle in the backfield by Banman and Richey gave the Coyotes the ball in Wildcat territory. The quick strike attack by the visiting team scored in one play as Jones connected with his favorite target on the season Frank Banman with 30 yard scoring pass and with the Herridge kick a quick 16-0 lead with 4:00 minutes left in the first quarter. The Wildcats got a great return on the ensuing kick-off and set up shop at the

Coyote 18 yard line to start their next drive. The Wildcats were employing the offensive philosophy to take as much time off the clock before each snap to shorten the game down and limit the touches for the Borden County offense, and ultimately although they did not have much offensive success, I believe it lulled the Coyotes to sleep a bit offensively and forced them into some mistakes they have not made all season long. The Coyote defense however did not fall asleep and even though the Wildcats had a great return, the defense stiffened and forced the ball over on downs. The Coyote offense took over and after a nice gain on their first offensive play they got a little greedy and had a deep pass intercepted trying to apply the knockout punch early. This time after the turnover, the home town Wildcats managed a little success before the Coyotes stiffened and as the 2nd quarter got under way, their defense held the Wildcats out of the endzone. The quick strike Coyote offense appeared again and on their second play with a 68 yard Corbin Sumners run, behind the blocking of Tucker, Herridge, Banman, Richey and Jones, the Coyotes had a 22-0 lead 6:30 left in the second quarter.

On the next offensive play for the Wildcats the Coyote defense had their one bad play of the half as the Wildcat runner broke several tackles on his way to the endzone and a touchdown for the home team to cut the Coyote lead to 22-8. Borden County struggled a bit on their next drive getting hit with a penalty to set them back and a bad snap that forced a busted play. They were unable to get a first down deep in Wildcat territory and turned the ball over to Grady on downs. The Coyotes would get one more offensive possession in the half. On their first play, as was the theme of the evening for the Coyotes, a pass just narrowly missed an open receiver for what potentially could have been a touchdown just before the half ended, but

on the last play of the half a potentially momentum changing play was stopped as an interception return looked like it would be a sure score but Corbin Sumners hustled back and pushed the Wildcat defender out at the 2 yard line. This would end the half with the Coyotes producing their low point total for the half with a 22-8 lead.

The Coyotes came out in the second half and quickly responded as another quick strike with a two play drive that was culminated by a 42 yard Sumners run. On this run Borden County got good blocks by Cayden Vaughn, Banman, Ricky Torres, and Jones. After the Herridge kick the Coyotes had a 30-8 lead. The Wildcats found some success in the 3rd quarter offensively as they just began to pound at the Borden County defense and were able to use their time consuming drives to come away with some points in the third quarter as they answered the Coyote touchdown with one of their own cutting

the Coyote lead to 30 to 16 with 5:44 left in the 3rd. The Coyote offense would respond, as Mason Coor managed to get a huge first down to keep the drive alive. Then a few plays later Sumners hit Tucker with a 28 yard scoring strike to give the Coyotes a 36 to 16 lead with 2:55 left in the quarter. The Coyote defense saw Richey and Banman leave with cramps in their legs and with a shuffled defensive front the Wildcats took advantage and answered the Coyotes again to cut the lead to 36-24.

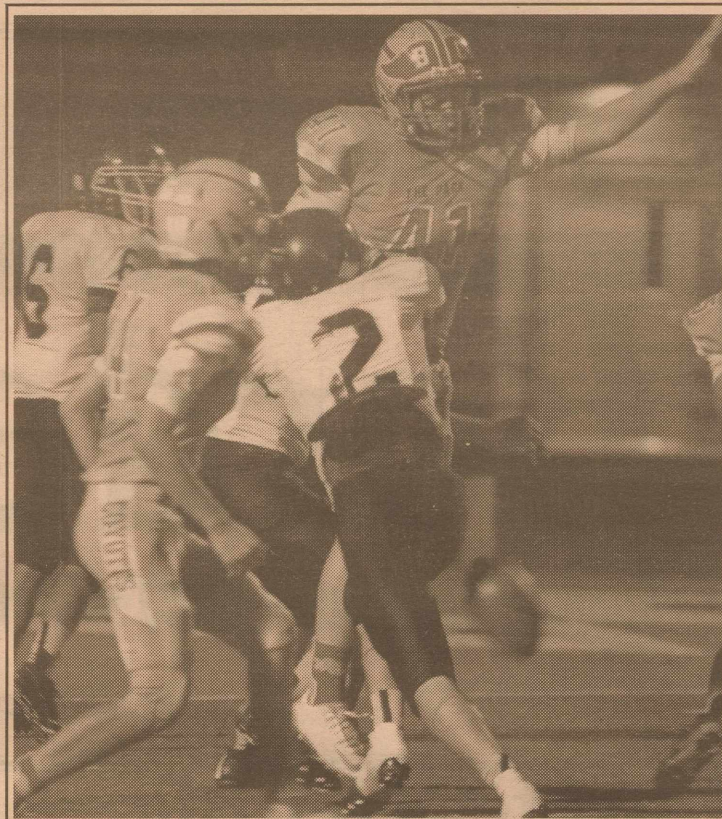
On the first play of the 4th quarter the Coyote offense came up just short of answering as Tucker was tackled inside the one yard line, turning the ball over to the home team. The Wildcats fed off of the momentum and started marching down the field. The defense seemed to be struggling a little physically as most of these young men play both sides of the ball. As the Wildcats got past mid-field the Coyotes put

Pups Punish the Wildcats in District Opener

The Borden County Pups pounded the visiting Grady Wildcats in the district opener of the 2014 season. Coming in with a spotless 5-0 record the Pups were hoping to continue their winning ways in phase two of the season. Their first defense, which has been dominating all year long, again was very dominating as they only gave up one first down for their entire time in the contest. This group consists of defensive ends Ben Justice and Will Yarbrow, linebacker Payton Merket, corners Riley Lewis and JW Nix and safety Lukas Grantham. While this group was getting multiple 3 and outs on defense, the Pups offense then held up to their end of the deal by taking these defensive stops and then translating them into points on the offensive side. The first Pups score from the first team offense of center Jeremy Souder, guard Will Yarbrow, end JW Nix, fullback Riley Lewis, quarter back and

running back alternators Ben Justice and Payton Merket, came from the feet of Justice as he rumbled, twisted and turned his way to the endzone from 13 yards out and a quick 6-0 lead with 3:01 left in the first quarter.

After another defensive stop Borden County got another ground touchdown as Payton Merket got in from 5 yards out. The second team offense then took to the field in their attempt to add the point after but came up short. This group consists of center Olivia Reyes, Guard Junior Gray, Ends Jason Robinson and Ryan Rathbun, fullback Colbin Briley, quarterback Jake Avey and Tailback Lukas Grantham. Anthony Lopez missed another game due to a knee injury.

The Pups defense got another stop and moments later Big Ben Justice had another touchdown with a very impres-

Borden County JV Wallops the Wildcats

The Borden County JV got off to a slow start in their district opener as the visiting Wildcats managed to score on a long pass just moments into the game. That would be the only lead the visitors would enjoy in this contest as the Coyotes then reeled off 38 unanswered points to take complete control of this contest. Borden County would get 3 scores in each of the first two quarters, with the first score coming from Brian Torres as he sprinted 32 yards to pay dirt to tie the game at 6 all. Having had success on their first series the visitors thought they would go to the air again, but this time Nick Proulx was Johnny on the spot as he picked off a pass and then made a sweet return to make the visitors pay for the errant pass. He reached pay dirt from 33 yards out to give the home team what would be the lead they would never surrender at 12-6. The Coyotes trying to kick for the extra point on their first four attempts were unsuccessful. On the Coyotes next defensive series the Wildcats did not learn their lesson as Thomas Nix playing in place of Dylan Murphy got another interception for the Coyote defense and moments later Brian Torres had another score for Borden County to extend the Coyotes lead to 18-6 with 2:16 left in the first quarter.

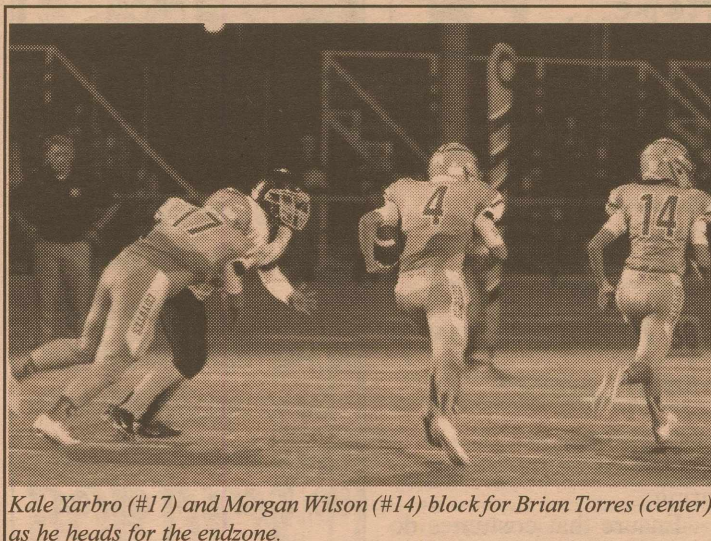
The Coyote defensive front that dominated the entire first half of this contest forced the visitors to punt as they abandoned the passing game after a pair of interceptions. The Wildcats had no success on the ground as the group of Steven Carrillo, Diego Bernal, Kale Yarbrow, Braxton Barnes and Braxton Coor completely dominated the trenches while corners Morgan Wilson, Nick

Proulx and Nathan Souder along with safety Thomas Nix took care of the air attack and the perimeter. This group of Coyotes did not allow anymore points in the first half for the visiting Wildcats. After another defensive stop, Torres again took to the ground for the Coyote offense sprinting 60 yards to the endzone and extended the Borden County lead to 24 to 6.

After another defensive stop, Nick Proulx made a long touchdown run and then on the extra point Proulx connected with Braxton Coor to extend their lead to 31-6 with 3:04 left in the half. Borden County would get the ball back and again the dominating ground game with the Coyote line dominating up front continued to pound away at the Wildcats. This blocking group included Braxton Coor, Diego Bernal, Nathan Souder, Steven Carrillo, Kale Yarbrow all on the line and Morgan Wilson at the quarterback position. Brian Torres again sprinted into the endzone to give the Coyotes a commanding lead and with the conversion pass from Proulx to Coor the home team had a commanding 38-6 halftime lead.

The Wildcats came out in the second half with a different mindset and they came right at the Coyotes. They had some success on the ground as they produced 22 points in the second half to make sure this contest which appeared to be headed to the mercy rule. They made sure it went the distance. After the visitors got their first score of the half, Proulx answered for the Coyotes on a long run. On the end of his run Nick was dinged up a bit and would eventually have to leave

in Sumners at a corner, Colby Pennell at an end and Ryan Wilborn at the other end and moved Richey to linebacker. The fresher Coyotes seemed to give the defense a little lift that was needed. As a result the defense held the Wildcats out of the endzone, not only on this drive, but the next three as well. Then the offense began to take command as the defensive change allowed the line of Banman, Tucker, and Herridge to be well rested and with this they took the line of scrimmage over and as a result the coyotes scored the last two touchdowns of the game on one play drives, the first a 60 yard run by Corbin Sumners that was followed by another Herridge kick to increase the Coyote lead to 44 to 24 and then following another defensive stop, this time a fumble recovery on 4th down by Willborn, Sumners sprinted 34 yards untouched to seal the victory. Herridge capped it off with the extra point kick and a commanding 52 to 24 lead. The Coyote defense got another stop and then they were able to run the clock out to cap off a tough district opener but more importantly send the Coyotes home with a 1-0 record and tied with Klondike at the top of the district race. The coyotes will have now face those 1-0 Cougars again on the road with the hopes of grabbing another district championship in the process.

Leading the way statistically for the Coyotes was Corbin Sumners with 339 yards rushing on 18 carries and 4 scores and was 2 of 4 passing for 66 yards and a score and a reception for 33 yards while being in on 5 tack-

les. Hunter Jones was 4 of 11 passing for 123 yards and 2 scores and 2 interceptions, had 2 carries for 38 yards and was in on 14 tackles and 2 passes broken up. Frank Banman had a touchdown reception of 30 yards and was in on 15 tackles with 2 tackles for loss. Mason Coor had 5 carries for 14 yards and was in on 2 tackles. Ryan Willborn was in on 11 tackles and had a fumble recovery and had 2 carries for 4 yards. Noah Morales was in on 3 tackles and had some nice blocks. Cayden Vaughn was in on a tackle and had some big blocks offensively. Trace Richey had two catches for 60 yards and a score and was in on 18 tackles with 2 tackles for loss. Jayton Lewis was in on 12 tackles. Ricky Torres was in on a tackle and had some big blocks offensively. Korbin Martinez had 3 passes broken up and was in on 7 tackles. Sean Tucker had a touchdown catch of 28 yards and was in on 11 tackles. Colby Pennell was in on 8 tackles. Riley Herridge had a catch for 38 yards and was 5 of 7 on extra points and had 4 touchbacks kicking the ball. Nathan Ham who has been out since Rankin looks to return next week against Klondike.

What a great victory guys, the mark of a great team is winning when you do not play your best game and that is just what this team did Friday. Thank you all for your support for these young men, thank you for making the trip to Grady, please come out and support the Coyotes as they hope to improve to 2-0 and accomplish goal #1. Good luck guys, prepare like champions!!! Big week!!!

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Halloween Safety for Pedestrians, Bicyclists and Motorists

Halloween means children getting outdoors to enjoy treats, fun, and games. Although Halloween comes before the change back to Standard Time this year, the days are getting shorter, and the nights are getting longer. With shorter days comes more night driving. Because nighttime driving is more dangerous, it requires extra attention from motorists, as well as pedestrians and bicyclists.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that nearly two-thirds of all fatal pedestrian crashes and almost one-fourth of fatal bicycle crashes occur in low-light or dark conditions. According to Safe Kids, on average, children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a car and killed on Halloween than on any other day of the year.

Keep the following safety tips in mind during Halloween and all year long.

Tips for Motorists

- Slow down. Watch for children walking on roads, medians, and curbs. Enter and exit driveways carefully.

- Be especially alert for children darting out from between parked vehicles and from behind bushes and shrubs. They're excited - and they are not paying attention.

- Never drink and drive - tonight or any night. If you are partying, designate a driver.

Tips for Parents

- Adults should accompany children at all times and supervise their "trick or treat" activities.

- Teach children to "stop, look left-right-left, and listen" before they cross the street.

- Use a flashlight, and wear retro-reflective strips or patches on your clothing or costume to be more visible to motorists.

- Be certain that the mask

does not obstruct vision or hearing.

- Ensure that costumes do not impede walking or driving ability.

Tips for Pedestrians (children and adults)

- Before crossing a street, stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left, right, and left again to be sure no cars are coming. Continue to check for traffic while on the street.

- Walk - never run - from house to house or across the road.

- Cross the street only at intersections and crosswalks.

- When crossing at an intersection with a traffic light, be sure to watch for turning cars. Obey all pedestrian signals.

- Walk on sidewalks whenever possible. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the street facing traffic.

By taking some extra time to make sure drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists obey the rules, Halloween can be a safe time for all.

sive spinning and twisting run after a short pass from Merket from 33 yards out. The extra point kick for the first time this season was kicked by Merket and with 4:51 left in the 2nd quarter the home team had a commanding 20-0 lead. Another defensive stop gave the Pups the ball back moments later and Payton Merket made the visiting Wildcats pay as he rumbled 27 yards for the Pups score. The second team of offense got another opportunity and this time made good on their chance as Grantham made a great move off of an Avey block to reach the endzone. This extended the Pups lead to 27-0 with 2:52 left in the half.

Borden County got the ball to start the second half and they wasted very little time as Merket again found paydirt, this time from 30 yards out to extend the comfortable lead to 33-0.
