5,000 or less population. It sets up an extra-territorial area of one mile around cities of 5,000-25,000; two miles around cities, 25,000-50,000; and of Lubbock. three and a half miles around those with populations ranging

from 50,000 to 100,000. Under this proposed law a city could annex in a year no more than an acreage equal to 10 percent of its size on the first day of that year. In computing this, many have drawn concentric circles around sample cities.

But this is not the limitation it would appear to be.

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

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


