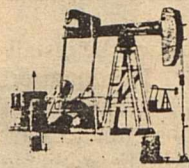

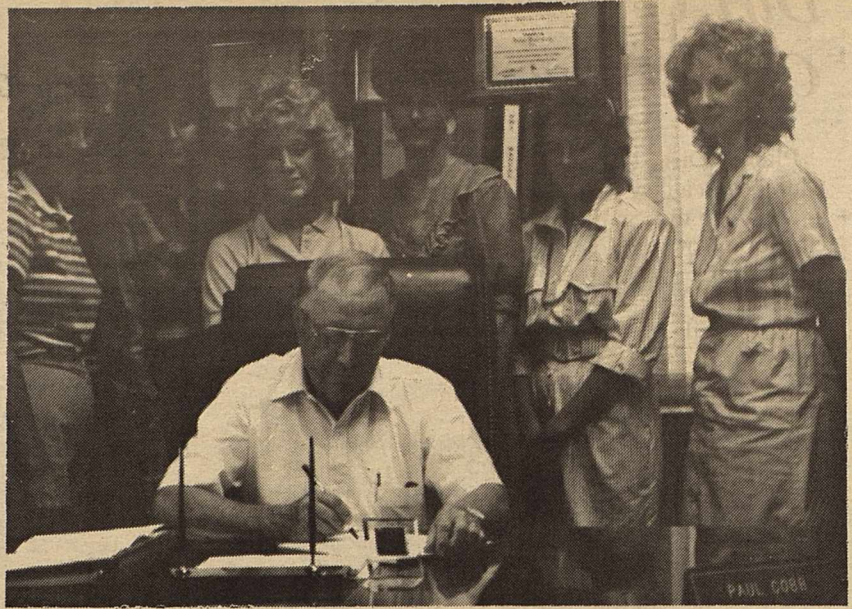

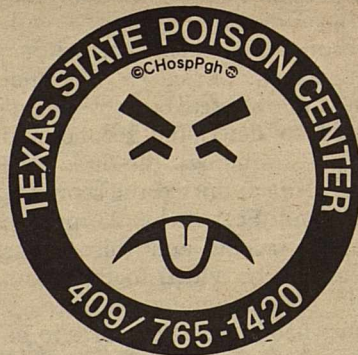
**Welfare Board Holds Meeting**

The drawing for a gas barbecue grill was postponed until Sept. 27. A work day was set for Sept. 24 in the Video Studio.

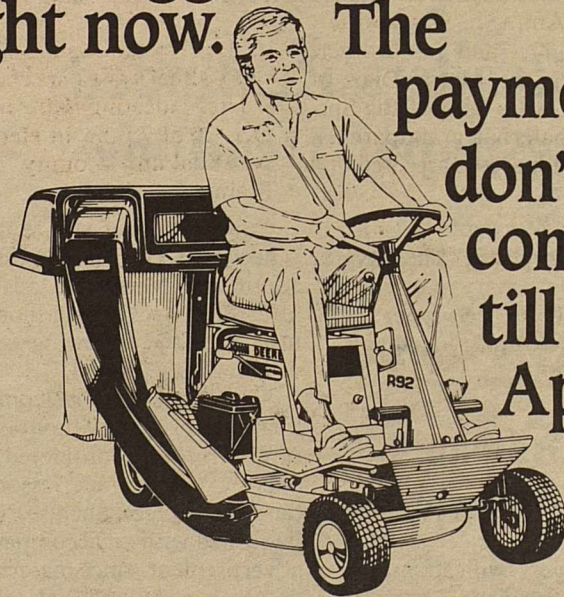

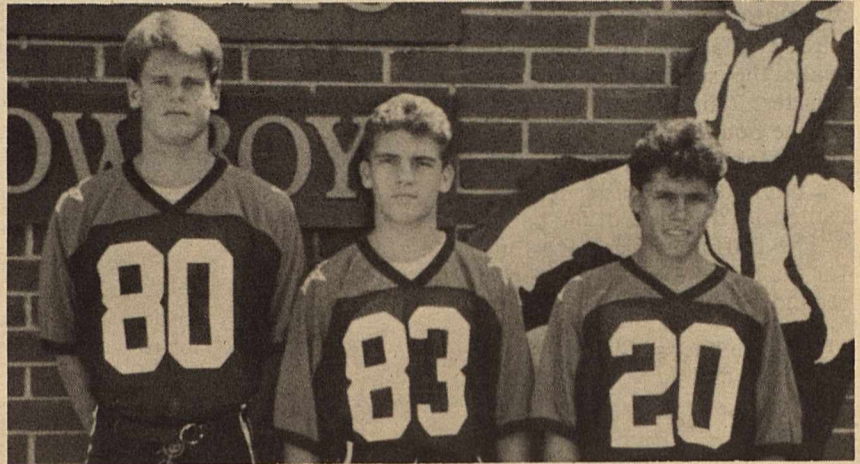
The good news this week is that we are completing our third week of school. We have set a school record attendance in our elementary school with 232 students enrolled at the present time with 65 or those students being in the first grade. We have 158 students in junior high and 120 students in our high school.

Our bus routes are becoming established and are beginning to settle into a normal route schedule. We have five bus routes that cover the 599 square miles in our district. It is our desire that no student should ride the bus for more than forty-five minutes. In addition to our regular bus routes, we also send a bus to Brownfield each day for our students in certain special education classes and for cosmetology students. Last year our route buses traveled a total of 100,392 miles.

Our bus drivers are: Dub Nelms, Paula McMinn, Jim Baldwin, Bill Strickler, Robert Rios, Dennis Casey and Melissa Garcia. We also have several staff members and others in the community, who have all the qualifications necessary to be a school bus driver and are willing to substitute for our regular drivers as the need arises. We would like to express our appreciation to our drivers, they have one of the most important responsibilities in our district as they transport our students to and from school. We ask that you help with this responsibility by being courteous and polite when a school bus approaches.

# Plains Falls To Forsan

The Forsan Buffaloes came to town last Friday night and handed the Cowboys their first loss of the season. Plains lost the contest, 22-6.

In the first quarter, the two undefeated teams engaged in a defensive struggle which produced a scoreless end to the first period. Forsan drew first blood with 9:09 left in the second quarter. Wade Wright scampered four yards to pay dirt, and also added the PAT to make the score 7-0. In the same quarter, Plains put their only points on the board with a four yard pass from McMinn to Rivera, but the extra point failed. This scoring strike came with 1:29 left in the half.

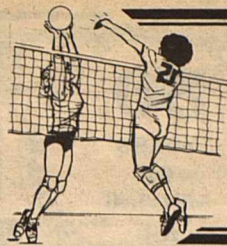
The Buffaloes were not finished for the half, however, with only :39 seconds left, quarterback Brad

Nichols threw a strike to Lee Morris which covered 52 yards and concluded in the end zone. The extra point by Wright failed. The Cowboys nearly pulled off a miracle themselves on a draw to Martin Barrientes which covered 51 yards - only four yards short of the goal line as time expired. The Cowboys went to the locker room with a 13-7 deficit at halftime.

The third period was another defensive struggle with no points being produced by either team.

The fourth quarter proved to be fatal for the Cowboys, who gave up nine points in a come-from-behind effort. Wade Wright put more points on the board with a 22 yard field goal with 3:31 left on the clock. The defensive unit also got into the scoring act when cornerback Brad Nichols picked off an errant pass from McMinn and went 23 yards to score with only 13 seconds left in the game. The extra point failed and the final score stood 22-6 in favor of Forsan.

The Buffaloes were led by Wade Wright who scored 10 points and rushed for 107 yards on 18 carries. Forsan improved their record 3-0 while Plains fell to 1-1. The Cowboys traveled to Farwell Sept. 19 to meet the Steers and will host Stanton Sept. 26, for Plains 1986 Homecoming.
