

Yet alcoholic beverages cause more crime, more welfare, more admissions to mental hospitals, more automobile accidents—more public tax burdens than any other single item.



Solon Wilson from the eastern edge of the county was W. L. Vaughan, Santa Anna by the office last week. He was telling me about the rye ginal land and grazed some 15 cows and calves on 40

acres all last winter. Vetch and rye compliment each other and make a high quality forage.

Mr. Wilson said he pulled the cows off of about half of it and baled over 400 bales. Vetch and rye have always done well on sandier type soils and might provide some good supplemental grazing for livestock producers.

Last Wednesday I visited Benton Cassaday's farm at Talpa and looked over his swine operation. Benton is chairman of our swine subcommittee. Benton has a real practical set up and is expanding it as time allows. Our Beef Cattle Committee Mrs. Marion Kirbo, Mullin, met Thursday morning. Zeno Hemphill, Charles Nolen, C. M. Huckabee, and I worked out the plans for our Pregnancy Determination Meeting to be held October 21, of Mrs. L. L. Wilder, Coleman, this year and made some plans for next year.

Our conservation committee had a breakfast meeting last Tuesday morning. Hal Martin, Arthur Doose, Beck Knox, Loy Jackson and Bob Pearson assisted the County Extension staff in developing plans for a conservation program next year. Brush, weeds and rogue grasses are giving ranchers a harder time of it every year. One of the things we plan to try next year is some range spraying of weeds to see if this is economically practical.

A lot of preparations are being made for our County Fair. I've been put in charge of the agricultural exhibits, so if anyone wants to make an agricultural display, I need to hear from you real soon to reserve booth space.

I received word from Dr. Merril that entries for the ram progeny test at Sonora will be opened right away. If anyone is interested in entering rams in this, I have all the information in my office.

I received some of the results on one of our milo demonstrations this year. Bill Haas, of Mozelle had four varieties, all of them new and supposedly top varities. There was a difference of 1100 lbs per acre on the top and bottom pielding varities, all grown side by side on identical land and under similar conditions.
