

# **Borden County ISD Receives Top State** Accountability Rating

On August 7th, the Texas Education Agency released school accountability ratings for the 2014-2015 school year for more than 8600 campuses, and 1200 school districts and

charter schools in Texas. For 2014-2015, the Borden County School received a rating of "Met Standard" and re-ceived a "Designation Distinction" in all 7 of the possible academic measures in the evaluation system.

School districts were rated on a variety of criteria, some new for the 2014-2015 school year. The following is a brief description taken from the TEA press release: "The 2015 ratings are based on a system that uses a range of indicators to provide greater the state. The performance index framework includes four

· Student Achievement – Provides a snapshot of performance across all subjects

· Student Progress - Measures year-to-year student progress by subject and student

Closing Performance Gaps – Emphasizes the academic achievement of economically disadvantaged students and the lowest perform-

- Emphasizes the importance of earning a high school diploma that provides students detail about the performance of with the foundation necessary

a district or charter and indi- for success in college, the vidual campuses throughout workforce, job training programs or the military'

All campuses and districts received a rating of either "Met Standard," "Met Alternative Standard," or "Improvement Required."

In addition to the rating, districts and campuses could earn the afore-mentioned "Distinction Designations" for exemplary performance in a number of areas. Those areas include "Academic Achieve-ment in Reading/ELA," "Aca-demic Achievement in Mathing racial/ethnic student ematics," "Academic Achievegroups ment in Science," "Academic

Postsecondary Readiness Achievement in Social Studies," "Top 25 Percent Student Progress," "Top 25 Percent Closing Performance Gaps," and "Postsecondary Readi-ness". These are measured in relation to campus groups comprised of similar student composition. According to the TEA press release "In 2015, 4,388 campuses that achieved the "Met Standard" rating earned some type of distinction designation. However, only 153 high schools, middle

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# Borden County 2015-2016 Borden Co. **School Dress Code**

The Borden County School's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with

the following:
Borden County's students shall be dressed and groomed in a manner that is clean and neat and that will not be a health and safety hazard to themselves or others. Clothing and grooming that in the principal's judgment may reasonably be expected to cause disruption of or interference with normal school operation is prohibited.

The Borden County School prohibits pictures, emblems, or writing on clothing that

1. Is lewd, offensive, vulgar, or contains obscene lan-

guage
2. Advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited by the school

3. Refers to satanic, cult, prison wear or gang activities

The following guidelines will be used to determine appropriate dress:

1. Dresses, skirts, split skirts and shorts should not be shorter than two inches above the knee. A student will lose the privilege of wearing shorts for the school year upon a third offense. Parents will be notified when the second offense occurs. Shorts must be tailored (hemmed with no frayed edges). No spandex biker shorts or wind shorts are allowed (loose-legged, athletic running shorts) and shorts shall

not be too tight. 2. Wearing of oversized or baggy pants and/or jeans is prohibited at school or at any school-sponsored activity on or off campus. No "saggin, baggin, or draggin." Pants must be an appropriate length and not drag the floor. Boys' pants will be worn at the waist and properly fit the waistline. No excessively wide legged or para-military attire will be braids. allowed. No chains will be allowed on school property or at school sponsored functions.

3. Shirts and blouses must

be buttoned appropriately with midriff and back covered at all times. (Tops must be long enough that skin does not show when arms are lifted.) Clothing shall be designed, constructed, and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or indecent, and that shall promote proper decorum. The opening on any type of shirt shall not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar of a dress shirt.

Tank tops and "see-through chiffon blouses" will not be allowed unless they are worn with a crew neck T-shirt underneath it or a shirt worn over them during all school hours and activities. Tailored shirt shirttails must be tucked in unless you have a crew T-shirt underneath the shirt. (All tailored shirts will be buttoned and tucked into the pants or skirt when representing Borden County in any extracurricular activity.)

Sleeveless blouses are permissible but must be in good taste. Appropriate undergarments must be worn and must not be exposed at any time.

4. Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. House shoes are not acceptable footwear. No metal cleats or plates on the soles of shoes shall be worn in the building.

5. Hair shall be clean and well groomed at all times while attending school, school functions, and school sponsored activities. It will be styled in a manner that will keep it out of the student's eyes and not obstruct one's vision. No unnatural or bizarre hair colors or haircuts will be permitted. Eyebrows must not be notched or shaved in an unnatural manner. Students are to be cleanshaven at all times. Mustaches and beards are not allowed. Sideburns shall not be worn lower than the bottom of the ear lobe and no wider than one inch at the base

6. Boys will not wear piercing jewelry. Girls may not wear exposed piercing jewelry other than earrings. No tongue piercing will be allowed for boys or

7. Sunglasses may not be worn in the building during school hours or events inside the building unless prescribed

8. Students may not wear hats, caps, bandanas, or hoods inside the building during the school day unless approved by the school administration. In addition, they may not wear such headwear when participating in basketball games, whether actively participating or sitting on the bench.

9. Any clothing or grooming not listed above that is determined by the school administration to pose a disruption, interference, or safety concern to the normal school operation or Borden County School Community will be prohibited and addressed as appropriate.

10. Students may not wear gloves or arm sleeves in the

school building.
A student who violates the dress code shall be given an opportunity to correct the problem at school. If not corrected, the student shall be assigned to in school suspension either for the remainder of the day or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school. Repeat offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action. The principal, in cooperation with the sponsor, coach, or other person in charge of an extracurricular activity, may regulate the dress and grooming of students who participate in the activity (for example: cheerleader uniforms lar. 

And, most imporists will be sharing the roads with school buses, pedestrians, bicycle riders, and lots of new teen drivers taking their first car to school. According to the National Safety Council, teen car crashes spike in September when they are driving to and from school. Drivers young and old need to be vigilant because child pedestrians can be very unpredictable. They're easily distracted and can often run into traffic or out from behind parked cars. Looking out for children rather than expecting them to look out for us is our best defense as drivers.

Distracted driving is always dangerous, but it is especially dangerous in and around school zones. According to the Texas Department of Transportation, crashes in school zones are most commonly due to driver inattention, failure to control speed, and failure to yield the right-of-way at stop signs. As responsible drivers, we need to put down the phone and pay attention in school zones. In fact, it is illegal to use a cell phone in a school zone.

Whether your oldest is just starting kindergarten or taking that first trip to school in his or her own car, parents can play an important role in keeping their children safe. For young children, make sure they know the rules about school bus safety when it comes to boarding and getting off the bus. If you are transporting children to school, remember that children under 13 should always ride in the back seat in a car seat (including a booster) or seat belt depending on whether they fit properly in the seat belt. Teen drivers and their parents should be aware of the Texas Graduated Driver License Law and the restrictions it puts in place, Remember, texting or more information on including no cell phone use at listening to mobile devices can school driving safety.




