

# City caps tainted well

The City of Muleshoe is permanently capping one of its wells after a random test indicated it was contaminated.

The well, located near the Muleshoe Co-op Gin, was primarily used as an emergency backup well, according to City Manager James Fisher. He said it had been used only once in the last five to six months.

Tests conducted by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission in February indicated high levels of nitrate. Tests indicated a nitrate level of 11.6 parts per million. The allowable limit is 10 parts per million.

"This is a concern, but it isn't anything to get alarmed about," Fisher said. "The well that we're abandoning is not part of the water system and has not been for some time."

"We've got a good water

supply and good water, we're just taking steps to avoid any future problems with the water system."

Nitrates are a by-product of fertilizers and could be coming from runoff from neighboring fields, Fisher said.

The City pumps all its drinking water from the Sandersosa wells located just south of Muleshoe.

The contaminated well was only source used to supply water to the 110,000 gallon storage tank located at West 9th Street and West Avenue B.

The City is exploring the possibility of piping water from the Sandersosa well field to the Ninth & B storage tank, which would serve as an emergency backup to the one million gallon storage tank located south of Muleshoe, Fisher said.

The City uses an average of one million gallons of water a day.

## Muleshoe High School holds Athletic banquet

More than two dozen awards were handed out during the annual Muleshoe High School Athletic banquet Tuesday in an outdoor ceremony at Benny Douglass Stadium.

The ceremony also included a Senior Spotlight for 24 athletes.

In girls cross country, all eight team members were earned the Gone with the Wind award. The Lady Mules won the District 1-3A title and qualified for the state meet, finishing ninth.

Freshman Clint Black was named the boys cross country MVP.

In football, senior tight end Jarrod Redwine earned the Offensive Player award and junior lineman Rick Aguirre the Defensive Player Award. Junior defensive end Chris Shelburne earned the Fighting Heart award.

The inexperienced Mules went 1-9, snapping a 19-

game losing streak by beating Sanford-Fritch 25-14 Oct. 25.

The junior varsity football team went 4-4.

In boys basketball, sophomores Dustin Cleavinger and Carlton Lewis helped the Mules win a school-record 21 games and finished tied for second in the district.

Cleavinger averaged 16.8 points and 10 rebounds and was named the Offensive Player of the Year. Lewis had 59 steals and earned Defensive Player of the Year.

Senior Corey Williams earned the Sportsmanship award.

The junior varsity basketball team finished 11-17 while the freshman went 14-3.

In girls basketball, senior JoBeth Gilleland earned the Sportsmanship award and senior Heather Hooten the Hustle Award.

The Lady Mules finished 11-20 overall and fourth in the district.

The junior varsity team was 21-5 and the freshman team finished 8-10.

In power lifting, senior Colby Latham and junior Ricko Aguirre were given Certificate of Achievement awards. Latham finished second at regionals and was a state qualifier. Aguirre finished third at regionals.

In tennis, Cambri Lewis earned the Girls MVP and Colby Latham the Boys MVP. Chris Vaughn was named Most Improved.

In baseball, junior Layne Kemp was named the Golden Spikes Award (MVP) winner. Kemp batted .507 and had a 5-5 pitching record for the 10-11 Mules. Jarrod Redwine earned the Fighting Heart

## Kemp, Redwine earn 1-3A honors

Muleshoe's Layne Kemp and Jarrod Redwine were named to the All-District 1-3A baseball first team Thursday.

Kemp was chosen as the designated hitter and Redwine was one of three outfielders selected.

Senior Nathan Culwell of district champion Tulia was named the most valuable player. Culwell hit .627 and was 3-1 with two saves.

Runner-up Perryton had four players selected to the first team, determined by a vote of league coaches. No other team had more than two.

Kemp batted a team-high .507 with four doubles, three triples and one home run. He scored 31 runs, drove in 19 runs and stole 12 bases.

On the mound, the junior right-hander went 5-5, including a five-inning no-hitter

against Dimmitt. He had 82 strikeouts in 62 innings.

"He had a good year," Muleshoe coach Brad Hill said. "He hit the ball consistently all year and did a good job on the mound."

Hill was both surprised and thrilled with Redwine's selection.

Redwine battled a shoulder injury all season, which hurt his offensive production.

The senior left fielder hit .297 with three doubles, two triples and a home run. He scored 19 runs and drive in 11.

"He works his butt off," Hill said. "He struggled at the plate, but a lot of that was his shoulder."

Senior Jeffrey Wheeler and junior Rodney Alanis were second-team selections for the Mules, who finished 10-11

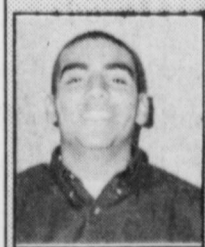

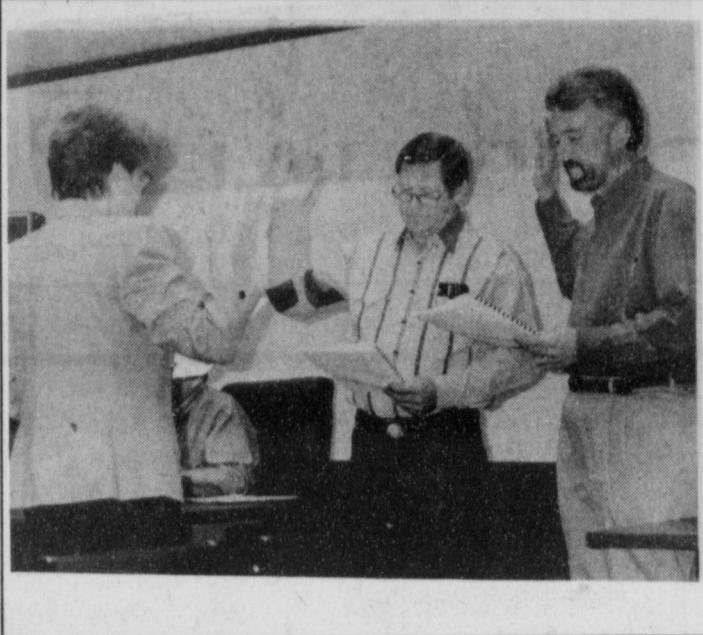

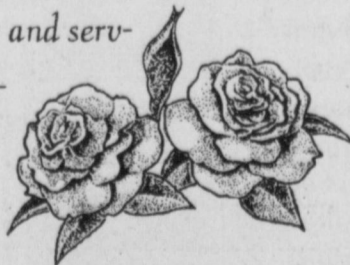

The Sierra Club, as well as many other "Anti" groups have experienced a decline in membership and income over the last several years. "Chicken Little Overkill" has numbed the public.

But, what better way to shock the wallet out of people's pants than with a giant Goliath. Some cause so great, and so insurmountable that it can become the symbol of fund raising campaigns for generations beyond our time. Granted, enthusiasm may wear thin over the years but it is a great marketing strategy for a business in decline.

This cynical view of the motives of the Sierra Club leadership does an injustice to those members and others who harbor an idealistic view of nature and man's interference thereof.

There are many farmers and ranchers who would prefer to keep power stations, nuclear reactors, airports, malls, landfills, city limits, strip mines, freeways, testing grounds and toxic waste dumps from being built next to them. deaf ears when you start affecting people's cost of living. Skyrocketing electric bills, water shortages, and declining livability are things people take personally.

The Glen Canyon Dam backs up the Colorado River for 186 miles and forms Lake Powell, the 2nd largest man-made lake in the U.S. It now supplies power and water to six million rate payers in six western states and recreation for 400,000 boaters each year. The price of civilization.

If the Sierra wanted, they could start smaller. Take the face off Mount Rushmore, for instance. Restore it to its natural beauty.

The land under Washington, D.C. was originally a wetland with habitat for birds, reptiles and plants. Now it is overrun with predators.

The Golden Gate Bridge mars the grandeur of the San Francisco Bay.

All those unsightly locks and dams that disrupt the natural flow of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers could be removed to restore their ancient ecosystem. Then move on to the Tennessee Valley Authority.

But the Sierra Club has declined these options and picked an area that they consider more practical as a fund-raiser. And they're right, regardless of their motives. Most potential donors don't even know where it is. They can rally to the cause without thinking because, after all, it will never affect their own cost of living. Bein' green is easy when it's not personal.

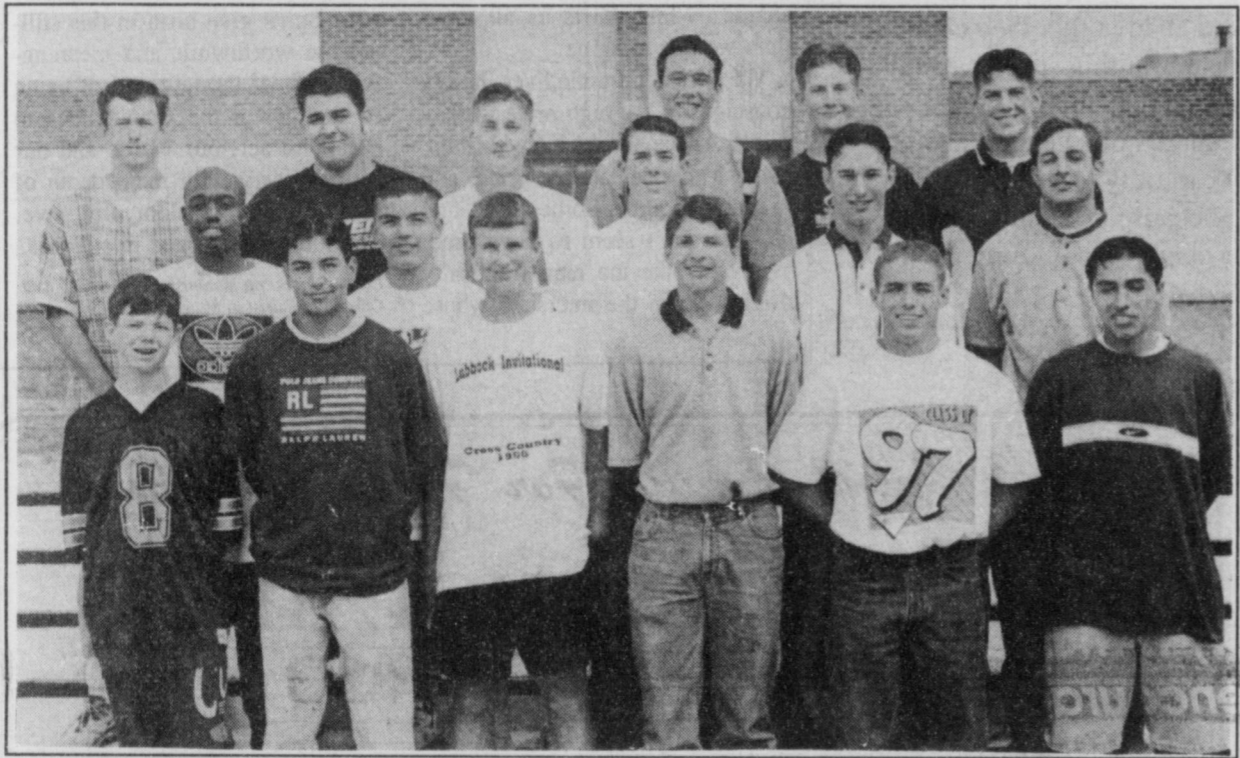
