THE PERFORATED DOLLAR

A New York business man, alarmed at bureaucratic success in wooing shareholders in American business to support socialistic schemes, suggests that the next invention of Big Government will be the perforated dollar bill, so divided that the tax collector can automatically walk off with 52 cents worth.

This perforation, he said, would be slightly left of center, with the private recipient retaining the 48-cent portion. Of course, no expenses would be deductible under this plan, which is in keeping with current Internal Revenue Service thinking.

"It seems the people in government believe it owns the 52 percent even before it has been made," James Cope, board chairman of Selva & Lee, a New York public relations firm, recently told members of the Detroit chapter of the Financial Executives Institute.

Differed Dollars

He pointed out that this would require two kinds of dollars — one for taxpayers and another for non-taxpayers, "including the vast, powerfully organized and politically active labor unions which align themselves so enthusiastically with the sponsors of 'public sector spending,' and which gather in millions without any tax liability whatsoever."

Business faces a strange phenomenon, he believes, an administration which vigorously professes the intention of getting the country moving forward and, at the same time, proposes tax reforms obviously intended as penalties on risk-taking.

"For more than a generation there has been a systematic, concentrated economic and political drive to get a wedge between shareholders — the owners of American business — and management," he continued. "The visible target of the bureaucrats has been a separate and suspect class identified as management, and the corporation has been portrayed as often as possible as a creature of management rather than as the property of its owners."

Campaign Successful

Mr. Cope stressed that events of the last year or so show that the campaign has been inordinately successful; that 17 million of the best informed people in the country "are basically unready to protect their assets from confiscation, or to support those who might try to prevent it."

He warned that these doctrinaire enemies of business success are working tirelessly throughout government to transform America's capitalistic system into the very socialistic state the people think they have rejected over and over.

He was particularly concerned over the 40-29 Senate vote in the last session of Congress that blocked as a tax deductible business expense the cost of newspaper advertising or other communication to inform employees and stockholders about legislation which would endanger their wages and profits.

Shareholder Army

"Over and over," he said, "Senators protested: 'Uncle Sam will pay 52 percent of the bill; small taxpayers will have to underwrite the lobbying campaigns.'"

He urged management to take a hard look at the shareholder army, 17 million strong — a group far larger than the labor movement could muster for any one of its highly potent causes — and enlist it in the battle against "the happy regulators."

"The question today," Mr. Cope stated, "is whether you work with your investors and owners, big and little, or whether you let government use their votes against their own interests and in the direction of socialized control of enterprise."

S'worm Program May Have To Be Dropped In March

The program initiated last year to rid the country of the screwworm is now suffering from lack of funds. It appears the program may have to be dropped in March unless the needed funds for its continued operation is forthcoming very soon.

More than one million dollars needs to be raised by Texas ranchmen and farmers in order for the program to continue. The initial program called for farmers and ranchmen to raise \$3 million through donations, but only about \$2 million was raised last year.

Your editor has discussed the results of last year's program with a number of interested citizens in this area over a period of the last several weeks. All have been highly in favor of the program continuing. Some have indicated they would contribute a second time to see the program continue.

There is little doubt as to the good accomplished in the first year of the program. Many livestock raisers had only a very few cases of screwworms and some were fortunate enough not to have any cases. It would seem to this writer that all those who were benefitted so much by the program last year would be ready to contribute again in order for the program to continue.

Although we do not have one head of livestock of any nature, we do not wish to see the program stopped. Some lives, many livestock and many working hours and money can be saved through the eradication of the screwworm. We urge each person owning livestock to contribute his fair share to the program.

Subscription Rates To Increase Friday, Feb. 1

Because of the postal rate increase which went into effect Monday of this week, it has become necessary that we increase the subscription rate on The Santa Anna News. Many other items used in the production of a newspaper have increased considerably during the past few years. This combined with the postal increase has made it necessary to increase our rates slightly.

We were also notified recently that just about all papers would increase in price soon after the first of the year.

At least for the time being, we are going to keep our single copy counter sale prices at 5 cents per copy. However, it may become necessary to increase this price in the near future.

Rates will increase February 1st as advertised on Page 2 of this issue of The News. From now until February 1, we will accept one-year subscriptions at the rate of \$2.00 per year plus tax in Coleman County; \$3.00 per year plus tax in Texas, but outside of Coleman County; and \$4.00 per year outside the State of Texas.

Subscriptions may be brought in or sent through the mail. All mail subscriptions must be post-marked before February 1, to be accepted on the old rate.

State Capitol NEWS

BOARD REPLACEMENTS ANNOUNCED
 Governor Price Daniel made numerous gubernatorial appointments at term's end. He has stated he will make no more appointments unless death creates a vacancy.

TURMAN SEEKS POST
 James A. Turman, who ran for lieutenant-governor last year and lost, wants to return to his favorite field — education.

The 35-year-old Speaker of the House quickly advanced in the field of education before he became a legislator eight years ago. He earned a doctorate in education, then became assistant professor of education and assistant to the president at Texas Woman's University.

He has asked the Texas Commission on Higher Education to consider him a candidate for its post of executive director.

SCHOOL FUND STILL GROWING
 The Permanent School Fund, that provided more than \$21,000,000 of non-tax money for use in public schools in 1962, now consists of investments totaling more than \$477,000,000.

Furthermore, it should continue to grow, since the current rate of return on corporate securities, treasury bonds and municipal bonds has increased from 3.38 percent to 3.51 percent.

In the past 25 years, the Fund has earned more than \$162,000,000 in interest through investments made by the State Board of Education.

WEATHER WOES CUT PRODUCTION
 Weather played havoc with almost every major crop in the state in 1962 and caused crop production to hit its lowest point since 1957.

U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that the 1962 crop index fell nine percent below the 1961 level to 127.0. All-time high of 145.0 was set in 1939, and the 1961 level was second highest.

Crops hardest hit were: wheat, down to 43,700,000 bushels or 49 percent below 1961; citrus, down to about six percent of 1961 production; sorghum, down to 12 percent; cotton, down 106,000 bales — to 4,680,000 bales.

Production of corn, peanuts, soybeans and rice was down. However, yield per acre was up over the previous year.

Weather's costly whims cut the total value of 1962 crops to \$1,400,000,000 — or eight percent below the 1961 value. Cotton lint and cottonseed accounted for 57 percent of the total; sorghum grain, 14 percent; and wheat, six percent.

RETURN OF DIGNITY
 Speaker-elect Byron Tunnell of Tyler said he's going to restore dignity to the House,

where legislation frequently resembles a trading boom at the New York Stock Exchange.

He warned legislators that they can no longer have secretaries work at their desks, and relatives will not be allowed to sit with them, except on very special occasions.

WORM ERADICATION FUNDS SHORT
 The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program — which succeeded in cutting screwworm cases by 75 to 90 percent in less than a year — will be halted March 31, unless livestock producers raise another \$1,000,000 by that date.

Charlie Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, made that announcement on behalf of SWAERF's board of trustees.

The three-year eradication program, initiated last January, cost an estimated \$12,000,000. The federal government was to pay \$6,000,000, the livestock producers, \$3,000,000, and the State \$3,000,000.

But so far the farmers and ranchers have donated only \$2,000,000.

Scruggs said, "The plan was based on 100 percent participation, and this has not been the case, although there have been commendable contributions in some counties."

ECONOMIC HEALTH
 Texas Bank Deposits are continuing to set records almost everywhere.

A survey of major cities was made after the state banking commissioner and the U. S. comptroller ordered condition reports as of December 28.

The December 28 date caught many banks by surprise. They were anticipating the call date to be December 31.

Some bankers said the difference in dates prevented them from reporting even higher figures. Last day of the year usually is a high mark for bank deposits.

TARGET FOR NEW AG
 Texas' new attorney general has pledged a positive campaign against juvenile delinquency as one of his major projects.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr addressed an overflow crowd at his swearing-in ceremonies in the Courts Building.

He said that delinquency is neither normal nor universal among our juveniles. "On the contrary, a respect for the law is far more common among young people than is disrespect," Carr stated.

Carr also pledged to "continue vigorously" investigations begun by his predecessor, Will Wilson, into the East Texas slant-hole well scandal and the Billie Sol Estes case.

Although pledging no enbility, Carr warned that in any croachment on local responsibility where local officials "fail in their trust to this state," he will not hesitate to step in

"to correct the situation within the boundaries of power and authority."

TAX TAKE GROWS
 Receipts from sales of cigarette, liquor and wine stamp sales totaled \$8,414,358 during December, State Treasurer Jesse James reports.

Receipts totaled \$7,300,000 from cigarette stamp sales; \$1,000,000 from liquor stamp sales; and \$91,414 from wine stamp sales.

December, 1961, receipts totaled \$7,925,997.

CARE NAMES AIDE
 Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has named Albert Jones of Austin as his first assistant.

The University of Texas professor has been directed by Carr to completely re-organize the attorney general's office. Carr said he has asked Jones to head up the re-organization "in order to secure the utmost efficiency in its operation."

Carr noted that Jones, a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers and a former president of the Texas State Bar, will give the office the services of an outstanding and prominent trial lawyer.

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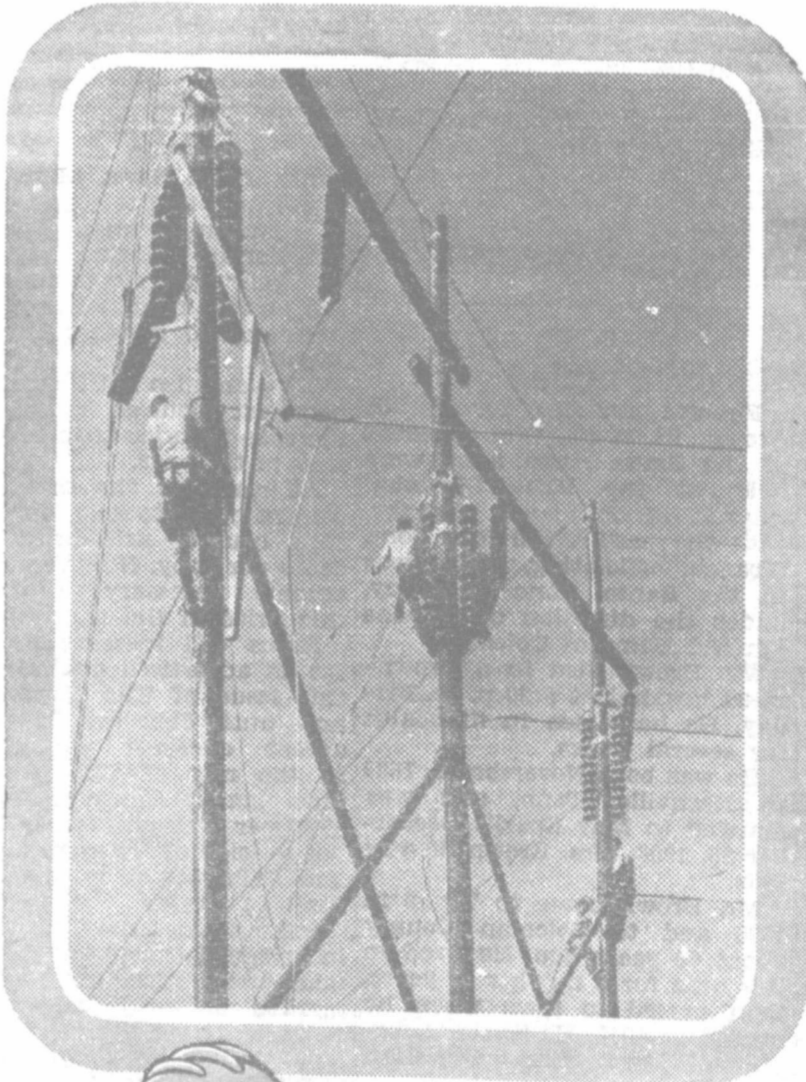

Brownwood — A Mid-Winter Reading Conference will be held February 22-23 at Howard Payne College, announced Dr. Frances L. Merritt, head of the college's Department of Education. It will open with a dinner Friday evening, Feb. 22, and will reconvene the next morning, continuing through noon.

Central Texas public school teachers, supervisors and administrators interested in improvement of reading at any grade level are invited to attend, she said. Information on reservations to attend are being mailed to the schools in the area.

Dr. Jane Carol, head of the Department of Elementary Education at Howard Payne, is the campus representative for the conference, which will have as its theme, "Challenge and Experimentation in the Teaching of Reading."

Chief consultant will be Mrs. Dorothy Kendali Bracken, director of the Reading Clinic of Southern Methodist University. Also present for the program will be Mrs. Marie Clark of Austin, president of the Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading.

Cattlemen Will Meet In San Antonio

March 18-20 has been set as the dates for the 86th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. The meeting will be in the Gunter Hotel in San Antonio.

Joe S. Fletcher, TSCRA secretary-general manager, said a top flight program is being arranged for the convention. It will include progress reports on the screwworm eradication program in the Southwest and a number of other subjects particularly important to cattlemen at this time.

Leo Weider of Victoria, TSCRA president, will preside over general sessions in which cattlemen will discuss issues presently affecting the cattle industry.

DPS Urges Early Inspection Of All Vehicles

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers.

All vehicles coming under the provisions of the Texas Vehicle Inspection Act must secure the 1963 inspection sticker by April 15, 1963. After that date, vehicles not displaying the new inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and the operators of those vehicles will be subject to arrest, Garrison said.

He reported that approximately one half of the inspection period has expired and about one fourth of the vehicles in the state have been inspected. Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, he added, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

"There are approximately 5,-

000 authorized inspection stations in the State and they are ready and capable of handling the inspection of all vehicles without delay if the owners of uninspected vehicles do not wait until the last few days before the deadline," Garrison said.

Of Interest To VETERANS Questions And Answers

Q — I see the VA pays pension under a heading "Civil War Pensions". I thought all the Civil War veterans were dead?

A — Pensions for Civil War dependents are paid to widows and helpless children of Civil War veterans. There are about 3,000 on the rolls.

Q — If a wife is a veteran, can she obtain a VA loan for a home even if her husband is not a veteran?

A — Veteran's benefits draw no line between the sexes thus a woman veteran is eligible for a home loan guaranty. However, many women veterans might be unable to obtain loans because of low annual income or doubts concerning long term employment. Your nearest VA office could advise you on this matter.

Q — Can I allow my annual GI insurance dividend to remain on deposit to meet future premiums?

A — Yes, you may. Notify the VA office where you pay your premiums of your intention to allow your dividend to remain on deposit.

Frostbite

Cold weather is back again and with it comes the health hazards that accompany sub-freezing temperatures. An ever present winter danger is frostbite.

Frostbite is, naturally, more of a problem in the northern states, but even in most of the south there are occasional periods of weather cold enough to nip unprotected noses and fingers.

Frostbite can be very painful for a long period, can result in amputations and can leave the victim hypersensitive to cold for the rest of his life. In some ways the damage of frostbite is similar to a burn. Injuries to both deep and shallow tissue are comparable. First degree frostbite, like sunburn, is an injury to surface skin. It is likely to attack ears, toes, fingers, cheeks or nose. Second degree frostbite produces blisters as in second degree burns. In third degree frostbite the damage is deep and much of the frozen part may be lost.

Prevention is the best protection against frostbite. This means being properly dressed in warm clothing, waterproof shoes and heavy, dry socks, and with good covering for head and ears. Keep clothing dry from both outside moisture and perspiration and avoid tight clothing or garters that may

restrict circulation.

Motorists traveling across country in subfreezing weather are advised to have heavy clothing and shoes in the car, in the event that there should be a breakdown and it becomes necessary to hike for help.

If your auto is stalled in snow or ice some distance from help, it may be safer to stay in the car than to walk a long distance in extreme cold with clothing that is too light.

The first signs of frostbite are "pins and needles" prickly feeling and then numbness. The affected part will turn white or gray and later red.

First aid possibilities are limited. Thawing of the tissue as soon as possible is the major consideration, and this can best be accomplished by getting the patient indoors into a warm room. Treat the frozen part with gentleness and do not rub or massage it. The old technique of rubbing snow or ice water on the frozen part does more harm than good by delaying thawing.

Medical treatment is needed promptly in frostbite. Control of the often severe pain is required and antibiotics and antitetanus injections may be needed if the skin is broken. Often the frozen skin will eventually slough off.

Billy Graham To Be Speaker At Baptist Meeting In Dallas

Dallas (Spl.) — Famed Evangelist Billy Graham will be the principal speaker here for the annual Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference, slated Monday through Wednesday, Jan. 14-16. Total attendance at the three-day meeting may exceed 20,000 predicted Dr. C. Wade Freeman of Dallas, director of the division of evangelism for the Baptist General Convention of Texas and conference director.

Peak attendance is expected at the Wednesday night session when Dr. Graham will speak. Television and motion picture actor Gregory Walcott of Hollywood, a Baptist layman, will also be on the Wednesday night program.

Sessions will be held at the 10,500-capacity Dallas Memorial Auditorium. In case of overflow

crowds, closed-circuit television will project the session into a nearby 2,000-seat theater.

No business will be conducted during the inspiration-type meeting. It is designed primarily for Baptist preachers and lay leaders, but the general public is invited to attend, especially for the Wednesday night sessions.

"I've never seen so much interest among Baptists throughout the state in any meeting before," said Conference Director Freeman. "We will have some of the greatest speakers in the entire Southern Baptist Convention on the program," he said.

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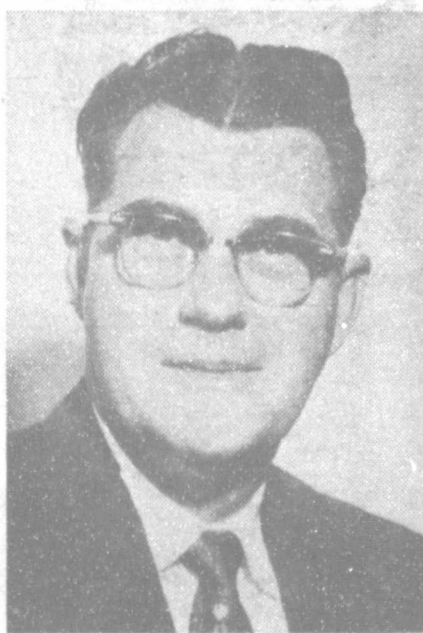
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Miss Petty Is Wed To Raymond L. Estes

In the Panhandle and other north Texas points, water of ten freezes over ponds, small lakes and other spots where duck hunters congregate.

If you have such a favorite hunting place and it freezes over, pour bluing on the ice. To the ducks flying overhead it will look like open water.
