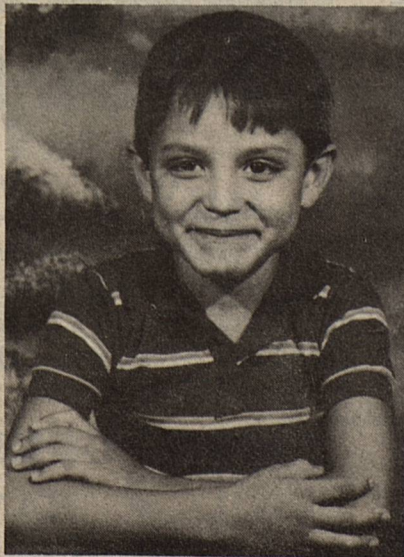
The Plains Elementary student died at 9:40 a.m. Monday, April 20 in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a brief illness.

Women's Protective Services Topic Of ABWA Program

Angela McGranahan of Women's Protective Services in Lubbock and Dinora Carrejo-Guthrie of Option Incorporated in Hobbs presented Monday evening's program for Texas Plains Charter Chapter of ABWA meeting in the home of Linda Lowrey.

Outreach Coordinator for Women's Protective Services, Ms. McGranahan stated that 15 counties, including Yoakum, are included in the region she serves. She is interested in recruiting volunteers who are willing to provide supportive services to women and children who are victims of abuse.

One out of two women will be physically abused at some point in their lives by men with whom they live, according to FBI estimates, she stated. More than 100,000 Texans are subject to spouse abuse on at least a weekly basis.

Estimates show that twenty percent of all hospital emergency room visits by women are attributed to wife beating; seventy percent of emergency room assault cases are wives.

According to estimates, eighty percent of Texas spouse abuse cases go unreported because of fear of reprisal, Ms. McGranahan said. Sixty percent of men who batter came from violent homes.

Absenteeism from work due to domestic violence results in an estimated economic loss to businesses of this country of three to five billion dollars per year plus another one hundred million in medical bills.

Summer Reading Program Slated

"Animal Antics" is the theme of the Summer Reading Program sponsored by Texas State Library. The summer program at Yoakum County Library begins June 1.

Boys and girls from kindergarten through eighth grade are invited to participate. Those reading ten books, at their own reading level, will receive a certificate. Names of boys earning certificates will be placed in a drawing for a Red Porsche 911 SC poster. Girls earning certificates will have their names placed in a drawing for an Encore Slippers poster. Winners will be announced at the end of the reading program. Posters will be displayed in the library.

Library personnel look forward to a large group of summer readers.

Ms. McGranahan stated that more than 4,500 victims and their dependents have been served by Women's Protective Services of Lubbock since it began in 1978.

She stated the purpose of WPS is to intervene in the cycle of violence by educating the community as to the incidence of family violence, setting up emergency shelter for battered victims (women or men) and their dependents and developing supportive services for victims of family violence.

Ms. McGranahan explained that any person in need of help because of family violence should call the Sheriff's office in Plains, 456-2377, or Denver City Police Department, 592-3516.

A training session will be offered May 2-3 in Denver City. Interested persons should call Debbie Rushing, Yoakum County Children's Protective Services, at 592-3307.

Special Bilingual Program To Be Offered This Fall

A special bilingual program is being offered this summer by Plains Independent School District for children who will be kindergarten students in the fall. It is designed to help those children who do not speak and/or understand English as well as they should.

Parents are not required to send their children but participation is encouraged. Students will be given a language test before being accepted into the program. Parents of all eligible students will be notified of test results before students are admitted to the program.

The school will begin June 29 and continue eight weeks, closing Aug. 21. Classes will meet from 9 a.m. until 12 noon. No meals or snacks will be served and no transportation furnished by the school. Each family will be responsible for providing transportation to and from school.

There will be no charge for the program. Certified teachers will be employed by the school district. Students are requested to maintain regular attendance in order to ensure the success of the program.

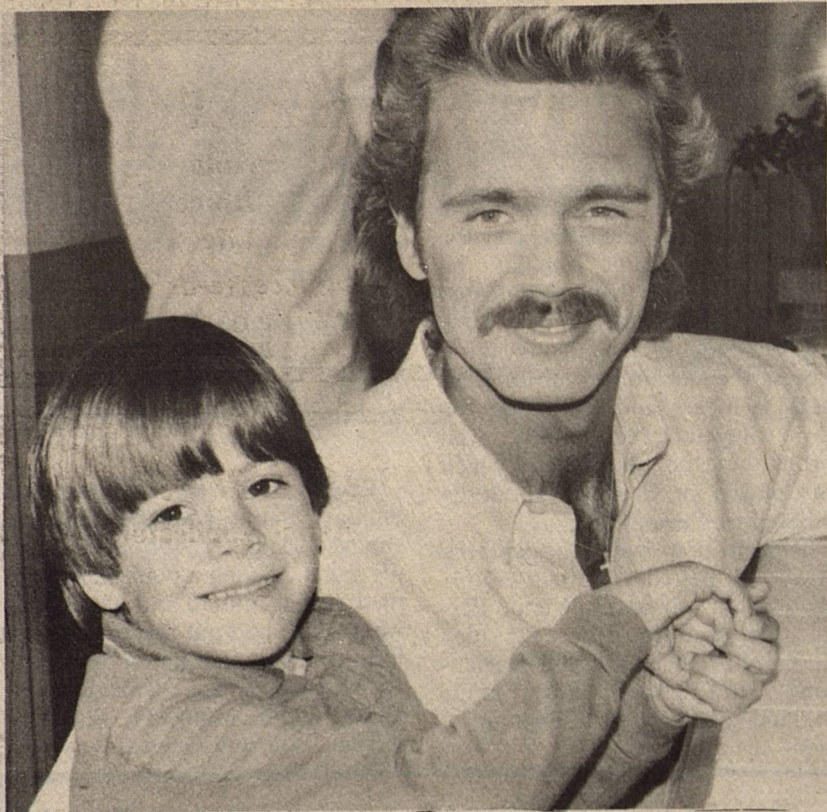
