Modern education apparently dwells more on "life adjustment" than on the three R's. With this in mind, the schools should be interested in a new course entitled, "How To Get Ahead in Life."

Its purpose is to show the child how to progress within our free enterprise system. Despite the many invasions of private property and curtailments of free choice, we still have — basically — a free enterprise system.

It would seem, then, to be the school's duty to equip the child with the basic understanding required to be a success in this system. The child should be taught the fundamental rule that underlies all individual success within our system:

**KEY TO SUCCESS**

That rule is: Your success in life depends directly upon the amount of service you give to others.

In the free enterprise system, a man must provide a product or service that others need or desire. If he wants to progress, he must be productive — and that production must be in areas desired by others. Otherwise, his only hope for existence is to live as a hermit.

This lesson applies whether you are a store clerk, steel tycoon, car mechanic, writer, doctor, salesman, production worker, architect, telephone repairman or anything else.

**REWARD EQUALS SERVICE**

The rule is simple: the more service you provide, the greater your personal reward will be. Obviously, you can't command a bigger salary by doing something nobody wants. On the other hand, the more you satisfy the needs and wants of your community, the more in demand you'll be. This applies whether you own your own company or work for someone else.

Socialists always cry that they want "production for use instead of for profit." Strangely, they can't see the obvious: production for profit is production for use. You can't make a profit unless you provide things people can use.

The free enterprise system has created more good things for more people than any "ism" in history. This is because each man is the master of his own fate — each controls his own property. That means each decides for himself what he will do with that property — what it will be exchanged for.

So anyone who wants some of that property must produce a product or service that satisfies the owner's desires. Only then can the exchange be made.

**NO SERVICE**

In the various types of socialist systems, however, it is the state that makes such decisions. The government decides what you need or can have. So people don't serve each other — they serve the state.

If these facts could be brought out to our school children — and they certainly aren't hard to understand — think how much more productive future generations might be.

Admittedly, they might serve to prejudice the child on behalf of the free enterprise system — so we can't be too hopeful that these ideas will be taught.

But what's to stop you from passing these simple truths on to your children?

## Many Small Farmers May Vote On Wheat Question

Some small farmers may be surprised to learn that they are eligible to vote in the May 21 Wheat Referendum, an election admitted by those for and against to be one of the most crucial decisions ever to face the American farmer.

Any farmer having a wheat base or a wheat allotment of any size may vote, as may his wife; if you own or operate a farm, you may be eligible, but you must make sure of this by May 13.

The question is whether to accept a law passed by the Congress in the last days of its 1962 session, providing for a 2-price system on wheat and to be tied in with feed-grains and other crops on every farm.

If the "No" vote carries, there will be no quotas, no payments for non-production, and the price support will be available at 50% of parity only for farmers keeping with their 1964 allotments. However, as some members of the Congress point out, a farmer can always sell wheat at the world price, currently \$1.30. Also, if the referendum fails to carry, any farmer wishing to do so may plant what wheat he wishes; while if it carries, no one will be permitted to grow wheat without an allotment.

The Department of Agriculture has prepared booklets urging the "yes" vote, while the Farm Raisers, the American Farm Bureau and others are pointing out the benefits of a "no" vote.

If the referendum carries, the law provides penalties in case of failure to comply with the program, with fines up to \$5,000 and other restrictions; while if fraud is claimed, fines up to \$10,000 and imprisonment up to 10 years may be assessed.

There is no doubt that this law will affect every citizen, and all farmers should go to the SCS office before May 13 to make sure of their right to vote as they believe best.

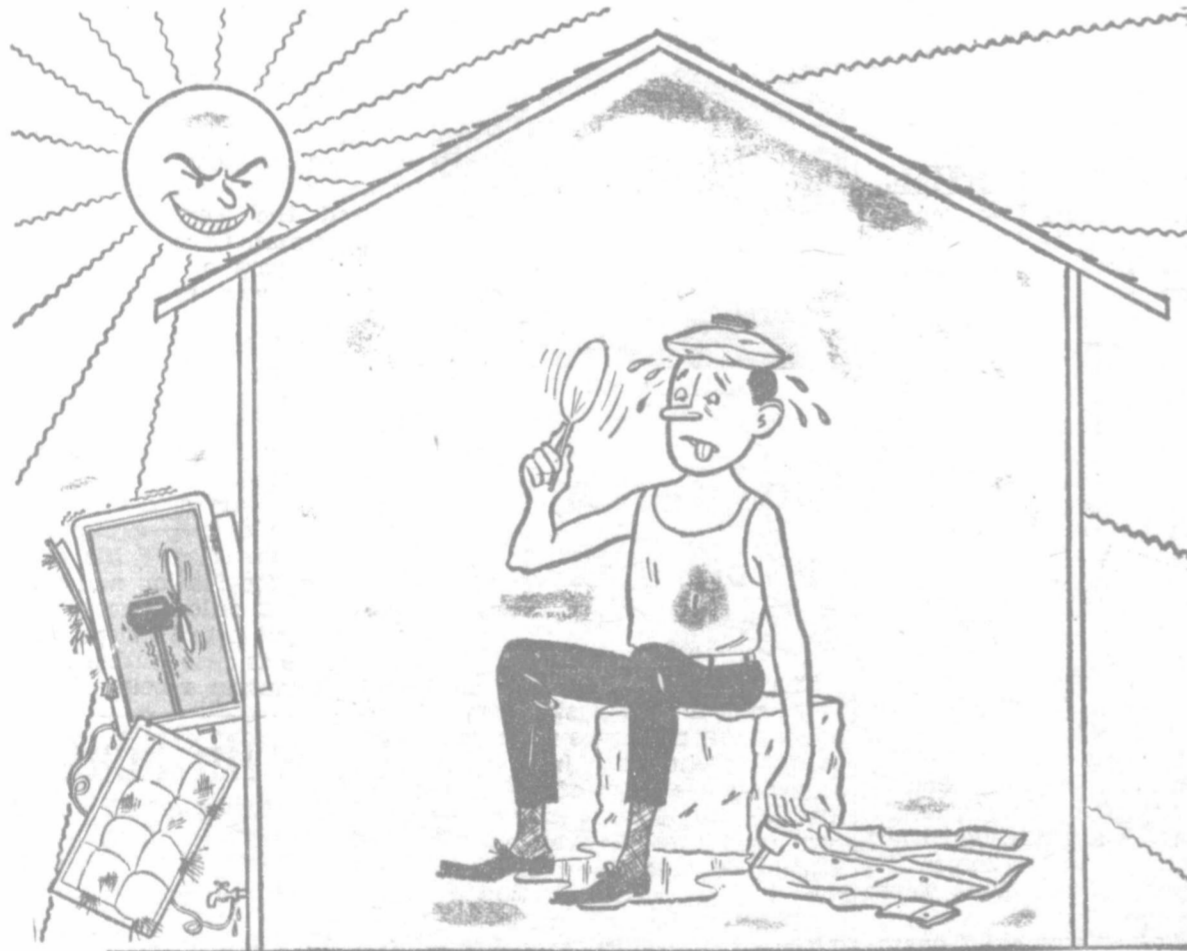
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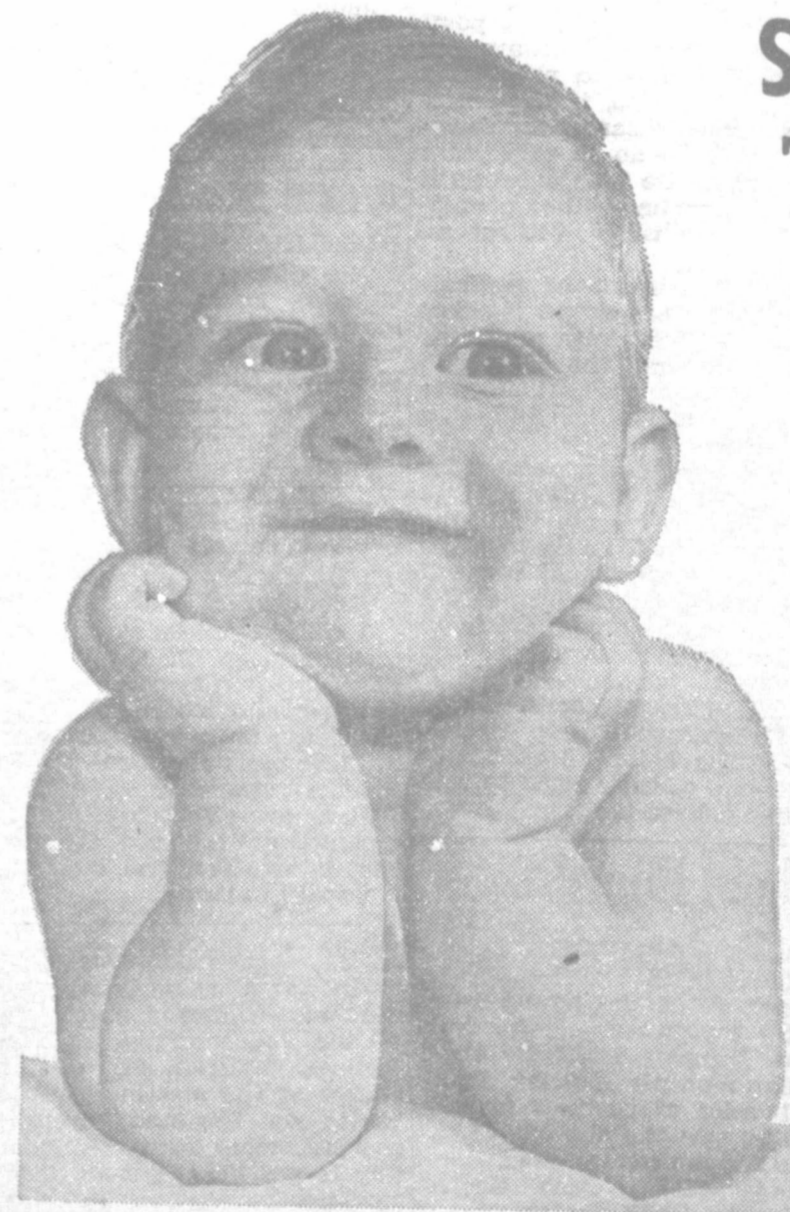

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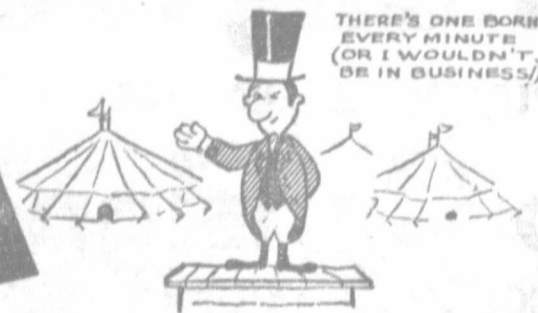

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in the House, ranks third (along with Bob Poage) in delegation seniority and fourth in seniority on the powerful Appropriations' Committee. George Mahan of Lubbock ranks second on Appropriations.

Because of committee seniority both Mahan and Thomas are ranked among the most influential members of the House. Thomas, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Independent Offices, handles appropriations amounting to some \$4 billion per year. He is known here as a hard task-master who insists upon agencies justifying every dime they spend, although in general he likes to line up with the party leadership on partisan issues. By and large, he is rated a valuable member from the standpoint of the taxpayers.

With Albert's retirement, I will then be fourth in our 23-member delegation seniority rating. Wright Patman of Texas is first, with 35 years of continuous service. George Mahan will be second, with 30 years and Bob Poage of Waco will be third with 28 years.

**THERE HAS BEEN** quite a turnover in the Texas delegation during my 21 years here. When I was first elected in 1942, the delegation had reached its peak of influence, sparked by an impressive array of members who were widely recognized for seniority and statesmanship. Looking back, there were such powerful figures as Hatton Summers of Dallas, Chairman of the Judiciary Committee, an independent who wielded tremendous influence in behalf of Constitutional law and good government. Fritz Lanham of Fort Worth, also a committee chairman, belonged to the old school of southern gentlemen. He voted independently and was highly respected. Joseph Mansfield of Columbus, Chairman of the Committee on Rivers and Harbors, was likewise one of the most respected and influential members in the House. Then, there was Ewing Thomason of El Paso, a ranking member of Military Affairs and

likewise highly regarded. Luther Johnson of Corsicana was a tower of strength, serving on the Foreign Affairs Committee. Paul Kilday of San Antonio was just beginning to develop stature which later made him one of the most effective members of the House.

Milton West of Brownsville was one of the real solid pillars in the conservative cause, along with Dick Kleburg, Ed Gossett, Sam Russell and Martin Dies. Dies at that time Chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, was an orator and a thorn in the side of the communists and the liberals.

Sam Rayburn, the Speaker, busied himself with the promotion of the party, although at that time his influence with the members of the Texas Delegation was not felt as much as later in his career. In general, Texans in those days were much more independent than were many of their replacements who succeeded them.

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Gov. John B. Connally signed 27 bills into law... then he and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith left the state.

Their departure was to permit Sen. Martin Dies, Jr. of Lufkin to take over as "Governor for a Day."

Each bill applied to a special area of interest. For example:

1. House Bill 16 by Rep. Olen R. Petty of Levelland interests State banks. It exempts them from the State sales tax and franchise tax so long as federal banks are exempt. Saves them up to \$1,000,000 a year.

2. House Bill 588 by Houston Rep. Tom Bass interests firemen and policemen. It enables them to credit toward "job seniority" time taken off for military service and guard duty. This speeds up their promotions.

3. House Bill 614 by Rep. Amando Canales of San Diego and Rep. Jerry Butler of Kenedy interest hunters. It puts a "No-Hunting" sign on Duval County for the next five years.

These laws will go into effect late in August.

### LOOPHOLE IN THE LOOP

Municipal annexation bill, which has passed both houses, is ready for Governor Connally's signature. It gives every city an "extra-territorial jurisdiction" from five miles for cities of more than 100,000 population to one-half mile around cities of 5,000 or less population.

It sets up an extra-territorial area of one mile around cities of 5,000-25,000; two miles around cities, 25,000-50,000; and three and a half miles around those with populations ranging from 50,000 to 100,000.

Under this proposed law a city could annex in a year no more than an acreage equal to 10 percent of its size on the first day of that year. In computing this, many have drawn concentric circles around sample cities.

But this is not the limitation it would appear to be.

Actually, instead of extending its whole perimeter, a large city could annex a five mile strip along major highways without approaching the 10 percent

limit.

### VOTERS REGISTRATION

A registration system to take the poll tax's place is all but decided by the Legislature.

Senate-passed bill by Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells calls for a 25-cent registration fee in lieu of the \$1.50, or \$1.75, poll tax. It retains the present system of registering voters each year.

El Paso Rep. Malcolm McGregor tried to include the Texas League of Women Voters' plan for permanent registration, but it was turned down.

House took the 25-cent fee provision out of the bill. So a House-Senate conference committee will have to settle this dispute. Another House amendment would require rural people and those residing in small towns to register every year, if they are over 60 years of age.

At present, these people are allowed to vote without registering at all.

Entire registration revision hinges on a constitutional amendment to repeal the poll tax. This bill, by Rep. Abraham Kazen of Laredo, passed the Senate, but is tied up in a House committee.

### CRIMINAL CODE REVISION

The much-opposed revision of the State Criminal Code now has the approval of the District and County Attorney's Association, through an endorsement by its president, Alton Griffin of Lubbock.

Endorsement applies to the House Criminal Jurisprudence committee version of the State Bar Association's plan for streamlining the code. House version is so different from San Angelo Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's bill which passed the Senate, that it may be a long, hard fight for approval. And there's less than three weeks left in this session. It must end by May 27.

### MISSION FOR MIGRANTS

Laredo Rep. Honore Ligarde told the House Appropriations committee that a program of basic education — gradeschool level reading, writing and arithmetic would be:

"One of the greatest bargains available to you today — the renovation of human beings in such a way that they cease to be a burden to the state and assume the dignified role of contributing taxpayers."

Ligarde has introduced alternate bills to set up an educational program under the Texas Education Agency, through the urging of the Texas Committee on Migrant Farm Workers.

There are about 127,000 illiterate migrant farm workers in the state. In addition there are 800,000 other adults who rate as illiterates and who would also be eligible for courses if a plan is adopted.

### FOR MEN ONLY

Decision by Texas A & M's

board of directors, to make the college coeducational provoked introduction of a House resolution against the board's decision. Also a bill designed to prevent entrance of females.

Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont introduced both measures.

1962 VOTERS' REGISTRATION State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported a total of 2,020,183 voter registrations issued through January 31, 1963.

This included 1,654,805 poll tax payments and 365,378 exemption certificates, to be used in any elections held through January 31, 1964.

Loving County issued the least poll tax receipts — 90. Harris County, the most — 232,760.

TEAMWORK TOO GOOD? Sen. Murray Watson of Mart said the 58th Legislature is bypassing many major issues in its "mad rush" to adjourn by May 27.

He praised the teamwork of House and Senate, but said, "All this good teamwork and this great speed is fine and good, but in our mad rush to set records — to avoid controversial issues — and to adjourn within the 140-day period, we are overlooking many vital problems."

Sen. Watson said the Legislature "seemingly is avoiding any positive approach to the growing water pollution problem—to traffic safety, crime, delinquency, divorce and other problems relating to our society's health and welfare."

### GUARD COMMANDER TO RETIRE

Maj. Gen. Lloyd M. Bentsen Sr. of Mission will retire as commander of the Reserve Corps of the Texas State Guard on May 11.

He will be succeeded by Maj. Gen. John L. Thompson of

Houston.

### STAMP SALES UP

More than \$9,000,000 was taken in by the State from the sale of wine, liquor and cigarette stamps in April. This represented an increase of \$750,000 over the April, 1962 revenue.

### WATER SAFETY ACT SUNK

Rep. Ben Atwell failed in a third attempt to launch a water safety bill which prohibited fees for use of public empondments.

### BUSINESS ACTIVITY DOWN AGAIN

The seasonally-adjusted index of Texas business activity went down in March for the second month in a row, according to the Bureau of Business Research, which bases its index

on the 1957-59 average.

Business in general in March was seven percent below February's level and four percent below that of March, 1962.

Only three cities — Beaumont, Tyler and Texarkana — showed increases. El Paso and Lubbock remained at their February levels, while other cities showed declines from two to 16 percent.

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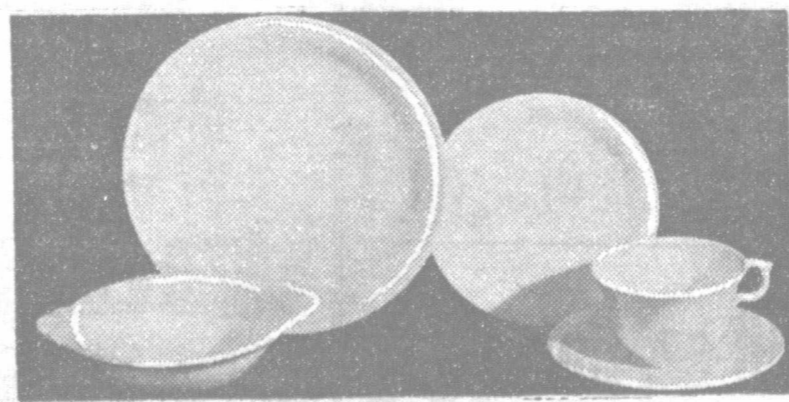

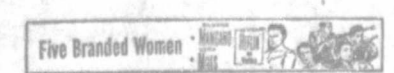
