More Firefighters Needed

Need for more firefighters was the center of discussion, Monday night when Plains Volunteer Firemen gathered for their regular meeting. At this time, there are 15 members on the roster and not all are active firefighters.

Fire chief, Rolan Taylor, said, "We have people to train new members and safety to the fireman is of primary importance to all of us. We are not going to send untrained people into a dangerous situation."

Taylor listed qualifications for new firefighters. A physical is not required, though firemen should be in good health. Persons should also be able to qualify for a commercial driver's license in order to drive the

trucks. Membership votes whether to accept candidates as firemen.

State Board of Insurance sets the standards for a volunteer fire department. How these requirements are met determines in part the insurance rates one pays on homes or businesses in Plains. Rates are higher now than they would be if the city had a minimum of 20 active firemen. Condition of the equipment, trucks and available water supply are also determining factors.

Taylor said, "Our equipment and trucks are in pretty good shape. There are some items of equipment we could certainly use, such as pagers for the firefighters...If they are away from their phone and even one-half mile or less out of town, we cannot reach them if we get a fire call."

Presently, the department has three firetrucks — a 2½ ton 1979 Ford with a 1000 gallon capacity, capable of pumping 750 gallons of water per minute; a 1955 truck with a 500 gallon capacity; and another Ford with a 250 gallon capacity. The trucks were purchased by Yoakum County and are maintained by the City of Plains. The city also provides a garage for the trucks at the fire station.

Ross W. James Named Supervisor

Ross W. James is the new county supervisor for Farmers Home Administration and will officially assume duties Jan. 21. He succeeds Linda Brakebill who has moved to Lubbock.

A native of Plainview, James has worked with FmHA in Swisher and Briscoe Counties and was also engaged in farming north of Plainview. He is a graduate of Plainview High School, attended Lubbock Christian College and earned degrees in ag finance from Texas Tech University.

James and his wife, Tonya, are parents of a one-year-old daughter, Sarah. He has been active in Young Farmers of Texas and Jaycees.

Visiting in Plains this week, he noted, "FmHA has 83 different loan programs. We do have the farmers best interest in mind and are eager to meet and work with the farmers in Yoakum County."

One of the newest pieces of equipment the department has is an AMKUS RESCUE UNIT, purchased in 1984. This is a hydraulic unit similar to the "Jaws of Life" units which enable firefighters in gaining quick entry into a building with less damage; however, it is primarily used to free a victim trapped in a wrecked vehicle.

Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer fireman is asked to attend one of the Monday night meetings held at 7:30 in the fire station next to the city hall. Visitors are always welcome. Becoming a volunteer firefighter is a community service which provides residents with a reason for pride and self-satisfaction.

ed to have Jones as a member of the staff in Plains and invites everyone to come by and get acquainted.

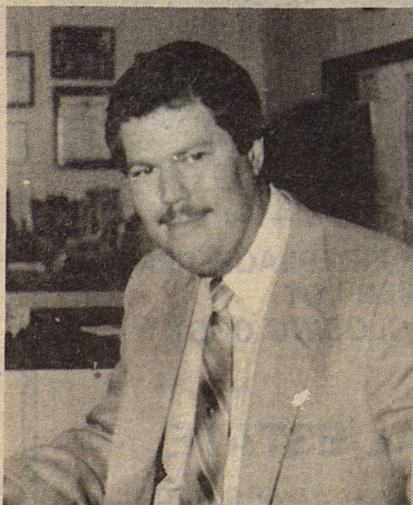
Citizens To Observe Texas Arbor Day

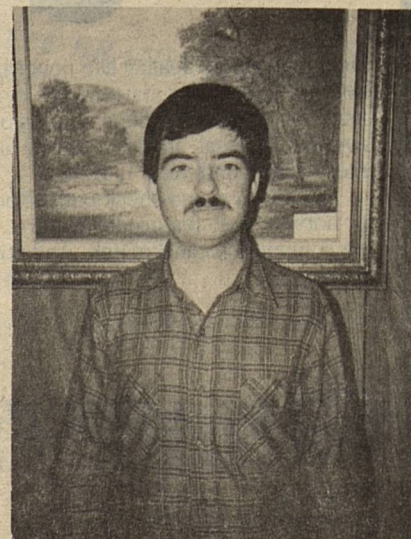

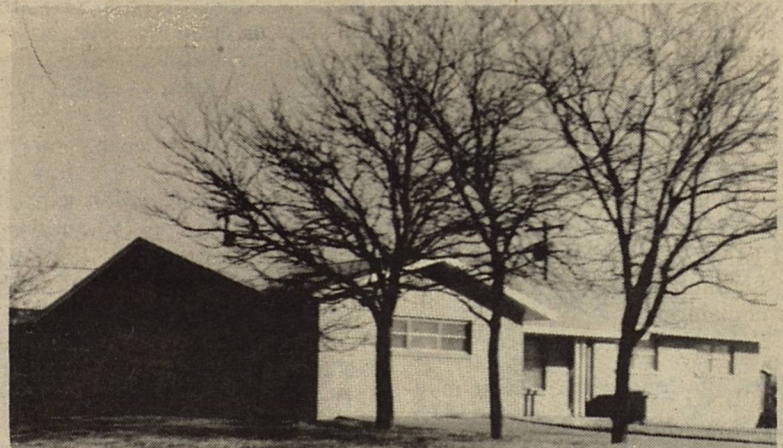

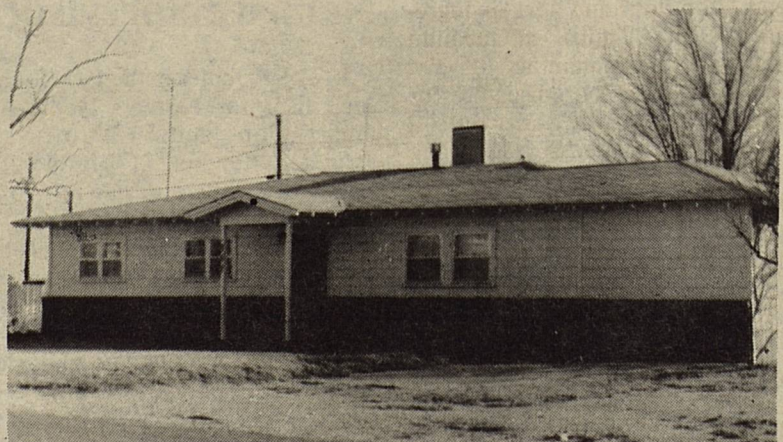

Kitchen Korner

Keeping up with the activities of her family leave little leisure time for Paula (Mrs. Larry) McMinn. With two sons in high school, another in elementary and a husband who is the athletic director for Plains High School, there's plenty to stay busy, says Paula.

Paula and Larry have called Plains their home for the past ten years. Mickey is a senior and Shane is a sophomore at PHS. Brad is a third grader.

A school bus driver, Paula also substitutes for teachers and aides when called upon.

Paula loves to sew and finds lots of pleasure in knitting and crocheting. She also likes to paint clothing.

Cooking is a pleasure, she says. She shares some of her families favorite recipes including one, "Ethel's Cake" that belonged to her grandmother.

CINNAMON ROLLS

- 3-3 1/2 c flour
- 1 pkg yeast
- 1/4 c sugar
- 1 t salt
- 1 c hot tap water
- 2 T butter, softened
- 1 egg

FILLING

- 1/2 c granulated sugar
- 2 t cinnamon
- 1/2 c softened butter

TOPPING

- 1 c heavy whipping cream
 - 1 c brown sugar
- (DO NOT SUBSTITUTE)

Mix brown sugar and cream in ungreased 9x13 pan. In large bowl, blend 1 1/2 c flour and next six ingredients. Beat 3 mins. at medium speed. Stir in remaining 1 1/2-2 c flour. Knead on floured surface for 1 min. Press or roll dough into a 15x7 inch rectangle. Spread filling over dough. Starting at long side, roll tightly, seal edges. Cut into 16-20 rolls. Place cut side down on cream mixture. Cover and let rise 35-45 mins. Bake rolls in pre-heated oven at 400° for 20-25 mins. Cool 10-15 mins. before turning out on tray.

BROWNIES

- 2 c sugar
- 1/2 c cocoa
- 1 c Crisco
- pinch of salt
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 c evaporated milk
- 1/2 t vanilla
- 1 c nuts

Cream first four ingredients together. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Bake in a greased

and floured pan (9x13) at 350° for 20-30 mins.

ICING

- 1 pkg powdered sugar
- pinch of salt
- 3 T cocoa
- 3/4 stk margarine, melted

Add enough evaporated milk to mixture to bring to spreading consistency. Spread over the hot brownies. Cut into squares.

ETHEL'S CAKE

(my grandmother's recipe)

- 1 c butter or shortening
- 2 c sugar
- 3 c flour
- 1 c buttermilk
- 1/2 t baking powder
- 1/2 t soda
- 4 eggs
- 1 t vanilla
- 1 t lemon (opt.)

Sift and measure flour, add baking powder and soda to flour. Cream sugar and butter thoroughly. Add alternately with milk and dry ingredients and one egg at a time. Beat thoroughly each time. Bake 1 hr. at 350°.

LASAGNE

- 6 strips of lasagne noodles
- 1/2 c chopped onion
- 1/4 t garlic powder
- 1 1/2 lbs ground beef
- 2 small or 1 lg can of tomato paste
- 1 can of tomatoes
- 1-1 1/2 t of salt
- 1/2 t pepper
- 1 t dried basil leaves
- 1 t oregano
- 1 sm carton cottage cheese
- 1-8 oz pkg of mozzarella cheese (can use 16 oz if desired)

Cook lasagne noodles in boiling salted water until tender (about 15

mins.) Stir occasionally while cooking. Drain and rinse. While lasagne is cooking, start ground beef cooking slowly. Add onions, cook until limp. After all red has disappeared from meat, stir in tomato paste, tomatoes, salt, pepper, basil, oregano and garlic. Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, about 30 mins. Grease a baking dish (9x13) and in it make layers of meat sauce, lasagne and cheeses. Make two layers. Bake in 350° oven 30-40 mins.

CHOCOLATE TIER DESSERT

- 1st layer:
2 c flour
2 stk butter, melted

1 c pecans

Mix and press into 9x13 pan sprayed with Pam. Bake at 350° for 20 mins.

2nd Layer:

- 1 c Cool Whip
- 1 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- 1 c powdered sugar

Mix and spread over 1st layer after it has cooled.

3rd Layer:

- 2 sm pkg of instant chocolate pudding
- 3 c milk

Mix and spread over 2nd layer. After pudding has thickened in refrigerator, then spread remaining Cool Whip over top.

From The Superintendent's Desk

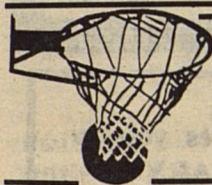

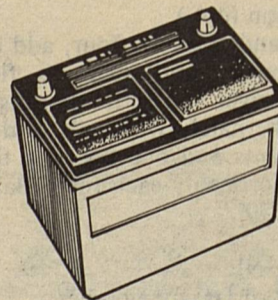

EXEMPTIONS:

1. Texas School Districts offer a \$5,000 residence homestead exemption off of appraised value, and additional exemptions to persons who are over 65 or disabled.
2. Yoakum County offers a \$3,000 homestead exemption off of appraised value on the Farm to Market and Lateral Road Fund, and a \$25,000 exemption off of appraised value to persons who are over 65.
3. The City of Plains and City of Denver City both offer exemptions to persons who are over 65.
4. All taxing units offer an exemption for certain service connected disabled veterans on one designated property. Surviving unmarried spouses are also entitled to these exemptions of a deceased veteran or a surviving minor child.
5. A mobile home owner must now provide a copy of a title issued by the Texas Department of Labor and Standards together with the residence homestead exemption in order to qualify for a residence homestead exemption.
6. If you received a residence homestead or disabled veterans exemption on your present property in 1985, it will not be necessary to make a new application for 1986 unless you receive a written request in the mail from the appraisal office. If you were at least 65 years of age or disabled on January 1, 1986 and have not previously filed for the over 65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application by April 1, 1986. Or, if you have never received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead, an original application must be filed with the appraisal office on or before April 1, 1986.

All exemptions not previously granted, must be filed on or before April 1, 1986.

LAND PRODUCTIVITY VALUATION:

If your acreage was appraised based on productivity for 1985, it will not be necessary to file a new application for 1986 unless you receive written request in the mail from this office.

RENDITIONS:

Business Personal Property renditions are mandatory according to State Law. Real Property renditions are an option available to owners of real property.

DEADLINE:

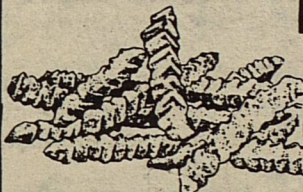

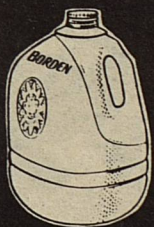
