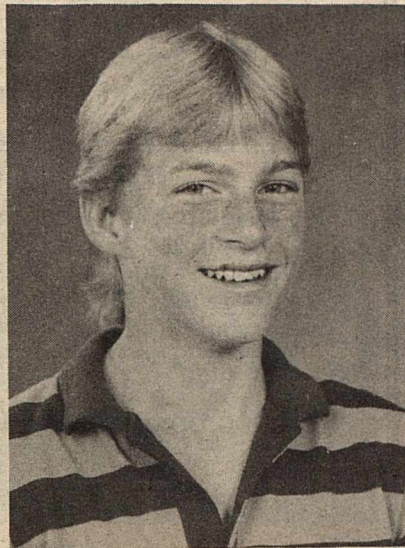

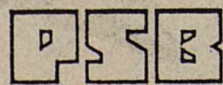

INSTANT HOT CHOCOLATE MIX

2 lb box Nestles Quik
1 lb 9.5 oz box Carnation instant milk

1 lb jar and 3 oz jar Coffee Mate
1 lb box and 1 c powdered sugar

Bake at 350° for 30 mins.

Edwin Livengood, of the Yoakum County Soil Conservation Service presented a program and film on water pollution.

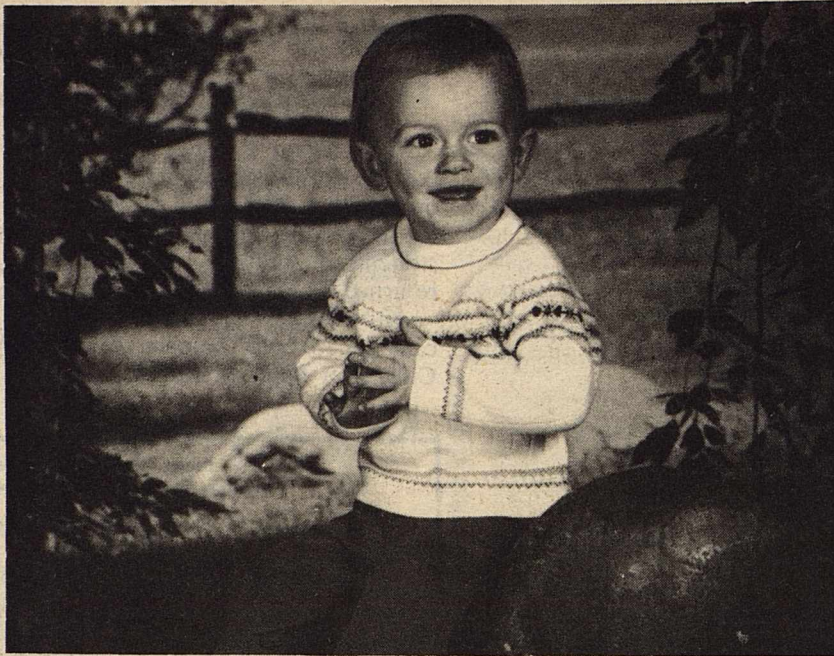

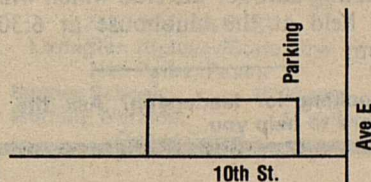

From The Superintendent's Desk

"The best news in education in a long time came with the appointment of Dr. William Kirby as Commissioner of Education. Dr. Kirby has served as interim commissioner for the past five months and has been a Texas Education Agency employee for the past twenty years. We congratulate the State Board of Education and Dr. Kirby on the appointment.

"Our junior high school renovation project is proceeding very nicely. Many people wonder why the renovation is taking place. There are three basic reasons for the renovation program. The first being that during the 1983 Christmas holidays, ceiling joists fell through the false tile ceiling in the junior high building. Structural stress was evident when school board members and an architectural firm examined the building. The lumber was extremely dry and brittle and there was little or no steel (with the exception of three steel joists) in the entire facility. Secondly, there were excessive plumbing problems in walls and floors; and the third reason deals with wiring and insurance rates. The wiring in this building did not meet state wiring codes. We, like many of you, admire the beauty of the tile roof, however, the weight of this type roof requires more support than is provided in the present structure. Our students and teachers are using libraries, shops and sharing classrooms, so that the project may be completed as soon as possible."

Child Welfare Board Meets In Lubbock Restaurant

A regional meeting of Child Welfare Board was held April 4 at the 50 Yard Line Restaurant in Lubbock with Mrs. Patti Lindsey of Denver City, Mrs. Peggy Squyres and Mrs. Jenny Coston of Denver City attending.

In conjunction with the proclamation of April as Child Abuse Month, a number of statistics were given about child abuse and it was noted that for 1985 there have been 28 intakes. Sexual abuse cases account for 20 percent of all intakes.

Facts pointed out included (1) One American child dies every four hours due to abuse or neglect; (2) Over 115 Texas children die annually due to abuse or neglect; (3) 5200 Texas children are in Child Protective Services foster care each month; (4) Confirmed cases of child abuse/neglect rose six percent in 1983; (5) It is believed that eight to 12 percent of Texas children (approximately 25 children for every church in Texas) are abused or neglected; (6) It is believed that only one-fourth of child abuse/neglect cases are reported; (7) 26 percent of Texas women are abused by a husband or boyfriend; (8) Four percent of elderly Texans are believed to be abused. Only 17 percent of this abuse is reported; and (10) 75-90 percent of those imprisoned for

violent crimes were abused and neglected as children.

To report child abuse cases, call the Department of Human Resources at 592-3307, Candy Seaton, Yoakum County Case Worker.
