



Less than 60 cases have been recorded in Texas during August, as compared to more than 5,000 infestations detected during the same month last year.

With the low population. chances for a fall buildup are considerably decreased eradication workers point out. However, even a small buildup can hamper eradication efforts, officials said, because sterile flies must be distributed over many WANTED: All kinds of sacks, message during the weekend, the native population down awidely-scattered areas to bring

Livestock specialists recommend that sheep and goats be sprayed after shearing with 0.25 percent Co-ral or 0.5 percent Korlan solution and each individual nick or cut be treated with smear. These insecticides will protect animals from screwworm infestations for two or three weeks until the wounds have had a chance to heal.

Animals should be inspected frequently, especially for several weeks after shearing, to insure that none have become infested. If worm infestations do develop, a dozen larvae from deep within the center of the wound should be collected, plac-ed in water or alcohol and sent to the Mission laboratory for positive identification or given to the County Extension Agent. All remaining larvae should be killed. If the sample is identified as screwworms, additional sterile flies will be airdropped near the infested premises.

"Stockmen have already had a taste of how much easier ranching will be when screwworms are no longer a problem,' one eradication official said. "I'm sure they will not want to do anything to jeopardize the early completion of the program, which will allow them to enjoy the benefits of screw-
