# SPS merger gains Texas approval

that remain in the way of a merger between Southwestern Public Service and Public Service Company of Colorado.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas Wednesday approved the merger to create New Century Energies. The Texas approval was the final in a series of okays from other utility commissions in affected states. Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Kansas have all given approval. Oklahoma's said it will not oppose the merger.

It was the fourth time the merger proposal had come before the Texas PUC for approval.

The final steps in the merger come at the federal level, where an administrative law judge for the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has recommended approval. The companies are waiting to appear on the commission agenda. Pending approval by the FERC and by the Securities and Exchange Commission, the merger is targeted for completion in May.

The Muleshoe SPS office is among 17 in Texas and New

Two federal hurdles are all Mexico that will be closed between May and November as a results of the merger. The remaining 26 SPS offices will cease all bill payment and regular office functions.



# Shaw faces second charge in neglect case

Authorities have filed a second charge against the live-in caregiver of Ella Mae Osbend, a mentally disabled Bailey County woman who apparently died Jan. 18 of neglect.

Andrew Lee Shaw, 42, the common-law husband of one of Osbend's daughters, faces two counts of injury to a disabled person: one in connection with the death of the 54-year-old Osbend; and one for her 49-year-old brother, Bobby D. Raybon, who is also mentally disabled.

Shaw was arrested and charged with the first count Jan. 23. He is being held in the county jail on bonds totaling \$75,000.

Shaw "intentionally and knowingly" neglected Raybon, which led to the second and more serious charge being filed, according to Benny Clifton, a criminal investigator with the Bailey County Sheriff's Department.

The second charge is considered a first-degree felony, which is punishable by 5 to 99 years in jail and a \$10,000 fine. The original charge is a second-degree felony.

Investigators are still waiting for an autopsy

The case will be presented to a grand jury Feb. 10 and investigators did not rule out the possibility of additional charges being added.

Bailey County Sheriff's deputies found Osbend and her brother the night of Jan. 18 in their home a mile west of Muleshoe after Shaw asked a neighbor to call 911 and report a possible stroke, Clifton said.

# St. Clair inks with Midwestern State

LAZBUDDIE—Justin St. Clair hasn't played 11-man football since junior high.

The Lazbuddie High School senior has since grown to a sturdy 6-foot-2 and 205 pounds and become one of the top six-man players in the South Plains.

But few noticed.

St. Clair often wondered if his dream of playing college football would die in the tiny football stadiums that dot West Texas. Six-man games are the heartbeat of many cotton gin communities on Friday night, but draw little interest from college recruiters.

But somebody did notice. St. Clair officially signed a national letter of intent Thursday to play football at Midwestern State, a NCAA Division II school in Wichita

Falls. "I'm just excited," said St. a few recruiter's lists.

Clair, who also considered an offer from Angelo State.

St. Clair said he felt Midwestern was an up-coming program and he'd get a chance to play sooner. He said he also felt more comfortable.

St. Clair accounted for 2,573 yards and 32 touchdowns while leading Lazbuddie to a 10-2 record and the state playoffs in 1996.

St. Clair was a two-year starter at quarterback before moving to running back this year, where he rushed for 1,238 yards and 14 touchdowns

The strong-armed senior also completed 67 of 131 passes for 1,091 yards and 15 touchdowns and caught 15 passes for 244 yards and three touchdowns.

It was his versatility that landed St. Clair on the Lubbock Avalanche Journal's All-South Plains team and on

# Any moisture good news for farmers

After a day of drizzling rain, Muleshoe residents woke up Friday to a light snow.

Muleshoe received threetenths of an inch of moisture over Thursday and Friday, including a half-inch of snow early Friday morning.

Area farmers should benefit doubly from the cold, wet weather, according to County Extension Agent Curtis Pre-

"The cold weather has probably killed a lot of bugs," Preston said. "The moisture was good, its just not enough."

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation estimates that Bailey County farmers need between two and eight inches of rain to bring their fields to optimum capac-

Preston said farmers would also benefit more from one good downpour rather than a lot of little spurts of rain.

"It's hard to get a whole lot of good out of two-tenths and three-tenths at a time," Preston said.

Robert Barritt, a forecaster for the National Weather Service in Lubbock, attributes the light moisture to a weak storm system.

Residents won't have much time to get used to any weather, according Barritt, who forecasts alternating periods of
