Grade School Football

The Carbon Grade School boys coached by Wilbur Wood, were defeated by Strawn Tuesday night 19 to 18 in a hard fought game for their first loss of the season. In previous games Carbon won from Moran 45 to 6 and in their second game they defeated Strawn 12 to 6. Third game was won by Carbon over Putnam 31-6 and their final game of the season will be at Moran Tues. Oct. 3. In their last game Larry Bryant Joe Fields and Rickie Pack were outstanding on offense and Weldon Kanady, Billy Harle, Donald Hughes, Ronald Riggs and Ronnie Lasater were outstanding on defense.

Good management of grassland during last summers drought is now paying off. Grass production of better native grasses such as little bluestem, Indian grass, and sideoats grama show from 4,000 to 8,000 pounds per acre. This is approaching normal yearly production for these grasses. Grass production on poor condition ranges that were severely overused last summer show a disappointing regrowth of grass. Many such areas have less than 1,000 pounds green weight per acre.

Stockmen who in one manner or another managed to retain their grass cover during last summers drought are now reaping their reward. A reward to be seen in fattening cattle, green grass on the land, and water in the ground for growing a lot more grass before winter comes.

A danger sign of recent overuse of grass is shown by moisture penetration tests. Core tests show a beginning of the same patterns of moisture penetration so frequently observed during the drought of the fifties. One overabused tightland pasture has the soil only wet to a depth of ten inches where the buffalo grass had been almost nubbed to the ground.

This represents only about 1 1/2 inches of water out of around 8 inches rainfall since August 15. Where the buffalo grass has 2-3 inches height the soil is wet almost 2 feet. This represents about 4 inches of water or about 50 per cent retention of rainfall. Mixed land pastures with a fair cover of grass and litter are generally saturated to around 3

feet. This represents 5-6 inches of water.

Going back to August 15 it had been almost 5 months since this area had received any effective rainfall. This had happened during our principle grass growing season. Grass production was practically zero. The grass on the land had been produced either in the very early spring or carried over from last winter. As the dry weather continued during June, July, and early August continuous grazing gradually eliminated this dry grass from the land. This happened on a very big portion of our rangeland as well as Coastal Bermuda pastures. Recent checks of soil moisture and grass growth by local Soil Conservation Service workers indicate how much good management pays. Except where grass has been overabused, growth since August 15 has exceeded all expectations.

Livestock operators who managed to be in position last summer to relieve the grazing pressure on their land are now producing an abundant crop of grass. Recent samples of grass production with clipping tests show fantastic grass growth where grazing pressure was not too severe. One patch of Coastal Bermuda from which the cattle were removed July 15 to prevent damaging the turf shows almost 10,000 pounds of green grass per acre. This represents enough grass on an acre to furnish five or six cows for a period of one month.

A nearby patch of K. R. bluestem shows 7,900 pounds of green grass per acre.

WOLVERINES BEAT IREDELL 20-8 BEFORE LARGEST CROWD

The Carbon Wolverines defeated Iredell 20 to 8 before the largest crowd of the season here last Thursday night.

Iredell was leading 2 to 0 at the half due to a safety. Carbon came back strong in the second half and Ronnie Hughes recovered Ronnie Packs fumble behind the goal line for our first touchdown in the third quarter. Alvie Allison kicked the extra point. Ronnie Pack scored on a 15-yard run and the third quarter ended 14 to 8 with Carbon leading. Ronnie Pack scored on a 20-yard run from the line of scrimmage in the last play of the ball game and the game ended 20 to 8. Ronnie Pack, Danny Hobbs and Dwain Clower were outstanding on offense and Ronnie Hughes, J. R. Harle, Larry Duncan and Bruce Wyatt were outstanding on defense.

The Wolverines have an open date this weekend before entering conference play with Moran there Thursday night.

Oct. 29. Carbon has a perfect record with 6 wins and no defeats for the season.

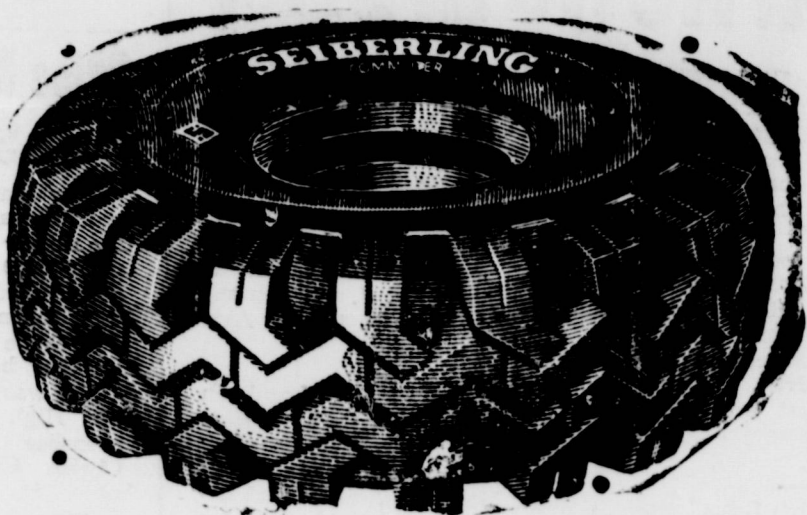

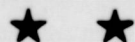
