Wheat Vote Set Tuesday

Polling places for the May 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1964 crop of wheat were announced today by Mr. Ray Bearden, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Ballots may be cast by eligible voters from 7:00 a, m. to 7:00 p. m., on Tuesday, May 21, at the following place: The Old Courthouse, Plains, Texas.

The Chairman explains that wheat growers eligible to vote in the referendum inculde (1) all producers of 15 acres or more who have an interest in a 1964 farm wheat acreage allotment, and (2) those farm operators (and other wheat growers on their farms) with allotments of less than 15 acres who elected by May 13 to aprticipate as an allotment grower in the 1964 wheat program. Such an election (was made by signing in the space provided on the back of the allotment notice for the farm and filing the notice at the ASCS County Office, Farmers that will be away on the Referendum day may obtain ballots and vote by mail.

Proclamation of wheat marketing quotas is directed by legislation whenever it is determined that the supply of wheat likely would be excessive in the absence of wheat marketing quotas. The supply of wheat for the 1964-65 marketing year, without quotas, has been estimated to be 2.8 35 million bushels, more than double the estimated domestic

disappearance and exports. Marketing quotas have been in effect continuously for the past ten wheat crops, as approved by growers voting in refer-endums held annually on the question.

Jobs don't "grow on trees" as the expression goes but, although some graduates don't realize the fact, industry is actually eager to qualified and capable high school graduates to fill immediate positions—or to enter training pro-

Some industries have established career guidance committees. Through distribution of press releases and information booklets, these committees inform junior and senior high students of job opportunities and requirements, colges offering specialized training, and companies which offer scholarship and financial aid programs.

For example, a 24-page booklet, "Grow with an Exciting Business," describes opportunities in the paper industry in such major areas as accounting, engineering, marketing and science. It also lists colleges which offer special-



GO TO COLLEGE . . :

Which Is Right Choice For High School Grad? ABOUT GOING TO COLLEGE

Question: Should I go to college? Answer: Yes-if your high school grades were good enough; if you can pass an entrance ex-

amination; if you can afford it. Question: Why should I go to college?

Answer: To continue your education and place yourself in a better position in your chosen

Question: Will a college degree guarantee me a job and a high income?

Answer: A college degree certifies that you have completed a specified course of education. You still have to get out and get yourself a job, just as a high school graduate does. And you have to earn" your way to the top.

Question: Then, why shouldn't I go ahead and get a job right

Answer: You can get a job right now—but a job that requires no more than a high school education will not pay as much as a job which sets a college degree as a requirement. As we said earlier, a college degree puts you into a position to realize a higher salary for your services.

Question: If I start now, with some good company, isn't it possible I might receive several promotions in four years, and by then have a good start on a

Answer: It's possible. It's also possible that four years from now you will discover that a co-worker, with a similar salary and similar pay, is fresh out of college-and you must compete with him for future promotions.

Question: Is a college education really so important in getting a 'good" job and is it such a factor in company promotions?

Answer: Simply stated, the best jobs go to college graduates because employers believe the col-lege graduate is better qualified

to accept a position of responsibility. If a high school graduate has outstanding qualifications, he may do well in any field; but another individual, with equal qualifications, plus the added recommendation of a college diploma, is certain to do better. As to the matter of promotions in business, put yourself in an employer's position: If you had two men of equal ability and talents, except that one had a college education, which man would you promote?

Question: Should I go on to college even though I have not yet chosen a career?

Answer: Certainly. The college f your choice will appoint an advisor to chart a course of general study and lend counsel to guide you to the choice of a career for which you are suited.

GETTING A JOB NOW

Question: I don't want to go to college. I want to get a job right away. How do I go about it?

Answer: Decide the type of job you would like to have . . . factory work, office work, selling, etc. Once you have chosen the type of work you wish to do, make a list of the companies in your com-munity which might hire you. Visit the personnel office of each and fill out an application for employment.

Question: Is that all there is to it? I just go around and make an application?

Answer: That is the beginning. When you make application for employment, you let a prospective employer know that you are available. He may not need you today or tomorrow. Next week, however, an opening may arise and he will be looking through the job applications filed with the personnel office to see if a likely candidate for the job is available.

Question: Then, if I am suited for the job, they call me and tell me when to report to work?

Answer: Not exactly. The job application that you fill out at a company personnel office does not always tell an employer all that he would like to know about you. The job application provides general information. If you are considered for employment, you will be asked to come in for a job interview at which time more specific questions will be asked.


