

WE NEED NO ETHICAL ELITE

Not long ago the Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court came up with what was hailed in some quarters as a great new philosophical concept but which, on closer examination, really had a rather hollow sound. He would like to see a new profession established — counselors in ethics, a body of experts to tell us what is right and what is wrong in those fields and relationships not covered by law.

### Contrast Pure and Simple

In primitive times, as Justice Earl Warren correctly pointed out, all conduct was dictated by law — really by the ruling despot. He might have added that this is also the case in communist societies. But then as we grew more civilized there arose that which the Justice called "the law beyond the law." Actually, of course, these are the concepts based in our Christian-Judaic heritage — in the moral, ethical and spiritual beliefs and traditions that distinguish Western civilization and its inhabitants from primitive and savage societies. They comprise a code of conduct outside the laws and regulations of political bodies and give us standards of loyalty, friendship, honesty, kindness and charity, all of which were unknown to primitive man.

Justice Warren admitted that law cannot operate without ethics, but that statutes cannot govern all personal conduct, which is certainly true if men are to remain free. However, he sees a breakdown in our ethical standards or at least in areas where we no longer seem able to distinguish between right and where we no longer seem able to establish this new profession of his in which a sort of elite of guidance experts would instruct the rest of us dumb boons in what is right and what is wrong.

### Court vs Responsible Liberty

A good argument can be made for the contention that there has been a breakdown, or a watering down, of our ethical standards. Justice Warren also admitted that the moral and ethical concepts he fears we are losing have been "transmitted from generation to generation in the family, in the school, in the great religious traditions and philosophy of the world." They certainly have, and so long as they continue to be so transmitted we don't need any professional guidance directors to spell them out for us. But how can they go on being transmitted when the Court which Justice Warren heads will not allow a simple, non-denominational prayer to be recited in our schools? Did not the Warren Court add greatly to the ethical breakdown when it arrogated to itself legislative powers it does not possess and attempted by "law" to force upon all of us its own notions of non-discrimination? Was not the Court, entirely aside from its unconstitutional act, performing in the same manner as the primitive dictators whom the Justice decries when it told us how and in what way and with whom our children should attend school?

Again, the greatest modern enemy of our ethical concepts is the communist conspiracy, which has no such standards of its own as we understand them and which is sworn to eradicate from the world civilized man's belief in a Supreme Being and those moral precepts of God and His Son which we use as our ethical guides, no matter how much and how often we fall in honoring them. Yet there came before Justice Warren's Court 39 cases involving this communist conspiracy and according to a compilation by Senator Eastland, Justice Warren cast his vote in favor of the communist position in 36 of those 39 cases.

### Judge Not ...

If it has not become unconstitutional for a Supreme Court Justice to refer to the greatest guide to moral, ethical and spiritual conduct, perhaps Justice Warren should glance at Chapter 7, Verse 3 of the Book of Matthew; "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye?"

## Publication Date Changes With This Issue of The News

We will appreciate your cooperation in observing the deadlines.

## ALIENS MUST REGISTER IN JAN.

Mr. J. W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration Office during the month of January.

Mr. J. W. Holland said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

## WCID Annual Election To Be Held Tuesday

The annual election of directors for the Coleman County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, will be held Tuesday, January 8, at the Tricham Community House. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. Bond Featherston will be the election judge.

The terms of Rankin McIver, Wiley P. McClatchey and Casey Herring expire this year. All three are seeking re-election and their names are the only ones printed on the ballots. Places are on the ballots for anyone voting to write in other names if they so desire.

E. R. Cupps is president of the water district. Bill Vaughn is secretary. All qualified voters living in the district are urged to go cast your ballot during the day. The area is bounded generally by the county line on the east to the Buffalo Community, then southwest to the east edge of Santa Anna, south to Whon and then east to the southeast corner of the county.

Directors are elected for a two year term.

## Postage Rates To Increase January 7th

Postage on just about everything handled by the U. S. Mail will increase considerably effective Monday, January 7th. First, second, third and fourth class matter, as well as air mail, are affected by the increase.

Postage on first class matter will increase 25 percent. Second, third and fourth class matter will increase in various categories, upward to about 33 percent.

First class postage will be 5 cents per ounce or part thereof; air mail postage will be 8 cents per ounce; regular postal cards will be four cents each and air mail postal cards will be 6 cents. Drop letters, mail which does not leave the post office of entry, will be four cents.

The new five-cent stamp bears the likeness of George Washington and is printed in light blue with a light background. The stamp returns to the classic style, as Washington's likeness is derived from the bust sculptured in 1785 by the French artist, Jean Houdon. Washington considers this the best of all depictions of the Father of Our Country.

# State Capital NEWS

Austin — House Textbook Investigating Committee ended its work on a sour note.

"This has been a most disagreeable experience," was the "understatement" of Committee Chairman Bill Dungan of McKinney as he brought the gavel down on the committee's final session before the Legislature meets on January 8.

The five-man group is split five ways. As a result, they will file individual reports on the results of the committee's several stormy sessions.

In addition to Representative Dungan, the committee is composed of Representatives John Alaniz of San Antonio, Bob Bass of DeKalb, Nelson Cowles of Hallsville and Ronald Roberts of Hillsboro. They took months of testimony concerning the contents of textbooks used in public schools.

As the final session ended, members were accusing each other of attending or not attending the now-famous Dallas hearing — at which Ex-General Edwin A. Walker testified — "for political campaign reasons."

They did get harmonious long enough to decide to publish five individual reports, in alphabetical order, in one volume, and

not to include two petitions presented at the meeting.

However, these are the only points on which the committee arrived at a meeting of the minds.

Roberts and Alaniz both maintained that the present system of textbook selection in Texas is the best in the nation. Alaniz charged that textbook hearings have been "dominated by the ultra right and the John Birchers."

Chairman Dungan and Cowles have not publicized their views yet.

Paul C. Vogler Jr. of Corpus Christi was one of the petitioners at the meeting. He urged continuation of textbook investigations.

Another petitioner, the Rev. William S. Arms of Austin, presented a "redress of grievance." Then he announced his intention to add 20,000 signatures to it at the upcoming Baptist convention in Fort Worth.

### TICKET TAX MAY END

Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy, headed by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, added two more recommendations to the long list of proposals it will submit to the 58th Legislature.

One was to repeal the admis-

sions tax, which brought in an annual \$553,000 from movie showings, operas, plays and other amusements before a recent court decision invalidated part of the proceeds.

Parkhouse said, "It seems obvious that the admissions tax as now drafted is a failure."

Also recommended was creation by the Legislature of a permanent tax study commission, to be aided by the Texas Research League, and financed with a maximum annual operation fund of \$5,000. The research league is a non-profit organization.

### FAREWELL BUDGET

Outgoing Gov. Price Daniel has proposed the largest budget in the state's history, for legislative consideration. He says the budget can be met without new taxes.

Daniel recommends spending \$3,100,000,000. That is \$347,000,000 more than the present appropriation.

His budget incorporates recommendations for salary increases in many state departments. State highway patrolmen would be among those getting raises under Daniel's plan. He suggested a starting salary of \$6,000 a year — \$1,000 more than they get now. He decried the present policy of paying them on the same scale as city lawmen.

Daniel said, "These men frequently work around the clock and you can't expect such devotion from men who are paid on a 40-hour-a-week basis."

He also asked the 58th Legis-

ture to boost salaries of state-employed physicians; juvenile parole officers; employees of the Texas Water Commission and the Railroad Commission; and teachers in all levels of education, among others.

Basically, except for higher education, the Governor's budget proposes continued operations at present levels for all state agencies and services, plus necessary funds to meet additional demands due to population growth.

### COLLEGES UPGRADED

Daniel also urged upgrading of public junior colleges and state-supported universities, and recommended larger appropriations and 16 per cent teaching salary increases — two things college administrators have cried for a long time.

He proposed that the 34 public junior colleges be allotted \$16,000,000 for the 1964-65 school years. This is \$3,000,000 less than administrators requested, but \$1,500,000 more than the current appropriation. Much of this increase would be used to cover \$500 annual pay raises for teachers.

Daniel advocated \$15,200,000 to cover a 16 per cent increase in teacher's salaries; \$2,700,000 additional funds for research in the state's 20 state-supported senior colleges, and \$2,300,000 additional for libraries.

He based his proposals on the recommendation of the Commission on Higher Education that tuition be doubled to \$200 a school year. But he explained that 4,500 scholarships for \$100 a year would be available, "to keep young people in college."

### APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Daniel filled several vacancies on state boards and commissions, but said he would leave appointments on the University of Texas and Texas A&M boards to his successor, John Connally.

### PERSONAL INCOME CLIMBS

Texans entered the final two months of 1962 with their personal income up 4.6 percent over the first ten months of 1961.

This year, according to figures released in Austin by "Business Week," Texans' total personal income for the first ten months of 1962 was a whopping \$16,854,000,000.

Last year during a similar

period it totaled \$16,105,700,000.

### LAW PARTNERS

Leonard Passmore, chief assistant to Attorney General Will Wilson, has joined Wilson in the private practice of law in Austin.

Passmore has been Wilson's chief aide for the past three years.

Both Wilson and Passmore left office on January 1.

### PRISON PRODUCE

Texas' Department of Corrections did a whopping big job of farming in 1962.

Asst. Director Byron W. Frierson, who is in charge of the vast farming operation, reports that the Department either "sold for cash or consumed, utilized or stored for use, in lieu of purchased items," \$4,583,600 in farm products.

Cotton is the big cash crop on the prison system farms.

"Our 10,000 acres of cotton this year averaged better than

a bale per acre for a total value of \$2,100,000," says Frierson. "And our rice crops put \$35,000 into the state treasury with \$13,650 worth held for consumption."

Edible crops had a total value of \$708,287. Total value of cattle slaughtered was \$384,660.

More than 11,000 hogs were raised for pork.

Other farm products included eggs, milk, turkeys and chickens.

### \$1,000,000 SLANT

The Attorney General's office reports that over \$1,000,000 monthly oil allowable was cut off in the East Texas and Hawkins fields because of deviated-well discoveries.

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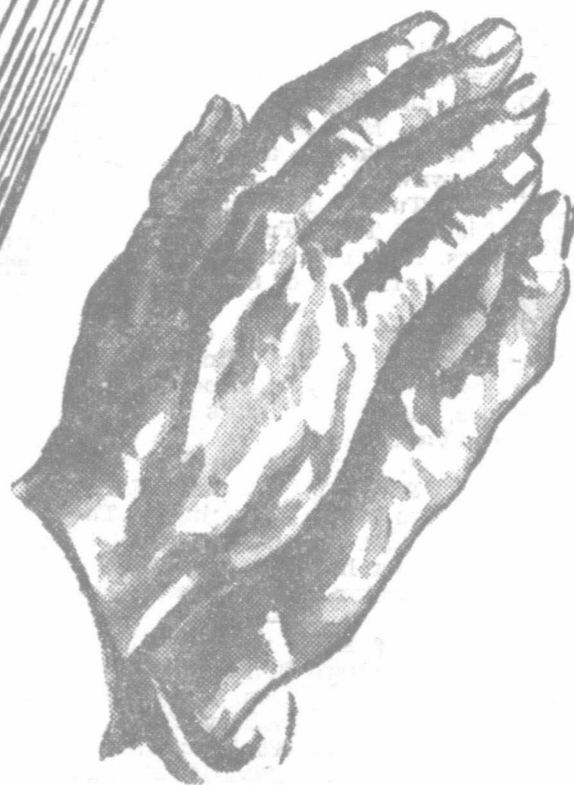

**Bids On Two N.W. Laterals To Be Opened Jan. 14**

Invitations for bids are being circulated for construction of floodwater retarding structure sites 18 and 19 in Northwest Laterals Watershed, according to the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District Supervisors. Bids for the construction job will be opened at 2:00 p. m. in the State Office of the Soil Conservation Service in Temple on January 14, 1963, according to T. G. Rockenbaugh, Work Unit Conservationist at Coleman.

Principal items involved in construction of the two floodwater retarding structures are placement of approximately 102,000 cubic yards of compacted earthfill material; 3,217 lb. of steel bar reinforcement in approximately 77 cubic yards of concrete and approximately 330 feet of 24" spun concrete pipe for construction of the principal spillways; salvaging and placing approximately 14,000 square yards of topsoil on the embankment and emergency spillways for establishing and growing grass; and construction of approximately 7,700 feet of net wire fence around the two dams and emergency spillways to protect vegetation from excessive grazing.

The contract is scheduled for completion within 133 calendar days from date of award and will be supervised from the F. P. Construction Office in Coleman with John P. Curtis as Project Construction Engineer, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist at Brownwood.

**Important Changes Noted In Income Tax Legislation**

College Station — During the last session of Congress important legislation relating to income tax payments was passed. Among the changes were depreciation and tax credit on certain types of assets used in farm and ranch operations as well as other businesses, reports C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist.

The investment credit provision is a tax credit of 7 percent, computed on the purchase or investment in depreciable, personal property during 1962 and thereafter. Livestock, including race horses, are excluded from the list of eligible items, Bates points out. The credit is given only for the tax-year in which the business asset is acquired and includes such items as tractors, combines, trucks, cotton harvesters and new fences, explains the specialist.

Here is an example of how the investment credit provision works. Assume a tractor is purchased in November 1962 for \$5,000 with no trade-in. The useful life of the asset determines the amount of tax credit allowed. If the tractor is set up on a life of 8 years, a full 7 percent of the purchase price or \$350 is credited on the tax due from the taxpayer for 1962 business operations. If the asset has a determined life of 5 years, only a third of this amount is allowed as a tax credit. Assets having a 6 or 7 year life entitle the purchaser to two-thirds of the \$350 tax credit, explains Bates.

Used equipment items get the tax credit, too, but are reported separate from new assets, says Bates. In case of 'trade-ins,' the portion of the purchase price eligible for tax credit is computed differently on new and used equipment.

Because this provision is new some taxpayers may overlook the requirement that the tax credit is compulsory on eligible assets. The basis or remaining cost for depreciation purposes must be reduced by the credit taken. If the taxpayer fails to take the credit for items purchased in 1962, he simply loses the amount involved and it cannot be recovered in future years, says Bates. All farmers are urged to get a copy of the 1963 Farmers Tax Guide at the office of county agents or Internal Revenue when it is available.

**Progress on S'worm Eradication Outlined**

Mission — Sterile screwworm flies are currently being dispersed in 73,000 square miles of Texas, 7,000 square miles of New Mexico and 10,000 square miles along the international border in Mexico. Last week, 77,576,450 flies were distributed, of which about half were males.

The flies are reared in a huge "fly factory" built near here with funds collected from individual livestock producers. They are sexually sterilized by being subjected to cobalt-60, a radioactive material, and are then dispersed by air-drop.

Program officials are already making plans to extend the barrier of sterile flies that will stretch along the international border from below Brownsville to the New Mexico-Arizona state line. If weather permits, officials expect the entire barrier to be in place by February 15, 1963. This barrier is designed to prevent native screwworm flies from entering areas where screwworms have already been eradicated. It is anticipated that nearly 50 million sterile flies per week will be needed for the barrier.

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**Of Interest To VETERANS Questions And Answers**

Q — I have moved and left forwarding address with the local post office. Will my GI insurance dividend due in January be forwarded?

A — Yes. Postal regulations now permit the forwarding of your dividend check.

Q — I understand a new law provides for GI Bill education and training for peacetime veterans. What should I do to find out if I am eligible to take advantage of this?

A — If you have a service-connected disability, you should register as soon as possible with your nearest Veterans Administration office for an appointment with a VA counselor. This is the required first step.

Q — I am a Korean Conflict veteran. How much longer do I have to apply for a GI home loan?

A — The minimum deadline for Korean Conflict veterans is January 31, 1965, and the maximum deadline is January 31, 1975. For all dates between the deadline is governed by the individual veteran's length of active service.

**Effort Being Made To Expand World War I Pensions**

An effort to increase and expand the pension program for veterans of the First World War is the major objective of the Veterans of World War I, Inc., when the new Congress convenes January 7.

Edward J. Neron, of San Diego, California, National Commander of the Veterans of World War I, urges all eligible veterans to contact the National Headquarters of the VWWI, at 40 G Street, N. E., Washington 2, D. C., in order to be informed on just what plans are being made for the proposals which will be presented to the new Congress. Neron asks that all men who served in 1917 and 1918 forward their names, addresses and serial numbers to the headquarters and in return they will be supplied with complete and specific information concerning the legislative program of the Veterans of World War I.

The latter organization is a comparatively new veterans group but on December 31 had enrolled over 225,000 members. It was given a Congressional charter by the Congress in 1958 and now ranks as the third

largest veteran organization in the country.

**\$327 Million In 1963 Insurance Dividends To Be Divided Soon**

More than \$327 million in 1963 GI insurance dividends — including a special dividend of \$90 million — will be paid in record time, according to John S. Gleason, Jr., Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

Plans for payment of both regular and special 1963 dividends were announced by the White House November 22, 1962.

Under a greatly speeded-up timetable, the entire payment of both regular and special dividend payments is expected to be completed during the month of January 1963.

About \$223 million of the \$327 million total is the regular 1963 dividend that will go to nearly five million World War II veterans holding National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies. More than \$15 million will go to 250,000 World War I veterans who hold U. S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policies.

Regular dividends, which are distributed annually, have regularly been paid on the anniversary date of the original issuance of the policy. On this occasion, the payments will be speeded up to be completed within the month of January. An accelerated method was used once before by the Veterans Administration when the regular dividends during 1961 were paid by mid-March of that year. In addition to the regular dividend, the VA will pay a special dividend of \$90 million during 1963 to all World War II NSLI policyholders. A previous dividend was paid to World War II policyholders during 1961.

The regular dividends which are paid to both World War I and World War II policyholders are primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death rate among GI policyholders continues to be lower than the rate upon which the payments were established by law.

The special dividend will be paid from the contingency reserve fund due to the fact that study and current experience indicate that the fund is more than ample to meet the needs of the insurance program.

VA officials reminded veteran policyholders that the preparing and mailing of the dividend payment was automatic and required no correspondence from veterans or their families. In fact, such correspondence might delay the dividend disbursement process, they said.

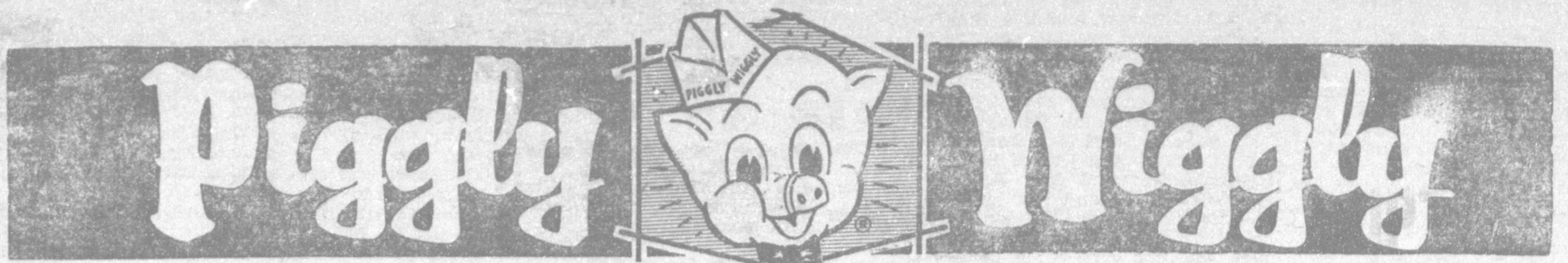
