





ite task. However, it's even of mildew may be a better somore difficult when stains won't come out in the wash. What should you do? We recommend that you start by making sure damp or wet clothes are not placed in the laundry basket and left for several


days. Warmer temperatures, higher humidity, and any remaining food on clothingespecially kids' clothes—cre-ates the perfect conditions for the growth of mildew. Mildew is a fungus and appears as dark-colored spots and splotches on textile items. When the textile is left in a warm, humid location with little or no light or air circulation, you have created the perfect condition for very difficult to remove mildew.

Prevention is the key. Experts at the International Fabricare Institute suggest drying any wet textiles before placing them in the laundry and certainly not storing them dirty. Some typical items might include infants' and children's clothing, sports wear, jackets, t-shirts, kitchen textiles, towels, and other common items. Avoid tossing damp clothing in a dark laundry hamper or closet. If you can't get to the laundry immediately, hang the item in an area with good air circulation until the item is dry. Or wash the item as soon as possible, treating the soiled area with a pre-wash enzyme product.

What removes mildew? Actually, only chlorine bleach removes and kills mildew growth and stains. Since not all fabrics are safely treated with





Step One

Pass a vehicle inspection and retain the vehicle inspection report (VIR) issued to you by the station.

Step Two

Renew your annual registration by mail, online, or in person, and your inspection status will be verified electronically. A passing inspection is required for registration.

Two Step Tips

Single Expiration Date: Transitioning to "Two Steps, One Sticker" requires every vehicle's inspection and registration dates to expire at the same time. In order to do this, during the first year you may register your vehicle as long as your vehicle inspection is valid the day you register. However, if your inspection and registration stickers are already aligned and both expire in the same month, your vehicle will need to pass inspection prior to registration renewal.

90 Days to Inspect: Beginning March 1, 2016, you will have a convenient 90-day window to complete the Two Steps. In order to register on time, you must have your vehicle inspected within 90 days before your sticker expires.

Inspection Verification: If your vehicle passed inspection but the system is unable to electronically verify it, simply present your passing vehicle inspection report (VIR), and you will be able to register.

Inspection Fees: The inspection fees have not changed but where you pay them has. You will now pay the inspection station its portion of the fee at the time of inspection and the state's portion of the fee will now be collected at the time of registration.

Part Time Radio Fun

Dr. Jim Bush recently retired from his job as chaplain at an assisted living facility for adults at Carlsbad, just north of San Angelo. He says he's not sure if he is kin to the Bush presidents.

"If I am related to Uncle George, he was born on the side of the family whose children were born with silver spoons in their mouths. I've always had my foot in my mouth."

His great-grandparents had eighteen children. Sixteen of them were boys.

"I know my grandfather and two of his brothers. That means there are thirteen branches of the Bush family in Texas that I know absolutely nothing about."

Years ago he worked as a part-time disc jockey at a radio station in Clayton, New Mexico. "That's as far northeast in New Mexico as you can go. Step across one state line and you're in Colorado and cross another and you're in Teas. And there's a little bit in there where you can step across into Oklahoma.

"The station was KLMX, Crossroads Country for northeastern New Mexico. Occasionally I would feature a country western group on my show. This one particular night, I was featuring the group Alabama when they just happened to be driving through in their bus from a concert in Denver on their way to a concert in Amarillo. That group of musicians heard me playing their songs and found out where the station was. They stopped in and I got to interview the whole band live on the air."

Jim was a single father with ts@tumbleweedsmith.com

a teenage daughter. He was a schoolteacher during the day. But that wouldn't pay all the bills. So occasionally he worked as a night clerk at a Clayton motel.

"George Strait owned a ranch near Eagles Nest, New Mexico and he had been visiting that ranch. He was on his way back home when it started to snow in Clayton. When it snows in Clayton, New Mexico there's nothing to stop the wind. We've had whiteout conditions many times. Any-way, the doorbell rang and I went to answer it. There was George Strait. He looked at me and said 'if I stay here tonight, are you going to call all your friends?' I said, who are you? He kinda grinned and said 'you know who I am.' said Mr. Strait, I would not call anybody and tell them that you are here. So he rented one entire wing of rooms at the motel and stayed there that night. He would come through and stay with us quite often when he was going home from the ranch. Somehow he heard about my radio career and when he was doing a concert in Amarillo he asked if I could come and introduce him, which I did. It was quite an exciting thing for me to get to share the stage with George Strait.

I told Jim, who is nearly bald, that both those incidents with well known performers were quite unusual and wonderful for him. He replied, "I would trade them for hair."
