

# Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners Court met in special session Monday morning.

### **Lions Elect New Officers**

Mary Guetersloh, Adult Probation Officer for Yoakum County, presented Thursday's program for Plains Lions Club.

Giving an update on the criminal justice system and the local probation department status, Mrs. Guetersloh made availabe brochures soliciting assistance of citizens assistance in combating air drug trafficking. Anyone who suspects they have information should contact law enforcement officers.

Mrs. Guetersloh also told Lions that a program is available on Satanism. She recently attended a meeting on that topic and said protection of our young through cultivating a positive self-esteem is an important preventive measure. She stated she is available for self-esteem programs.

She urged Lions to help generate interest in the local literacy program. A training course July 8-9 to teach volunteers how to teach persons to read and write is available free of cost at the Yoakum County Library in Plains. She announced Denver City currently has 26 tutor/volunteers and 36 students.


