Cowboys End Season, 10-2

Plains 20 Wheeler 29

The Plains Cowboys traveled to Hereford Friday night to meet the Wheeler Mustangs in a Regional football playoff game. The Cowboys had high hopes for a regional championship, but the Mustangs proved to be a formidable force to overcome.

Plains won the coin toss and after the Mustang opening kickoff, started from their own 15 yard line. Shane McMinn passed to Scott Lowrey for six yards. A five yard penalty on Wheeler gave the Cowboys a first down. The next series found the Cowboys unable to move and they punted the ball.

Wheeler took over on its 45 yard line. In a drive that took eight plays the Mustangs scored their first touchdown. Grayson Benson and Bubba Smith had good runs for Wheeler. Shane Guest scored the TD from 18 yards out. The PAT was no good.

Plains started the next drive from their own 13 yard line. A five yard penalty put the Cowboys on their own eight yard line. A run by Alex Barrientes got out to the 22 yard line. The Cowboys failed to get the first down and punted.

Wheeler took the ball on Plains 47 yard line and returned it to the 33 yard line. Wheeler ran six plays before the end of the first quarter. Wheeler was on the Cowboy 18 yard line at the start of the second quarter. Benson took the ball to the three yard line on the next play. Smith scored on the following play. The two point conversion was no good.

Green returned the kickoff to the Plains 25 yard line. Lowrey took a pass from McMinn to the 47 yard line. The next play McMinn's pass was tipped and intercepted on the Wheeler five yard line by Guest. Fifteen plays later the Mustangs made good on a 16 yard field goal. The score stood at 15-0.

Barrientes returned the kickoff to the Plains 26 yard line. Two running plays moved the ball to the 30 yard line. A McMinn pass to Green was good for 20 yards to the 50 yard line. Green then took a pass to the Wheeler 40 yard line. Diaz had a fine run to the Wheeler 17 yard line. McMinn's pass to Lowrey was good for 16 yards to the one yard line. On

a quarterback sneak McMinn scored. The PAT was no good. The half ended after a short possession by Wheeler with the score 15-6.

Plains opened the second half kicking off to Wheeler. The Mustangs started from their own 21 yard line. They ran six plays and are forced by the Plains defense to punt.

The Cowboys took over on their own 32 yard line. Blake McWhirter ran the ball to the 37 yard line. He then carried for two yards to the 39. A five yard penalty put the

Shoemaker Rites Held In Plains

Services were held Monday, Nov. 30 in First United Methodist Church for Lynn S. Shoemaker, 79. Officiating were the Rev. Ken Peterson, and the Rev. L.D. Hinson, pastor of First Assembly of God Church.

Interment was in Plains Cemetery under direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

Mr. Shoemaker died at 4:15 p.m. Nov. 27 in St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock after a lengthy illness.

Born March 14, 1908 in Campbell, he moved to Oklahoma at an early age. He moved to Plains in 1933 and then to California. He married Sallye Ruth Davis Sept. 19, 1938 in Lovington, N.M. They lived in Los Angeles, Calif. where he was an automobile and aircraft mechanic.

Retiring in 1973, he moved to Oregon and returned to Plains in 1980. He was a member of First United Methodist Church.

Computer Training Offered Yoakum County Farmers

Farmers and ranchers in Yoakum County who want to improve their skills with computers as a step toward improving their chances for profit should take advantage of a series of short courses being offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says County Agent David Kight.

"The Extension Service is dedicated to helping Texas farmers and ranchers regain profitability in their operations," Kight said. "To do this, producers must improve their financial management skills, their skills in budgeting, planning and record keeping."

One of the newest pieces of farm and ranch equipment that can be used to enhance these skills is the computer, the Extension agent said.

To provide in-depth training in the use of this piece of equipment, the Extension Service will teach four computer short courses in the next few months at Sweetwater on the Texas State Technical Institute campus. Each will be two and one-half days long and will be taught by Extension economists from around the state who specialize in various computer applications in their work with farmers and ranchers.

The first in the series will be Dec. 28-30 and will cover "Electronic Spreadsheets and Their Use in Agriculture", said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension agricultural economist and management specialist at Lubbock. Lotus 1-2-3 is the spreadsheet software to be used in the training.

"The spreadsheet has proven to the type of software most often used and most helpful to farmers and ranchers, Kight said. The first short course will cover what spreadsheets are, how they work, and what they can do to help agricultural decision makers develop new aids to fit their situations.

"No previous computer spreadsheet experience is necessary, since most of this course will involve teaching the basics of Lotus 1-2-3," the county agent said. Participants will review available spreadsheets being used for decisions on farm program participation, stocker cattle budgeting, cash flow planning, record keeping and other applications.

Each short course will be limited to 20 participants. This will insure the opportunity for hands-on computer use and a high staffparticipant ratio, Smith explained. The \$125 registration fee covers four meals, refreshments and educational materials. Those interested in attending the spreadsheet short course Dec. 28-30 in Sweetwater should immediately write or call Dr. Jackie Smith at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, Rt. 3, Box 213AA, Lubbock, 79401-9746, telephone 806-746-6101.

Other in-depth short courses to be held in 1988 at Sweetwater will include "Farm and Ranch Accounting with Microcomputers," "Advanced Electronic Spreadsheet Applications in Agriculture" and "Whole Farm/Ranch Planning and Financial Management".



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

These are the kind of articles that I most enjoy writing. Today is more difficult because I feel that if I write about the good things, then I must also report the things that are not so good.

It is often said that it is the way in which we look at things that is important. Situations that are considered adversities to many people are challenges to others. In the past three weeks I have seen our students experience both wins and losses. In winning I saw an attitude of humility, and in losing I saw a cordial attitude. Our students have held their heads high in both winning and losing situations. They have demonstrated the quality of character that makes us proud that they represent our school. You will never know the number of compliments our students receive from towns where we participate in events and from restaurants where they eat. Our students are the kind of young people that you want them to be and are a pleasure to be around. They cheer together in victory and hurt for each other in defeat.

We have not won every athletic contest this year and we have not won every academic contest. Not all of our students passed the TEAMS exit level test on the first application, however we are all working to win in each area. The TEAMs test gets harder each year but we will master this exam. Our teachers, coaches, band director, administrators, and students often meet adversities and challenges. Working together we will solve these problems. Plains I.S.D. is an excellent school and is getting better all the time.

As I read of and observe things that are happening to schools across the state, I become more appreciative of small schools and West Texas.

The Classroom Teachers of Dallas organization urged its members to boycott nighttime open house gatherings during American Education Week because security is so lax in school parking lots that members risk vandalism of their cars, theft, verbal abuse and worse. The Dallas Times Herald newspaper published an editorial calling for the district to consider hiring trained security guards at schools where the trouble is worst, and asking for frequent surveillance by police patrol officers on nights when meetings are held.

We are hearing similar type stories from Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, Fort Worth, and even closer in Lubbock, Odessa, Midland and Amarillo.

It is really a pleasure to be able to attend a function in our community without fear for self or property. This is a very unique condition and we should all work together to preserve this life style.

Cowboys back to the 34 yard line. McMinn passed to Diaz for a completion to the 49 yard line. Being rushed by a defender McMinn threw to the 24 yard line where the pass was intercepted by Benson. He returned it to the 50 yard line where he fumbles, however, the fumble was recovered by Wheeler. A penalty put the Mustangs back to the 35 yard line. They ran six plays then surprised the Cowboys with a guard around run by Chad Bentley. The play was good for 37 yards. Green caught him from behind to stop the play. A clipping penalty brought the Mustangs back to the 35 yard line. JUNIOR HIGH



Pays To Worm Your Beef Cows

Field trials conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service show that worming beef cows is a paying practice, returning \$2 to \$5 for every dollar invested, points out David Kight, County Extension Agent.

Bruce Carpenter, Extension Service assistant in beef cattle at Bryan this summer compiled the results of trials.


Trial one involved two separate pastures of cows with their calves. All animals in one pasture were treated with fenbendazole, while animals in the other pasture were left untreated. Average daily gain of treated calves was higher than that in the untreated group, resulting in a total weight gain advantage for treated calves of 13.9 pounds, Kight points out.


Similar weight advantages for treated calves resulted in trial two where treated and control animals were run on the same pasture. Under these conditions, reinfestation of treated cattle running with untreated cattle may have negated the value of treatment. However, that was not true in this particular case.

In trial three, an effort was made to see if treating both the cow and calf offered any advantage over treating only the cow or only the calf. It did not appear that treating both had any advantage over treating only the cow, but did appear advantageous over treating only the calf.

These data indicate the importance of treating the cow, rather than the calf, particularly if treatment occurs at a time when most cows have calves that are less than 80-90 days of age. Calves older than that would likely respond to treatment regardless of whether their dam had been treated or not.

'What To Do' Tips Given For Hot Check Victims

District Attorney Linda Lowrey shares information with residents concerning procedures to follow to collect hot checks.

The Texas Penal Code, Section 32.41, requires notice be sent to an individual whose check is returned to a merchant stamped "insufficient funds". The merchant is required to send a certified letter with return receipt requested to the check writer. The letter should be addressed to the address printed on the check.

If the certified letter produces no results or is returned "unclaimed" the merchant then turns the check over to the Criminal District Attorney. A courtesy letter is sent by Criminal District Attorney to the person who wrote the insufficient check. The person is given seven days to pay the check plus a fee for collection.

If the courtesy letter produces no result, a sworn complaint is filed by the Criminal District Attorney with the appropriate Justice of the Peace, who then issues a warrant.

Returned checks stamped "account closed" require no notice ac-

Yoakum County's Criminal cording to the Penal Code. In the past, Criminal District Attorney's office mailed courtesy letters to all persons whose checks were turned over for collection. That policy is now changed. Checks which are returned "account closed" will now be filed on immediately.

District Attorney Lowrey explained this change in policy was made because the law does not require notice be sent to a person closing his or her account and because the longer a check is held without a complaint being filed, the more likely it is that the person who wrote the check will be gone. The purpose is to collect checks for the merchant as quickly as possible.

Time is of the essence, states Ms. Lowrey. Merchants should send letters on insufficient checks as quickly as possible. They should also turn in checks stamped "account closed" quickly so that chances of collecting are enhanced.

"And all checks need driver's license numbers," states Ms.

Miss Jones was high point individual in the contest with 396 points out of 400 points.


Wilson was third high individual in swine judging. Miss Jones was third high individual in swine and sheep judging and third in beef cat-

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
