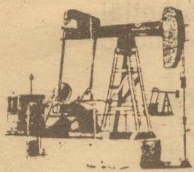

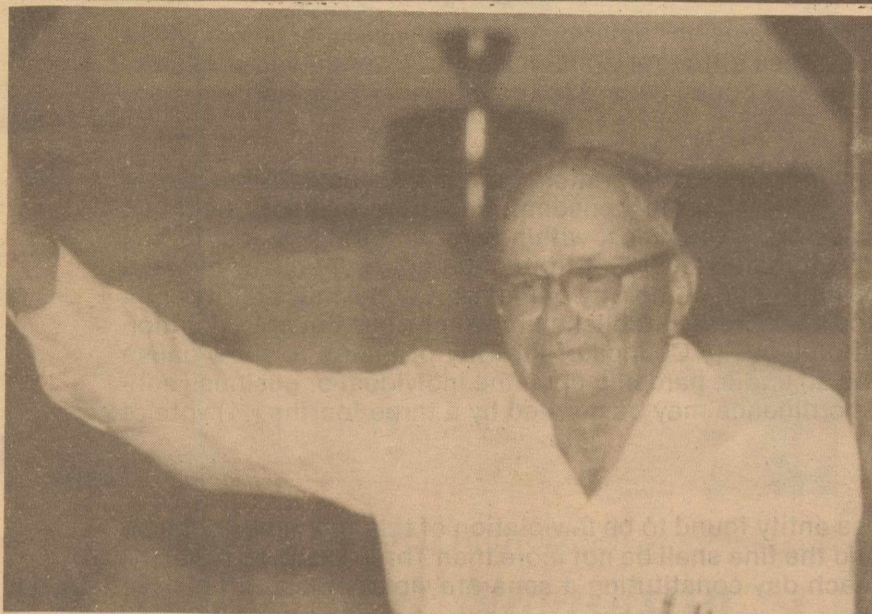

Born April 13 in Brownfield, the little boy was pronounced dead Wednesday after cardio-pulmonary resuscitation techniques by law enforcement officers were unsuccessful. The baby was taken to the hospital by EMS Ambulance Service.

Run-Off Election Results Announced

Dallas Brewer edged H.K. Henniger in the run-off battle for Yoakum County Judge. In Saturday's balloting, Brewer received 795 votes to Henniger's 709.

In the race for County Treasurer, Toni Jones garnered 802 votes to Gary Don Ford's 696.

A.G. Brantley bested Billie Blundell in the election for Precinct One's Justice of the Peace seat. Winning by 56 votes, Brantley received 283 and Ms. Blundell, 227.

Volunteers Needed For Ambulance Crew

Persons are being sought who will train and serve with the ambulance service in Plains. The City of Plains is making plans to sponsor an ECA course to qualify these persons. It is scheduled for the first week in August.

Anyone interested in taking the course and becoming a part of the ambulance service is asked to contact City Hall, 456-2288.

A meeting is being planned for sometime in July when interested persons can ask questions and learn more about plans.

The small number of persons presently working with the ambulance service is a grave concern of the city and the people of Plains. Denver City recently has been taking most of the ambulance calls for Plains, but this cannot continue. Quite a few Plains residents have trained in the three schools that have been previously held but have become disinterested. A plea is issued now for those persons genuinely interested in serving, to take the training courses and offer their time and support to the ambulance service.

ORDINANCE NO. 79 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING RESTRICTIONS UPON LIQUOR ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF PLAINS AND MAKING VIOLATIONS A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY FINE NOT TO EXCEED THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (300.00) FOR EACH DAY OF NONCOMPLIANCE

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Plains finds that there is a potential public hazard regarding a private club, or any establishment selling alcoholic beverages in the City limits of the City of Plains; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Plains believes that it is in the best interest of the citizens of Plains to have a reasonable plan for location of such establishments;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS:

SECTION 1

The City Council of the City of Plains has determined that any establishment which serves or sells alcoholic beverages either for on premises or off premises consumption presents a certain health and police hazard to the citizens of Plains,

SECTION 2

It shall be unlawful for any individual, corporation, firm or any business enterprise to place an establishment, either for the consumption of, or sale of, alcoholic beverages, either on premises or off premises, within two hundred (200) feet of any residence or business or five hundred (500) feet from churches, schools or medical facilities, located within the city limits of the City of Plains. Any business entity or individual who desires to place a business establishment which sells liquor in violation of this ordinance may petition the City Council of the City of Plains to show cause why this ordinance would be an undue hardship upon the individual or business entity, and a variance from this ordinance may be granted by a three fourths (¾) vote of the City Council.

SECTION 3

Any individual or business entity found to be in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and the fine shall be not more than Three Hundred (\$300.00) for each day of violation, each day constituting a separate violation and offense of this ordinance.

SECTION 4

If any portion of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be declared invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portions thereof. All ordinances, or any parts of ordinances or other resolutions in conflict with this ordinance are hereby expressly changed, amended or altered to effectuate this ordinance.

Dobson Film Series Begun At Denver City Church

First United Methodist Church of Denver City is sponsoring a six-weeks series, "Turn Your Heart Toward Home" by Dr. James and Shirley Dobson. The film series began June 1 and will continue at 7 p.m. each Sunday through July 6.

Slated for Sunday, June 15 is "Power In Parenting: The Adolescent" and discusses father/daughter and mother/son relationships and the importance of allowing children to grow and develop as individuals.

The bride graduated from Plains High School and Baylor University. She is presently employed in the marketing department of Spenco Medical Corporation.

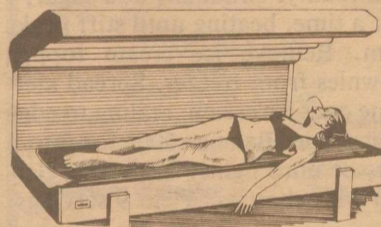

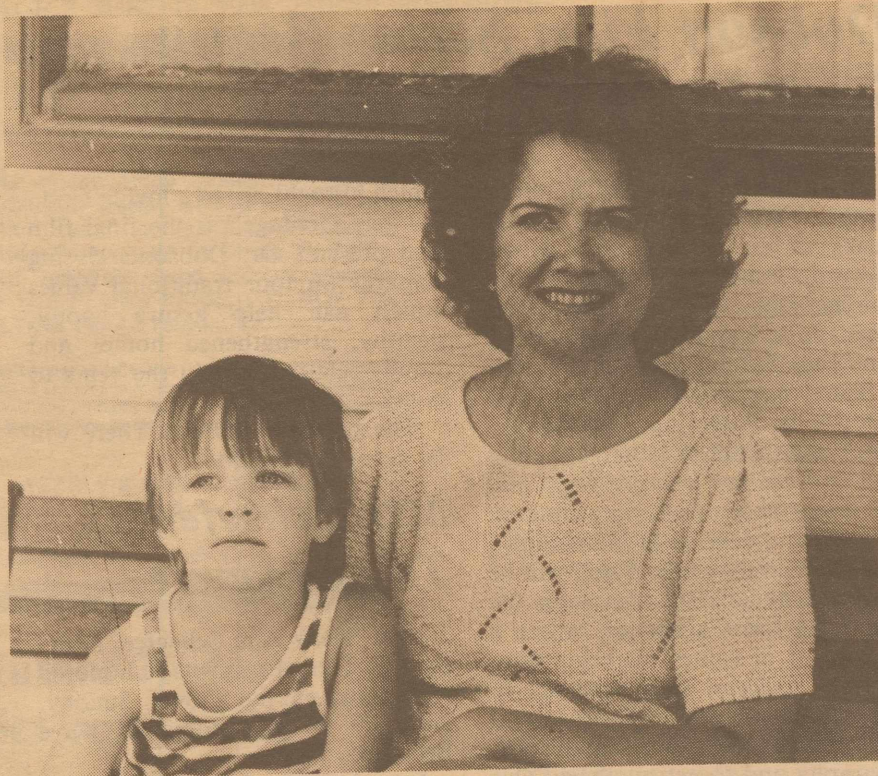

Kitchen Korner

Recipes shared with our readers this week are somewhat out of the ordinary, especially the so-called "elephant stew" which would prove to be difficult even for the best of cooks!

MARINATED SWEET CHICKEN

1 bottle Russian Dressing (or Catalina)
1 jar apricot preserves
1 envelope dry onion soup mix
1 or 2 chickens, cut-up indiv. pieces
Combine dressing, preserves and soup mix; pour over chicken and bake 30 mins. covered at 350°. Take cover off and bake additional 30 mins. or til liquid crystalizes or thickens.

VEGETABLE CASSEROLE

1 c string beans
1 can lima beans
1 can English peas
Cook and drain, season lightly and combine.

SAUCE:

2 c Helman's mayonaise
1 med onion, grated fine
1 t Worcestershire
6 T oil
Dash of Accent
4 hard-boiled eggs, grated
Layer in 2 qt casserole:
Vegetables
Sauce
1 egg, grated
repeat

Top with 2 remaining hardboiled eggs, grated
(Make 2 layers)

Sprinkle paprika on top. May be frozen at this stage and thawed to bake. Bake in 350° oven til bubbly, approx. 45 mins.

BROWNIE ALASKAS

1 (15.5 oz) pkg fudge brownie mix
1½ pts strawberry ice cream
4 egg whites
½ c sugar
red and green cherry wedges

Prepare brownie mix according to package directions using a 9-inch square pan; let cool completely. Cut brownies into 3 inch squares or rounds. Arrange brownies on a cookie sheet; top each with a scoop of ice cream. Freeze at least 1 hr.

Beat egg whites (at room temp) until foamy. Gradually add sugar, 1 T at a time, beating until stiff peaks form. Remove ice cream topped brownies from freezer. Spread meringue over ice cream; sealing to edge of brownie. Bake at 500° for 2 to 3 mins or until lightly browned. Garnish with cherries. Yield 9 servings.

SOUTH OF THE BORDER LASAGNE

1 lb ground beef
4 (7-inch) flour tortillas
veg. oil
1 15 oz can tomato sauce
1 1¼ oz pkg taco seasoning mix
1 4 oz can chopped green chilies, drained and divided
1 16 oz can avocado dip or 1 recipe of guacamole
1 c (4 oz) shredded Monterey Jack Cheese, divided
1 jalapeno pepper, sliced and seeded (optional)
1 hot red pepper, sliced and seeded (optional)
fresh parsley sprigs

Cook ground beef in a skillet until browned, stirring to crumble; drain well and set aside.

Fry tortillas, one at a time, in ¼ inch hot oil about 5 seconds on each side or just til softened. Drain well on paper towels. Set aside.

Combine tomato sauce and taco seasoning mix in a medium saucepan; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer uncovered 10 mins. Remove from heat; reserve ¼ c sauce mixture. Add beef and half of green chilies to remaining sauce mix.

Place a tortilla and half of meat mixture in a greased 8- or 9-inch cake pan. Layer with a tortilla, avocado mixture, ½ c cheese and remaining green chilies. Top with a tortilla, remaining meat sauce, remaining tortilla and ¼ c reserved sauce. Bake uncovered at 350° for 40 mins. Sprinkle with remaining ½ c cheese and bake on additional 5 mins. or til cheese melts. Garnish

top with pepper slices and parsley if desired. Makes 4 servings.

ELEPHANT STEW

1 elephant (med. size)
2 rabbits (optional)
salt & pepper to taste
brown gravy (lots!)

Cut elephant into small bite size pieces - this will take about 2 months. Reserve the trunk - you will need something to put the pieces in. Add enough brown gravy to cover. Cook on Kerosene stove for about 4 weeks at 465°. This will serve 3,800 people. If more are expected, the 2 rabbits may be added. Do this only if necessary, as most people DO NOT LIKE to find "hare" in their stew!!

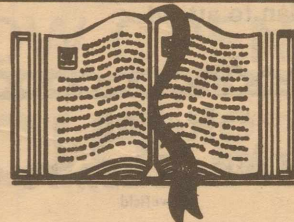

From The Superintendent's Desk

School is now out in Plains but in Austin there are still difficult choices to be made concerning education funding and public school spending that will affect all public schools in the State of Texas. W.N. Kirby, state education commissioner, told Texas House members convened to discuss the State's budget crisis that state taxes should be raised if needed to support public education.

"We simply can't finance state revenues on the back of public education," Kirby told lawmakers. Specifically Kirby warned that the state will need to come up with \$556 million in additional revenue to support the education programs - including the reforms - now in place for 1988-89.

The budget decrease of 10 percent in school funding would eliminate 1 billion in Texas public school funds. A 20 percent decrease would reduce education spending by 2.25 billion.

Districts might be able to make up a 10 percent decrease in state education spending by raising taxes an average of 19.8 percent, Kirby said, or by slashing payrolls and laying off employees. All districts would be affected differently. The commissioner estimated that the affluent Highland Park I.S.D. might have to raise taxes by only 2 percent, while Brownsville I.S.D. would need a hefty 160 percent tax increase to make up the deficit.

On the "good news" side, Kirby reported the state will spend \$149 million less than was anticipated in the current biennium because of less-than-anticipated enrollments in full-day kindergarten and other programs. But the state's student population is continuing to grow at more than 60,000 students a year.

HB 72 is succeeding," Kirby told lawmakers, citing improving student achievement scores, teacher and administrator competency programs, teacher pay hikes and the emphasis of increased funding and equalization programs. But Kirby added the success of HB 72 and the curriculum bill will be severely hampered unless education funding is increased - not decreased.

So you see there is still much to be accomplished concerning funding for public education in our state. However, our lawmakers and educators will continue in their efforts to make education in Texas the best!

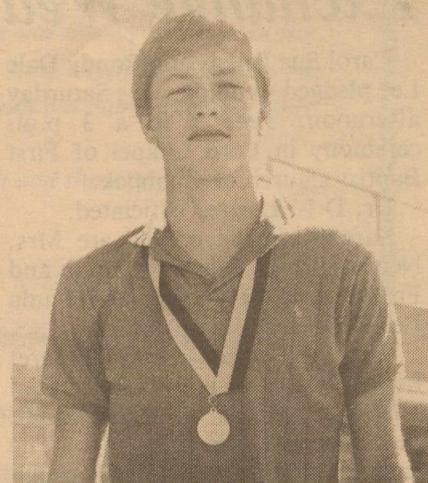

The prospective groom graduated in 1978 from Plains High School. He is currently employed with Adams Farm Equipment Company of Lubbock.

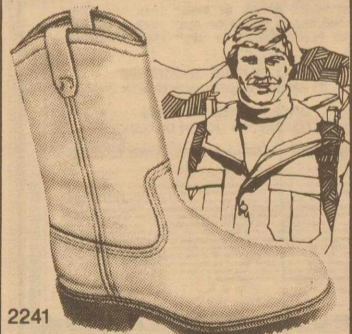

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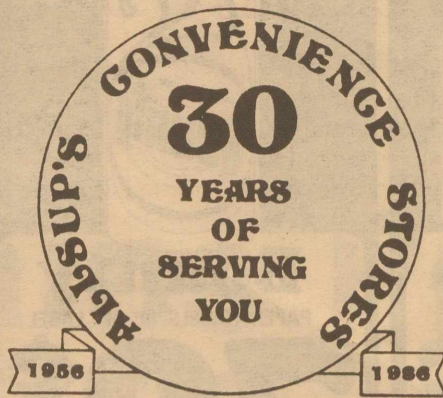
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
