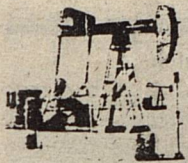

Cowboys Bust Broncos

Plains played the role of the neighborhood bully by throwing its weight all over Meadow Memorial Field Friday night, according to Saturday's Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The Cowboys did what they wanted, when they wanted in busting the Broncos 39-13 in a District 3-1A football clash.

The Broncos, who slipped to 4-4 overall and 0-3 in district action, dug themselves a hole with three turnovers early in the first quarter, and the Cowboys were there to kick dirt in their faces.

Plains now 7-1 and 3-1, rolled up 433 yards in total offense, including 222 yards in the first half, while holding Meadow to 176 total yards and only 50 yards in the first half.

The A-J reports the Cowboys scoring early and often, jumping to a 21-0 advantage at halftime and then riding off into the sunset.

After their first possession ended with a punt, the Cowboys got the ball back moments later when Scott Lowrey stepped in front on an errant Ray Ruiz pass at the Meadow 40 yard line.

Three plays later, Michael Diaz, who dashed for 170 yards on 20 carries in the contest, scampered into the end zone from 28 yards out. Shane McMinn then booted the extra point, giving Plains a 7-0 lead with 4:56 left to play in the first quarter.

Only a few seconds had ticked off the clock when the Cowboys got the ball back again after James Ritz fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Kevin Lowrey pounced on the loose pigskin for Plains at the Meadow 25.

Plains took its time scoring, covering the 25 yards to paydirt in

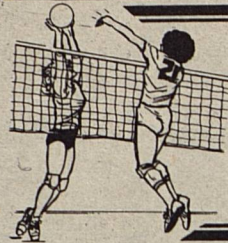

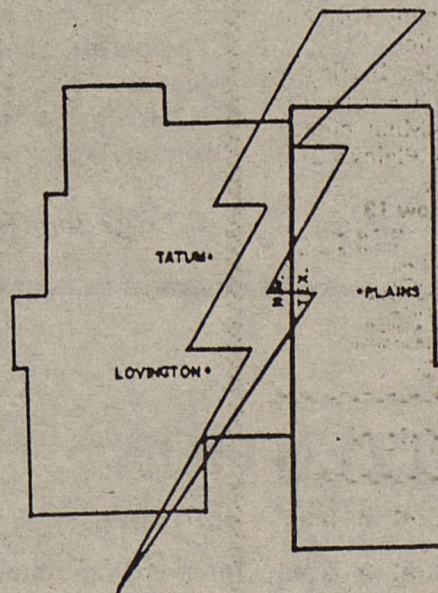

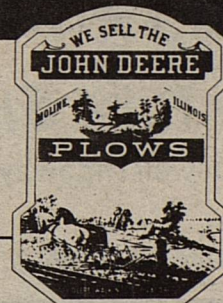
